Pastor's Letter

Father Pat's Homily of January 29, 2017

The Beatitudes

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he had sat down, his disciples came to him. He began to teach them, saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted. Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land. Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied. Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. Blessed are the clean of heart, for they will see God. Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God. Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven."

I was channel surfing the other night and a movie called Up In The Air was on. It starred George Clooney and was made in 2009. I had seen it when it came out in the theatres, but I started watching it. Clooney plays a man named Ryan Bingham who works for a corporation that specializes in downsizing companies. So his job is to go into a company and individually tell employees, some who have worked for the companies for more than thirty years, that they are being fired. He does this efficiently, professionally, and without any human emotion. It is painful to watch these scenes. The movie is titled Up in the Air since "Ryan" spends most of his life on airplanes. He has little contact with any family members, mostly lives in hotel rooms, and has no serious loving relationships. I think the movie seeks to challenge some of the emptiness that can be found in our disconnected age where business comes first and family life and values are considered old fashioned by many. Ryan is a wealthy, successful man whose life is totally empty. In perhaps the saddest truth of all, is that he does not even know how empty his life is. The movie ends with several people of various ages and backgrounds speaking about how painful and difficult it was to be unemployed. Yet, each person mentions that he/she could not have survived the ordeal without their spouse, or a parent, or their children. These people, while devastated, find strength and support in the love of others. Their commitments are a striking contrast to Ryan Bingham's, whose life is one of complete detachment from others.

As I was reading and praying over the Gospel today of Jesus delivering the Sermon on the Mount and the Beatitudes, I thought of this movie. The Beatitudes are central to the message of Jesus. Moses went up Mount Sinai to receive the ten commandments. These commandments were the law of God for his sons and daughters. The commandments today are still a fundamental part of Christian living. They are the most basic principles for human beings to interact with God and with one's neighbor. It is fair to say that if the vast majority of people in the world followed these commandments to honor God and his name, to respect our parents, to not hurt one another by acts of lies, theft, adultery, and violence, what a different world you and I would live in!

Mountains often have significance in the Scriptures. When we read that someone has gone up a mountain, we know that there may well be an encounter with God. ...are you kidding me? How can being poor in spirit or meek bring Like Moses, Jesus too goes up a mountain, not as high as Mount Sinai, but a significant elevation. Having seen the Mount of the Beatitudes, we were told by our guide that it was more like a natural auditorium, with the crowds below Jesus so they could sit and hear him. Unlike Moses, Jesus does not receive any commandments from God. Rather, since he is the Son of God, he proclaims what we today call the Beatitudes. Rather than say, thou shalt not kill or steal or lie, Jesus says, Blessed are you when you are poor in spirit, when you are meek, when you mourn, when you are a peacemaker, when you are merciful, and yes, even when people ridicule and persecute you for your beliefs and principles. Our Lord Jesus is not outlining a plan to avoid sin. He knows that the ten commandments have been revealed and are written in the human heart. Jesus is giving us the path to happiness in life. Unlike Ryan Bingham who finds only emptiness and sadness in life, Jesus is telling us that living the Beatitudes will lead one to peace and contentment.


As we read the Beatitudes, we may ask, are you kidding me? How can being poor in spirit or meek bring me joy? How can mourning in any way be equated with happi-

ness? Jesus is not saying being poor makes one happy. He is telling us that being consumed with wealth is not the path to peace. I think we may think meekness is weakness. I am struck that our age is an angry age with so many people trying to outshout one another. To my mind, strength is found in gentleness, forgiveness, peacemaking and compassion. Although I find it hard not to let go of anger toward someone who has hurt me in any way, I also know that I am not happy or at peace within myself when I am fighting with someone or holding a grudge toward them.

Mourning is painful, but at the same time, being surrounded by family and friends at a time of loss, and knowing that there is a life beyond that which we can see, is a great blessing. I have often heard people say at a time of loss or tragedy: where would we be without our faith. Blessed are the peacemakers. I can't make peace in the Middle East or with the ISIS terrorists, but I can, if I choose by the grace of God, work to bring healing and understanding in my home, in my family, with my co-workers or in my parish. Blessed are the peacemakers for they will be called children of God.

If we seek to live these Beatitudes people may think us foolish, overly religious, out of touch with the modern world. Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me. Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven. What a blessing to know where my life is ultimately heading. Perhaps, you might pray over these Beatitudes. Listen to them with your heart and not just your ears. Choose one of them for a look inside yourself and ask yourself how your life might change if you let those words of Jesus spoken to people on a crowded hillside two thousand years ago, become a blessing to you.



The Most Reverend John Oliver Barres, S.T.D., J.C.L., D.D., was installed as the fifth Bishop of the Rockville Centre Catholic Diocese on Tuesday, January 31, 2017 in the Cathedral of Saint Agnes. Bishop Barres succeeds Bishop William Murphy who has retired.

The principal installing prelates were Timothy Cardinal Dolan, Archbishop of New York and Metropolitan of the New York Province and Archbishop Christophe Pierre, Apostolic Nuncio to the United States of America.

He may become known as the "point guard bishop." Bishop John O. Barres, the pope's choice to be the next bishop of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, is a basketball guy — big-time. He loves the game, played on Princeton University's junior varsity squad for three years, and plans to draw upon his experiences on the court in leading Long Island's Catholics. "My experience as a point guard, even at the JV level at Princeton, was one of the ways the Holy Spirit formed me to be a point guard with the Catholic Church as the bishop of Rockville Centre," Barres, 56, said Friday on the Telecare news program "Everyday Faith Live." Playing on Princeton's team was a lesson in "radical unselfishness, radical death to ego, team chemistry, team fundamentals — and the beautiful pleasure of executing a backdoor cut-and-pass beautifully," he said later at a news conference. Telecare on Friday broadcast a video of Barres holding basketball clinics with young people and making a 20-foot jump shot that was all net, showing he still has good shooting form. Just as a point guard sees the whole floor and works with every player as an extension of the coach, I am looking forward to that beautiful role here," Barres said.

Growing up in Larchmont in Westchester County, his Catholic Youth Organization basketball team made "pilgrimages" in the early 1970s to Nassau Veterans Memorial Coliseum to watch "the Doctor" — future Hall of Famer Julius Erving, of Roosevelt — "perform midair surgery with a red, white and blue ABA ball," he said. Today, he counts among his friends Steve Mills, president of the New York Knicks, and David Blatt, who used to coach LeBron James on the Cleveland Cavaliers. He thinks his former Princeton coach, the legendary Pete Carril, may attend his January 31 installation as Bishop of Rockville Centre.


Barres' personal connection to Long Island goes back to childhood, he said, recalling the beaches not far from St. Agnes Cathedral — seat of the diocese that spans Nassau and Suffolk counties. "One of my greatest family memories is of my parents packing their six children, peanut butter and jelly sandwiches and celery sticks into an overcrowded blue Ford Galaxy car to head to Jones Beach, with a preference for either Field 6 or Field 9!" he said. And from Larchmont, he noted, "I had a clear vision across the Sound of the Diocese of Rockville Centre, never knowing that God's vision and providence would one day bring us together."

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Barres' late parents, Marjorie and Oliver Barres, were Protestant ministers who met each other at the Yale Divinity School and later converted to Catholicism. In 1960, Barres was baptized by Bishop Fulton Sheen. He earned an undergraduate degree in English literature at Princeton and a master's degree at the New York University Graduate School of Business Administration. He studied theology at The Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. Barres was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Wilmington in Delaware in October 1989.

Pope John Paul II named him a chaplain to His Holiness in July 2000 with the title of monsignor. Pope Benedict XVI named him a Prelate of Honor in November 2005. In Allentown, Barres started a diocese wide St. Thomas More Society for lawyers aimed at promoting the issue of religious liberty. He also started a program for young men considering the priesthood, and has the diocese sponsor a weeklong summer camp for high-school-age boys who may have a vocation to the priesthood. Barres is a proponent of using social media to promote the Catholic faith. He has a video blog on the Allentown diocesan website and has opened a Twitter account. On a national level, he serves on the Committee on Evangelization and Catechesis for the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

ROCKVILLE CENTRE FAITHFUL AMONG JUBILANT CROWD AT MARCH FOR LIFE IN WASHINGTON: More than 2,000 people from the Diocese of Rockville Centre traveled to Washington D.C. to witness the Gospel of Life and stand up for the rights of the unborn at the annual March for Life. www.licatholic.org. About 10,000 young people from across the United States, including many groups from the Diocese of Rockville Centre, gathered at the D.C. Armory January 27 to rally, pray and attend Mass before the annual March for Life. Arriving at the D.C. "We are going to offer ourselves as an expression of the beauty of life in a throwaway culture," the Cardinal told those gathered at the Mass.
