# Pastor's Letter

The shepherds went in haste to Bethlehem and found Mary and Joseph, and the Infant lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known the message that had been told them about this Child. All who heard it were amazed by what had been told them by the shepherds. And Mary kept all these things, pondering on them in her heart. Luke 2: 16-19

The most common question that we hear after Christmas is, how was your Christmas? Unless your family experienced some illness or loss, the universal responses seem to be - it was good. We were with our family and friends. I had a great Christmas.

I love Christmas here at St. Martin's. The crowded pews, the joyful spirits of the parishioners, the glorious decorations in our church, the beautiful music, the innocence of the children at the pageant, the humble confessions heard, the generosity shown by the empty giving tree, all fill me with delight to the core of my soul.

Then, home to Brooklyn to continue the joy with family and friends. I think there was some fear I might get bedsores from sitting on the recliner too long, but I did manage to get into the city (as we Brooklynites say) to visit St. Patrick's Cathedral, see the Rockefeller Christmas tree and wait on a long line with my niece and nephew to buy half price tickets for *Miss Saigon*. Certainly a moving musical but rather heavy for the holidays. I had a great Italian dinner (is there any other kind?) with friends, a visit to other friends, and then a few days in the Poconos where my niece has a vacation home. I sleepily cheered the New Year in at midnight with family and friends, and then went to bed, but not before watching at least one episode of *The Honeymooners*. I had a great Christmas!

What kind of Christmas did the Blessed Mother have? Well, as she was making plans to marry her dear Joseph, she was visited by the Archangel Gabriel with a call to be the mother of God. It is so easy to write those words but impossible to imagine what the young teen experienced in that visitation. With a trembling soul, she says yes to the God she so loves. The angel tells her that her cousin Elizabeth, a woman considered beyond child-bearing years, is pregnant. Mary makes haste to be with her, no doubt to help her, but also to speak about her own awesome news.

Then, back to Nazareth, to hear mean gossip and rumors about her sudden pregnancy. Joseph, the love of her life, is confused and does not know what to say to her. He is very disturbed until he too is visited by an angel in a dream. Due to a Roman census, they must soon leave their village and go to Bethlehem, the ancestral home of Joseph. After a long arduous journey of six days on a donkey, they find Bethlehem crowded with no rooms available for them. Finally, a kind man offers them a stable.

The miracle Baby is born and with no crib or cradle, he is placed in a manger - a place of food for animals - but a symbol that this Child named Jesus will become the Bread of Life. Bewildered shepherds come to the stable and report singing angels in the skies. Soon after, wise foreigners from the East, speak of a strange star and come bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Being devout Jews, the couple follow the rites of circumcision and the presentation of the Child in the Temple. Here they met two ancient voices, Anna and Simeon, who proclaim that this Child is the Messiah, the long Awaited One. Then, another angelic visit tells them they must flee home and go to Egypt since King Herod seeks to kill Jesus, the future King of the Jews.

Mary, how was your Christmas? The Gospel tells us that Mary pondered all these things in her heart. What did all this mean? What does it mean to say Jesus is to be Savior of the world? How could I, a simple peasant girl from Nazareth be the Mother of God? Pondering and Treasuring. What is to be in the days to come? It is all too much to grasp and she can only trust in God.

My friend Steve Descovich who never has had a doubt in his life, tells me that the Irish (and me in particular) ponder too much. To me, pondering is to enter mystery and wonder. It is to seek understanding and never completely get it. It is to want certainty and to live with doubt. It is to be at peace and still worried, to be happy and yet feel a tinge of sadness. Although I admire the decisive, I am grateful for the gift of pondering.

#### My Knees Ache to Kneel...for a Good Reason

I write this in memory of my sister, Pat, who passed away in January, 2016. I do so because the

new kneelers in the Blessed Sacrament area are there in her memory. I wanted to have something at St. Martin's for her because she was like a surrogate parishioner. She could not attend Mass at her church anymore because of the travel but also because the pews had metal backs and she had difficulty kneeling down. In the relationship she had with Jesus Christ, she was "okay" with not being able to go to church but her greatest lament was that she could not kneel...not for God, not for cleaning, not for picking up things, nor for comfort.



Those of us with bad knees, legs, or simply difficulty in getting up and down, know how she felt. She felt that kneeling was "for" something and not against anything. We knelt and genuflected a great deal as children. Kneeling was a way of honoring God and of letting Him know that He was special and deserved our going down on our knees for Him. Genuflecting acknowledged his sacrifice and was a way of saying "Hello" before sitting in a pew.

Kneeling to protest was not in our thought waves. We kneel at the most sacred parts of our Mass and even with the kinks, cracks, and sound effects that we utter, I am sure that Father, Son, and Holy Spirit acknowledge our efforts and say *thank you* for the positive message. For those who cannot kneel, I am sure that the message is, "Thank you for all the times that you could and did."

I hope that when you visit the prayer area that you, if possible, kneel on the kneeler and remember Pat and why she wanted to kneel. Pray also for all those who kneel not "for" but against. I spend many times in the church alone, and I have been practicing kneeling in the Blessed Sacrament area and I am, along with therapy, finding it more comfortable to kneel. The grunts and groans are less, and the ups and downs are quicker. Perhaps, Pat, as she has always done for me in my entire life is just helping me out as always. - Ann Hughes



**EUCHARISTIC ADORATION:** Beginning this Tuesday, January 9<sup>th</sup> and every Tuesday thereafter, the Blessed Sacrament will be in the monstrance for Eucharistic Adoration from 3:00PM to 7:30PM. Should there be a conflict with this schedule, the Upcoming Events column will have the time of Adoration every week so there is no confusion. Since the monstrance will be placed in front of the tabernacle, we ask that you to come through the door of the Blessed Sacrament chapel.

#### Why Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

Human beings hunger for God. As believers, we see the presence of God in many ways. Certainly, God is in the wonder and glory of all creation, other people, ourselves, the Mass, the Sacraments, the Bible. There are times when we are moved to wonder at the world around us.

There is another powerful presence of God that our Catholic Church offers us through the gift of what has been called the Real Presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. In faith we recognize that Jesus remains in the consecrated host and precious blood even after the Mass has been concluded. Thus, we seek to attend to the Eucharist with profound respect as we clean the chalices and ciboriums. Catholic Churches keep the Eucharist, almost always just the consecrated wine and not the precious blood which is consumed after Mass for practical reasons), in what is called the tabernacle. Near the tabernacle is a lit candle called the sanctuary lamp. If that candle is lit, it reminds all who see it that Christ is present in the tabernacle. The only time we do not light this candle is on Good Friday and most of Holy Saturday to help us focus on the death of Jesus on the cross. At all other times, Jesus remains in the tabernacle, twenty-four hours a day.

So, whenever we go into a Catholic Church, at any time of the day or night, Jesus is present in the Eucharist in the tabernacle. The Church has called this the real presence to stress that there is a very profound and true presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. He told us, *This is my Body*. That is why we genuflect or bow when we come into the Church. As I mentioned at the beginning of this reflection, God is very present in so many ways around us. However, the Eucharistic presence of Jesus in the tabernacle is an awesome gift that Jesus has given us in his words, *I will be with you until the end of time*. We can pray anytime, anywhere. God is present. But there is a very special and unique presence when we are before Christ in the Blessed Sacrament. To help us grow in love of this great gift of Jesus being with us, throughout the centuries, we have what is called exposition of the Blessed Sacrament. Jesus is placed in what is called a monstrance (which means to show) so we can see the host right before our eyes. Now, in our belief, Jesus is as present in our churches, whether there is exposition or not. However, exposition heightens our awareness of His presence and can assist us in our prayers.

Here is how one author described Eucharistic adoration: Eucharistic Adoration is a Catholic tradition in which one is in the presence of the exposed Blessed Sacrament. Held in a monstrance, the Body of Christ is stationed in a space, usually the altar or chapel, that allows one to have personal, tranquil, and uninterrupted time with Jesus. The Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament serves as an extension of the adoration and praise given towards the Body and Blood of Christ during the Mass. Humbling ourselves before God, Eucharistic Adoration allows one to acknowledge the strength and almighty power of our Lord and Savior. During this time of reverence, visitors may pray, recite the rosary, read scripture, offer intentions, or simply sit and be in the presence of the Lord. Open to anyone, Eucharistic Adoration also assigns the visiting adorers the responsibility of being a guardian to the Blessed Sacrament. This silent period with Jesus in his entirety graces many with the blessing of internal peace, greater hunger for Communion with God, and deepened assurance in His power and presence.

#### Some terms for Adoration

**Monstrance:** A symbol of the Blessed Sacrament since the monstrance is the sacred vessel which contains the consecrated Host when exposed or carried in procession.

**Ciborium:** A covered container used to hold the consecrated small Hosts. It is like a chalice but covered and larger, used for small Communion hosts of the faithful. It is made of various precious metals, and the interior is commonly gold or gold-plated

**Tabernacle:** A cupboard or boxlike receptacle for the exclusive reservation of the Blessed Sacrament. In early Christian times the sacred species was reserved in the home because of possible persecution. Later dove-shaped tabernacles were suspended by chains before the altar. Nowadays tabernacles may be round or rectangular and made of wood, stone, or metal

**Sanctuary Lamp:** A wax candle, generally in a red glass container, kept burning day and night wherever the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in Catholic churches or chapels. It is an emblem of Christ's abiding love and a reminder to the faithful to respond with loving adoration in return.

#### How to pray in front of the Blessed Sacrament

- It is an act of faith; you may or not experience something emotionally.
- More than likely, your mind will wander. No big deal. Just try to come back to your prayer. If you fall asleep, ok. The apostles fell asleep in the garden.
- Being in front of the Blessed Sacrament is not about doing something. It is being with God.
- Talk to the Lord about whatever is in your heart.
- Listen. Now your world needs quiet. Be still and know that I am God.
- Perhaps, use one of the booklets we offer to help you pray or say the rosary of the divine mercy prayer.
- Relax and sit with our Greatest Friend, your God.
