Pastor's Letter

Now that the turkey leftovers have been just about finished (if you have any turkey legs left, you can drop them off at the rectory), and Santa has showed up at the end of the Thanksgiving Macy's Day Pa-



rade, we are quickly moving into preparing for Christmas. I have recently read a book that our spiritual book club will be reading entitled *Hidden Christmas* by Timothy Keller. Keller, a Presbyterian minister, is a wonderful spiritual writer. He wrote one of my all-time favorite books: *The Prodigal God.* If you want to read a wonderful book to prepare for the great feast of Christmas, I highly recommend *Hidden Christmas*. Keller says some obvious words about Christmas but I find they were so simple that I might miss

them as December dawns upon us.

He writes: Christmas is the only Christian holy day that is a secular holiday, arguably our culture's biggest. The result is two different celebrations, each observed by millions of people at the same time. This brings discomfort to both groups. I find this to be so very true. Bill O'Reilly, the Fox commentator, and others have been seeking to challenge those who want to push Christ out of Christmas. Practices such as not allowing workers to wish customers Merry Christmas and the banning of all Christmas music in some public schools are two such examples of what O'Reilly calls the "war on Christmas." The Knights of Columbus along with other groups have stressed the use of bumper stickers and car magnets that say, Keep Christ in Christmas. I am both delighted and surprised that our town of Bethpage places a lovely Christmas crèche on Broadway. Here at St. Martin's and in Catholic and Christians churches throughout the world, there will be the celebration of the four Sundays of Advent, with the liturgy and preaching focusing on the spiritual preparation and the meaning of Christmas. There is no doubt that our society does celebrate the holiday of Christmas with tremendous energy to the point that many arrive on Christmas morning both exhausted and broke.

Still, I am no Scrooge. I love the many aspects of Christmas preparations. Christmas cards, shopping for gifts, the search for sugar free Christmas cookies, decorating, sentimental movies and stories, Christmas music, visiting with family and friends are all essential parts of my Christmas. Almost every one of these Christmas customs have their roots in honoring the birth of Jesus. Granted, it is easy to get so wrapped up in these traditions that we may miss the Baby, the Word made Flesh, the God-baby.

My message to you and to me (most talks and sermons I give are not only to others but to myself), is to balance the holiday and the Holy Day. The holiday's truest meaning is to help us celebrate and rejoice in the Holy Day.

Here are some practical steps you might consider for your integration of the Holy Day of Christmas into the holiday season:

- Attend Mass for the four Sundays of Advent.
- Remember the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, our nation's patron and a Holy Day of obligation.
- Celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation during Advent.
- We will celebrate the beautiful Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick on December 3rd at the 9:00 a.m. Mass

- Donate to the Parish Giving Tree, the Food Pantry, or some other good cause that reminds us to reach out to those in need.
- At 8:30 a.m. each morning, we will say the Morning Divine Office in Church before the 9:00 a.m. Mass.
- There will be two Advent prayers services at 7:30 p.m. on December 13th and 20th.
- Consider having an Advent Wreath at home, especially if you have children.
- Consider buying your tree from our Parish Life Teen Youth Ministry.
- Send a card to someone that you may have lost touch with or with whom you may have had a disagreement. If all you can do is wish them a Merry Christmas, that is fine.
- Wear your parish Christmas button as a sign of witness.
- Avoid all political talk at Christmas dinner.
- Say a prayer when you put up your Christmas tree.
- Explain your family Christmas figures to your children or grandchildren.
- Shop but not till you drop.
- Watch It's a Wonderful Life or A Christmas Carol.
- Have fun.
- Enjoy your family and friends!

The American Military Channel has been running a series about the Cold War that lasted pretty much from the end of World War II up until the fall of the Soviet Union. The series places a great stress on the ongoing development of more and more nuclear weapons that had tremendous capacity for the destruction of the world. Both the United States had and continues to have submarines, planes, and missals that in less than 20 minutes or so can change the world forever. The series also speaks of some of the moments, either by intention or by accident, that the Cold War almost turned hot with the reality of a full blown nuclear war occurring. The movie, *Crimson Red*, starring Gene Hackman and Denzel Washington captures well the danger of an accidental missile launch from an American submarine.

I was twelve years old during the Cuban Missile Crisis of 1962 and remember going to our basement to fill up a large sink with water in case we were attacked. Of course, those of us over 60 still recall practicing putting our heads under our school desks to prepare for an attack by the Russians. Occasionally, I still see some old signs in Brooklyn pointing to fallout shelters. Today, although there are many countries with weapons of mass destruction, and even the threat of a terrorist cell obtaining such an instrument, we seem to worry less about the threat of nuclear destruction than in the 1950's and 60's. Sad to say, our reality is that after September 11th, we have grown accustomed to living with terrorism. It seems there is far more energy placed on debates of the possibility of our destroying the world by global warming and pollution.

Like most of the nation, I was captivated by following our recent national elections. One thing that struck me both before and during the election on November 8th was the great desire that the media, perhaps reflecting us, wanted to know who was going to win the election. Poll after poll was taken, trends were studied daily, and exit polls on election day sought to tell us what was going to be the results. I suppose that is only human. Show up at a home with a wrapped gift and the kids will immediately ask who is that gift for? Is it for me? What is it? Soon, parents will be searching out their special hiding place for Christmas gifts. We know that it is not only children who have this great curiosity in wanting to know. I must say I am amazed that some couples who have a sonogram in preparation for the birth of their child can tell the doctor that they do not want to know the results. I am not sure if I could do that. Tell someone you have a big secret will lead them to consider waterboarding you until you reveal it to them.

Years ago, the longest two hours of my life was when I called the doctor's office for the result of echocar-diogram. They had always been normal and that is what I had expected to hear. After waiting the thirty seconds or so for the nurse to get the results, she told me, *Oh, I must have the doctor call you since he wants to talk to you.* It was two hours before he called and I was in full blown panic. The first sin of Adam and Eve was brought about by a powerful temptation from Satan. He tells our first parents, who are gloriously happy and have a wonderful relationship with God, that if they eat the one fruit that God has told them to avoid, they will be like God and know everything. Ah, to know everything is a temptation we all face. Living with the unknown is hard to do.

Our scripture readings today are called apocalyptic in nature. They are addressing the end of the world. Jesus is telling the people that the world they know, the reality they have experienced, will someday end. Even the great Temple of Jerusalem will fall to the ground in destruction! These words are unimaginable to the people. The Temple will always be there! Jesus has their attention and they demanded to know when this will happen. What will be the sign that will help us prepare for this? Tell us now! Jesus tells them that that is reserved for his Father to know.

There was a time when the Redemptorists, the order that serves here at St. Martin's, were famous for preaching on hell and brimstone. It was said that we spoke so well about hell that you thought we had been there! Such preaching is now less frequent. Our founder St. Alphonsus told us that conversions brought about by fear do not last; only those brought about by knowing the love of God will last. We all know we are going to die, but we prefer not to dwell on this topic. None of know the hour or the moment of our call home to God. How often we are shocked by the sudden and unexpected death of a loved one! Our first words are: I can't believe it! It can't be true!

I think we are blessed not to know the hour of our death. It would make us so anxious and afraid to live our lives with joy and zest. Still, there are many accounts of people who suffer from a terminal disease who truly live their last days with great dignity and peace. For me the fundamental truth of today's Gospel

about the end of time is that we take each day as a gift from God and live it as well as we can. If we are angry and bitter toward someone, now is the time to repair the breach in the relationship. If there is someone we rarely tell we love them and how precious they are to us, now is the time to do so. I have often seen a sign in sacristies that reads: *Priest of God, say this Mass as if it were your first Mass, your last Mass, your only Mass.* It is not easy to be so focused in life that we could live in such a way of attentiveness to God, to others, and to the world around us but it a grace and gift to pray for in our daily lives.

St. Francis de Sales teaches: Each moment of each day comes from the hand of a loving God and is graced for your salvation. The only time you have is each present moment. Don't dwell in the past or the future. The great psychologist called neurosis as a refusal to love in the present. The only moment we have is today. This is the gift that God has given you and me: this day. To follow Jesus is to seek to take each moment he gives us and to live it as faithfully as we can in loving him, loving our family and friends, doing what we can for those who are suffering or in need. Jesus tells us that in midst of adversity and suffering, not a hair on your head will be destroyed. By your perseverance you will secure your life.

Gifts from Bethlehem - Olive Wood Handcrafted from the Holy Land

A Traditional Art and Livelihood for Holy Land Christians - The handicrafts trade evolved as a cultural tradition of Christians in the Holy Land for many centuries. This indigenous form of art has since become an industry of great importance to the local people of the Holy Land who rely on it for livelihood, and to Christian pilgrims from all around the world whose holy pilgrimage can be memorialized for a lifetime in cherished olive wood or mother of pearl souvenirs. The olive wood carving market is the major source of income in the Bethlehem area. More than 65% of the income of the community in Bethlehem comes from this work. In recent years, however, the holy crafts trade has suffered many hardships due to social and economical pressures. Because of a sharp fall in tourism and also as a result of diminishing numbers of craftsmen who leave their traditional trade and emigrate due to the difficult conditions in their homeland, the Holy Land handicraft market is facing serious danger, and so is the Christian community in there.

Sixty five years ago the Christians represented more than 28% of the total population in the Holy Land, today they are less than 1.5%. The loss of Christians in the land of Christianity's birth will represent a tragedy of immeasurable proportions for the billions of Christians worldwide. Thank you for your vital support for a Christian tradition and in protecting this very important culture and industry.
