Pastor's Letter

For the past several years, I have mentioned that my favorite television show is *Blue Bloods*. It stars Tom Selleck as the New York City Police Commissioner, with his father being the retired commission-




er, two of his sons on the police force, and a daughter who is an assistant prosecutor for the City of New York. They are Irish Catholic and live in Brooklyn - so what's not to like! However, last year I started to follow a television show called *This is Us* that rivals *Blue Bloods*. It is very hard to describe the show since it takes place in both the present and in the past with hints of the future, and the characters are spread all over the nation. The similarity that it has to *Blue Bloods* is that it is a show about how a family interacts with one another, and how the members of a family affect one another in very profound ways.

Well, with all this talk of the Irish and Brooklyn, St. Alphonsus Liguori grew up in a little town named Marienalla, just outside of Naples, Italy.

He was born September 27, 1696, the oldest of eight children. His family was relatively well-off financially, with his father being a naval sea captain and his mother was a very devout Catholic woman. His father wanted Alphonsus, as the oldest son, to follow him in his profession, but Alphonsus wanted to be a priest. They argued about this very much and Alphonsus reluctantly became a lawyer as a compromise. He was a brilliant student and had degrees in both church and civil law before he turned twenty. He became one of the most famous lawyers in Naples. Still, he was very committed

to his Catholic faith and worked among the poor in hospitals and even prayed with people on death row.

Then came a major turning point. After never losing a case, he had his first loss and was humiliated. It seems that the judge had been bribed in this case. It is said that he locked himself in his room and wept for three days. This becomes a key turning point in the life of Alphonsus. His words tell of his transformation: O world, I know you now. He leaves his gentleman's sword at the statue of the Blessed Mother and commits his life to the Virgin Mary and begins to study for the priesthood.



Skip to the future now. A young boy is growing up in Brooklyn in the 1950's. His parents are Irish immigrants. The boy loves playing ball in the streets of Brooklyn and it is said he could hit two sewers on a windy day. He goes to Church, but is not more religious than any other of his friends. The parish where he lives is staffed by Redemptorists and the parish is the center of the neighborhood. The boy's best friend decides to go the high school seminary. So, our young man follows him to the seminary, not to be a priest as much as to be with his friends and continue his love of all sports.

Back in the 17th century, Alphonsus is ordained and a becomes a renowned preacher. He is giving retreats and missions all over Naples and is in demand everywhere. Alphonsus is on fire with love for God, and works himself to the point of exhaustion. His doctor tells him he must take a rest and go on a vacation.

In the 20th century, the young Brooklyn boy is doing well in the seminary. After a severe bout of homesickness and some struggle with algebra, he takes to the seminary routine. From a family of three with two sisters, he loves having many friends and companions. He begins to learn how to pray a little bit in front of the Blessed Mother picture. The idea of being a Redemptorist priest is taking hold in his heart.

While on his recuperation and rest period in the mountains off the Amalfi Coast, Alphonsus encounters many poor goat herders. They have no priest to serve them since most of the priests want to stay in the big city of Naples. These people are abandoned and have no one to tell them about Jesus. Alphonsus now has another turning point in his life. God is calling him to serve these people who are on the edge of society. So moved by the Holy Spirit, Alphonsus begins a Congregation of priests and brothers to preach to good news to those who do not have the opportunity to hear it. It is named the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, but is popularly called the Redemptorists.

The years in the seminary move fast for our friend from Brooklyn. His best friend - the reason why the young man entered the seminary - is dismissed for making illegal wine. Yet the young man stays on. He is beginning to see himself as a priest. He likes his teachers who are almost all Redemptorists. He begins to truly pray. Something amazing happens to him as young man of 18 - he falls in love with Jesus Christ and his heart is captured.

Alphonsus' new congregation gets off to a shaky start but soon takes root. Over the years since the first days on the Amalfi Coast, candidates are pouring into the order and the poor are hearing the Gospel preached. As Alphonsus grows older, he is happy to hear that the Congregation has spread to other parts of Europe.



The young man in America grows to love his Congregation and its founder Alphonsus. He learns there are more than 5,000 Redemptorists all over the world, following the footsteps of this great saint who wrote 111 books. Alphonsus was a skilled musician and painter, a Bishop of the Church, but most especially a lover of the poor.

Our young priest's first assignment is to teach in a seminary, the same one where he began his own journey to the priesthood. He learns that his order has decided to take a parish, St. Martin of Tours in Long Island in a town called Bethpage. The

Provincial at the time explains that Long Island has a great many Catholics and not enough priests to serve them.

St. Alphonsus died on August 1, 1787. Among his best-known works are *The Glories of Mary* and *The Way of the Cross*, the latter still used in parishes during Lenten devotions. He was canonized in 1839 by Pope Gregory XVI and proclaimed a Doctor of the Church by Pope Pius IX in 1871. One of the most widely read Catholic authors, he is the patron saint of confessors. St. Alphonsus, who himself suffered from scruples, is know for his kindness in the confessional.

Today at St. Martin of Tours Church in Bethpage, a son of Alphonsus is telling you about his spiritual father. This concludes our story of *This Is Us* - The Redemptorists.







RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS: KILLING THE PAIN NOT THE PATIENT: PALLIATIVE CARE VS. ASSISTED SUICIDE by Richard M. Doerflinger and Carlos F. Gomez, M.D. Ph.D.

Some time ago an ad appeared in a medical journal promoting a NEW PAIN-KILLING DRUG. To emphasize that this new product relieved pain without sleepiness or other side-effects, the ad began with a slogan: "STOP THE PAIN - NOT THE PATIENT." The outcome of our society's debate on PHYSICIAN - ASSISTED SUICIDE may depend on HOW WELL WE COMMUNICATE - and ACT UPON - a similar message. We are living at a time when SOME LAWMAKERS and DOCTORS think that the best solution FOR SOME PATIENTS' SUFFERING is to give them LETHAL DRUGS FOR SUICIDE. CATHOLICS COMMITTED TO THE DIGNITY OF EACH HUMAN PERSON MUST INSIST: "KILL THE PAIN. NOT THE PATIENT."

It is a compelling message. Some opinion polls show support for assisted suicide when it is presented as the only relief for a dying patient in unbearable pain. But when Americans are offered an ALTERNATIVE, they overwhelmingly say that society SHOULD CONCENTRATE ON ENSURING PAIN CONTROL AND COMPASSIONATE CARE for such patients - not on HELPING THEM TAKE THEIR LIVES. The PREFERENCE IS EVEN STRONGER AMONG DYING PATIENTS THEMSELVES. "Patients with pain do not seem to view EUTHANASIA OR PHYSICIAN-ASSISTED SUICIDE as the appropriate response to poor pain management," wrote Dr. Ezekiel Emanuel, a director of the study. A.2383 Paulin/S.3151 Savino IN RELATION TO LEGALIZING PHYSICIAN-ASSISTED SUICIDE

The above referenced bill would add a new section of the PUBLIC HEALTH LAW to allow PHYSICIANS TO PRESCRIBE LETHAL DOSES OF MEDICATION FOR THE EXPRESSED PURPOSE OF ENDING A PATIENT'S LIFE. LEGALIZING PHYSICIAN ASSISTED SUICIDE WOULD: Blur longstanding medical, moral and legal distinctions between WITHDRAWING EXTRAORDINARY MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AND TAKING ACTIVE STEPS TO DESTROY HUMAN LIFE. UNDERMINE THE PHYSICIAN'S ROLE AS HEALER, forever alter the DOCTOR-PATIENT relationship, and lessen the quality of care provided to patients at the end of life.

This legislation DOES NOT require SCREENING, TESTING, OR TREATMENT for CLINICAL DEPRESSION. It requires a physician to falsify the death certificate to list the underlying illness as the cause of death. It similarly encourages insurance fraud by allowing beneficiaries to collect benefits following a suicide. It allows non-NYS residents to access Physician-assisted suicide: and it contains ABSOLUTELY NO SAFEGUARDS AGAINST COERCION or ABUSE ONCE the LETHAL DRUGS ARE IN THE PATIENT'S POSSESSION. RATHER THAN ASSISTING SUICIDE, GOVERNMENT SHOULD BE CONSISTENT IN ITS EFFORTS TO PREVENT SUICIDE.

We urge the state to remove barriers and improve access to palliative care and hospice care for those in the final stages of terminal illness. Improved education and training of physicians in pain management, together with appropriate diagnosis and TREATMENT FOR DEPRESSION, WOULD GO A LONG WAY TOWARD ELIMINATING CALLS FOR SUICIDE AMONG THE SICK AND THE DYING.
