Pastor's Letter

'Rejoice with me because I have found my lost sheep.' I tell you, in just the same way there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who have no need of repentance. Luke 15

IVI ost of us have family stories that are told about some incident in our childhood that make us cringe when a parent or older brother or sister starts telling one of these accounts. There is a story told about my leaving home at about the age of three and ending up on the church steps (about a block from my home) holding a mop. I was lost and did not know it. That is all I know of the story, and I am not sure if I actually remember it, or just think I remember it because I have been told the story so many times. I suppose I could give a psychological spin to the story by saying I was seeking God, like Jesus in the temple, and it was a foreshadowing of my vocation to be a priest. But why the mop? The only think I can think of was that this was a sign that I was going to reject all hard work such as mopping floors and rather choose the priesthood. I presume my parents were in panic when they found out I had left home, crossed a street, and ended up on the steps of Our Lady of Perpetual Help.

Getting lost is one of life's more frustrating experiences, and I have learned to dread the word *recalculating* on the GPS. But there is a very serious side to getting lost. I have seen the instant panic in my family when one of the children is out of sight for just a few seconds. Your heart instantly beats faster until you see the precious child. We know too well stories about *Amber Alerts* when a child is missing. I cannot even begin to imagine the fear and worry that fill a parent's heart when a child has been missing for hours, days, weeks and even years.

oday we are conscious of the tragic day of September 11th, 2001 when Islamic terrorists killed almost 3,000 people at the Twin Towers, at the Pentagon and in Shanksville, Pennsylvania. It was a day that those of us who experienced it will never forget. It was very difficult to get through on phones since both land lines and cell phones were so overloaded. Until we heard the voice of the loved one you needed to seek out, you were in terror. We also know well how many of the phone calls went unanswered since a loved one had died in the assault. I remember going home to my sister's house that night where all my immediate family had gathered. Thankfully, we were all there, but we began to check on our extended family of cousins. At the time I had cousins in both the fire department and the police force. Gratefully, they were all accounted for.

But then my nephew said, "what about Michael? He works for Cantor Fitzgerald!" Michael was a young cousin, married with a baby that I had just recently baptized. Over time, we would sadly come to know that Michael had died in the attack.

In the Brooklyn neighborhood where I lived, there were many candlelight displays outside of homes and apartments, marking that someone had not come home. I recall that all over the city posters emerged that showed pictures of the missing asking if anyone had seen this person. Those images, which often showed a smiling face in a happy time, were haunting to look at. The hospitals were flooded with people who were seeking out loved ones who might have been injured and been brought to the hospital. We learned that day, and in the days that followed, the painful experience of searching out for someone who was lost.

Seeking out those who are lost is at the heart of this Gospel we heard today, and it is truly a central message of Jesus. We hear a parable of a shepherd seeking a lost sheep, and of a woman desperately seeking for a precious lost coin. It is very important to note to whom Jesus is addressing these two parable: he is speaking to the religious leadership of his time, the scribes and Pharisees who are murmuring against Jesus because he eats and drinks with sinners, the lost and abandoned. These righteous leaders see no need for God to seek them out; they are the so called good people. They are not lost so they do not need mercy or salvation. The mission of Jesus, as given by his Father, is to seek out the lost. God longs to bring home to his loving arms who are lost in any way. Don't miss what is going on here: the religious leaders are lost and do not know it - they really do not see their need for God.

- Who are the lost of our lives? Whom do we seek out and seek to bring home? Many are filled with worry about their children and grandchildren and it is a natural concern, but know and trust that Jesus is seeking them out in his own way and time.
- There may be someone who is lost to us because of a dispute or an old resentment. Might we seek to bring them home to us?
- There are people in most of our lives whom we have written off and stopped seeking out. God never stops seeking out the lost.
- Perhaps even in our homes, in our marriages, with our children, certain relationships have drifted and new beginnings need to be searched out.
- I may be lost within myself, wondering about the meaning and purpose of life. I may have lost my way. The Good Shepherd is searching us out to bring us into the arms of his mercy.

I love this verse of <u>Amazing Grace</u>: *I was lost, but now I'm found*. Jesus *always* seeks to find us!

RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE

OCTOBER IS RESPECT LIFE MONTH: excerpts USCCB

The events of September 11, 2001 showed humanity at its worst...and its best. We saw acts of terrible depravity and in response to them, acts of true nobility. How can people behave in such radically different ways? The answer may be in the way we choose to look at human life. One view says that human life has no inherent value or dignity. It is a thing to be use; it's worth measured by its usefulness to others. The other view maintains that every human life has immeasurable worth. Human beings are made in God's image and likeness, each unique and irreplaceable. They may not be used as means to another's ends - rather, they are ends to themselves.

Those who plotted the September 11th attacks showed contempt for life. Innocent people were seen as nameless, faceless targets for destruction. The terrorists were blind to their victims' worth as unique individuals, as loving fathers, mothers, sons and daughters. Their only value was as fodder to fuel a war against modern society. Compare this distain for life, with the attitude of rescue personnel and employees who struggled to help others evacuate the World Trade Center and the Pentagon, and those brave passengers who forced a plane to crash in Pennsylvania thereby saving countless other lives. Their acts of heroism expressed a conviction that every human life - even the lives of strangers - is precious. Many willingly risked - and lost - their lives. Not because they failed to value their own lives, but because they knew there is no greater love than to offer one's life to save others.

Father Mychal Judge gave his life praying with victims at the scene. His midtown Franciscan friary door was always open to anyone in need. So many ordinary people are remembered for doing simple things with great love. And whether they knew it or not, they were helping to build a culture of life in which indifference, violence, bigotry and injustice have no place.

As we center on October and Respect Life Month, let us keep in mind that, from abortion to assisted suicide, to creating life simply to destroy it, we have come a long way toward seeing fellow human beings as faceless burdens or as "things to be used. Reversing this attitude will not happen overnight. But it is no exaggeration to say the future of humanity depends on it. A society in which new human lives can be engineered, created, manipulated and destroyed as mere research material is not a society that can appreciate the unique gift of each human person. A culture of life, where every human life is protected, respected and celebrated, begins with a personal decision to respect the dignity of others.

We must work together through our words and actions, and work for public policies that support human life and human dignity...Above all, we **must** pray!

I also thank T.J. Hance and Ed Indelicato who installed the sign on one of the hottest days of the summer! - Father Pat




