Pastor's Letter

Jesus said, for everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." Luke 14

Those of you who have a spot of gray hair in your head might recall an old Country Western song by Mac Davis entitled, it's Hard to be Humble. Part of the lyrics go like this:

Oh Lord it's hard to be humble/when you're perfect in every way./I can't wait to look in the mirror/ Cause I get better looking each day/To know me is to love me/I must be a hell of a man./ O Lord it's hard to be humble/but I'm doing the best that I can.

I think that the songwriter wrote these lyrics with a smile on his face. No doubt he was poking fun at himself and the rest of humanity who struggle with pride. It is no surprise that the first sin, Original Sin, was the story of Adam and Eve eating a piece of forbidden fruit. Just for the record, the word *apple* was never used. Very often this sin is called a sin of disobedience because God told our first parents that they could eat of anything they desired in the Garden of Paradise except the fruit of one tree. Actually, I believe this was more a sin of pride that brought them to be disobedient. Satan, (who knows something about pride since his fall into hell came when he was told that someday God would become human), seduces Adam and Eve with the temptation, if you eat that fruit, you will be like God. Although these two creatures had every delight in the world, they wanted more - they wanted to be God. The great irony is that in the desire to be God they lose what is most important to their humanity: their *relationship* with God.

I think there is something in most people who like to see the high and mighty brought low. We often talk about someone being "knocked off their pedestal." Sometimes when my niece Claire questions something that I have said, I remind her, perhaps half kiddingly, that I have four masters' degrees. As I struggle to open a milk carton, she is quick to say, *So much for the man with the four masters!* I recall a few years ago parking on a street where I had to climb over a snowbank. An elderly woman spotted me and rushed to offer help. She said, "can I help you Poppy?" I was humiliated and told her in no uncertain terms, I was fine and that I did not need help! It is hard to be humble.

Recently we celebrated the death of Muhammed Ali. I think his popularity grew as he began to grow older and suffered from the ravages of Parkinson's disease. He became an American icon and a beloved figure. When he was young, some Americans despised him because he was constantly proclaiming, *I am the greatest!* Many wanted to see "The Greatest" knocked to the ground. I find it annoying when I see football players doing all sorts of celebrating when they score a touchdown. I think of the words of the late Vince Lombardi who told his players, When you score a touchdown act like you have been there before. I believe the world fell in love with Pope Francis when as the newly elected Pope, he carried his own suitcase, paid his own bill at the hotel where he stayed, and rode the bus with the other cardinals. His humility moved a world.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is dealing with some very proud men. They are the religious leadership of the Jewish community. A banquet is being held and they are jockeying to see who can sit at the best table. They want to be seen and honored. When my sister was planning weddings with her daughters, she insisted our family be next to the band so no one would complain about their seats since we were all in the process of losing our hearing. I suggested when it comes to another party, let's at least sit near the bar or the bathrooms. Jesus is actually teasing these proud rabbis and poking a bit of fun at them. He tells them to take a poor seat and then you will be invited to come up higher and everyone will be impressed. I think they did not like his subtle humor.

I agree with Mac Davis, It is hard to be humble. The word humble is rooted in the word humus which means from the earth. Remember the message of Ash Wednesday: Remember that you are dust and unto to dust you shall return. We come from the earth and shall return to the earth. So, can we say it is hard to be human? Certainly there are many times when it is hard to be humble or human. When we grow ill and infirm, there is a strong temptation to ask God why this is happening! Naturally, when someone we love dies, we wonder about God and his ways. We may grow angry and doubt his love. To be human is to face sickness and death, but most of us think these struggles are for other people. Today, August 28, would ordinarily be the Feast of St. Augustine, one of the greatest minds that the Church ever had. He told a story of walking along a seashore pondering the mystery of God and seeking to understand the Blessed Trinity. He saw a little child playing by the ocean with a shell. He said to the young boy, little boy, what are you doing? The boy responded that he was trying to get the whole ocean in his shell. Augustine smiled and said, that is foolish-the ocean is too great for such a small shell. The boy responded in turn, so true for you who thinks your mind can understand the mysteries of God. No doubt, the great saint was humbled a bit.

I honestly think most gossip and pettiness is about pride. Most of us, in our heart of hearts, do not think we are so great. We know well our sins and weaknesses. But if I can speak about your faults, your failures, how you look, how smarter my kids are than yours, how much better I keep my house than you do, I can for a moment, feel better about myself. I have always found that most people who do a great deal of bragging are people who suffer from poor self-images and are hurting very much inside.

To be humble, does not mean we do not have gifts and talents. We all do. Some people have worked very hard to develop their talents and it is fine to be happy about them and to use them. But, the challenge is to see that these gifts come from God and do not make me any better than any other person. To be humble, does not mean that I should allow other people to mistreat me. Jesus did tell us to love our neighbor as we love ourselves.

I have read that humility is truth. A truly humble person knows the truth that all gifts, starting with my very life, come from God. A humble person knows the truth that God so loves every person in the world - which he came to die for each of us and raise us up to his glory. A humble person knows that he or she will fail sometimes and even sin. Yet, he or she knows that truth that we are God's children wrapped in the arms of his tender mercies. A humble person knows that we all need love and mercy in our loves and seeks to both accept kindness and mercy from others and to render it in turn. In a few minutes we will approach the altar and receive the Body and Blood of Christ. Before we do, we say a most beautiful prayer: Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof but only say the word and my soul shall be healed. Our power and strength comes from God.
