Pastor's Letter

**California Dreamin'** 

All the leaves are brown and the sky is gray/I've been for a walk on a winter's day. I'd be safe and warm if I was in L.A./California dreamin' on such a winter's day.

Stopped in to a church I passed along the way/Well I got down on my knees and I pretend to pray. You know the preacher liked the cold;/He knows I'm gonna stay/California dreamin' on such a winter's day.

**California Dreamin',** a song written by the Mamas and the Papas, was a big hit in the mid sixties. I liked the song much very much although I never much dreamt of living in California and I was not even sure that the mention of the preacher meant. I just loved the first line: all the leaves are brown and the sky is gray. When the song was popular in the 60s, I was living in a small town called North East, about a mile from Lake Erie. Winter came early in that area and spring came late. I could certainly relate the gray skies and the brown leaves which would pretty much come upon us in mid-October and the first chills of winter would be soon felt. I guess I associate this music as a November song.

Fortunately, November here on Long Island, is usually not quite as cold as Western Pennsylvania, but we do see mostly brown leaves, gray skies, and the night's darkness drawing upon us earlier in the evening. Although it is getting colder, the threat of snow is still usually several weeks away. (I hope I don't jinx us with a major snow fall). The great American poet, Robert Frost wrote: *Not yesterday I learned to know the love of bare November days before the coming of the snow*. I like the month of November, perhaps because Thanksgiving Day is my favorite holiday and Advent and Christmas will soon follow. I no longer have the stress of the Mets season and as a Jet fan my season is usually over since we have so many losses.

November begins with two feast days that move us to reflect on eternal. On the first day of this blustery month, we celebrate All Saints Day - a day our church gives us to remind us that so many of the people we knew and loved are now home with God. Anyone who is in heaven is a saint. We have famous saints in our faith such as St. Peter, St. Therese of Lisieux, St. Anthony of Padua, St. Joseph, and of course, the Mother of God, the Blessed Mother. But we also have saints in heaven such as our parents, friends, relatives, teachers who taught us, priests who gave us the sacraments and so many other wonderful people known only to God.

The second day of the month follows up with All Souls Day; this is a day we pray for and remember our beloved deceased. On Saturday, November 5<sup>th</sup>, we have one of the most special liturgies of the year: The Mass of Remembrance. All those who have lost a loved one over the past year from our parish are invited to a special Mass to remember and pray for their loved ones. It is a Mass that touches the heart and lifts the spirit.

**During this month, on November 8<sup>th</sup>, we will have Election Day.** I do know some citizens are unhappy with the two major presidential candidates, but we know that it is a blessing to live in a nation where we can go to the polls and vote. That is never to be taken for granted.

**On November 9, 1732, St. Alphonsus Liguori,** along with several companions, journeyed from Naples to a little mountainous village named Scala, where there were many poor people, to found the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, nicknamed the Redemptorists. As you know well (and you better), the priests who serve you here in the parish are Redemptorists.

**On November 11, we have Veterans' Day,** as well as the patronal feast of our parish, St Martin of Tours. We would not have what we have today, our freedom of religion and the other freedoms of the Bill of Rights without the generation of men and women who served so generously in the Armed Forces of our nation, with many paying the ultimate price. St. Martin of Tours was a soldier who lived more than a thousand years ago. He came to know Jesus in a very special way, and served him in others, particularly the poor. As a parish, we will gather winter coats in memory of our saint who cut his coat in half to clothe a man who was freezing from the cold. We have a great model to imitate.

**November 19<sup>th</sup> is the Golden Harvest.** Someone will win \$5,000.00. It is a fun night, with friends and neighbors, eating good food, and listening to the same old jokes from the pastor. It is also a very important fund-raiser for the parish we love.


**November 21<sup>st</sup> also brings us the Feast of the Presentation of Our Blessed Mother** in the temple as an infant, Mary was brought to the temple in Jerusalem by her parents, Joachim and Anne, devout Jews, to recognize their child, as is true for all children, was a gift from God entrusted to them. St. Cecilia, whose feast day is November 22<sup>nd</sup>, is the patroness of musicians. We praise God for the talents and gifts of our musicians and singers, Elena, Dawn, Chris, Nick, Maureen, Claire, Kelly and all the members of our three choirs. We thank them and ask their patroness to bless them always.

And to top off this great month, as the year is slowly drawing to an ending, we turn to God in a very special way as Americans with deep gratitude in our hearts for all the gifts we have as a nation, as families, and as his children blessed in countless ways by his amazing grace. I hope my sister is learning to make sugar free sweet potatoes with marsh mallows, and calorie free pecan pie with vanilla ice cream. I love Thanksgiving Day which is November 24<sup>th</sup>.

The first Sunday of Advent, perhaps my favorite liturgical time of the year, begins on the weekend of November 26<sup>th</sup>- 27<sup>th</sup>, as the Church invites us to make ready the way of the Lord. Advent is a time of spiritual reflection that calls us not to lose the true message of the Incarnation of God's Son, Jesus, the Word made flesh.

November, the eleventh month of the year, is a special time for all of us here in the parish of St. Martin of Tours. Let the Lord wrap you in the warmth of his love as the winds of winter begin to blow.

October 24, 2016 Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

With Election Day just two weeks away, the decisions you and I will make are important ones. Each and every one of us has a very important role to play. We have to decide who will get our vote. Permit me the opportunity to share with you some thoughts I ask you to consider. First and foremost, pray. Spend time in prayer asking God to guide you and your family and our country during this time. Pray before the Blessed Sacrament, pray to the Blessed Mother, pray the rosary and entrust your decision to our Lord.

Like many of you, I lament the current climate of division, and the mean spiritedness and intolerance of some toward those who do not agree with candidates and positions that do not fit their worldview. If you think you are confused and slightly battered by the noise, public protests and private misgivings, you have every reason to be so. But as responsible citizens and faithful men and women of God, we have to exercise our right to vote in a way that is serious, well-informed and reflective of who we are as Americans and Catholics.

We believe in God. We know He is the creator and thus God is intimately present in all things -- the world, human life, communities, choices and elections. Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI said, "Those who deny God can lead us only in a direction that ultimately is destructive." The human person, made in the image and likeness of God, is the ultimate measure of what is good or bad, right or wrong. Every person is sacred and has inherent rights which political leaders must protect and serve. Those who do not are unworthy of our vote. Those who contradict themselves by saying one thing and doing another are unworthy of our vote.

Many issues are very important in our society today. But none of them can eclipse the centrality of human life, especially innocent human life in the womb or at the end of life. Above all and over all, the number one issue more fundamental and crucial than any other is abortion – that is the direct taking of innocent life, which is financed by government funds -- the diversion of our tax dollars to abortionists like Planned Parenthood as well as government insistence that we Catholics like the Little Sisters of the Poor, violate our consciences to advance such programs.

Support of abortion by a candidate for public office, some of whom are Catholics, even if they use the fallacious and deeply offensive "personally opposed but . . ." line, is reason sufficient unto itself to disqualify any and every such candidate from receiving our vote. Let me repeat that: Support of abortion by a candidate for public office, some of whom are Catholics, even if they use the fallacious and deeply offensive "personally opposed but . . ." line, is reason sufficient unto itself to disqualify any and every such candidate from receiving our vote.

I have three questions to end this letter! Please reflect upon these as you examine your conscience and prepare to exercise your right to vote.

- Do you think our country is going in the right direction or the wrong direction? I believe it is heading in the wrong direction. If I am right, then,
- Of the two candidates running for President, and of all of the candidates running for elective office, whether federal, state or local, which ones will continue to lead us in the current direction or which are more likely to restore justice in those areas that cry out for such a restoration?
- Which ones are willing to lead us in a direction that is more pro life, more pro family and more pro truth? Which ones will recognize and respect the role of religion in the lives of citizens and the Church's right to mediate the truths of the Gospel and the Church's teaching as part of the public life of our country, in public ministries like health care, education and charitable works, without being forced to adopt and facilitate those cultural practices that are not consonant with Church teaching?

For further insight, I have written two columns on voting in *The Long Island Catholic Magazine*. They are also available on the diocesan website, www.drvc.org. In addition, the U.S. Bishops have prepared a teaching document on the political responsibility of Catholics called "Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship". It is also available online. I urge you to consider thoughtfully these resources along with this letter as you go through the process of deciding whom you will support with your vote.

May God bless you and your families and may God continue to bless the United States of America.


