### Confirmation Day, March 2017

As a parish priest, I am blessed to participate in many significant moments of the lives of our parishioners. Celebrating and preaching at daily and Sunday Mass to a faith-filled community is a joy, as in proclaiming the victory of Jesus Christ at a funeral or the presence of our Lord with the sick and dying through the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is to stand on sacred ground. The very evident festive spirit at a wedding or a baptism lifts my heart. To forgive sins in the name of Jesus is a powerful but humbling experience.



I love walking into our Church on Christmas Eve and seeing a full church with so many people eager to hear the wondrous story of the birth of Jesus. When we baptize and welcome new members into our faith community at the Easter Vigil, there is delight on both the part of those entering the church, those who have helped prepared them for that moment, and throughout the entire congregation. Although it is a very hectic day, witnessing the desire of so many people to receive ashes as Lent begins makes me seek to deepen my need for conversion. I remember John Denver sang a song called *Some Days are Diamonds, and Some Days are Stones.* Most of my days here at St. Martin are gems (Harry Smith often said to me, *Father Pat, you are* 

gem). But there are some days that are truly diamonds.

Confirmation Day here at St. Martin's is a diamond day for me. Perhaps, part of my love of this day is that I do not have to do too much. The assigned bishop does the preaching and confirming. Bishop Andrzej Jerzy Zglejszewski was the confirming bishop at our two Confirmation Masses on March 8<sup>th</sup>. Needless to say, I never try to pronounce his last name - I have trouble enough with his first name. He is truly a delightful man who has a great sense of humor, loves his ministry and so enjoys celebrating the Sacrament of Confirmation with the children. Occasionally, he refers to himself as Arnold Schwarzenegger, with the words, *I'll be back.* I think those confirmed and their families were very grateful for his presence among us.

After the two ceremonies, we have a dinner in St. Alphonsus Hall for the Bishop. Invited are the Confirmation teachers, our parish staff, and those who played a special role in organizing the day. I am sure that all bishops praise the hosting parish at such dinners, but I do think that Bishop Andrzej went out of his way to praise our parish and its staff. Perhaps, I am like a proud parent taking pride in his family, but I do think he went the extra mile in saying how impressed he was with our parish celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation. I know I am always amazed that we can educate, organize, and celebrate two ceremonies yearly for over 180 teens and their families in such an uplifting, spiritual liturgy.

I am now in my sixth year as pastor. The young people who were confirmed were making their first holy communion my first year here. I can understand a little bit how parents say how fast the time goes and how fast the kids grow up. I could recall little girls who now were seeking to adjust to their high heels, and boys who were growing taller. Where will this sacrament bring these children in their lives is an unknown. Some may be devout practicing Catholics all their lives. Others may drift from the faith and then return when they have their own families. Perhaps, some may even give up their Catholic faith in the years to come. Only God knows. But as they came forward to be confirmed, I could see in their eyes that this moment was a holy one for them, an encounter with the Living God. I trust God will be with them all the days of their lives.

It is always dangerous to thank people by name so I will try to resist lest I leave anybody inadvertently out. I think of all the parishioners who helped create this Confirmation Day:

- The parishioners who have conducted our marriage preparation program that prepared the parents
  of these young people for Confirmation.
- The parishioners who lead our baptismal program.
- The directors of the religious education program.
- All the teachers in our religious education program.
- Our musicians and choir who play such a key role in the liturgy.
- The servers, both young and old, who assist at the ceremonies.
- Our maintenance team who set up chairs and banners for the Church
- Our office staff who prepare programs and host the dinner
- Our clergy, both priests and deacons, living and deceased, who were part of the formation of these
  young people.
- Our sacristans and those who care for the sacred linens
- Those who decorate the church in such a beautiful way
- Those various members of our councils and committees who offer wise guidance to the pastor

You the parishioners made this day possible by your financial support of the parish. We could not have 185 young people confirmed without the necessary funds to run the parish. I want you to realize you are active participants in the mission of this parish by your financial support. I thank everyone who made Confirmation Day so beautiful!

I was recently watching a rerun of *Everyone Loves Raymond*. It was a two-part show about the wedding of Robert to Amy. Naturally, everything goes wrong with both the ceremony and reception with Marie interrupting the wedding ceremony to give Robert last minute advice, and Frank complaining that there is crummy food and a cash bar at the reception. The entire day is moving toward being a fiasco when Raymond saves it all with his wedding toast as best man. He speaks about editing out the bad memories and holding on to the good ones. Here is part of what he says:

"...and you know one more thing about the editing. I, uh think you're gonna remember about today what you wanna remember. You know, I guess our brains are like that. Like I remember my wedding day as the day I got to kiss the most beautiful girl in the world. Yeah. I think she remembers it. At least I hope she does. It was a good day. The start of a lot of good memories. We completely blotted out the part where Mom was hanging onto my pants yelling, "Don't go! Don't go!" Yeah. We didn't save **those** pictures. Just the good ones. Hold onto the good ones. Those are the keepers."

Confirmation Day at St. Martin's is one of the good ones. A keeper!

**The Movie Of Gods and Men** will be shown on **Friday March 31 at 7PM in St. Alphonsus Hall.** Rated PG 13 (2 hours and 3 minutes)

A Review of the Movie: What is refreshing about the popular and critical success of Of Gods and Men (winner the Grand Prix at Cannes 2010) is not that it is particularly experimental or challenging, but rather that it avoids going either for the populist crowd-pleasing angle or the tear-jerker that its real-life inspiration seems to demand. The film is based on a true story of a small community of Cistercian monks in Tibhirine in Algeria caught up in the country's political troubles during the 1990s. The monks regard it as their duty to bring aid and provide medicine for the local villagers who are suffering because of the local unrest and the battles between the national army and Islamic fundamentalists, but they risk incurring the wrath not only of the fundamentalists through their spreading of Christian beliefs, but also the Algerian army who believe that they may be giving aid and medicine to wounded militants. It would be all too easy to let the divide that exists in this situation and the choice that is faced by the monks to remain simplistic - should they stay or should they go? Even though there are some reservations expressed, there is never any doubt that the monks will come to the logical Christian conclusion and stay. What is rather more impressive however is how the director refuses to allow this decision to be seen, as it would in a more conventional film, as simply an act of heroism or bravery. The situation is not exploited shamelessly for heavy-handed sentimentality as it would be in a Hollywood production, but rather it goes deeper into the qualities that lie behind courage and potential martyrdom. What the monks have to grapple with are their own doubts, their own flaws, their own fears their very humanity. It is not weak to confront these fears, but the true measure of the men is in how they come to terms with their human weaknesses without denying them.

Beauvois manages to draw the essential truth and beauty out of the film, and at the same time protect it from the intrusive elements that could indeed diminish its force, simply showing the closeness of their brotherhood, their willingness to understand and forgive, and their ability to reflect deeply not so much on the decision that must be taken whether to stay or to leave, but on a deep search into themselves for the heartfelt truth. These kind of reflections and questions are not so easy to put up on the screen without troublesome exposition, but Beauvois manages to show simply and effectively how the monks find this truth in their daily routines and in the simplicity of their lifestyle. It all comes down to life and the love of life itself, and the simple pleasures that can be gained from it.

### So that they may see both spiritually and physically!



In next week's Gospel, the man born blind sees for the first time. Jesus cures him, a lowly beggar, with mud. Those around doubt the man's explanation and doubt the power and compassion of Jesus Christ. They are blind to the Lord even though they see. They are blind spiritually. In this world, there are many who, while not blind, are unable to fully see. May of these are not spiritually blind but physically, their sight prevents them from reading or seeing distance or light causes them poor vision. Our prayers for them help them

spiritually but we can use that Spirit driving us to pray by actually doing something about it.

Many of us have old prescriptive glasses for reading or distance or reading glasses bought from drugstores. Many of us have old prescriptive sunglasses that we no longer use. Perhaps you know of others in your families or among your friends who have old glasses. The RCIA ministry is conducting a collection of gently used eyeglasses which will be shipped to *Eye Make A Difference*, a VSP global organization helping people to have a better outlook on their lives. There will be boxes set up in Church for you to place any gently used glasses that you might have (with or without cases). Think about it! We are such a gifted and generous parish and you can help even further by helping someone, somewhere to see.

These boxes will remain from Saturday, March 25, through Thursday, March 30, 2017.

# DIVORCE NUMBERS RISE AMONG OLDER AMERICANS, FALL AMONG YOUNGER COUPLES: Washington D.C. March 2017 CNA/EWTN NEWS:

The divorce rate has doubled for Americans over age 50, and tripled among Americans over 65, a new survey shows. "At a time when divorce is becoming less common for younger adults, so-called GRAY DIVORCE is on the rise, the PEW RESEARCH CENTER said." In 2015, the divorce rate among married persons over 50 was 10 in 1,000, an increase from 5 in 1,000 in 1990. Among those 65 and older, the divorce rate has tripled to 6 per 1,000. Pew said the divorced rate among those 50 and older is partly linked to the aging of the Baby Boomer generation, the age cohort 51 - 69 in 2015. As young adults, this generation had unprecedented levels of divorce. Remarriages tend to be less stable than first marriages, with the divorced-and-remarried having twice the divorce rate as those married once. Among the divorces of adults age 50 and older, 48% were in a second or later marriage.

The risk of divorce is also higher among those who have been married for a shorter time. At the same time, Pew said a SIGNIFICANT SHARE of divorces are among those 50 and older. About 34% of those divorcing after 50 years old had been married for at least 30 years, and 12% were married for over 40 years. Many of these divorcees cited dissatisfaction in their marriages and a desire to seek opportunities to pursue their own interest and independence late in life. These older divorcees, especially women, face more financial insecurity than married and widowed adults. As for younger age cohorts, the divorce rate slightly increased among married adults age 40 - 49. Divorce rates have dropped 21% among those aged 25 - 39 from 30 in 1,000 to 24 in 1,000 from 1990 to 2015. According to Pew, this decline is in part attributed to younger generations' delay in marrying. It is also attributed to the phenomenon of the college-educated being more likely to marry and also being less likely to divorce. Tags: Marriage, Catholic News, Divorce.

### Happy Feast of St. Joseph, March 20<sup>th</sup>

Everything we know about the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus comes from Scripture and that has seemed too little for those who made up legends about him. We know he was a carpenter, a working man, for



the skeptical Nazarenes ask about Jesus, "Is this not the carpenter's Son?" (Matthew 13:55). He wasn't rich for when he took Jesus to the Temple to be circumcised and Mary to be purified he offered the sacrifice of two turtledoves or a pair of pigeons, allowed only for those who could not afford a lamb (Luke 2:24). Despite his humble work and means, Joseph came from a royal lineage. Luke and Matthew disagree some about the details of Joseph's genealogy but they both mark his descent from David, the greatest king of Israel (Matthew 1:1-16 and Luke 3:23-38). Indeed the angel who first tells Joseph about Jesus greets him as "son of David," a royal title used also for Jesus.

We know Joseph was a compassionate, caring man. When he discovered Mary was pregnant after they had been betrothed, he knew the child was not his but was as yet unaware that she was carrying the Son of God. He knew women accused of adultery could be stoned to death, so he resolved to send her away quietly to not expose her to shame or cruelty. However, when an angel came to Joseph in a dream and told him, "Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins," he did as the angel told him and took Mary as his wife. (Matthew 1:19-25).

When the angel came again to tell him that his family was in danger, he immediately left everything he owned, all his family and friends, and fled to a strange country with his young wife and the baby. He waited in Egypt without question until the angel told him it was safe to go back (Matthew 2:13-23). We know Joseph loved Jesus. His one concern was for the safety of this child entrusted to him. Not only did he leave his home to protect Jesus, but up on his return settled in the obscure town of Nazareth out of fear for his life. When Jesus stayed in the Temple we are told Joseph (along with Mary) searched with great anxiety for three days for him (Luke 2:48). We also know that Joseph treated Jesus as his own son for over and over the people of Nazareth say of Jesus, "Is this not the son of Joseph?" (Luke 4:22) We know Joseph respected God. He followed God's commands in handling the situation with Mary and going to Jerusalem to have Jesus circumcised and Mary purified after Jesus' birth. We are told that he took his family to Jerusalem every year for Passover, something that could not have been easy for a working man.

Since Joseph does not appear in Jesus' public life, at his death, or resurrection, many historians believe Joseph probably had died before Jesus entered public ministry. Joseph is the patron saint of the dying because, assuming he died before Jesus' public life, he died with Jesus and Mary close to him, the way we all would like to leave this earth. Joseph is also patron saint of the Universal Church, families, fathers, expectant mothers, travelers, immigrants, house sellers and buyers, craftsmen, engineers, and working people in general. We celebrate two feast days for Joseph: March 19 for Joseph the Husband of Mary and May 1 for Joseph the Worker. March 19 has been the most commonly celebrated feast day for Joseph, and it wasn't until 1955 that Pope Pius XII established the Feast of "St. Joseph the Worker" to be celebrated on May 1.

#### Prayer to St. Joseph

Oh St. Joseph, whose protection is so great, so strong, so prompt before the throne of God, I place in you all my interests and desires. Oh St. Joseph, do assist me by your powerful intercession and obtain for me from your divine son all spiritual blessings through Jesus Christ, our Lord; so that having engaged here below your heavenly power, I may offer my thanksgiving and homage to the most loving of Fathers. Oh St. Joseph, I never weary contemplating you and Jesus asleep in your arms. I dare not approach while he reposes near your heart. Press Him in my name and kiss his fine head for me, and ask him to return the kiss when I draw my dying breath. St. Joseph, patron of departing souls, pray for us. Amen
