Pastor's Letter

Years ago I took a course in early childhood recollections as I was working for a degree in guidance counseling. The professor presented to us the idea that our early child memories can tell us about our present realities. He was not a Freudian psychologist who sought to have us go deep into our unconscious to discover hidden secrets. Rather, he asked the question why we, of all the thousands and thousands of experiences we had in our early childhood, choose to hold onto these few in our consciousness and let so many others remain buried? Why did these particular memories have such power within us? In particular, he sought to have us understand in the present what these memories mean to us. It was a fascinating course.

What is one of your earliest childhood memories? The challenge with this question is that you may not be sure if you are remembering an actual event, or if you are holding on to what you were told by others as to what happened. Our families often tell us things we did as little children, and so we ask ourselves if we are remembering them in our own memory bank or just imagining what we heard from others?

One of my earliest memories is being on the church steps of my home parish of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. I was about three or four. I had a mop in my hand. I am not sure if I got to the church without my family knowing, or if I was with someone. I am not sure if it even happened, but I somehow have that memory in my mind, and I have never been quite sure how to interpret it. Perhaps the mop suggests that I had a fixation on cleaning and working hard! However, I think those who know me would be quick to dismiss that since I have been told that I would not know which end of a mop to hold. Perhaps it shows that I was destined to be a priest since I was on the steps of a Church? Maybe? Or it



may be that I liked to go off and go on adventures. I am not sure how to diagnose this early memory.

I do have another clear memory when I was in the first or second grade. I distinctly recall that a large group of children were in the convent garden. We were all in our school uniforms. There was a large barrel in the middle of the garden and there was a fire that was bringing forth lots of smoke. We were burning letters that we had written to the Blessed Mother. The Sisters told us that that smoke represented our prayers going up to heaven. It was the May crowning of the Blessed Mother and there was a moment when the Blessed Mother was crowned.

I loved that moment and am delighted that we have a May crowning here at St. Martin's as part of the 10:00 a.m. Mass this Sunday. I have resisted having

any fires since I might get in trouble with the Bethpage Fire Department, and this would be humiliating since I am the chaplain!

We come before our outdoor statue of the Blessed Mother by the Church. Generations of parishioners have crowned this statue, had their First Communion, Confirmation, graduation and wedding pictures taken here. One of the first communion girls wearing her communion dress, climbed a little ladder, and put a crown of roses around the Mother of God. We say a few prayers and place flowers near the statue to honor Mary.

There would be some good willed people of other faith traditions wondering what we were doing. Why are we honoring a statue made of earthly matter? They might even wonder if we were worshipping an idol. Certainly crowning a statue with flowers is a devotional act and not any kind of false idol worship. Catholics know that we *only* adore God. We know that God took human flesh and became fully human as well as being fully divine. Our Lord told us to look at the lilies of the field and see the glory of God. He took bread and broke it and told us that it was his body. In Jesus, God became touchable. He was not a God far away but very close to us.

One of the last gifts he gave us from the cross was that of his own Mother Mary. He told future generations of believers, *Behold your Mother*. It is no surprise that the first miracle Jesus performed at the wedding feast of Cana was done at the request of his Mother. We see Mary in the midst of the apostles, giving them strength and courage, as they await the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

There may not be a symbol more powerful than the image of the love of a mother for her child. It is a



universal symbol of love. To help us understand the unimaginable love that God has for each one of us, Jesus gives us his Mother since we know what it is to have a mother's love. So as we sing our songs and crown our Mother, we are giving praise and glory to Jesus, the Son of God, who was born of this woman.

To honor Mary is to honor the God who created her and called her to be the Mother of Jesus. We believe she is the Queen of Heaven and Earth. It is my hope that our May crowning may stir up your memories of a May crowning you experienced

as a child, and to create lasting memories for the present generation of children.


Memorial Day

All of us, whether it is our choice of vocation, dealing with serious health issues involving ourselves or loved ones, whether to sell our home, a change of work, what school or career to pursue, have serious decisions to make in our life. All of us in our lives can invoke the Holy Spirit to know how best to do God's will. - Father Pat



A great bishop and Doctor of the Church tells us: "*Through the Spirit we attain what is beyond our most sublime aspirations.*" At one time or another I think we all wonder how God is working in our lives, or if he's working at all! Unlike the animals we are rational beings, who look for reasons in the happenings of life, but often we don't get answers right away or even at all, and we're left with a lot of uncertainty.

Sixteen years ago today I stood in this exact spot on Pentecost Sunday to deliver my first homily. It was my Mass of Thanksgiving shortly after my ordination, and to say I was nervous would be a gross understatement! My family and friends, as well as all my classmates were present to support me...and to critique me as well, so this better be good! But there was a problem. The time was approaching rapidly and I needed an engaging story or some human experience in order to capture the imagination of my listeners. I thought, I prayed, I read the commentaries and I still couldn't come up with anything of interest. I was just plain empty and the clock was ticking!

And then one afternoon as I was sitting in Battery Park looking out over the water, it suddenly came to me as an inner movement of grace that it was my *own* story I was to tell in order to glorify God for his great work in me. At first I resisted, but the more I thought about it, it became like a rhythmic mantra playing in my mind. These were the words: *"Manifest my glory; tell your own story."* So there it was, my own vocation story, an experience of 39 years of wandering in the desert of uncertainty - a story of grace, yes, but also of confusion, unknowing, waiting, and also some crushing disappointments. And it all began on Pentecost Sunday 1961. I remember it like it was yesterday. It was on that day so many years ago that the Spirit of God put in my heart so strongly the desire for an ordained ministry in the Church, and here I am 55 years later telling the story again to manifest God's glory and to offer him my profound gratitude for a promise fulfilled.

I made every effort to respond to God's invitation joyfully, but little did I know how much struggle it would entail and how many mountains and valleys I would have to cross in order to arrive at my Godordained destination. Shortly after that powerful Pentecost experience, I entered a seminary to begin studies for the priesthood, but for some reason, unknown to me even now, it didn't work out and I left. However the desire and the inclination for public ministry in the Church never left me. What was I to make of this? I couldn't figure it out. How was God working in me and what was I to do now? I had to live with that confusion for many years. But there's much more to the story! Quite some time after this, I was fortunate to meet and eventually marry my beautiful wife. God blessed our union with four wonderful children, and so I see marriage and family life as my primary vocation. Many years later, with the dream still alive in my mind and with my wife's support, I applied for acceptance into the Diaconate Formation Program. I was thrilled. Here was my opportunity once again, and this time I was sure it would work out. However, God had other plans. During the application process I received a big job promotion that entailed a tremendous commitment on my part, and because of this I had no choice but to withdraw my application. I was crushed! Here I was, being congratulated on my promotion, and on the inside I was dying because my dream, once again, was unfulfilled. Where was God in all of this? I was struggling for an answer and there was no answer for me. God was silent as he often is when we demand answers.

As the years passed and the dream still persisted, I had the nerve to apply for the diaconate once again. Would it work out this time or would this be strike three - you're out! Here I was a mature man committing myself to five years of intense study and a lifetime commitment only on the strength of what I believed to be an inner call by God. I must be insane! How could I take this kind of risk again after two profound disappointments? I thought about it so very carefully and then I made a leap of faith, thinking that the God who had put this in me would surely bring it about. After all, this was my own "sacred scripture" written on my heart by the finger of God himself, and I must follow it no matter what!

And then, fast forward to May 27, 2000, a miracle took place in St. Agnes Cathedral, at least a miracle in *my* life. When the ordaining bishop placed his hands on my head in silence, and then spoke the prayer of consecration - a dream, a hope kept alive for so many years - *finally* came to pass! The Church validated my inner call by conferring on me the Sacred Order of Deacon. The promise of the Spirit was finally fulfilled! You can only imagine the emotion I felt that day! Some may ask why I tell this story? I tell it first to give glory to God. I also tell it with the realization that so many of us struggle with the mystery of how God is working in our lives, or even *if* he's working at all. We have to deal with so much confusion and uncertainty as we look to make sense out of the reality of our existence. How will the problems we're struggling with work out? Why doesn't God act right now? How can I continue to carry this impossible cross in my life? Why is God silent? Who really has answers to these perplexing questions? One thing we know for sure is that we're a work in progress over a lifetime and God isn't finished with us yet. His time is not necessarily our time and so we desperately need patience and humility if his plan for us is to unfold.



Look at today's scripture. What does it say to us? One of the things we see clearly is that, like us, the disciples were held in the bondage of fear and confusion. And in a precise moment - in **God's** time - the power of the Holy Spirit liberated them. They were emboldened to say very strongly and with persistence that "Jesus is Lord!" The promise of Jesus to send his Spirit to be with them for-

ever was fulfilled on that great day of Pentecost 2000 years ago. That very same Spirit is with us today. The Spirit who hovered over the waters at creation. The Spirit who inspired the prophets. The Spirit we received in baptism. The same Spirit who dwells in the Church. The Spirit who inspires all the good we do in life.

And what do we have to be alert to in all of this? That we are open and receptive to the often mysterious workings of the Spirit of God, and that we allow the Spirit to guide us in all our endeavors, both religious and secular. If we don't do this, the oil in our inner lamp can dry up and then are walking in the darkness of sin and indifference - and how pitiable that is for a child of God redeemed by the blood of the Lamb! So the awesome Spirit of Jesus is near at hand and hard at work for us as we allow him to mold and shape us into what he wants us to be. Very often emptying us out in the crucible of suffering and defeat in order to fill us with the new wine of beauty, truth, compassion, gentleness, faith, peace, love and all the magnificent fruits of the Spirit. That's what his work in us is all about.

So as we approach the Eucharist today, let us ask ourselves, have we heard the wind and experienced the awesome power of God's Spirit in our lives? Have we seen the fire and has it enflamed our hearts to faith, repentance and good works? And have we, by our lives, even with all our faults and deficiencies proclaimed the message of the risen Christ to others by word and deed?

And so as this wonderful season of grace draws to a close, let us recall, at least, the first words of Jesus in his risen life: "Peace be with you...Rejoice! Receive the Holy Spirit!" The promise has indeed been fulfilled...Alleluia, alleluia, alleluia...Amen!
