

Jesus said, "There was a rich man who dressed in purple garments and fine linen and dined sumptuously each day. And lying at his door was a poor man named Lazarus, covered with sores, who would gladly have eaten his fill of the scraps that fell from the rich man's table. Dogs even used to come and lick his sores

ears ago I read a book named *Bums*. It was an informal history of the Brooklyn Dodgers. As some of you might remem-

ber, Bums was a beloved nickname for the Dodgers, perhaps based on the fact they usually ended the season by losing the World Series to that Evil Empire named the Yankees. There was a story in the book that has stayed with me. Three friends were at a restaurant having dinner and reminiscing about the old days as friends often do. One of them suggested, for whatever reason I do not recall, that each write down on a piece of paper the names of three people who are in hell. When they finished writing and revealed the names they had chosen, they all had the same three names in the exact same order: Adolph Hitler, Joseph Stalin, and Walter O'Malley, the man blamed for moving the Dodgers from Brooklyn to Los Angeles. In fairness to Mr. O'Malley, current thought, also blames Robert Moses for the departure of the baseball team.

Hell is a doctrine of the Catholic Church. Here is the present teaching of the Church on hell from The Catechism of the Catholic Church: "The teaching of the Church affirms the existence of hell and its eternity. Immediately after death the souls of those who die in a state of mortal sin descend into hell where they suffer the punishments of hell, eternal fire." The chief punishment of hell is eternal separation from God, in whom alone man can possess the life and happiness for which he was created and for which he longs.

I must confess, although I accept this teaching of the Church on hell, I struggle with understanding it. This is the Year of Mercy, and over and over again in the Gospels, Jesus reveals himself as a lover of sinners. I have often asked parents if there is something that there son or daughter could do to them or to others that would be so bad that they would forever reject their child and condemn them to eternal punishment. I have found the universal response to be no. Still, I do know of cases where a son or daughter walks away from a parent's love by his or her choice and never returns. The parents are left heartbroken, but they cannot force the adult child to come back to their love. This is an analogy that I would use for God. Like all analogies, it has its limits. God never condemns someone to hell; it is free choice that a person makes in his or her life. My image would be that God weeps over those who have chosen to reject his love forever.

I am consoled by the belief that we cannot say for sure that anyone is in hell. Even though this wretched state is a teaching of our faith community, only God knows if a person has rejected God to the point of condemning himself/herself to hell. Even Judas, for all any of us know, may have repented at the last second and begged the mercy of God as did the repentant thief on Calvary who cried out to Jesus for mercy. God is both a God of mercy and a God of justice. Sometimes we creatures demand God give over to hell people such as those who perpetrated the Holocaust, committed horrible crimes toward children, or killed people by violent acts of terrorism. There was a recent story of an elderly God-fearing woman who had her pocket-book stolen by a young woman. The robbed woman demanded that God send this person to hell since she deserved it.

he definition I read about hell describes two severe punishments of hell: fire and the absence of God. Many scholars today would suggest that the fire image is more of vivid image of suffering than a defined reality. However, there is no doubt that the essence of hell is the absence of God. To be in hell is to be lonely and without love forever. I do not think it is that easy to go to hell. Again, I seriously struggle with the idea that God would send a person to hell for a fleeting impure thought or for a person who spent his or her life attending Sunday Mass who misses one Sunday. I am not encouraging such behaviors and believe they are sins; but is it sin that destroys one's relationship with God and leads to eternal damnation? I find the God revealed to us by Jesus incompatible with such a possibility.

I grew up on hell and the fear of God. Granted the scriptures tell us that fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, but we also know that Jesus has told us that perfect love casts out fear. We love and worship God not out of fear, but because he has first loved us, came on earth for us, suffered and died for us, and rose on the third day with the promise of eternal life. Perhaps the most known of all scripture is John 3:16: God so loved the world that he gave his only son that whoever believe in him may not die but have eternal life. God is always compassionate and merciful, but his love is never to be taken for granted.


Today, this familiar parable is haunting. A rich man named Dives goes to hell and is suffering because his wealth and pleasure so consumed him that he never noticed the poor man named Lazarus, sitting at his doors, starving and filled with sores that are licked by the dogs. The sin of Dives is that he never sees the poor man. His world view does not include this poor dying man on his doorstep.

It is clear that Jesus is revealing to us, as he constantly does, that we are brother and sister to one another. We need to notice and see those who are in need around us. Unlike those contestants in beauty contests who promise to work for world peace and an end to hunger if they are chosen, we cannot end all the pain and suffering of the world. We know there are people lying in the streets of New York and other cities. We know there are countless children who do not have the opportunity of a decent education. We know there are countless people who are hungry in the world. The first step is to notice them. There may be a person in our own classroom, at our job, or sitting at our kitchen table who is in pain. Do we notice? Once we notice and see, we begin to be changed by the grace of God. The philosopher Sartre described hell as other people. Certainly, there are many situations in the world around us that might justify the words *hell on earth*.

Once we see, we can be moved to help not a thousand people, but one person. It is good for me and you to ponder, who are the Lazarus's of our lives? Whom are we failing to see sitting on the doorsteps of our lives? Lord, be merciful to me a sinner for failing to see you in my brothers and sisters!



Why is October the Month of the Holy Rosary?

This month, five minutes before the Saturday Night and Sunday Masses, one of the clergy will lead the congregation in a decade of the rosary since October in the month of the Ho-



ly Rosary. How this came to be is an interesting moment, not only for people of the Catholic faith, but in the history of Western Europe. There are historians who believe that if the Catholic naval forces had been defeated at Lapanto, Christianity would have been basically suppressed in Western Europe. Sad to say, secularism is a serious threat to the life of faith in Western Europe today. Perhaps, we can pray the rosary in our time that the Christian and Mus-

lim faiths may be at peace with each other.

Battle of Lepanto

On October 7, 1571, a great victory over the mighty Turkish fleet was won by Catholic naval forces primarily from Spain, Venice, and Genoa under the command of Don Juan of Austria. It was the last battle at sea between "oared" ships, which featured the most powerful navy in the world, a Muslim force with between 12,000 to 15,000 Christian slaves as rowers. The patchwork team of Catholic ships was powered by the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Knowing that the Christian forces were at a distinct material disadvantage, the holy pontiff, St. Pope Pius V called for all of Europe to pray the Rosary for victory. We know today that the victory was decisive, prevented the Islamic invasion of Europe, and evidenced the Hand of God working through Our Lady. At the hour of victory, St. Pope Pius V, who was hundreds of miles away at the Vatican, is said to have gotten up from a meeting, went over to a window, and exclaimed with supernatural radiance: "The Christian fleet is victorious!" and shed tears of thanksgiving to God.

What you may not know is that one of three admirals commanding the Catholic forces at Lepanto was Andrea Doria. He carried a small copy of Mexico's Our Lady of Guadalupe into battle. This image is now enshrined in the Church of San Stefano in Aveto, Italy. At Saint Mary Major Basilica in Rome, close to the tomb of the great St. Pope Pius V, one was once able to view yet another Islamic flag from the Battle, until 1965, when it was returned to Istanbul in an intended friendly token of concord.

The Rosary at Lepanto, the Victory over the Muslims was won by the faithful praying the Rosary. Even though they had superior numbers, the Turks really were overmatched. Blessed Padre Pio, the Spiritual Father of the Blue Army, said: "The Rosary is the weapon," and how right he was! The Battle of Lepanto was at first celebrated liturgically as "Our Lady of Victory." Later, the feast of October 7th was renamed "Our Lady of the Rosary" and extended throughout the Universal Church by Pope Clement XI in 1716 (who canonized Pope Pius V in 1712).

Please see the sacristan before mass begins if you require altar breads that are free of gluten, peanuts and dairy. Let the sacristan know how many for consecration.

Liturgical Ministry Training



All are welcome to any gathering of the Spiritual Book Club. This book is highly recommended whether you



come to the club or not. It is a wonderful and realistic reflection on the Mass. For Catholics, the Mass is the "source and summit of the Christian life," as the documents of the Church put it. Yet many Catholics might confess to not understand in any depth what goes on in an "ordinary" celebration of the Eucharist. In perhaps her most compelling and original book to date, novelist and spiritual writer Paula Huston guides us through a Mass on the Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time at her home parish in Arroyo Grande, California. Huston's personal and spiritual reflections offer fresh and often unexpected insights into the profound mystery at the heart of the Catholic faith. A natural storyteller, Huston deftly illuminates what might seem either mysteri-

ous to those unfamiliar with the Mass or overly familiar to those who have lost an appreciation of its mystery. In the Mass "we are healed and restored and spiritually fed," she writes. "We are handed strong armor against evil. We are unified and made whole as a people and as a Church. We get a little taste of heaven."
