

Pastor's Letter

Last New Year's Eve, a good friend of mine, Father Francis O'Rourke, died at the age of 80. We had worked together for nine years as part of the Provincial Council of our province. We loved to tease each other and he often got the better of me. After a New York Jet loss (not an uncommon event), he would have the paper wide open to the pages that described the loss. Ironically, he too, was a Jet fan but he loved to see my reactions to his antics. Frank was very conservative both in his politics and spirituality. He was also a great lover all things Irish since both his parents were from Ireland. In 1996, when Bill Clinton was running for a second term of office against Senator Bob Dole, I asked Frank whom was he voting for. I said to him, :this election must be dilemma for you since Bill Clinton had done a great deal for the Irish." He looked at me with great scorn and said, I am **Catholic** before I am Irish!

I think a challenge for all immigrants to our nation is are we good Americans and good Catholics? Most often these two great values do not clash, but occasionally they do. It is said that previous generations of immigrants did all they could when they arrived in America to prove they were good Americans. They wanted to fit in. Interestingly, the people judging them as to whether they were good Americans were also immigrants themselves, even if they came over on the Mayflower. There was serious prejudice against Catholic immigrants in the 19th century with churches being burned down. One of the reasons that the Catholic school system in America started was because many public schools were promoting anti-Catholic bigotry in their classrooms. Even as late as 1960, there was still a strong prejudice against voting for John F. Kennedy, a Catholic. It was said that if he was elected, the pope would be running America. Thank God that bigotry has passed. Joe Biden is Catholic as well as five members of the Supreme Court. Nonetheless, I do think there is still a very subtle prejudice in the media against the Catholic Church because of the Church's commitment to pro-life issues and traditional marriage.

I am very proud to be an American as were my Irish immigrant parents. The flag always hung out from our parlor floor window on national holidays. God has blessed our nation with great natural resources. I have heard it said that states like Nebraska and Kansas could feed the whole world with their great harvests of wheat and corn. I love that our country is quick to respond to natural disasters wherever they occur the world, and we have often shed the blood of our finest young men and women in defense of those oppressed by dictators.

We are not perfect. We certainly know that among our struggles, the sin of slavery still haunts our nation today, and our treatment of Native Americans was not always honorable. I think Catholics tend to be good citizens. Many members of the military, the police and fire departments, the FBI, and other such service professions are Catholics. So many of the 9/11 funerals were for Catholics; yet as patriotic as we are, we still need to discern where "my Catholic faith and my love of country" may clash.

I will mention three areas to look at as we think about being both Catholic and American. The first is the issue of life. As Catholics, it is our conviction that life is a gift from God. We seek to protect life from conception to natural death. There are many of our fellow citizens who disagree with this position. We have every right and obligation to stand up for our convictions in terms of life. I believe there is very strong movement to move away from the constitutional principal of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness as natural God-given rights.

The second principle is that of religious freedom. Again, I think the past years have seen an erosion in a commitment to this fundamental American principle. Religious people (with Catholics among them) are sometimes being forced by legislation and the courts to go against their beliefs. Most of us do not even notice this until it might affect us.

The third principle to address is immigration. This is a most complicated topic to address. Our Church teaches that people have a right to better themselves by immigrating to another land, while at the same time, it teaches that a nation has a right to protect its borders. In my own mind, it is far from easy to reconcile the two. I do think that as a nation we have the moral right to vet the people who come into our country so that we are not accepting criminals and terrorists. Yet, we are also called to see the poor and suffering as our brothers and sisters. We have a right to protect our nation while at the same time an obligation not to fall into bigotry and resentment against all immigrants.

We American Catholics, as we celebrate the 4th of July, love our nation and we are committed to our faith. Most times, both values stand side by side. We can be good Americans without compromising our core values.

The carved sun on George Washington's Chair

Is the sun rising or setting on America? It began in Philadelphia in May of 1787. The purpose of this



convention was to create a constitution by which the 13 American colonies could construct and maintain a federal government. By September, the 55 delegates had reached agreement upon a system of federal government and the means of adopting it, by giving each state the opportunity to vote for ratification.

As the final signatures were being placed upon the document, Benjamin Franklin, the most senior member of the convention, offered a commentary to the members seated

nearby. Throughout the proceedings in Philadelphia, Franklin had noticed that George Washington, the presiding chairman, was seated in a high-back chair that had a gilded sun carved at the top. Noting that painters often found it difficult in their art to distinguish a rising sun from a setting one, Franklin commented that he had similar concerns about the future of America. Was the sun rising or setting upon this nation?

But as Franklin saw the finished Constitution taking form and the system of government it would produce, he stated, "Now, at length, I have the happiness to know that it is a *rising* sun and not a setting sun."

I grew up in the shadows of the Basilica of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Brooklyn. Wednesday was novena day and the chimes played the hymn to Our Lady of Perpetual Help throughout the neighborhood. In those days, no one would dare complain. I am not sure if we even knew that the Blessed Mother had other titles other than Our Lady of Perpetual Help. As I grew older, I learned that Mary had *many* titles: Our Lady of Hope, Our Lady of Sorrow, Our Lady of Consolation, Queen of the Angels, Queen of Martyrs, Our Lady of Guadalupe, Our Lady of Lourdes and Our Lady of Fatima, to name but a very few.

Every title of Mary honored some attribute that believers found in her and wanted to celebrate. Of course, her greatest title is that of Mother of God. There was a time when certain people tried to say she was only the Mother of the human Jesus since no human being could have title of Mother of God. At the Council of Ephesus, this heresy was put to an end. The people cried out in Greek in the streets with great delight, *"Theotokas,"* which means Mother of God!

In my days in the seminary, we were taught to pray daily to Our Lady of Perpetual Help. In high school, we had a shine to Mary under the title of Perpetual Help; and it was a custom to stop by the icon several times a day to make a short visit and say a quick prayer. As a freshman, I prayed regularly for three things: 1) that my Mom and Dad live to see me ordained a priest; 2) that I make the basketball team; and 3) that I become, when I was a senior, one of the prefect of students which was a most prestigious position.

I am grateful to Our Lady that my Mom and Dad did live to see me ordained; and they shared in the joy of my priesthood for many years. I did finally make the basketball team in my senior year but I was the fifteenth man on a terrible team and I only played two minutes the whole year. Still, I do not feel cheated by Our Lady of Perpetual Help since, ten years later, I was the coach of the same team. I won't tell you my lifetime record. I never did become a student prefect. In my senior year I was in charge of the pond to prepare it for hockey games. That year in cold Western Pennsylvania, the pond never froze and all the hockey players blamed me. But I might say that Our Lady heard my prayer for a prestigious positon by election as Provincial. From that experience, I might say, "be careful what you pray for; you're going to get it!"

There is a cute story I heard about the Blessed Mother. It seems that Jesus saw some people in heaven, and he complained to heaven's gatekeeper, St. Peter, because he thought he was getting soft and letting in some people who did not meet the heavenly standards (probably Yankee fans). Peter responded to Jesus in this way, "Lord, every time I close the door, your Mother opens a window!" It is a charming little story but it is true to our faith. God the Father, the Son, the Holy Spirit - the Blessed Trinity - is the source of all compassion and mercy. Jesus in the Gospels shows us constantly his love of sinners.

No one can ever outdo God in his infinite mercy and compassion. Still for whatever reason, particularly in the past and even today, some viewed God as a fierce judge waiting to throw sinners into hell. So Mary became for many the compassionate warm mother who loves her children. We all had a mother. I suspect the bond between mother and child is perhaps the deepest bond that human beings share with one another. One of my favorite aspects of the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help is the long graceful fingers of Mary pointing to Jesus. Whoever loves the Blessed Mother will always be lead to Jesus. I love the Gospel of the Wedding Feast of Cana. Mary notices a need; the party is running out of wine! Jewish



weddings at the time went on for days and they were for the whole village. Hospitality for the Jewish people was of the highest value. To run out of wine would be shameful.

Who would notice such a thing - a mother! Mary goes to Jesus and says, "they have no more wine!" Jesus tells her that it is not yet time for him to publically reveal himself with a miracle. Mary, knowing Jesus would not refuse her request, tells the waiters, "do whatever he says!" Soon there is 150 gallons of water turned to wine. Mary's word to the waiters is also to us, "do whatever he says!"

A second feature the icon shows is the humanity of Jesus. He

is good but he is fully human, like us in all things but sin. Everyone's favorite detail in the image is the loose sandal. The unknown artist tells a story of Jesus as a child seeing in a nightmare the instruments of his crucifixion being held by the Archangels Michael and Gabriel. Filled with terror he runs so fast into his Mother's arms that his sandal is coming off. The arms of Mary are a good place to run when we face great fear or serious worry.

Through almost a miracle, this ancient icon became entrusted to the Redemptorist Order in 1866 by Pope Pius IX. When he handed the original icon to our superior General, the Pope said three words: "Make her known." And 150 years later, we Redemptorists are so grateful for this grace since countless blessings have come to our Congregation through Our Lady. Wherever we go, we bring Our Lady of Perpetual Help with us. We have also seen her work wonders in the lives of countless people. The Redemptorists brought Our Lady here 30 years ago when we were blessed to come to St. Martin's.

I was thinking of the mission the Pope gave us 150 years ago - make her known. We have done that mission well since this icon is perhaps the most popular image of Mary in the world. As I think about making her known, I think of a friend telling a friend, "oh, you have to go to such and such a restaurant, the food is great!" "You've got to see this movie - it is wonderful!" "Read this book; you will love it!" "You must see this television show!" "Please, go to my doctor; she will help get you better!" Friends always share with friends because they love them.

We Redemptorists love the people we serve. I know that is true of us here at St. Martin's. So in our enthusiasm and because we have felt her love, we turn to you, our friends, and say, "Go to Our Lady of Perpetual Help; she will take care of you!" *Father Pat's homily on the Jubilee of the Icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help*



RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE

SUPREME COURT RULING BLASTED FOR PRO-ABORTION BIAS IN TEXAS RULING

Washington D.C., June 27, 2016, (CNA/EWTN News). In striking down Texas' regulations of abortion clinics, the Supreme Court showed favoritism toward the supposed RIGHT TO ABORTION over states' interests in the health of women and normal court proceedings, critics said Monday. "The Court has rejected a common-sense law protecting women from abortion facilities that put profits above patient safety," said Deirdre McQuade, assistant director of pro-life communications at the U.S. CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS secretariat of Pro-Life Activities.

In a 5-3 vote, the Supreme Court struck down a Texas law that included two key regulations of abortion clinics - ABORTIONISTS HAD TO HAVE ADMITTING PRIVILEGES AT A LOCAL HOSPITAL, AND CLINICS HAD TO MEET THE STANDARDS OF AMBULATORY SURGICAL CENTERS.

THE COURT RULED THAT THE LAW PUT AN undue burden ON A WOMEN'S RIGHT TO AN ABORTION, SAYING THAT IT POSED a substantial obstacle TO THAT RIGHT WITHOUT SHOWING THE NECESSARY BENEFITS OF ITS REGULATIONS TO WOMEN'S HEALTH. The court also said that requiring clinics to meet the standards of ambulatory surgical centers, PROVIDES FEW, IF ANY, HEALTH BENEFITS FOR WOMEN, POSES A SUBSTANTIAL OBSTACLE TO WOMEN SEEKING ABORTIONS, AND CONSTITUTES AND UNDUE BURDEN ON THEIR CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHT TO DO SO."

Justice Clarence Thomas said that the DECISION PERPETUATES THE COURT'S HABIT OF APPLYING DIF-FERENT RULES TO DIFFERENT CONSTITUTIONAL RIGHTS - ESPECIALLY THE PUTATIVE RIGHT TO ABOR-TION."

Catholics spoke out against the majority opinion: "THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN TEXAS, IN COMMUNION WITH MILLIONS OF CATHOLICS ACROSS AMERICA AND THE WORLD, WILL CONTINUE ITS EFFORTS TO PROTECT LIFE AND HUMAN DIGNITY FROM CONCEPTION TO NATURAL DEATH," The Texas Catholic bishops stated. "SURGICAL ABORTION IS AN INVASIVE PROCEDURE THAT POSES NUMEROUS AND SERI-OUS MEDICAL COMPLICATIONS," they said. "THE STATE HAS A LEGITIMATE INTEREST IN ENSURING THE MAXIMUM LEVEL OF SAFETY FOR THE WOMAN SUBJECTED TO THE PROCEDURE AND THAT VIABLE EMERGENCY CARE IS AVAILABLE IF COMPLICATIONS SUCH AS HEMORRAGE, INFECTION, UTERINE PERFORATION, BLOOD CLOTS, CERVICAL TEARS, OR ALLERGIC REACTIONS OCCUR.'

The Texas law came after a massive grand jury report on horrific abuses at the Philadelphia clinic of DR. KERMIT GOSNELL, which became the subject of NATIONAL OUTRAGE. This and other reports of abuses in abortion clinics should make state legislatures interested in greater regulation, not less. 
