Updates

• I decided to install a new playground in place of the present one. The first reason I did so was be-



cause the old one was beginning to show wear, and we were having some problems with splinters. I have found that the playground is very popular with the younger children in the parish. I see many children playing there before or after religious education classes during the year as well as after the children's Mass at 10:00 a.m. Since we were not able to have a gym as part of our capital campaign due to the very high cost, I thought this was a small way to make up for that. The cost was \$19,000 which was taken from the Capital Campaign Fund. We sought to get a very safe unit, and we pray our children have great

fun in safety on the new playground.

- I am working on the possibility of our having a handicap accessible ramp into the school cafeteria, named Emmaus Hall, which is the first floor of the school. Many parishioners have asked for this and we are presently working to study what is possible and what it would cost.
- The Capital Campaign will end this December. I am working on a how to recognize our many donors and you will be hearing from me shortly. It is still not too late to make a donation to the campaign. Any money given remains in the parish and is not taxed by the diocese.
- There are other projects that I hope to complete in the coming year. As a former teacher, I think of the year as beginning in September. They include the painting of the exterior of the church, the lighting in the church, and new doors for the church.
- The large derrick in the Town of Oyster Bay's municipal parking lot is not any kind of parish project. I
 do regret that it is blocking one of the entrances onto Church property. I was informed of the project by the Arcadis Company for the purpose of conducting an environmental study.

Jesus loved to go to the about home of Martha, Mary and Lazarus. It must have been a place where he could really rest and relax. They must have told him many times, "Jesus, make yourself at home; you are always welcome!" Martha is the one who is busy about doing many things. She is preparing the family meal and wants to be so very hospitable to Jesus. Meanwhile, her sister Mary is sitting at the one thing. Mary has feet of Jesus and listening and speaking to him. The words of Jesus have so chosen the better part captivated Mary that she delights in just being with him. Martha complains and it will not be tak- to Jesus about this and wonders why Mary does not help with the meal. To my mind, it is certainly a very reasonable request. Jesus gently tells Martha that Mary has chosen the better part - that of focusing on the message that Jesus has to bring to his people.

We have all heard the voice of Martha. Stop watching that football game and take out the garbage! Get off that cell phone and set the table for dinner! Turn the television off and come to dinner! Both Martha and Mary love Jesus and he loves them. They express their love in different ways. I am sure Jesus enjoyed the meals that Martha prepared for him. I am also sure that Jesus appreciated the presence of Mary as she listened to him.

I wonder if those of us who are Marthas sort of resent Mary a little bit. Sure, she loves Jesus and sits with him, but let's get practical - who is going to prepare the dinner? Preparing the meal for Jesus is also a great act of love. Most people tend to be Marthas rather than Marys. We like to be busy; we like to get things done. We are very faithful to being at Mass on the weekend; we love the intimacy we have with Jesus in receiving his Body and Blood. There are times when the sermon inspires us, or we hear a favorite hymn.

When I visited our parishes in the Caribbean, the average Sunday Mass was about two hours, and the priest spoke for at least a half hour. If you did not preach a long homily, the people would tell you that they were cheated. I suspect that if we started having two hour Masses here that many parishioners would start going to St. Kilian's or St. James. It Is hard not to look at our watch during Mass and wonder why the Mass does not move more quickly. Some of us leave the Mass as soon as we feel we have fulfilled our Sunday obligation. Breakfast is waiting; we need to do our food shopping; the kids have soccer games to be played; the Jets are on; the grass must be cut; there is homework to be done.

We also need to work to provide for our family. The luxury of sitting at the feet of Jesus, of prayer, of just being with God is too challenging in the face of my busy life. I have met some Marys in our parish. They are men and women who pray here in the church at odd times during the day. Some of them sit for an hour or so in front of the Blessed Sacrament or say the rosary and the Divine Mercy Chaplet. When I see them, I am both inspired and challenged. They remind me that I should pray more. Let me be clear, both Marthas and Marys are loved by God; neither is better than the other.

I believe this Gospel account of Martha and Mary is inviting us to look at our life styles. I just finished two weeks vacation that I shared with family and friends. I did some bike riding, swimming, walking, shopping, and enjoyed wonderful meals. (I was certainly a *Mary* during the preparation of the meals as I concentrated on the Mets and the news.) A vacation is a great gift, a time to slow down and enjoy our family and friends, the sun, the scenery, and the food. I am not sure how good we are at leisure and recreation. I love the word *recreation*. It means to be *re*-created. That is why God gives us the Sabbath, a time to rest, a time to slow down, and a time to pray.

If you are asked, "how are you?" the common greeting of today is to respond, "Oh, I am so busy!" The person who asks the question goes on to say how busy he or she is. It's as if it is a contest to see who's the busier one! There is a certain amount of busyness that is necessary and good. We need time to work, to raise our children, to upkeep our home or apartment, to pay our bills, to see our doctors. These are all necessary activities that must be done. However, we all need to find some time to pause and slow down. Try reading sentences without punctuation. Living without some quiet times throws us out of balance. While I was on vacation, there was the opportunity to use the community pools. One pool was your average pool, filled with laughter and children splashing about. But this community had a unique pool called the serenity pool that was quiet for very quiet conversation.

Maybe we all need a space for some quiet in our lives. On the Fourth of July, I went to a wonderful fireworks display over the bay in the Outer Banks of North Carolina. It was breathtaking to see all the glorious colors and feel a deep sense of patriotism from those around us. As we left the lot, the traffic was unbearable, as we sat for almost an hour without moving. The glory of the fireworks were soon forgotten as I grew more and more frustrated.

The clichés "stop and smell the roses" or "smell the coffee" are used so often because they contain a truth very similar to the story of Martha and Mary. We can be both Marthas and Marys. In the midst of all our activities and especially in our relationship with loved ones, we can for just a moment slow down and appreciate all that we have and all that is going on around us.

How often we hear, "I can't believe my son is going to college" or "my daughter is graduating from grade school!" "They grow up so fast!" "It seemed like only yesterday they were babies!" How true! Today's Gospel is a powerful call to see God in the world around us, in the people of our lives, in the daily events that make up our lives. This Eucharist invites us to slow down and reflect on the presence of God in our lives. As we leave Mass, we go forward to see him in the world around us.

One last thought - If you looked at your watch during this sermon, you must say one "Hail Mary!"
