For the past several weeks, I have been addressing the issue of parish stewardship in the bulletin. I have been seeking to inform you of how we spend the hard-earned money you donate to the parish. Last week I wrote about the clergy salaries. In addition to those salaries, we of course have a number employees here at St. Martin's. Our staff includes 24 employees, both full and part time. The payroll budget in 2017 was \$607,900.00. This figure includes benefits for our full time employees and all payroll taxes.

Our parish seeks to pay a fair and just salary to those who work at St. Martin's. However, I often say that no one gets rich working in a Catholic parish. We find it hard to even give cost-of-living increases on any kind of regular basis. For a parish our size, with 4,000 families on the books and five buildings, I would say that our staff is rather small. I would love to have another person or two assist us in our mission, but we cannot afford that.

I find the employees here at St. Martin's to be very dedicated and committed to the parishioners and the mission of our parish. They are very generous with their time, and often go above and beyond their job descriptions.

I often think they see their work more as a kind of sharing in a mission rather than just a job. Our staff sets an excellent tone for a Catholic parish, and I am proud to be serving with them.

Pastor's Letter

Is suppose I am despondent because the New York Yankees are contenders for the World Series and the New York Mets are finished for the year. I was thinking about the 1969 Mets. I like that memory since I am nineteen years old in that image. As you might recall, the New York Mets were perhaps the worst baseball team for many years since their beginning in 1962. They set records for losing the most games. Then, in this amazing year of 1969, they went from ninth place to winning the World Series in five games. New York City was so happy and shocked that they reelected John Lindsey even though he had been very unpopular. This Mets team has often been referred to as *The Miracle Mets*. We have an even more shocking sport upset story in 1980, when a bunch of American kids beat the great Russian hockey team in the Olympics at Lake Placid. The Russian team had been almost unbeatable for years and had even beaten the professional National Hockey League all-stars in a series of matches. No one gave the young Americans a chance and they pulled what many consider the greatest sports upset in history, beating the Russians in 4-3. Experts have said that if this game was played a thousand times, the Russians would win nine hundred and ninety-nine times. In the last seconds of the game, Al Michaels, the announcer on the network shouted, *do you believe in miracles*? And as the clock struck zero, he screamed, *Yes!*

Do you believe in miracles? I would describe a miracle as something well beyond the ordinary happening without any logical or scientific explanation. I would also say that such miracles are quite rare, and one must be cautious in describing something as a miracle that can only be explained by the power of God. The Catholic Church has been very slow to declare something as a miraculous happening brought about by the grace of Almighty God. I do not think the church would declare the Mets or the USA hockey team overcoming great odds to win a sporting event a miracle, but the language of the miraculous is often used somewhat casually. When a person who is always late, arrives five minutes early, we joke that it is "a miracle!" When a student struggling in calculus gets an A, he or she might say it was a miracle.

Yet I think there are some, what I might call *ordinary miracles*, that are often overlooked. When I look at a newborn baby, and I see those tiny little fingernails, I see a miracle. I know biology can explain it all, but for me, it is a miracle. How did someone figure out how to make coffee from coffee beans? Can anyone deny that chocolate and pizza are miraculous foods that could only come from the Divine? Young couples often marvel at the seemingly many coincidences that brought them together at just the right times in their lives. A couple married 50 or 60 years will talk about the many little miracles that kept them together and in love for so many years. Occasionally, I have found myself in what I thought was the wrong place at the wrong time, only to find it was the right place at the right time since a person needed a priest at just the moment that I happened to have wandered in. People could argue such moments are coincidences, but I am not too sure of that.

This past Friday, the world marked what has been declared as the anniversary of *The Miracle of the Sun* in a little town in Portugal named Fatima on October 13,1917. You are probably familiar with the story. Three children - a brother name Francisco and his sister Jacinta and their cousin Lucia - were rather typical children who loved to play, to sing, and to dance. They were in charge of taking care of their sheep. As they are in the fields, they began over the course of many months to have experiences of seeing and hearing the Blessed Mother speak to them. They are resolved to tell no one but one of them finds it impossible not to tell her family.



ucia's mother is very angry at her daughter and tells her to stop making up stories. Eventually, the parish priest tells the children that this might be the work of the devil. At one point, the local government that is very anti-religious, put the children in jail. But nothing will shake their confidence. Crowds begin to follow the children when they go to the place where they experience the presence of the Blessed Mother on the 13th of each

month. The little ones asked the Blessed Mother to show the people a sign so that they will believe and stop saying that they are liars. The Blessed Mother promises a sign for October 13, 1917. More than 70,000 people gathered at this very rural place on that day. The newspaper reporters are there as are the government officials ready to mock the people and condemn the children.

The most anti-religious newspaper, *Il Seculo*, wrote this about that day: *People then began to ask each other what they had seen. The great majority admitted to having seen the trembling and the dancing of the sun; others affirmed that they saw the face of the Blessed Virgin; others, again, swore that the sun whirled on itself like a giant wheel and that it lowered itself to the earth as if to burn it in its rays. Some said they saw it change colors successively. You can google Fatima: The Miracle of the Sun for more information.*

The miracle of Fatima happened at a very difficult moment of history. World War I, the truly first modern war where man's ability to kill was becoming more proficient. Atheistic communism was taking over Russia. The message given by our Lady was right from the Gospels and the words of her Son Jesus: *Turn away from sin and evil. People are risking eternal damnation. Give your hearts to God and follow his ways.* There was nothing new in the message of Fatima. We hear it every week at Mass in the Gospels. Yet, like our Gospel today speaks about being invited to a wedding, Mary is giving the world a special invitation to follow her Son Jesus, a message that sometimes the world seems to forget.

I think we would agree that our world today is in as much danger today as in 1917. We live with daily threats of terrorism and fear the nuclear weapons in the hands of North Korea. Thanks be to God, much of communism has fallen, as Mary predicted it would if we prayed for this as we did for so many years after Masses. Jesus is always inviting, as he does today in the Gospel, to turn to him, to follow him, and to give our hearts to him. Mary, his Mother is always blessing us. Today, we are in the presence of another miracle, that of the Holy Eucharist, bread and wine transformed into his Body and Blood. The answer to Al Michael's question is, I do believe in miracles.



The hurricane relief collection taken last week was very generous on the part of our parishioners, especially considering your previous generous donations to a hurricane collection that was taken several weeks ago that focused on Houston. This week's second collection was \$8,523.00. So, half of that collection will go the Rockville Centre Diocese to assist the suffering people of Puerto Rico, the US Virgin Islands, and those impacted by the

earthquake in Mexico.

As I explained in the bulletin, I had received permission from the diocese to give half of this collection to the Redemptorist relief efforts to assist the battered people of the small island of Dominica, which is an independent nation. Fr. Pat's Homily of October 15, 2017

atholics seem to have a saint for every occasion. As a New York Jet fan, I often pray to St. Jude because he is the patron of hopeless causes. Poor St. Anthony spends his eternity running heaven's lost and found department. He is constantly called on to find lost rings, glasses, money, and even cars in mall parking lots. For many years, some women have been saying this prayer: *St. Anne, find me a man as fast as you can!* I am not sure if there is a saint to help you get rid of a boyfriend that you don't like. I think about St. Joseph, the husband of the Blessed Mother and the man who raised Jesus, spending his lifetime on earth being buried upside down so a house can be sold. Although many smile at these traditions, I know I am a big St. Anthony fan since I tend to lose my reading glasses even when I am wearing them.

There are people of other faiths, and even many Catholics who wonder what such practices are about. Might we be using the saints in a rather superstitious way, such as holding a horseshoe or rabbit's foot as a good luck charm? I recall a man I met not too long ago who had a form of brain cancer. When I met him, he told me he had been cured from his cancer and was so very grateful to God. I asked him which saint he prayed to, and I will never forget his response: I prayed to the Man Himself! He was, of course, referring to Jesus Christ.

His theology was correct. As much as I love the saints of the Church, they do not heal us of disease, free us of worry, or help us face life difficulties. All grace and power on heaven and earth come from God. God is the source of all healing and grace. I think of the greatest saint of all, Mary the Mother of Jesus, who at the wedding feast of Cana when the wine was running low, went to her Son Jesus and told him about the embarrassment the newly married couple would soon face. She then directed the servants with these words: *Do whatever he says*.

Still I pray to the saints and invite others to do so if they find it comforting. The Catholic Church has certainly encouraged this practice and the names of saints are often in included in our official prayers at Mass. I think God gives us the saints because it is all but impossible to grasp an image of God. Even though God took flesh in Jesus and showed us the face of God in his humanity, we as humans naturally struggle with the idea of the Divine, a God who has always been and always will be. A God who created the heavens and earth and all that is, including ourselves, out of nothing, is not easy to grasp. How do you get your hands around the Divine?

So for many of us, we see the love of God and his care and compassion for each one of us reflected in the very human people of flesh and blood - the saints. We know any prayer raised to a saint is also raised to God at the same time. The saints help us to understand and grasp that God cares about all our needs and concerns and He invites us to bring our prayers to Him through the saints. They are our friends and family in heaven, along with our loved ones. Like the crowd that gathers on the streets for the New York City Marathon, they are cheering us on to God.

o with a background of the saints, we go on to St. Gerard Majella. Gerard was born in a little village named Muro Lucano in the Naples area of Italy in 1726. He was a very prayerful young man, and although rather sickly, he managed to enter the Redemptorist Congregation as a Brother. He died in 1755. Although he lived less than thirty years, he was a remarkable man who people saw as very close to God. He often said that his only goal in life was to do the will of God.

He is associated with pregnancy by several stories. Here are two of the stories that occurred during the lifetime of Gerard that have led to his being The Mother's Saint - His miraculous apostolate for mothers began during his lifetime. Once as he was leaving the home of his friends, the Pirofalo family, one of the daughters called after him that he had forgotten his handkerchief. In a moment of prophetic insight, Gerard said, "*Keep it. It will be useful to you some day.*" The handkerchief was treasured as a precious souvenir of Gerard.

Years later, the girl to whom he had given it was in danger of death in childbirth. She remembered the words of Gerard and called for the handkerchief. Almost immediately, the danger passed and she delivered a healthy child. On another occasion, the prayers of Gerard were asked by a mother when both she and her unborn child were in danger. Both she and the child came through the ordeal safely. After his death, the mothers of Italy took Gerard to their hearts and made him their patron. St. Gerard has become popular all over the world as the saint to pray to become pregnant and for a safe delivery as well as to adopt a baby.

St. Gerard has a special role in my family. In 1938, when my mother was pregnant with her first child, she was very nervous about the pregnancy and birth. She asked a priest, who happened to be a Redemptorist, to pray for her. He told her to pray to St. Gerard. The baby was born on October 16, the feast of St. Gerard, and in gratitude to St. Gerard, my Mom and Dad named my sister Geraldine. Years later, when my niece was pregnant with her third child, it was a difficult pregnancy and she almost lost the baby several times. My sister stormed heaven with prayers to St. Gerard. Gratefully, Brendan Gerard was born and is blessed with a wonderful godfather named Father Pat. When my niece was first seeking to become pregnant after five years or so of marriage, her husband told me they wanted to become pregnant. He asked if I could help. I told him I was Irish and knew nothing about these matters. I blessed them with my relic of St. Gerard, and after their third child, they told me to put the medal away.

Those of you who are here today to pray to St. Gerard for pregnancy, adoption, or a safe delivery are wonderful people who want to bring life into our world or to nurture a child. God sees the goodness in your heart. You come in faith. I know for some of you there may be discouragement at the challenge of not becoming pregnant. Those who wish to have children and struggle to do so carry a burden and sorrow. We pray for and with you today. I hope your prayer is heard.

But I pray that whether you become pregnant or adopt that you never doubt the great love that God has for you and know that there are so many ways you can bring the love of God into the world. You are all the beloved children of God. Amen.
