Pastor's Letter



Dear Parishioners,

It is said that the older you get, the faster time seems to pass by. It just seems like yesterday that we began the Capital Campaign for *Paving the Way to Christ*. It was actually almost three years ago and the Campaign ends in December! A more detailed letter will be going out to all the donors in the coming days.

I have decided to create two donor walls that will list the names of the donors or the names of anybody they wish to remember (up to thirty letters which includes spaces and punctuation). The above picture is a rendition of what I have in mind. The two plaques are a light shade of green. This will take a while to do since gathering all the information will take some time.

Let me outline some points about this remembrance wall:

- I know some donors felt recognition was not needed and said nothing had to be done to recognize their donation. Anyone who wants to remain anonymous will have that option.
- A promise was made when the campaign began that recognition would be given to the donors. I believe that promise should be kept. I have seen people touch the names of their loved ones who are listed on the donor tree in the gathering space of the Church. For people to be so generous in challenging economic times stands as a witness as a great testimony to their love of God and their parish.
- I also know that there were many parishioners who wished to donate to the campaign but were unable to do so because of their limited financial resources. You did support the campaign by your prayers and by volunteering to help with the work of Paving the Way to Christ.

Father Pat's Homily of August 7, 2016

You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come.

Luke 12

There is an old story that I have probably told before, but I think it captures an aspect of today's Gospel. An old Irish priest goes for a morning walk in the small village where he serves as pastor. As he is walking down the street, he notices a fellow coming toward him. Since the pastor knew everyone in the small village, his curiosity is aroused and he asks the young man who he is. The fellow responds, *I am Jesus, God's Son. I have always wanted to visit Ireland, since they say it is the closest thing to heaven.* The elderly cleric is shocked and frightened to meet Christ face to face, and he makes a beeline home and called his bishop to tell him that Christ is present in his village. The priest asks the bishop what he should do. The bishop is also startled by this news and decides to call the cardinal of Dublin. The cardinal also is unsure what to do so he makes a direct call to the Pope in Rome. His eminence says, *Holy Father, Jesus is walk-ing down the street of a little village in our country and we are not sure how to respond!* The Pope pauses for a moment and says, *Look Busy!*

I think we have all had such experiences in life. There are a few parishioners who like to knock on the back door of the rectory, which opens to my office. I often yell *Come in* since I may be comfortably ensconced on my New York Met recliner, sitting in my man cave, which is a small room off the side of my office, taking a bit of mid-afternoon sies-ta. When I see the person, I sit up and announce that I working on my Sunday sermon since I want to appear busy. You can't get away with much these days. There are cameras in many places that we do not even notice. The police use these cameras often to solve serious crimes. They also use them to catch those not making a full stop at a stop sign as I can attest. There are drones and satellites in the sky watching and seeing what is going on. People are amazingly quick to take out their cell phone and record just

about anything that catches their attention. There are cell phone apps that can help you see and record what is going on in your home while you are away. In the past, there was a show called *Candid Camera* which recorded people secretly doing funny things. Now it seems we are **all** on *Candid Camera*.

Most of us learned that God is all-knowing and all-seeing. Jesus tells us two parables today about the master coming home unexpectedly to see what the servants are doing. We heard today: *Gird your loins and light your lamps and be like servants who await their master's return from a wedding, ready to open immediately when he comes and knocks. Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival. You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come.*" In the second parable, But if that servant says to himself, 'My master is delayed in coming,' and begins to beat the menservants and the maidservants, to eat and drink and get drunk, then that servant's master will come on an unexpected day and at an unknown hour and will punish the servant serverely.

Although we do not like to think about it, there is a fundamental truth to these two parables. None of us know the hour or the day when God will call us home. I remember being asked the question, *if you knew that this day was the day you were going to die, what would you do?* Certainly, like those trapped in the Twin Towers on 9/11, you would want to call your loved ones and tell them how much you love them. You would ask yourself, *am I ready to face God today? Do I need to go to confession?* You would certainly pray. You might think with regret at some nasty words you spoke recently to a loved one and wish you could take them back, or you might think of someone you were bitter toward and wish you now had a chance for a reconciliation.

I do not believe that Jesus tells these parables to scare us although the Bible does say that *fear is the beginning of wisdom*. The Scriptures also tell us that *perfect love does cast our fear*. St. Alphonsus Liguori, told his followers that *conversions brought about by fear will not last, but only those brought about by love*. We could ask why we came to Mass today. We might respond that we want to love and worship God and hear his word and receive his Body and Blood. Perhaps, we came because we always come, or I do not want God to punish me for not keeping his commandments. Perhaps, you came because your mother insisted you come. I suppose we would have a variety of motivations, but the hope is that we come because we love the God who loves us.

Through the years, I have spoken to people who have been away from their faith for a long time. They go to confession and celebrate his mercy. But then they begin to say, *Well I forgot to tell this sin or I might not have explained that failure as well as I could have*. I sometimes think we may have a tendency to turn God into a great book keeper with a giant ledger on all of us. Every failure is listed and we better be able to confess each one. This image of the great accountant in the heavens does not fit with the words of Jesus who constantly speaks about the mercy and love that his Father has for each one of us. God is not a "*Gotcha!*" God waiting to pounce on us for every sin and fault.

These two parable stress to us that the only time, the only moment we have, is the present. Yesterday is gone and tomorrow is not here. The great psychologist Carl Jung described neurosis as a refusal to live in the present. I have read that people who face a terminal disease often come to deeply value every precious moment that they have. Some Catholic writers talk about the sacrament of the present moment. So now is the time to tell our loved one that we love them, to make peace with our enemies, to be disciples of Jesus as well as we can. We trust that God is loving us at this moment rather than watching us to catch us sinning. Today we heard in the Gospel: *Provide money bags for yourselves that do not wear out, an inexhaustible treasure in heaven that no thief can reach nor moth destroy. For where your treasure is, there also will your heart be.* God's love is our treasure.

The Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary - Monday, August 15th

Celebrated every year on August 15, the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary commemorates the death of Mary and her bodily assumption into Heaven, before her

body could begin to decay—a foretaste of our own bodily resurrection at the end of time. Because it signifies the Blessed Virgin's passing into eternal life, it is one of the most important of all Marian feasts.

In dioceses of the United States, it is usually a holy day of obligation. However, if the feast falls on a Monday or a Saturday, it is not an obligatory one. This decision has been made since the shortage of priests can make it difficult to have all the necessary masses required for both Sunday and the Holy Day. This norm also applies to All Saints Day, Feast of the Immaculate Conception, and the Solemnity of Mary (January 1st). Christmas Day is always a day of obligation even if does fall on a Saturday or Monday.



Mass will be celebrated at 6:30AM, while the 9:00AM Mass will be celebrated with music accompaniment. All are most welcome to honor Mary on this great feast.

Women Religious call for civility by candidates in presidential race Source: The Long Island Catholic Magazine, August 2016

SILVER SPRING, Md. (CNS) — More than 5,600 U.S. religious sisters have signed a letter asking for civil discourse in the presidential campaign.

The letter was to be sent Aug. 8 to the candidates of the Democratic, Republican, Green and Libertarian parties as well as their vice presidential running mates and the chairs of their respective parties.

"We simply ask that all who seek to lead refrain from language that disrespects, dehumanizes or demonizes another," the letter said. "We pray that all who seek to influence public opinion will be mindful of the common good and respectful of the dignity of each and every person."

The letter was written by the Leadership Conference of Women Religious (LCWR), based in the Washington suburb of Silver Spring. LCWR has 1,362 members, who represent 308 congregations of women religious in the United States.

A total of 5,671 sisters have signed the letter. Their ministries include education, health care, and other pastoral and social services.

"We urge you to join us in pledging to engage in careful listening and honest dialogue that honors the dignity of those with whom we disagree and treats all with the respect that is their God-given right," the letter said. "Please join us in promising to seek the common good, to desire only good for all others, and to offer our own truth with equal measures of conviction and humility."

The letter quoted from Pope Francis' address to Congress when he visited the United States last September: "You are called to defend and preserve the dignity of your fellow citizens in the tireless and demanding pursuit of the common good, for this is the chief aim of all politics."

"Unfortunately, we live in a time when our politics is too often marked by self-interest and demeaning rhetoric. We seem to be caught in a political system paralyzed by ideological extremism and hyper-partisanship," the letter said.

"Those on all sides of the growing political divide too often appeal to our basest instincts and stoke the fires of fear that tear at the fabric of our nation. We cannot let the voices of hatred and fear carry the day."

"Unfortunately, it seems in this particular political season commitment to political discourse that preserves the dignity of the human person and promotes the common good is in short supply," said an Aug. 3 statement by Sister Joan Marie Steadman, a Sister of St. Joseph who is LCWR's executive director. "This is why LCWR is calling for civility in our discourse and decency in our political interaction."
