Pastor's Letter

On the missions that I give, Father John McGowan often reads a humorous fictional letter from my cousin Bessie. One of the lines in the letter reads, *Mr. Jones from across the street died recently. He was an atheist who believed in neither heaven or hell. It was funny to see him all laid out in his best suit in the funeral home with nowhere to go. I heard a story on the news today that was a classic New York City story: An audience member at the Metropolitan Opera sprinkled a powdery substance — what the police said may have been the ashes of his mentor — into the orchestra pit during an intermission of a performance on Saturday, setting off a police investigation and the cancellation of the rest of that opera and a production that evening. I remember a priest joking that he wanted his ashes spread in the Jersey City Courthouse since they would never be disturbed. There is no doubt that a fair number of people are choosing cremation for themselves and their families. Cremation was once forbidden by the Catholic Church because some societies and groups who choose this practice in the past did it as an act of defiance toward Jesus' promise that all human beings will one day be reunited with their bodies at the end of time. These atheistic societies were seeking to suggest that not even God could reunite the ashes of a dead person.*

Here at St. Martin's we have many funerals where we have the cremains of the deceased near the altar. The deceased may have requested cremation or it may be the choice of the family. In the past, I have had some funerals for Redemptorists who chose to be cremated. This choice involves different factors such as a personal desire, the challenge of space on the earth, and the avoidance of certain costs that go with a burial. You may have heard recently that the Catholic Church has offered some guidance for cremation and the respect due to the ashes of the deceased. Here is part of the recent document from the Vatican:

In circumstances when cremation is chosen because of sanitary, economic or social considerations, this choice must never violate the explicitly-stated or the reasonably inferable wishes of the deceased faithful. The Church raises no doctrinal objections to this practice, since cremation of the deceased's body does not affect his or her soul, nor does it prevent God, in his omnipotence, from raising up the deceased body to new life. Thus, cremation, in and of itself, objectively negates neither the Christian doctrine of the soul's immortality nor that of the resurrection of the body. The Church continues to prefer the practice of burying the bodies of the deceased, because this shows a greater esteem towards the deceased. Nevertheless, cremation is not prohibited, "unless it was chosen for reasons contrary to Christian doctrine."

When, for legitimate motives, cremation of the body has been chosen, the ashes of the faithful must be laid to rest in a sacred place, that is, in a cemetery or, in certain cases, in a church or an area, which has been set aside for this purpose, and so dedicated by the competent ecclesial authority. From the earliest times, Christians have desired that the faithful departed become the objects of the Christian community's prayers and remembrance. Their tombs have become places of prayer, remembrance and reflection. The faithful departed remain part of the Church who believes "in the communion of all the faithful of Christ, those who are pilgrims on earth, the dead who are being purified, and the blessed in heaven, all together forming one Church."

The reservation of the ashes of the departed in a sacred place ensures that they are not excluded from the prayers and remembrance of their family or the Christian community. It prevents the faithful departed from being forgotten, or their remains from being shown a lack of respect, which eventuality is possible, most especially once the immediately subsequent generation has too passed away. Also it prevents any unfitting or superstitious practices.

For the reasons given above, the conservation of the ashes of the departed in a domestic residence is not permitted. Only in grave and exceptional cases dependent on cultural conditions of a localized nature, may the Ordinary, in agreement with the Episcopal Conference or the Synod of Bishops of the Oriental Churches, concede permission for the conservation of the ashes of the departed in a domestic residence. I have great respect for the military and how they honor their deceased with a flag on the coffin and the rituals that are part of a military service. The Catholic Church has and always is about respect for the human body, even when the person has died. We are temples of the Holy Spirit. I always find it moving when I reverence the body or cremains of a deceased person with the incense as a sign of respect for the person who will one day have a resurrected body.

When I first heard about this new directive, I did wonder why we could not bury a person in our back yard and have the site blessed with holy water by a clergy person. But I find myself very much agree with the idea of the ashes being placed in a sacred place such as a cemetery. Eventually, people sell their houses and move on or die. New owners come in and the place of the ashes is long forgotten. Being in a cemetery, surrounded by others who have died, is a place where the dead are long remembered and prayed by future generations. We are part of a faith community whether we are alive or dead. That is the long held teaching of the communion of saints; we particularly celebrate these days on All Saints Day and All Souls Day, and whenever we remember and pray for the deceased.

Eternal rest grant unto them O Lord, and may their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed rest in peace. Amen.

Pope Francis and Greg Burke, the new Vatican spokesman, listen to a reporter's question about the U.S. presidential election aboard the pope's flight from Baku, Azerbaijan, to Rome Oct. 2. (CNS) --"Catholics facing difficult political choices must study the issues, pray about the election and then vote according to their consciences," Pope Francis said. Flying back to Rome from Azerbaijan Oct. 2, the pope was asked by a reporter what U.S. Catholics should do in a presidential election where both candidates hold some positions contrary to Church teaching. Although he was in a relaxed mood and welcomed reporters' questions for almost an hour, Pope Francis said that he would never comment on a specific electoral campaign. "The people are sovereign," he said. "Study the proposals well, pray and choose in conscience.

These are the words of St. Paul on the need to pray for our governmental leaders:

I urge you first of all, then, to offer petitions, prayers, requests, and thanksgiving on behalf of all persons, for kings and all those in high places, so that we can lead a quiet and tranquil life of the greatest piety and purity, as is good and proper in the eyes of our savior God, who wants all people to be saved and come to the perception of truth. First Timothy 2:1-4
