Pastor's Letter

The most famous song from the Broadway show *Fiddler on the Roof* is named *Tradition*. This well-known song speaks of the family traditions that held a Jewish family together in Russia in the early twentieth century.

[TEVYE]

Tradition, tradition! Tradition! Tradition, tradition! Tradition!
Who, day and night, must scramble for a living, Feed a wife and children, say his daily prayers?
And who has the right, as master of the house, To have the final word at home?
The Papa, the Papa! Tradition. The Papa, the Papa! Tradition.

[GOLDE & MAMAS]

Who must know the way to make a proper home, A quiet home, a kosher home? Who must raise the family and run the home, So Papa's free to read the holy book? The Mama, the Mama! Tradition! The Mama, the Mama! Tradition!

[SONS]

At three, I started Hebrew school. At ten, I learned a trade.
I hear they've picked a bride for me. I hope she's pretty.
The sons, the sons! Tradition! The sons, the sons! Tradition!

[DAUGHTERS]

And who does Mama teach to mend and tend and fix,
Preparing me to marry whoever Papa picks?
The daughters, the daughters! Tradition! The daughters, the daughters! Tradition!

Tradition! I was thinking of the family traditions that I have had with my family on New Year's Eve. My father almost always worked as a paper handler on the night shift for the <u>New York Times</u> on December 31st and my sister would go out to eat with her husband. Mom always liked to go out to eat at a local restaurant named the <u>Bay Ridge Seafood</u> (now closed). There was a New Year's Eve special and she liked to get to the restaurant around six p.m. There was almost always a waiting time since reservations were not accepted. So after a forty minute wait, the maître d would direct us to a seat.

My mother was never happy with the first table that was offered and this put us back on the waiting line. I wondered if we would eat before the ball fell at midnight! Finally, we sat down and Mom would tell me what I liked and should order. Naturally, I chose the opposite of what she suggested. Most of the people in the restaurant were couples. I always felt like they were looking at me with scorn since I suspected they were thinking that this is a guy who can't even get a date on New Year's Eve – he has to go out with his mother!

When we got back home, I would usually watch some meaningless football bowl game since the big matches were on New Year's Day. My sister, before she left, cooked some great snacks for later in the evening such as pigs in a blanket and baked clams. She left her three children in our care. Naturally, the kids were excited about staying up until midnight, but they rarely made it. We would break out the snacks at around 10:30 p.m. along with a taste of Jamison for "my son the priest," and we would watch Guy Lombardo and his band at the world-famous Waldorf Astoria. The television commentator would announce that the tickets for dinner on New Year's Eve were around \$400.00. My mother would say we did better at the Bay Ridge Seafood. Tradition!

Finally, as the ball and the New Year echoed in, my mother sent me out to ring the bell and come in to the house. I told her it was cold out. She said, according to Irish lore, that it was good luck if the first person in the house was a dark-haired man. My sister Gerry would call from whatever convent she was living in and my sister Maryanne from wherever she was to wish us a Happy New Year. I have never been too wild about New Year's Eve, and our customs did not energize me very much. We would shout Happy New Year from our area ways to neighbors and join them in the low budget noisemakers of pots and pans being banged together.

I do remember very vividly one New Year's Eve when my mother had gotten very ill and was taken to the hospital. We did not know what was wrong and my sister and I were so very concerned and upset to see Mom sick. Finding our family doctor on New Year's Eve was all but impossible. Finally, a doctor I knew was at the hospital and he explained that he would make certain that our mother was well-cared for. At around 11:00PM, stressed out, worried, exhausted and hungry, we went home. Already horns were hooting and festivities beginning for the New Year. My worries about my mother dimmed any latent joy I might have for New Year's Eve. I just wanted to go home and go to bed.

When we got home, my two nieces and my nephew, who were now teens, had prepared our family traditional foods and insisted we stay up and watch the ball fall at midnight. I was moved by how they had learned the traditions of our family and were now using them to bring comfort to their mom and uncle. Tradition! And at midnight, my hair having been transformed from brown to gray over the years, my nephew had the honor of being the first man in for the New Year. Then, we went on to the banging of the pot and pans. Mom got better in a few days and I think often of that New Year's and how the ritual sustained us.

Last New Year's Eve, we took our family tradition to the Poconos. My niece and her husband had just bought a new vacation home there and they wanted the family to welcome the New Year's in their residence. Since January 1st is the anniversary of my sister's wedding to her now deceased husband Jack, we also added a mass of remembrance to the family tradition. This year, I again plan on being in the Poconos this New Year's Eve for some pigs in a blanket and delightful (?) sugar free desserts. Sean, age 10, will be the first man in the house for the New Year. We have upgraded from the pots and pans to Dollar Store noisemakers. We will toast Jack, Mom and Dad, Gerry, and remember as well our living family members who could not be with us. What was once a kind of tedious New Year's Tradition is now very special to me.

For me, New Year's Day is about looking back in gratitude to God for what has been, and moving forward in hope for what will be. As Catholics, we have many traditions, rituals, and sacred customs. Certainly, our most sacred ritual which is so much more than any word can describe, is the celebration of the Mass, the dying and rising of Jesus. Family traditions and rituals are lovely and bring us great comfort. They connect us to one another, generation to generation. Our Catholic faith has sustained generation after generation, from the catacombs of Rome, the death chambers of the Nazis, through illnesses and deaths, as we find meaning and comfort in baptisms and funerals, weddings and anniversaries, first communions and parish picnics. Happy New Year!

Twenty centuries have come and gone, and today he is the central figure of the human race.


