Pastor's Letter

In May of 1917, as Lucia, Francisco, and Jacinta watched their flocks of sheep at the Cova da Iria, they met a beautiful lady—they didn't know who she was—who asked them to meet her there on the 13th of every month for the next six months. She promised to tell them who she was and what she wanted. Today, we know that the lady was, as she called herself, "the Lady of the Rosary", the Mother of God. Among the many things Mary said to the children during their meetings, she promised that on the last month of the apparitions—in October—she would perform a miracle "so that all may believe." (Note that she didn't say all would believe. You can lead a horse to water, but you can't make him drink!)

Thousands of witnesses, including people from many miles away, saw the sun leave its place in the sky, begin to spin like a top, and come barreling toward the earth. Did anyone find it odd that they could look at the sun without it hurting their eyes? Or were they focused on the fear that it was the end of the world? Many got down on their knees to pray. And then, just as quickly as it came toward the earth, it returned to its spot in the sky and stopped spinning. Everyone was dry, as if it hadn't rained at all.

Last week was very stressful for me as the annual parish picnic approached for Friday, August 12th. More than 400 parishioners had responded that they would attend; and raffle tickets to defray the cost of the picnic had been sold at the weekend Masses for the previous two weeks. A planning committee had been meeting over the course of the past months, cakes and desserts were being baked, food was being purchased, the DJ was hired, and gift baskets were being prepared. We had many wonderful volunteers in involved in the stages of preparation. The only thing that was out of our control of course was the weather.

A week before the picnic, I went into full anxiety mode and began checking several weather apps on my Ipad. If I didn't like what they reported, I would turn to another one for a hopefully better forecast. I kept reading predictions for rain and thunderstorms. As August 12th drew nearer, the weather people were saying it would rain early on Friday evening, right as our gathering would begin! Should I cancel or move ahead? What would we do with 400 thawed hamburgers and pounds of macaroni salad? And, along with the rainy weather reports were warnings about excessive heat and humidity. I began to feel like I had my own personal raincloud following me. As Friday morning dawned, the reports said there was a good chance it would rain at 7:00 p.m. There were warnings in red letters about the dangers of excessive heat. Should we cancel the picnic lest I drown everyone and then bake them? I could envision people running with plates of food in the rain and Steve Descovich telling me. *"I told you so, Padre!"*

They loved LaSalle School, and they continue to honor that great school by their loving service to our parish. The Knights of Columbus from the Hartigan Council made a very generous donation of food, grilling hamburgers and hot dogs in the heat of the evening.

Pope Francis prays for exploited women, Mary's intercession on Feast of Assumption

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Celebrating the feast of the Assumption just three days after visiting a group of young women rescued from the sex trade, Pope Francis prayed for all exploited women and girls.

"The Lord bows down to the lowly in order to raise them up as is proclaimed in the Magnificat," Mary's hymn of praise to God, the pope said Aug. 15.

"Mary's canticle leads us to think of many painful situations today and particularly those of women overpowered by the burdens of life and the drama of violence, women who are slaves of the abuse of the powerful, girls forced into inhuman work, women forced to surrender body and spirit to the greed of men," Pope Francis told thousands of people gathered to pray the Angelus with him.

The pope prayed that exploited women soon would be able to live "a life of peace, justice and love in expectation of the day they finally will feel held by hands that do not humiliate them, but tenderly lift them and lead them on the path to life."

Pope Francis also prayed on the feast day that Mary would intercede to bring "compassion, understanding and agreement" to the many places in the world experiencing war and violent conflicts.

Father Pat's Homily of August 14, 2016

Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. From now on a household of five will be divided, three against two and two against three; a father will be divided against his son and a son against his father, a mother against her daughter and a daughter against her mother, a mother-in-law against her daughter-in-law and a daughter-in-law against her mother-in-law."

My godfather, Danny, who is now home with God, was a man that I deeply admired. An immigrant from Ireland, he and his wife raised eight children. Danny loved to talk religion with me. At times during his life, he suffered from depression. He found comfort in charismatic prayers groups that helped him deal with this issue. Some of the groups he attended were not Catholic and had ideas that I would not agree with since they were contrary to my faith. Danny always remained a practicing Catholic, but he would often stop by the house to chat with my Mom, his Aunt, and then we would begin to debate about our beliefs. I never took offence at what Danny said, and most of our conversations, although intense at times, were never insulting of each other's beliefs. Danny would often ask me if I had been born again and baptized in the spirit. My mother, who attended Danny's baptism many years ago in Ireland, did not like that her nephew dared argue with her son the priest. She finally told him, *be quiet Danny, I was at our baptism in the Flagmont Church and it was a fierce rainy day and one baptism was enough for you.* She then quoted the wise aphorism, *never talk religion or politics.*

I find that our present ongoing presidential elections between Donald Trump and Hilary Clinton a rather dangerous topic to discuss with someone who feels differently than do you about the candidates. It seems to me that the discussions quickly become personal with words such as *you are an idiot if your vote for that person or how can you look yourself in the mirror and vote consider voting for that candidate*. These discussion quickly move from speaking about ideas to judging the mental and moral competence of the person with whom we are speaking. We know that we live in an age where being politically correct is very important. Say something you might consider harmless and you could lose your job or career. Some of this political correctness has moved to the point of being absurd.

I am reading a book about Alexander Hamilton and the author makes the point that of our first five presidents, four of them were slaveholders. Now, we would all agree that slavery was a great evil in our nation, but there are those who would like to take down the monuments in honor of these founding figures of our nation. I think that if we were establishing a capital today, there would be strong opposition to the name it Washington since our president did own slaves.

Some of the things that go on around Christmas such as not allowing workers to say *Merry Christmas*, to have a Christmas tree in the office, or to not even allow school children to sing secular Christmas songs since we cannot allow our young to be tinged in any way with the spirit of Christmas, bother many people. I do not think we need to spend much time and energy changing the word *manhole to utility hole*. I am happy that we say *One Nation under God* in *The Pledge of Allegiance* even though it offends some. Still, there is virtue to some political correctness. Certainly ethnic stereotypes and derogatory remarks about people because of their nationality, their religion, their immigration status, or their sexual orientation are not in line with our Christian principles to treat others as we wish to be treated.

Today's Scripture readings speak quite clearly about the willingness to not compromise one's beliefs. In our first reading from Jeremiah, the prophet Jeremiah has been telling the Jewish people that they are not being faithful to what God is asking of them. God has called him to this difficult mission. The people reject his message and throw him into the bottom of a muddy cistern. There is a price for speaking courageously about one's convictions. In The Letter to the Hebrews, we heard: Let us rid ourselves of every burden and sin that clings to us and persevere in running the race that lies before us while keeping our eyes fixed on Jesus, the leader and perfecter of faith. Keep your eyes on Jesus. If you live as Jesus say you may be at best consider odd and at worst you may suffer insults for your beliefs.

Jesus constantly speaks to us about unity and being at peace with one another. So, it is somewhat shocking to hear the following: Do you think that I have come to establish peace on the earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. From now on a household of five will be divided, three against two and two against three; a father will be divided against his son and a son against his father, a mother against her daughter. How do we be faithful to our religious convictions while still loving family members and friends who do not agree with us and our values? One of the consistent issues I hear from so many parents is that my adult children do not go to Mass. What can I do? What are we to do if a family member is living with someone or living a lifestyle that is inconsistent with the Gospel of Jesus that we hold so sacred? Here are a few simple examples:

I recommend that you always act in love toward those with whom we do not agree in matters of faith. Through the years I have been asked if it is ok to go to our daughter or son's wedding in a secular setting. I tell the parents to go because you love your son or daughter; it does not mean that you agree with they have chosen not to get married in the Catholic Church. They are still your child.

You have a right to your principles; if your visiting grandson wants to share a bedroom with his girlfriend, you can lovingly give him the name of the nearest motel.

If a group of people are saying racist or mean things about others, you can choose to gently say you do not want to be part of such a conversation.

If you are at a McDonald's, you can publically bless yourself before you eat your Big Mac.

If a co-worker tells you about an illness, you can say you will pray for them.

You can tell a loved one, who does not go to Mass, why going to Mass is special to you. There is no need to nag or threaten God's wrath. Then, invite them and pray for them.

You can tell someone that you cannot meet them for dinner on a certain night because you are attending a parish event. You can invite them to the event.

Living our faith publically is not always easy. We come here to Mass to receive the Body of Jesus to find strength and support to go. We seek to keep our eyes fixed on Jesus as the Scriptures calls us to.
