Pastor's Letter

Jesus said in reply, "Ten were cleansed, were they not? Where are the other nine? Has none but this foreigner returned to give thanks to God?" Then he said to him, "Stand up and go; your faith has saved you."

One of the challenges that I find in preaching here at St. Martin's is that I cannot remember if I told a certain joke or not. The good news is that most people are too polite to tell me, *Father you told us that one, about ten times...!*

So here we go, and if you heard it, try to make like you didn't. A woman comes to the rectory and asks for the pastor. She is quite upset. The pastor asks her what is wrong. She tells him that her husband bought a lottery ticket the other night and she is now holding the winning numbers for the Powerball lottery of 200 million dollars. The pastor says, *That is great news! Congratulations! Why are you upset?* She responds, *Father, you know my husband Joe has a heart condition. I am very afraid that when he finds out this news, he may have a heart attack from the shock of winning so much money.* The pastor thinks for a moment and says, *Don't worry. I have an idea of how I can break the news to Joe in a gentle way that won't startle him.*

That night there is a meeting of the pastoral council of which Joe is a member. The pastor says at the beginning of the meeting *a*s a kind of ice breaker, *I thought I would ask this question: What would you do if you ever won the 200 million dollar Powerball lottery?* Joe quickly raises his hands, and say, *If I ever won that lottery, I would give half the money to our parish.* Hearing those words, the pastor fell over with a heart attack! It is a good story to keep in mind if you ever do win the lottery and want to share half of it with the church, but please be careful how you break the news to me!

I have found that very often gratitude leads to kindness to others. At a wedding, a couple gives out wedding favors to the guests. At the birth of a child, cigars are handed out by the proud Dad. I often ask someone why they want to get involved in some ministry of the parish, and I often hear a response such as *Father, God has been good to me and I want to be good to others*. A 50th wedding anniversary is a time of saying thanks to God, family and friends because He has blessed the couple with a happy marriage. I think the parishioners of St. Martin's are so supportive of the food pantry by their donations because they are grateful to God that they have food on their own tables and want to help others.

I listened to the speech that Mike Piazza gave when he entered into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. He must have thanked well over 50 people by name in his talk, including little league coaches, minor league teammates, and the workers at the stadiums where he played. This is what he said about the 9/11 responders and those who serve in the military: Jesus said, there's no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. I consider it a privilege to have witnessed that love. Your families and those left behind are always in my prayers. I pray we never forget their sacrifice and work to always defeat such evil. He had great praise for his parents and family, including these words about his mother: My mother gave me the greatest gift a mother can give a child. She gave me the gift of my Catholic faith. This has had a profound impact on my career and it has given me patience, compassion and hope. True gratitude - having a sense of thanksgiving in our hearts for what we have been given - leads to not only words of thanks but to action and generosity. In today's Gospel Jesus heals ten lepers. Lepers not only suffered from the horrors of their disease, but they were removed from the community and forced to live in isolation because of the fear of the disease spreading. Hearing their cry for healing on the road to Jerusalem, our Lord Jesus tells them to go to the priests, which was Jewish law since the priest could restore them to the community if he saw they were healed. *As they were going, they were cleansed. And one of them, realizing he had been healed, returned, glorifying God in a loud voice; and he fell at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. He was a Samaritan.* His healing has led him to return to praise and thank God.

Are the other nine ungrateful? I judge them gently. Perhaps they had not seen their families in years and rushed to them. Perhaps they had a meal of celebration. It is easy to get so overwhelmed with good news that one might forget to say thank you immediately. And then perhaps they came back later to Jesus. But nothing can stop this Samaritan from rushing back to the One who brought him healing. His body has not only been healed, he has found faith in the power of the Son of God. Even greater than physical healing is to experience salvation revealed through Jesus Christ.

A key detail to this story is that the one who returns is a Samaritan. Samaritans in the eyes of many of the Jewish leaders and people were considered renegade - fallen away Jews - people to be despised. Yet like the *Parable of the Good Samaritan*, the hero of this story, the one who is *most* grateful is considered the greatest sinner. Jesus' praising of the Samaritan infuriates the leadership and is another reason for many of them to plot against the Messiah.

There is an oft used expression, *There but for the grace of God go I*. We might say it when we see a homeless person on the street, hear of someone convicted of embezzlement or tax fraud, or judge someone harshly for their lack of religious practice. To truly mean *There but for the grace of God go I* recognizes we are all Samaritans in need of the mercy of God. We do not save ourselves; we stand in awe how blessed we are with God's love and seek to share it with those who do not yet know it. The word *Eucharist means thanksgiving*. Every Mass is a profound act of thanking God for our lives, our loved ones, and our faith. Lord, I am not worthy that you should come under my roof, but only say the word, and my soul will be healed.





Filling a 17 foot truck with baby needs is a GIFT OF LOVE THAT NO WORDS OF THANKS CAN EVER EXPRESS. WE THANK YOU FROM THE BOTTOM OF OUR HEARTS.

Often a woman wants to love and nurture her baby, but through fear and no place to turn, they feel they have NO CHOICE. THIS IS WHERE THE LIFE CENTER STEPS IN. We have four (4) Crisis Pregnancy Centers, Massapequa, Deer Park, Hempstead and Riverhead. Our dedicated staff of volunteers work long hours to insure that every woman that walks through our doors finds a SAFE HAVEN, requirements and assistance for medical care coverage, counseling, pregnancy tests and someone to listen to her needs through all 9 months. She will be given baby clothes, formula, diapers...you know, all those things you donated, until her baby is 2 years of age. Whatever she may need, the Life Center will be there for her.

Once more, we ask you to take home a baby bottle, fill it with your spare change and RETURN IT ON THE WEEKEND OF OCTOBER 29 AND 30TH. Would you also say that special prayer attached to each baby bottle. It has a direct effect on saving the life of a child. It is also bringing about something very special at the Life Center, A CHANGE OF HEART. This change of heart is the reason why in the past 12 months alone, 110 BABIES WERE BROUGHT SAFELY INTO THIS WORLD.

If you would like to volunteer, please fill out the tag on each bottle and the Life Center will get back to you. MOST OF ALL, WE WOULD LIKE TO THANK OUR OWN FATHER PAT, WHO HAS ENCOURAGED, AND CHAMPIONED US EVERY YEAR. HE WAS WITH US WHEN WE WERE NAMED PARISH OF THE YEAR IN 2012. THE AWARD FOR THAT HONOR SITS IN THE GATHERING PLACE, NEAR THE STATUE OF ST. MICHAEL THE ARCH ANGEL. HE CONTINUES TO STAND WITH US EVERY STEP OF THE WAY AS WE TRY TO BRING ABOUT THE MESSAGE OF LIFE. HIS DOOR IS ALWAYS OPEN TO ANY REQUEST WE MAY BRING BEFORE HIM ALONG WITH OUR RESPECT LIFE COMMITTEE. HE IS COMMITTED TO THE SANCTITY OF LIFE FROM CONCEPTION TO NATURAL DEATH, We are truly blessed.

Feast of Saint Gerard **October 16th**

St. Gerard Majella is the patron of expectant mothers. He was born in 1726 in Muro, Italy to a family of



seven. Majella grew up in poverty with a great respect for the poor. He applied to the Capuchin monastery at Muro twice, but was turned down both times. Majella was told his health was not well enough for such a strenuous life. However, Majella did not give up. In 1749 at the age of 23, he joined the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, the Redemptorists, and just three years later became a professed lay brother. Along with his miracles effected through prayers for woman in labor, Majella's last recorded miracle is one that many credit toward his becoming the patron of expectant mothers. Shortly before his death, Majella encountered a young girl. He had dropped his handkerchief and she set out to return it, only to be told to keep it. Majella told her she "may need it someday." Years after Majella's passing, the young girl became married

and with child. She unexpectedly went into labor and was on the verge of losing her baby. She called for Majella's handkerchief to be applied to her. Almost immediately, her pain abated and she proceeded to give birth to a healthy child, something very rare during that time. Due to the numerous miracles performed through Majella's prayers, proceedings for his canonization began shortly after his death. In 1893, Majella was beatified by Pope Leo XIII and on December 11, 1904, Pope Pius X canonized this man of God.

Prayer: Saint Gerard, faithful Redemptorist Brother, follower of Jesus Christ, and friend of couples seeking to become pregnant, or women who are with child and seeking a safe delivery, we pray for your blessings on those who come to you for your intersession. Bring their prayers to the Lord who sees the goodness of their hearts. St. Gerard, in a time when the gift of human life is becoming diminished, bless those who so desire and value the gift of a child through pregnancy or adoption, and may Our Lady of Perpetual Help be with those who pray with you and before her icon of love. Amen

SPIRITUAL BOOK CLUB - November 4, 2016 - 7:30PM "One Ordinary Sunday: A Meditation on the Mystery of the Mass" by Paula Huston Paperback - March 11, 2016 - Ave Maria Press

All are welcome to any gathering of the Spiritual Book Club. This book is highly recommended whether you come to the club or not. It is a wonderful and realistic reflection on the Mass. For Catholics, the Mass is the "source and summit of the Christian life," as the documents of the Church put it. Yet many Catholics might confess to not understand in any depth what goes on in an "ordinary" celebration of the Eucharist. "We are handed strong armor against evil. We are unified and made whole as a people and as a Church. We get a little taste of heaven."
