I know that I am human with many faults and limitations, and that Jesus gate of the city, a man is the Son of God with both a human and divine nature. Even if the Lord let me be godlike for a day, I might be too nervous to walk on water! My faith would fail me and I would cry out like St. Peter, Lord, save me! On a more serious note, I feel this temptation when I see a child suffering from a serious illness. It is so very painful to see a suffering child and I can only think of the pain of the family. I wish I could touch the child and restore the little one to full health. When I see a family about to lose a Mom or Dad at a young age, my heart breaks. I anoint them and her, he was moved with offer them Holy Communion, sacraments that are great gifts from God. Still, I wish I could heal them and raise them up. This feeling happens to me all the time, and I come face to face with the reality that I am not her, "Do not weep." God. Like all people, I am subject to the universal laws of nature. Granted, there are rare times that miracles do happen, and we praise God for them.

In our Gospel today, there is a woman in the village of Nain who is walking behind her dead son in a funeral procession. Widows are mentioned halted, and he said, often in both the Old and New Testaments. Most women before and during the time of Christ had little power. They were second class citizens who depended on their husbands for their care and protection. Some of the Moslem countries of today continue to treat women in this way. There are many admonitions in the Scriptures to care for widows The dead man sat up since they were so vulnerable. So, this Gospel presents us with a widow. It also tells us that the widow had a son; we can presume that this son helped take care of his mother and provided for her. That would be expected both then and now. But now the son is dead.

> A key sentence of this Gospel that we heard today is: "When the Lord saw her, he was moved with pity for her and said to her, 'Do not weep.'"

The deep pain of this woman entered into the heart of Jesus. To be compassionate is to enter deeply into the suffering of another. Very often, when another person tells of us of their suffering, we may say, I know what you are going through; I too had a similar experience. These are well-meaning words but I am not sure if we can ever truly enter into the suffering of another. I do not think our Lord Jesus planned on doing a miracle that day. Jesus does not cure everyone, nor does he raise them from the dead. But his loving heart cannot resist the tears of the mother. He touches the coffin telling the young man to get up. The young man gets up and speaks to his mother!

The Gospel left me thinking about widows and widowers, of whom we have many in our parish. Some are still in deep pain while time has tempered the loss of their spouse but is never completely gone. My sister lost her husband three years ago, and she often says to me, *I miss Jack. I miss him when I just want someone to listen to me. I miss him when I am upset and want his help in calming down. I miss him at family occasions and when I am invited to events that are filled with couples.* 

Being a widow or widower has its sorrows. As a community we are called to touch them, in our own ways, with our love and support. We can help raise them up. There is a great deal of pain and suffering in the world, much of which we can do little about. Still, in our own families and among our friends and parishioners, there are those who need, whether they know it or not, the compassionate touch of Jesus that can come through us.

Last week you, through the good work of Ro Malerba, raised almost \$2,000 for homeless veterans. You touched those good men and women with the fingers of Jesus. The donations for the baby shower for the Right to Life were outstanding. Women and men you may never meet may be able to bring a life into the world and sustain that baby because of your generosity. Some of you literally bring Jesus to homes in the parish as you visit the sick and touch them with Sacred Host and your own kindness and love. Our food pantry and St. Vincent de Paul Society continue to touch people in need with compassionate love that seeks to mirror the love of Jesus.

I love the story of the Wedding Feast of Cana. It is not Jesus who notices the wine running low but his mother. Perhaps he was so enjoying himself that he did not see this reality. But here in the village of Nain, he notices...he sees. I think that is the first step in compassion and touching another person with Jesus. It is to see another's pain. I remember a priest asking the most dangerous question he could ask at the end of a busy Sunday to someone with tears in her eyes and sitting in a pew after Mass. The

question? *"Is there something wrong*?" Asking the question, *"Can I help you*?" may lead to missing a Jet game as you seek to be helpful to the hurting person. We begin to be compassionate when we truly can see another, perhaps even our spouse or best friend in pain, and *notice* it!

And we have places in ourselves that are dying or have died. We could have developed a cold heart to someone we once loved. Our faith in God may be weak and growing weaker. We may have lost our energy and enthusiasm for life. They are common problems that many of us face. I recommend two steps in such cases to the part of you that is dying.



First, talk to someone you trust. Let go of pride and what people will think, and open your heart to life. Second, **pray** to Jesus - the same Jesus who touched the son of the widow at Nain, and ask him to touch that part of you that most needs new life. You might do that today as we receive him in the Eucharist!





The philosopher Hans Jonas once said that three things have distinguished human life from other



animal experiences since the dawn of history - the TOOL, the IM-AGE and the GRAVE. The TOOL imposes our knowledge and will onto nature. the IMAGE - our paintings and other art -projects and our imagination. It implies a sense of beauty and memory, and a desire to express them. But the greatest difference between humans and other animals is the GRAVE. Only humans bury their dead. Only humans know their own mortality. And knowing that they will die, only humans can ask where we came

from, and what our life means and what comes after it.

When we talk about THE DIGNITY OF THE HUMAN PERSON and THE SANCTITY OF HUMAN LIFE, we are putting into words that we are unique in nature and unlike any other creature. We now live in a society that speaks persuasively about protecting the environment and rescuing species on the brink of extinction. But then it tolerates the MASS KILLING OF UNBORN CHILDREN, and contemplates the KILLING OF THE SICK AND ELDERLY in the name of their "DIGNITY."

Modern critics of religion like to point out that GOD is absent from the U.S. Constitution. And that is true, but not because GOD was unwelcome. In effect, GOD suffused the whole constitutional enterprise. Nearly all the Founders were religious believers and were quite devout. Their writings were heavily influenced by biblical language, morality and thought. The Founders saw religious faith as something separate from government but VITAL TO THE NATION'S SURVIVAL.

Today, people of faith are facing a multitude of threats to RELIGIOUS LIBERTY and demand other active witness and opposition. It is important for our OWN INTEGRITY and the INTEGRITY OF OUR COUNTRY that we STAND UP on attacks on our RELIGIOUS FREEDOM. History affords many examples, both before and since America's founding, where RESTRAINTS ON RELIGIOUS LIBERTY presaged the denial of OTHER HUMAN RIGHTS. BY STANDING UP FOR RELIGIOUS LIBERTY NOW, WE CAN RENEW THE SOUL OF AMERICA AND strengthen our nation's commitment to ALL THE RIGHTS AND FREEDOMS we enjoy as children of GOD.




