

Pastor's Letter Here is the funeral homily I gave for New York City Firefighter William Billy

Tolley. I am putting this homily in the bulletin as a tribute to him, to the New York City Fire Department, to all firefighters and all first responders. Thank you for who you are and your great service.

Along with people of every faith, nationality, and culture, I offer my deepest condolences to you Marie, the wife of Billy Tolley, to your precious daughter Bella, to his mother Marie and her husband Frank, to his father Bob and his wife Marion, to his brother Bobby and his wife Amy, to Marie's sister Kim and her husband Ryan, to her sister Theresa and her husband Steve, to his best friend Chris, to his brothers and sisters of Fire Company Ladder 135 and Engine 286, to the people of New York City, to the members of the band *Internal Bleeding*, and to the thousands of firefighters who have traveled to Bethpage from far and near in memory of their fallen brother.

We New Yorkers cherish the well-earned name given to our firefighters: *New York's Bravest*. Your members have shown that throughout your history. We love and value you for who you are and what you do for us day in and day out, often unnoticed until a tragic moment such as the death of firefighter Billy Tolley on Thursday, April 20th occurs. His death leaves so many pained, confused, and crying out for meaning during their sorrow.

Billy's daughter Bella, named after Billy's grandmother, knew something was wrong before Marie could find the words to tell her about her Daddy. *Mommy, why were you gone all day yesterday? What happened? I know something is wrong!* As courageous, strong and brave as any firefighter who has ever rushed into a burning building, this loving mother, carrying her crushing grief, gently tells Bella that her Daddy has gone home to God. Bella, as wise as any ancient philosopher says, *Mommy, Daddy is too young to die.* Bella, as vulnerable and innocent as any eight-year little girl can be on the Eve of her first communion, cries; *Mommy, I have no Daddy.* In the numbness of her pain, Marie tells her, *Bella, you know Daddy loved to help people. That's what firemen do. They help people. Your Daddy was a good man who died helping people.* In the words of the most difficult conversation a parent can ever have with her child, we hear words of faith. Our second reading today from St. Paul, the great preacher of the Resurrection of Jesus, proclaims the same faith-filled words of Marie: *For Christ, while we were still helpless, yet died at the appointed time for the ungodly. Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for a just person, though perhaps for a good person one might even find courage to die. But God proves his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.*

It is true that only with great difficulty does a person die for a good person, though perhaps for such a person one might find the courage to die. Billy, like any firefighter, put his life on the line, for any person who called for help. Creed, color, nationality means nothing to a firefighter. Their goal is to protect and save lives. Jesus Christ, the Son of God and a man like us in all things but sin, was willing to die for everyone who had ever lived. Jesus Christ died out of love for Billy Tolley, and for every one of us.

Billy was a man of passion. His brother Bobby told me that Billy had a passion for being a firefighter. It was not a job to him but a calling, a way of life. Bobby told me his brother cared about everyone and would help anyone he could. Billy was a devoted father. I asked Bella what are some of the favorite things you did with your Daddy. She told me, I loved to play the drums with him and I love to go to get chocolate ice cream with him.

The teachers in our religious education program knew him as the gentle father who dropped Bella off for her religion class and picked her up. We knew him as the Dad who sat with Bella and Marie at our 10:00AM children's Mass and clapped along with the song you just sang before the Gospel: *Alle, Alle.* Billy was loved by his fire department family, especially those of his fire company the *Myrtle Turtles*. His wife Marie laughed at the memory of how Billy loved gadgets. He had gadgets to boil eggs, slice eggs and to peel eggs. Recently when Marie was preparing a watermelon to serve, Billy said he would like to look for a watermelon slicer. Billy, the driver of the fire truck, liked to add his personally made gadgets to the truck, but I better not mention that with the Fire Commissioner present here since that is against department regulations! Billy was determined to make the first communion party for Bella perfect, and since Bella loved cupcakes, he was going to get a cross made from cupcakes. He ended buying two cakes since he had forgot that he had ordered one already. Recently, Billy put tin foil on a budding robin's nest on his porch to stop their building there. After his death, the robins continue to use the tinfoil as a roof, and Bella and Marie knew Billy was home with God. They had this sign as he laughed with them in eternity. There was an expression used by both his family and his firefighter family: *that's Billy being Billy*.

He loved playing the drums in the band and going on tour with them. I must confess my music taste runs between elevator music and FM Lite, but it was clear from the outpouring of praise and love that Billy and his band *Internal Bleeding* have received that he was a very talented and gifted man. On the Band's Facebook, they wrote: "Our drummer, the heartbeat of the band, died today." The group wrote on its Facebook page, "There are ZERO WORDS to describe the loss. He was a good, decent and honorable man who loved his friends, his family and the people he served. There will never be another like him.

Zero Words to describe the loss brings us back to Bella's question about why did her Daddy have to die. The last time Billy Tolley was in this church was at the 10:00AM Mass on Easter Sunday. He heard proclaimed the heart of the Catholic faith in the Gospel that morning as he sat with his family. As the friends of Jesus go to anoint his dead body, they are asked a question by an angel standing in empty tomb. Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has been raised and goes before you in Galilee. Go and tell his disciples. A few years ago, I was on a tour of the Holy Land and stood in the Church of the Holy Sepulcher. Our tour guide, a Palestinian Catholic, told us: This is the place where Jesus rose from the dead. I know that because my father told me that. He knew that because his father told him...and down through the generations we have passed on by the power of the Holy Spirit this truth: Jesus has been raised from the dead. Today, and at every Mass we announce the message as Jesus told us to: Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again.

Another question remains: why do you look for the living among the dead? Billy's dead body is in the casket, but Billy is not there. Billy's love for his family, his friends, his passions for firefighting and music, his dreams and hopes, his memories, all that made Billy Billy we Catholics call his soul, his spirit. That which made Billy Billy lives. God breathed that soul into Billy forty-two years ago, and that soul is eternal, that soul is with God and will be one day reunited with his body. Billy is more alive today in the kingdom of God than he was as he climbed that ladder in Ridgewood. He is loving Bella and Marie and all of you right now. Jesus told us, I am the Resurrection and the Life, whoever believes in me shall never die. In the famous Gospel passage of John that gives so much hope to Christians, Jesus said, God so loved the world that he gave his only son that whoever believes in him shall not die but have eternal life.

Bella, when you receive Jesus in Holy Communion for the first time this Saturday, tell Jesus you love him and tell Jesus to take the best care of your father. Remember the little book we gave you on Easter Sunday at Mass; The angel said, Don't be scared. Jesus is no longer dead. Look inside and you will see that He is not here. He is risen. Yes, it's true. Just as he said he would die. Bella, I know you're sad, but I also know that your Daddy is alive with Jesus and that your Daddy will always be loving you. My brothers and sisters, why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here. He is risen. Billy Tolley is home with God. I will end with a prayer about remembering Billy:

BURY MY BODY but don't bury my beliefs
BURY MY HEART but don't bury my love
BURY MY EYES but not my vision
BURY MY FEET but not the path of my life
BURY MY HANDS but don't bury my work
BURY MY SHOULDERS but not the concerns I carried
BURY MY VOICE but not my message
BURY MY MIND but don't bury my dreams
BURY ME BUT DON'T BURY MY LIFE. I am with you; I am with Jesus

he death of Firefighter Billy Tolley was a tragedy. As I reflected on this death, my mind went back to the time of September 11th, 2001. A week or so after the terror attack, there was a memorial Mass at that Basilica of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in Brooklyn as there were at churches all over the United States and the world. I was asked to be the homilist for the Mass at the Basilica. The church was filled to overflowing that night and I can still remember firefighters carrying up the bread and wine to the altar in their boots and work clothes since they were on duty if a fire were to be called in. In those dark days, with so much death and pain, the words that I kept hearing in my prayer were, Love is stronger than death. Without being conscious of it, it is a scripture passage from The Song of Songs (Ch. 8:6) and it kept running through my mind: Set me like a seal over your heart, like a seal on your arm. For love is as strong as death, its jealousy as enduring as the grave. Love flashes like fire, the brightest kind of flame.

Set me as a seal upon your heart, as a seal upon your arm, for love is stronger than death, its flashes are flashes of fire, the very flame of the Lord.

- Love is stronger than death was the message that I chose to preach on that hot September evening sixteen years ago. As I reflect on the life and death and promise of resurrection of Firefighter Billy Tolley, that ancient refrain echoes again in my mind and heart. Love is stronger than death.
- I saw the power of love in the bond shared between Marie, Billy's wife and their daughter, Bella. As broken-hearted as Marie was, her love was so focused on comforting Bella. And Bella's was clinging to Mom as her Mom was holding onto her. In being together, they could take small steps forward. Love is stronger than death.
- I saw the power of love in the families of Marie and Billy. Through the days of the wake and funeral, Marie and Bella, as well as Billy's parents and brother, were surrounded by a circle of loving and compassionate support from family and friends. Love is stronger than death.
- I saw the power of love in the New York City Firefighters. Like Marie and Billy's family, they, bearing their own deep sorrow, did everything they could to assist the family and comfort them. The wake and funeral were rites that were carried with great dignity in heart-felt testimony to their fallen brother. Love is stronger than death.
- I saw the power of love in the thousands of firefighters and first responders that came from all the United States and from other countries witnessed to their respect for Billy Tolley. Love is stronger than death.
- I saw the power of love in the people who posted red ribbons, who made signs, who welcomed the firefighters as they showed support and kindness. Many people made donations to help support the education of Bella. Love is stronger than death.
- Bishop John Barres cleared his calendar, and with a Confirmation Mass still to celebrate, came in support of the family of Billy Tolley. Love is stronger than death.
- I saw the power of love in the presence of so many civic officials who came to represent the people of New York City and Long Island. Love is stronger than death.



• I saw the power of love in our parish community. Several members of our parish staff and ministries had very important roles to play in the planning of the liturgy, the music, serving at the Mass, hosting the visiting dignitaries, helping with setting up and preparing spaces for those participating in the funeral, cleaning the church, and many other details. They worked long hours, in addition to their regular duties, in providing a welcoming spirit to all who came to St. Martin's and in support of our parishioners, Marie and Bella. As I parish, you can be most

proud of those who are on staff and those who serve in our various funeral ministries. I know Bella took comfort in seeing two of her religious education teachers at the funeral. Love is stronger than death.

• I saw the power of love at the First Communion service we had on Saturday. Being sensitive to make sure there were enough seats for all the families of the children making their First Holy Communion, several firefighters from Billy's company came into church. When I thanked them for coming at the end of the Mass, the entire church rose and gave them a standing ovation. How wonderful are our parishioners? Love is stronger than death.

MARIJUANA SCORES BADLY IN "ENTIRELY PREDICTABLE" REPORT: Excerpts from CNA/CATHOLIC NEWS AGEN-CY: A recent report shows that traffic deaths, crime, emergency room visits and youth usage of marijuana increased significantly in the first two years following the legalization of recreational pot in the state of Colorado. Released by the Rocky Mountain High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area in September, the report compared marijuana-related statistics from previous years in Colorado to data from 2013 - 2015, the first years after legalization of recreational marijuana. About one in five more youth are now reporting having used marijuana in the past month since its legalization. Marijuana related hospitalizations in the state nearly doubled from 6,305 in 2011 to 11,439 in 2014. The biggest health concern for YOUNG PEOPLE using marijuana is its HARMFUL EFFECT ON THE BRAIN, WHICH CONTINUES its DEVELOPMENT WELL INTO A PERSON'S 20s. The main active ingredient in marijuana, THC, binds to receptors in the brain and can cause a SIGNIFICANT DECREASE IN IQ over time. A 2012 study published in the NATIONAL ACADEMY OF SCIENCES found that ADOLESCENT EXPOSURE TO MARIJUANA can lead to an 8 POINT DROP IN IQ, on par with the drop seen in CHILDREN EXPOSED TO LEAD. Marijuana can also be addictive, with one in six adolescent users developing a dependence over time.

A SECONDARY HEALTH CONCERN is TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS, which make up the leading cause of death in teens - 20 year olds. According to the report, in 2009 marijuana related traffic deaths involving operators testing positive for marijuana represented 10% of all TRAFFIC FATALITIES in Colorado. By 2015, that number doubled to 21% The amount of youth reporting marijuana use after legalization, compared to before, increased by about 20 percent. COLLEGE-AGE Coloradans now rank first in the nation for marijuana use.

Tom Gorman, Director of Rocky Mountain High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area, which released the report, also believes that the negative impact will only increase overtime. "Any time you legalize a substance you're going to have more people using. The more people you have using, the more adverse (effects) you're going to have on society, as well as the individual," he told CNA.

"ALCOHOL IS A PERFECT EXAMPLE OF THAT, BECAUSE SO MANY PEOPLE USE AND ABUSE ALCOHOL. We almost have AS MANY PEOPLE ADDICTED TO ALCOHOL as ALL THE ILLEGAL DRUGS COMBINED. We can expect the same thing from marijuana, although with alcohol you don't necessarily drink to get drunk. With marijuana, you smoke to get high. The report is also a good reference point for OTHER STATES CONSIDERING LEGALIZATION OF MARIJUANA. Until now, there hasn't been enough data available. "If you look at it overall and you look at the trends, which are all negative, whether it's emergency room visits or hospitalization or fatalities or DRUG USE AMONG OUR KIDS, the other states now have some data to make an informed decision. Bishop John Barres has written his first pastoral letter, Miracle of the Sun Fatima - 100 years, to the people of the Diocese of Rockville Centre. It is a deeply spiritual message, based on the message of Our Blessed Mother in her appearances at Fatima, Portugal one hundred years ago, calling us to pray the rosary for world peace and for our families. Copies of the entire document will be available to you; I have put together a few highlights for you. Here they are:

As we celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Our Lady's appearance in Fatima, I ask every Catholic of every age in the Church of Rockville Centre to pray the rosary daily during the month of May 2017 in honor of Our Lady of Fatima and for the promotion of **dramatic missionary growth** on Long Island. As we rediscover or discover the 1917 Miracle of Our Lady's Apparitions in Fatima, it is an historical moment and opportunity to rekindle our devotion to Mary in 2017. Here are some of the key themes of Our Lady of Fatima for us to reflect on together:

From May 13 to October 13 of 1917, the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared in Fatima (Portugal) to three poor shepherd children, Lucia, Francisco and Jacinta. The apparitions were preceded by three apparitions of an angel in the spring of 1916. On each occasion, Our Lady asked them to say the rosary and to offer reparation for the offenses made to her Immaculate Heart. On October 13, 1917, an event that was foretold by Our Lady to the shepherd children occurred before thousands of people so that the world would believe the message of the apparitions. For



about ten minutes, the sun spun in the sky like a wheel of fire. This moment witnessed by thousands is often referred to as "the Miracle of the Sun." Our Lady of Fatima asked for the world to be consecrated to her Immaculate Heart.

The rosary is a contemplative and biblical prayer. Praying the rosary deeply has a profound impact on every dimension of our prayer life and every effort we make to share the gift of our Catholic faith. The 100th Anniversary of Fatima is an opportunity for every Catholic of every age and vocation to rediscover the power of the rosary and to pray it with deeper fervor, strength and concentration. In this fallen world, violence, war and persecution often dominate the global stage and our hope can easily erode. But Our Lady of Fatima asks us to understand and believe that the world can be better and that her intercession and our prayers, and the power of the rosary can help turn historical tides of turmoil to peace. She asks us to pray for peace in the world and for those who are persecuted for their faith. She asks us to pray for peace in our hearts and peace in our families knowing that peace within families is critical to the architecture of global peace.



n the Eucharistic Chapel, we have placed a small bookshelf with several prayers books that have a focus on visits to the Blessed Sacrament. One can pray just sitting silently in front of the tabernacle, speaking and listening to Jesus in the Real Presence. Still, I know some of us find a prayer book or book with spiritual reflections, helpful in assisting us to pray.
