Pastor's Letter

I always look forward to going over to the church before Christmas and Easter to see the beautiful decorations and symbols that Ann Hughes and her team of talented assistants have arranged to help give praise and glory to God, and to lift our hearts in prayer at the wonder of God's love. Parishioners and visitors often thank me for what I have created. Being always ready to accept praise, even when it is not earned, I graciously accept their words of gratitude. As Clint Eastwood would say, A man needs to know his limita-



tions, and I am a firm believer in that principle since my creative designs pretty much run to Mets blue and Jets green. So, I leave the decorating team alone and let them work their creative magic.

The present Easter display is so very beautifully done. I love the display of flowers, so generously supported by the parishioners in their flower envelopes. Although I would be hard-pressed to name the variety of plants and flowers in our sanctuary, I do love the variety of styles and colors. The lambs on top of the wood grate bring to mind the prayers we say before receiving the Holy Eucharist: Lamb of God, You take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us, and

This is Jesus the Lamb of God who comes to take away the sins of the world. In the scriptural account in the Book of Exodus the Jewish people led by Moses, are guided out of slavery from the Egyptians by the power of God. On the night before their escape, each family eats a one year old unblemished lamb and sprinkles its blood on their door lintels to protect them from death. Jesus is now the Lamb of God who saves us by shedding his blood on the cross and calling us to eat his body and drink his blood at Eucharist.

I was delighted to see the infant Jesus crib in front of the altar. This statue is a particular favorite of mine since I bought it in Bethlehem a few years ago when I had the opportunity to make a pilgrimage to the Holy Land. The infant is put out every 25th of each month by Joseph and Mary Colavolpe. I had to find the correctly named people for this monthly mission. We also display the infant predominately during the Christmas Season. I am waiting for someone to ask me why is it out for Easter. Since Ann Hughes is a better trained theologian than I am, I will leave it to her to give the correct answer. As for my feeling, I think it makes perfect sense. When I teach little children about Easter, I always ask them what is the most important day of the year. Most of them immediately exclaim: *Christmas!* I am not sure if this response is based on their liturgical studies or on their love of Christmas presents. I always say that Christmas is a most special day but there is one that is more important. They always look quite skeptical when I say this. I then say it is St. Patrick's Day! However young they are, they know their pastor is kidding them since he looks to boast about his patron saint and his heritage. I then go on to make the point that Easter is considered the most important day of the Catholic faith. I must confess that I have never been able to convince them of this, but it is true according to the teaching of the Church.

Our faith was born on Easter Sunday as Jesus was raised from the dead. Without the resurrection, Jesus would be just another holy prophet with a powerful and loving message. His resurrection and ascension to the Father through the power of the Holy Spirit is the clear mark that He is the Son of God; his death is the clear mark that He is fully human.

Thus Sunday replaced the Jewish Saturday Sabbath because every Sunday is a now a kind of little Easter, as we celebrate the death and resurrection of Jesus. One child, perhaps either a future Jesuit or a possible lawyer, will always tell me, *Well, if there was no Christmas, there would be no Easter.* Out of the mouth of babes!

As I meditated on our Easter display one morning, I saw a very strong connection between the infant Jesus, the crucifix to the right of the altar, the altar itself, the pulpit and book of the Gospel to the left of the altar, and the great resurrection cross that predominates our sanctuary from above. And, I took comfort in knowing that Mary, the Mother of God, is just a few feet away in our prayer area. For me, the infant Jesus is a very powerful meditation on a God who loves us so much that he becomes a helpless infant who is totally dependent on Joseph and Mary. The Word has become flesh and dwells among us. *He did not cling to his divinity but emptied himself and became like us in all things but sin*. God become a touchable God in his full humanity.

The pulpit and *Book of the Gospel* moves me to reflect on the life and message of Jesus Christ. Our Lord teaches us that *the one who sees him sees the Father*. We take comfort and hope in the message of God who runs to welcome home a prodigal child. We learn that *God so loved the world that whoever believes in Him may not die but have eternal life*. The beautifully carved cross next the altar shows Christ in his full agony on the cross. In his humanity, we see a bruised and a battered man, crowned with thorns, nails pounded into his flesh, brutally lashed stripes across his back. The cross is the great school of the love that God has for each one of us. The Baby of Bethlehem was placed on the wood of manger; now Jesus dies on a rough wooden cross. His full humanity is revealed in his death.

My eyes move to the resurrected Jesus that stands above the altar. Gone is the blood and crown of thorns. He is vibrant and vigorous God, King of kings and Lord of lords, who has overcome the power of sin and death, opened the gates of paradise to his followers, and sits now at the right hand of the Father. *Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again.* The reality of the death and resurrection of Jesus is made present daily on the altar at the center of our sanctuary. There on that altar, we celebrate his death and resurrection as we follow his command of the Last Supper: *Do this in memory of me.* To be at Mass is to enter into the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus and our own promise of eternal life.

Holding the fully human and divine Jesus in her arms over by our prayer area is the Blessed Mother on the Icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help. Jesus not only had a mother, and as a last gift from the cross, he gave her to all generations to come as he told us; *Behold your mother*. The mother of Jesus is our mother too. There is one final piece to my reflections on our Easter Church at St. Martin's. Over the pews hang white strips of cloth made by Roberta Grieco recalling the resurrection of Jesus. In a few weeks, they will be replaced by red strips, representing the gift of the Holy Spirit on each one of us. The *nave* (based on the word Latin word *navis* which means ship) is the area of the church where the congregation sits. We are pilgrims on the way home to God. We are also filled with the presence of the Holy Spirit who is as present to us our own breath.

If any of you have your own prayerful thoughts on the Easter decorations, you are welcome to send them to me. *The best ones will win a bag of sugar free jellybeans.*



ST. JOSEPH THE WORKER - FEAST DAY - MAY 1st

To foster deep devotion to Saint Joseph among Catholics, and in response to the "May Day" celebrations for workers sponsored by Communists, Pope Pius XII instituted the feast of Saint Joseph

the Worker in 1955. This feast extends the long relationship between Joseph and the cause of workers in both Catholic faith and devotion. Beginning in the Book of Genesis, the dignity of human work has long been celebrated as a participation in the creative work of God. By work, humankind both fulfills the command found in to care for the earth (Gn 2:15) and to be productive in their labors. Saint Joseph, the carpenter and foster father of Jesus, is but one example of the holiness of human labor.



Jesus, too, was a carpenter. He learned the trade from Saint Joseph and spent his early adult years working side-by-side in Joseph's carpentry shop before leaving to pursue his ministry as preacher and healer. In his encyclical Pope John Paul II stated: "the Church considers it her task always to call attention to the dignity and rights of those who work, to condemn situations in which that dignity and those rights are violated, and to help to guide [social] changes so as to ensure authentic progress by man and society."

Saint Joseph is held up as a model of such work. Pius XII emphasized this when he said, "The spirit flows to you and to all men from the heart of the God-man, Savior of the world, but certainly, no worker was ever more completely and profoundly penetrated by it than the foster father of Jesus, who lived with Him in closest intimacy and community of family life and work."

This silent saint, who was given the noble task of caring and watching over the Virgin Mary and Jesus, now cares for and watches over the Church and models for all the dignity of human work.

s Catholics, we are very good at entering into the spirit of Lent. Many make sacrifices, pray more, and do good works. Lent is 40 days. I often feel that the Easter season, which is 50 days, often ends for many of us on Easter Sunday. Granted, it is a challenge to rejoice and celebrate 50 days in the spirit of rejoicing at the Resurrection of Jesus. For many people, one of the favorite Lenten devotions is to pray the Stations of the Cross in honor of the passion and death of Jesus.

On Friday, May 5th, I invite you to pray the Stations of the Resurrection, at 7:30PM in church. We reflect on and pray on the wonder and glory of the Risen Jesus. The prayer service will be about a half hour.

RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY DRUNK DRIVING (MADD...NO MORE VICTIMS)

A day rarely goes by that we do not hear of or view on TV a car, bus, or other vehicle involved in a crash with a drunk driver at the wheel. It makes you wonder, how many hit-an-run accidents were involved with drunk driving. The following article by MADD - MOTHERS AGAINST DRUNK DRIVING will give you more insight into the problem.

- GENERAL DRUNK DRIVING: 50 TO 75% of CONVICTED DRUNK DRIVERS continue to drive on a SUS-PENDED LICENSE.
- ONLY TIME WILL SOBER A PERSON UP. DRINKING STRONG COFFEE, EXERCISING OR TAKING A COLD SHOWER WILL NOT HELP.
- EVERY TWO MINUTES, A PERSON IS INJURED IN A DRUNK DRIVING CRASH.
- ON AVERAGE, TWO IN THREE PEOPLE WILL BE INVOLVED IN A DRUNK DRIVING CRASH IN THEIR LIFE-TIME.
- IN 2013, 28.7 MILLION PEOPLE ADMITTED TO DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE OF ALCOHOL..THAT'S MORE THAN THE POPULATION OF TEXAS.
- THE RATE OF DRUNK DRIVING IS HIGHEST AMONG 26 TO 29 YEAR OLDS (20.7 PERCENT)
- EVERY DAY IN AMERICA ANOTHER 27 PEOPLE DIE AS A RESULT OF DRUNK DRIVING CRASHES.
- IN THE UNITED STATES, THE NUMBER OF DRUNK DRIVING DEATHS HAS BEEN CUT IN HALF SINCE MADD WAS FOUNDED IN 1980.
- AN AVERAGE DRUNK DRIVER HAS DRIVEN DRUNK OVER 80 TIMES BEFORE FIRST ARREST.

Drunk Driving costs the U.S. \$132 billion a year. Adults drank too much and drove about 121 million times per year, over 300,000 incidents of drinking and driving a day. In 2015, 10,265 PEOPLE DIED in DRUNK DRIVING CRASHES. and 290,000 were INJURED. Drunk driving involvement in FATAL CRASHES in 2014 was almost 4 times higher at NIGHT than during the DAY. In 2014, 16% of all drivers involved in fatal crashes during the week were drunk, compared to 29 % on weekends.

CHILDREN: IN 2013, A TOTAL OF 1,149 CHILDREN 14 AND YOUNGER WERE KILLED IN MOTOR VEHICLE TRAFFIC CRASHES. OF THOSE 1,149 FATALITIES, 200 (17%) occurred in alcohol impaired driving crashes. Out of those 200 DEATHS, 121 (61%) were occupants of vehicles with drivers who had BACS of .08 or higher. Another 29 children were pedestrians or pedal-cyclists struck by drivers with BACS of .08 or higher.




