Pastor's Letter

Father Pat made this announcement at the 7:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday, May 20th.

After a significant amount of reflection and consultation, I have decided, as of January 1, 2018, to eliminate the 7:00 p.m. evening Mass on Saturday. I have spoken at length to the parish pastoral council, the parish staff and at a parish assembly. As early as 2012, in the document that I prepared entitled *Discerning the Future*, the question of our Mass schedule was raised. I know this decision will disappoint many of you who attend the 7:00 p.m. Mass on Saturday, and I regret that and any inconvenience that might occur for you from this decision. I have come to know that many parishioners have their favorite Mass to attend, and it is hard to ask you to accept this change.

However, I have been convinced for several years that our parish does not need eight Sunday Masses. (two on Saturday evening and six on Sunday). I wish we had the need for even more Masses but this is not the case. Attendance at Masses, with some very few exceptions, has been in decline in the United States for many years. There are numerous studies done on this and many factors would enter the discussion of this reality. We have had many such discussions on this topic at various meetings in our parish. Over the years, I have observed that none of our eight Masses are completely full. The 5:00 p.m. on Saturday and the 10:00 a.m. on Sunday are close to being full. The 7:00 a.m. on Sunday is rather consistent in its attendance as is the 11:30 a.m. on Sundays. They are rather well attended liturgies. I have found attendance at the 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, the 8:30 a.m., the 1:00 p.m., and the 5:30 p.m. on Sunday are rarely well-attended and at other times, the church is more than half empty.

I considered eliminating two weekend Masses and making some changes in the Mass schedules. However, I thought it best to start in a careful way that would do the least amount to upset the life of the parish.

Why cut back on weekend Masses? We have enough priests here at St. Martin's. This is a very fair question to ask. In full disclosure, I have been informed by my Redemptorist superiors that we will be getting another Redemptorist priest here in September. So, there will be four men on our staff. (this can often change as you know) This makes any questions about changing Masses schedule even more confusing to some parishioners. I understand that. The reasons I am acting now is that, with the desire of many parishioners that I open the Mass books soon, I had to have this decision in place. Unless there are some very unusual circumstances, once we being to accept Mass intentions for the year 2018, there can be no revision of our Mass schedule until January of 2019. A commitment to say an intention Mass is one that is taken very seriously.

Here are the key reasons I believe this is the time to adjust the Mass schedule:

- I have two years left here at St. Martin's as your pastor. Although I would be happy to leave everything as it is, I do not think that is fair to the next pastor and to the parishioners. As we look at the future, it seems very clear that there will be less priests available in the not too distant future.
- I also believe that liturgy, the Mass, is a richer experience, when more people are present in the community. Attending Mass is both a personal and communal act of the worship of God.

Thirdly, it is the mind of the Church that a priest should not celebrate too many Masses in a day. Although many priests say two and three Masses on a Sunday, (and sometimes on weekdays with funerals and weddings) this is only done with the permission of the local bishop. This has nothing to do about making the priest do too much. It is a concern that saying three and four Masses on a Sunday may impact the spirituality of the priest and move him from truly praying to going through the motions of celebrating the Eucharist.

Ince I have been here at St. Martin's, I have found our priests to be very generous with their time and talents. I have never heard any confrere complain about having to say too many Masses. I believe our priests take joy in celebrating the Eucharist with you. I would never dare to say we priests are overworked since I believe you have very challenging and difficult work schedules as well as other responsibilities. Although I consulted with the other priests, this was my decision. I considered doing surveys and more discussions, but I became convinced that such discussions would not be fruitful and might even cause hurt and division in our parish. That is the least thing I would want. The clear majority of us would find it difficult to let go of the Mass we most like to attend.

I have found that each of our eight Sunday Masses has its own flavor and style. Each Eucharist was prayerful. My decision to discontinue to the 7:00 p.m. was in no way a decision based on how well the congregation participated, how well they supported the parish, or any factors rather than three reasons I gave above. The spiritual needs of every parishioner are important to me.

I would be happy to speak personally with anyone about this decision. Change can be difficult for many people, including myself. There is enormous life and energy here at St. Martin's and I continue to be amazed at how many lives are touched by the ministries of this parish. The Eucharist is at the heart of the Church and our parish. The Eucharist leads us to feed the poor in our parish outreach center and to the service of the St. Vincent de Paul Society, to the education of 1,200 children in religious education, to welcoming new members in our parish through our baptisms and RCIA programs, to bringing Holy Communion to the sick, to marrying couples, to lifting the burden of sins from people, and to offering comfort to those who are mourning the loss of loved ones.

I hope you do not see the changing of our Mass schedule as a lack of life in our parish. St. Martin's is a vibrant faith community.



Father Pat's Homily - Sunday May 21, 2017

The Redemptorist seminary I attended many years ago was located on beautiful land overlooking the Hudson River near Kingston, New York in a little hamlet called Esopus. It was there that I was ordained to the priesthood. The property was quite expansive and we owned four or five horses that had once worked as police horses in New York City. I was never much for riding the horses since they seemed to prefer less well-built men than myself. However, I was assigned to care for them on the horse crew. So every day I had to go the barn, clean their stalls, feed them and wash them. These horses were quite placid, but they were quite intelligent. They could sense my anxiety as I cared for them so they occasionally played with me by brushing into me and making loud sounds. After a few weeks of this work, I suddenly found myself having an attack of what turned out to be a form of asthma. For several hours I was short of breath. It frightened me so much that I went to the emergency room, was given an injection, and told that it was probably due to working with hay and horses. I have never had another attack as I retired from my horse work. Naturally, my loving classmates chose to say that I was more allergic to work than horses. I will let you be the judge of that!

Still, being short of breath is a serious and frightening medical concern. It is often the sign of heart or lung issues. It is very painful to see a person struggling to breathe and gasp for air. We cannot live without breathing. When I teach children about God and prayer, I tell them to pay attention to their breathing and to notice that they are drawing breath in and out. At first, they exaggerate this and make all sorts of sounds but then they slowly settle down and a calm takes over. I explain to them that God is as close to them as their breath. If they pay attention to their breathing, they can sense the presence of God and how he is always with us.

In the creation story of the world from the Book of Genesis, we hear: In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth; The earth was formless and void, and darkness was over the surface of the world, and the Spirit of God was moving over the surface of the world. Over the vast emptiness of the unformed universe was the hovering Spirit of God. Listen to how the inspired writer of Genesis describes the creation of human beings: And the Lord God formed humanity from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living soul. Human beings are from the earth but the living breath that we call the soul is from God. We are wonderfully, fearfully made. The word spirit comes from the Latin word spiritus. Spiritus means breath, courage, spirit or soul. We speak of the Bible as being the inspired word of God: the word inspire means to breathe into. To say the Bible is inspired means God breathed himself into the human language.

Spirit is an elusive term just as is breath. I am sure a biology major or a doctor could give a very clear and scientific explanation of what is breath. But most of us take our breathing for granted, and rarely notice it unless there is a medical problem. We keep moving about with the thousand things we must do. Occasionally, we may notice we are short of breath as we rush for a train or go up a hill, but like much of our biological functions, it is just there and doing its job in keeping us alive.

So, I suppose it is not surprising that we tend to think of the Holy Spirit in similar ways. We know that the Holy Spirit is the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity. God is Three Persons in one God. In our prayers and language, we often talk about God. God saved me. I could not have made it through that terrible ordeal without the love of God. God is good. Thank God. O my God are phrases that we are quick to say, sometimes in prayer and other times in worry or concern.

When we say such words, I know I am not thinking in clear theological categories. Am I speaking about the Trinity or God the Father, the Son, or the Holy Spirit when I use the word God? We have a sense in our minds of God the Father. We all have had fathers so we have a good sense of the word. We have seen movies with both serious and humorous images of God the Father. I think of Michelangelo's famous painting in the Sistine Chapel with the hand of the Father reaching out to the hand of Adam and bringing him to life. We kind of think we know God the Father.

Certainly, Jesus is the most familiar person of the Blessed Trinity to us. We hear the Gospels about Jesus at every Mass. Jesus took flesh and became human and did the very human things that we do: we eat, we sleep, we talk, we have friends and people we love, we cry and we get afraid. Jesus did all those things. Jesus did that which is most human of all – he died. I think if I asked every one of you in church today to describe Jesus to me, you would have some image that would come to mind. Jesus makes God touchable for us. He told us: *The one who sees Me, sees the Father*.

But now on to that elusive Holy Spirit - the breath of God. Perhaps, we could feature the Holy Spirit on

John Walsh's television show *America's Most Wanted*. We use a color to describe the Holy Spirit: red. We use the image of tongues of fire to help us envision the Spirit. We focus on the Sacrament of Confirmation to capture the mystery of the Holy Spirit. We call the Holy Spirit the Advocate and Counselor, the Paraclete. When I was in school we prayed to the Holy Spirit before a test or an exam. The job description for the Holy Spirit seemed to be to show up for Confirmations. I think of the story of parents who had three children. The first child has a photo album filled with thousands of pictures of almost every moment of his or her life. The



second child has a photo album, but it has no pictures in it. The third child does not even have a photo album. I think we sometimes think of the Holy Spirit as the forgotten person of the Blessed Trinity.

This coming week is the feast of the Ascension and soon we will celebrate the Great Feast of Pentecost. Today, in our Gospel reading, Jesus makes a promise to us: I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you always, the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot accept, because it neither sees nor knows him. But you know him, because he remains with you, and will be in you.

You and I live in the time of the Holy Spirit. Jesus has asked the Father and he has sent to us the Holy Spirit. Simply put, the Holy Spirit is the very real presence of God on earth. Whatever faith we have, whatever love is in our hearts, whenever we try to love God, all this grace comes from the gentle and not so gentle nudges of the Holy Spirit. We live and move and have our being in the presence of God. You want to know how close the Spirit of God is to you? Notice your breathing. Feel your breath. That is the living presence of God in you and me. Come Holy Spirit, Come!
