Pastor's Letter

FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY

I always feel a special connection between the Feast of the Holy Family and our parish here at St.



Martin's Parish. It is very clear how important family life is to you. Our parish does have a family sense where one can feel very much at home. However, my sense of connection goes back almost thirty-five years ago. I was a young priest, teaching at our High School Seminary. Since the students went home for Christmas break, we teachers were free for two weeks, one of the well-earned perks of being a teacher. Since St. Martin was then, as it is now, a very busy parish, and the priests here were eager to take a few days with their families, Father George Keaveney, CSSR would invite me to come to the parish from my family home in Brooklyn to say some Masses between Christmas and New Year's. I believe that the first time I ever came to St. Martin's was on the Feast of the Holy Family, which is the Sunday that falls between Christmas and New Year's. My family liked to come with me, not so much because they were

eager to hear me preach, but because my mother always thought of Long Island as the country. As a girl raised in the country hills of Clare, Ireland, she loved to go for drives on Long Island. Obviously, even then, Bethpage was not a rural setting, but they insisted on coming. So, my mother, Dad, sister, and her three little kids, who now have children of their own, would pile into whatever car I was driving at the time and head for St. Martin's.

At that time, most of our Redemptorist rectories were very private. Lay people were not invited into our dining room or living room unless there was some very special occasion. Gratefully, that has changed today. However, when we came to the rectory my family was immediately invited in for breakfast. Amy Dane cooked a lovely breakfast and was so very welcoming to my family. She continues to exhibit that beautiful spirit of hospitality. Since I was saying two Masses, my family would relax and enjoy the breakfast in the rectory. Whatever priests, deacon or staff member happened by, they were very gracious to the visitors from Brooklyn.

After celebrating my assigned Masses, Mom always wanted to go to Zorn's in search of the perfect chicken. The kids would go to the animal farm that was on the grounds and delighted in the turkeys and geese. We would often buy some food and have a kind of picnic in and around the car. Perhaps, we were inventing tailgating! The weather always seemed to be good and the day was something that our family enjoyed. Of course, with six people in the car, including three little ones, there were some fights and arguments about windows and seats and who hit whom. I was anxious to get home and watch the Jets while my mother was mentioning a side trip to Montauk which I gently informed her that it was about three hours away. We sometimes compromised on Riverhead because my family had once summered there many years ago.

I like this memory. I think that message I preached on the Feast of the Holy Family then is pretty much the same as the one I preach now. Family life is the place of the greatest joy and happiness in our lives. Yet, family can break our hearts and leave us wounded for life. We do not choose our families. I certainly believe that there are no perfect families. Looking for perfection in others will only cause others frustration and ourselves disappointment. Family life does not come naturally. A person must work to be a good member of a family. I am convinced there is no more essential quality for family life than the ability to forgive and let go of past hurts. I, as I am sure is true for you, have encountered many families who have fallen into anger and disappointment. I often find that families do like to sit and remember the past as I did in the article. We hold those memories precious. However, I wonder if when they are happening if we do not realize how special that time is. Every day can be a day of making good memories.

I have always admired the spirituality of Alcoholics Anonymous. I am happy that our parish hosts several programs of AA. Most of us know that great wisdom of the serenity prayer. It is prayer with such wisdom. I believe it is a prayer that is truly in line with the Gospel of Jesus. I am convinced its guidance could be a powerful way to enhance our own family life. Here is the prayer in its entirety.

The Complete Serenity Prayer!

God, Grant me the Serenity to accept the things I cannot change, the Courage to change the things I can and the Wisdom to know the difference.

Living one day at a time;
enjoying one moment at a time;
Accepting hardship as the pathway to peace.

Taking, as He did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it.

Trusting that He will make all things right if I surrender to His Will;
That I may be reasonably happy in this life,
and supremely happy with Him forever in the next. Amen.



A New Year's Prayer

God, thank you for a new year. May everyone in our family be willing to begin anew with a clean slate. We know that you are always ready to forgive us. Help us to be willing to forgive ourselves and to forgive one another.

As we begin a new year, remind us of our truest values and our deepest desires. Help us to live in the goodness that comes from doing what you want us to do. Help us to put aside anxiety about the future and the past, so that we might live in peace with you now, one day at a time.

hen did you hear your first Christmas song during the last weeks? I know some radio stations begin playing Christmas music wall to wall around Thanksgiving Day. When did you hear first: the ringing of a Salvation Army worker or a song on the radio? I know there are some people who quickly get tired of the endless Christmas songs they hear in the malls as they shop, but I love Christmas music. I suppose that is because I love Christmas. What does surprise me a bit that is after



today, December 25th, you may not hear another carol until next year. This bothers me a bit because Christmas is not just one day, but it a season that extends until the feast of the Epiphany, or as some call it, little Christmas. The Christmas carol, *The Twelve Days of Christmas*, reminds us that celebrating the birth of Christ is not just a one-day event. God did not bless me with much of a singing voice, but I can belt out *Five Golden Rings*.

I Googled the five most popular songs, and this is what I came up. I am sure there would be many debates about this since most of these lists are rather casually drawn up. They are in this order: *The Christmas Song* by Nat King Cole, *White Christmas* by Bing Crosby, *Happy Xmas* by John Lennon, *Rocking Around the Christmas Tree* by Brenda Lee, and *Santa Claus Is Coming To Town by* Bruce Springsteen and Bon Jovi. Who wouldn't like the beautiful voice of Nat King Cole even though I do not have much of a taste for chestnuts, roasted or not. I like Bing Crosby but I am not big on *White Christmas* since we would lose much of our congregation, and dare I say as a pastor, much of our collection! *Rocking Around the Christmas Tree* is a fun song for a party. Although I wish John Lennon would have used the word *Christmas* rather than *XMass*, I do appreciate his desire for a world at peace and an end to war as all of us do. I like Bruce Springsteen's music as Santa Claus is a good friend of mine. Some dare to say that we are similar in size. I am glad that *Grandma Got Run Over by a Reindeer* did not make the top five Christmas songs. Perhaps, you noticed that of the five songs listed, none of them are hymns or carols. You have to Google "Christmas hymns" in order to get those top 5 that many of us love very much.

Rather than list the five most popular Christmas carols from Google, I will mention five that I like very much. This is not easy for me since there is not a Christmas hymn that I do not enjoy hearing. The first Christmas hymn ever sung was by choirs of angels who sang *Glory to God in the Highest*. The hymn, *O Come All Ye Faithful* captures this wondrous moment.

The angels speak to us:

O come, all ye faithful, joyful and triumphant, come ye, O come ye, to Bethlehem. Come and behold Him, born the King of angels; O come, let us adore Him, O come, let us adore Him, Christ the Lord.

To adore God - to fall on our knees before the Infant - is to recognize the fundamental truth that we are not God; we are creatures. God is Lord of heaven and earth and reveals himself in his Son Jesus. At this Mass, and at every Mass that you attend, you are adoring God and praising him for all that he has given us. The world you and I live in says that **we** are the center of everything. *We* are in charge of all that is. Not true! God is God and we are his sons and daughters. Let us come and adore him and recognize that truth.

I love hearing the song O Holy Night, especially when sung by a soloist. Part of the lyrics sung are: Oh, Holy Night the stars are brightly shining. It is the night of our dear Savior's birth. Long lay the world in sin and error pining 'til He appeared and the soul felt its worth. A thrill of hope the weary world rejoices.

The world is weary. After so much news of deadly hurricanes and earthquakes, the ongoing threat of terrorism and the fear of war, we need hope. Through the birth of Christ, the voice of God sends shouts of that very hope. He will never give up on this world and on us. As much as human beings sin and mess up, his love is without end. Jesus Christ is our Savior with the promise of eternal life for his children. This night, amid chaos and confusion, gives us hope.

Silent Night is probably the most popular of all Christmas hymns. Here is the last verse of the hymn: Silent night, holy night Son of God, love's pure light; Radiant beams from Thy holy face with the dawn of redeeming grace. Jesus, Lord, at Thy birth; Jesus, Lord, at Thy birth.

With all the rush and pressure of Christmas, the shopping, the cooking, the wrapping, the decorating, we may need a silent night. The song speaks to me about not missing the baby during all the celebrating. God, who created the heavens and earth, creator of oceans and mountains, comes among us as a baby. Christianity is the only religious faith that believes God became human - one of us, and like us in all things but sin. May we never get used to that most astounding truth. I am not sure if you will know the hymn *Tu Scende Dalle Stelle*. It is an Christmas song written more than two hundred



years ago by a Neapolitan priest named St. Alphonsus Liguori. St. Alphonsus is very special to me since he is the founder of the religious order I belong to called the Redemptorists. Alphonsus lived in a time when people were very afraid of God and felt God was going to condemn them to hell. This song tells of the love that God has for us: Oh, my Divine Baby I see you trembling here, Oh Blessed God, Ah, how much it cost you, your loving me. Ah, how much it cost you, your loving me. We know the cost of the love of God will bring him to the cross on Calvary.

The last song choice is a modern one called *A New York City Christmas* by Rob Thomas. When I heard it for the first time, it moved me and still does. To me it is a hymn which should remind us that Christmas is about the love God has for us. But that this love must move us to love one another those in our family, our friends, our neighbors, the poor and desperate, the forgotten. We hear these lyrics: *call on your Angels, come down to the city Let's crowd around the big tree, all you strangers you know me Bring your compassion, bring your forgiveness Lord, how we need it on this New York City Christmas.*


