Pastor's Getter

In the back of our church on the wall near the Sunday sacristy is a wooden plaque inscribed with the words below. I wish I had made the words darker since it is not so easy to read. Next to it is a picture of Jesus mounting a donkey in a little village outside of Jerusalem named Bethphage. From here, Jesus began his Palm Sunday journey into Jerusalem. We always read this Gospel

on Palm Sunday and the town of our parish (although spelled with an added h) is mentioned. I am touched by this scriptural mention of our town.

In 1695, Thomas Powell bought about 10,000 acres from local Indian tribes. He call his land Bethphage because it was situated between to other Long Island towns of Jericho and Jerusalem in the same way as the biblical town of Bethphage (meaning "house of figs") was situated. Today Jerusalem is known as Wantagh and Island Trees while Jericho is unaltered. Here is the inscription:

Jesus proceeded on his journey up to Jerusalem. As he drew near to Bethphage and Bethany at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples. He said, "Go into the village opposite you, and as you enter it you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. So they brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks over the colt, and help Jesus to mount. As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road; and now as he was approaching the slope of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of his disciples began to praise God aloud with joy for all the mighty deeds they had seen. They proclaimed: "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord. Peace in heaven and glory in the highest."

Palm Sunday begins the most sacred week of the Church year. If you have not done much to make Lent a holy time, this is a week when you can recover and have a fresh start. In the eyes of the Church, Lent actually ends on Wednesday. Now, that does not mean that you need to go out and a buy a Snickers bar if you gave up chocolate for Lent. We call the final days of this week Holy Week and use the term the Easter Triduum (which means three days) for Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and The Easter Vigil. Easter then begins after dark on Holy Saturday. These are truly the most solemn days of our Catholic faith. I always find it a bit special to read the Palm Sunday Gospel and hear the town of Bethpage mentioned.

Years ago, I recall preaching on Palm Sunday at a parish where I was giving a Holy Week retreat. I told a story about a famous football game to make what I considered a good point about the Holy Triduum. The pastor heard my talk and told me in no uncertain terms that his people did not want to hear about football. I was in trouble since I knew any mention of sports such as the Mets or Jets could lead to my being kicked out of the parish. As you know, that meant half of my sermon material went out the window! Here is an account of this story: Richard "Dicky" Moegle attended Taylor High School, where he played football and basketball. He accepted a scholarship from Rice University and attended as a 16-year-old freshman. In the 1954 Cotton Bowl Classic against Alabama, Moegel was on a roll. Against the tide, he struck early and often. The day's stats would show in a 28-6 victory, that Maegle rolled to 265 yards in only eleven carries, scoring three times, still a Cotton Bowl record. But the carry of the day was one that will live in the annals of college football history. In the second quarter, with the Owls already up 7-0, they set up shop on their own five-yard line. Maegle took a quick pitch, broke off-tackle, and headed for the sidelines. With nothing but daylight ahead, he was headed for a 95-yard touchdown run. On the 'Bama bench, Tommy Lewis, a reserve back, had had all he could take. Maegle was in the clear, at the Alabama 40, when Lewis burst off the bench to bring him down. Confusion reigned; the officials huddled. Coach Neely dashed across the field, challenging Rice coach Harold "Red" Drew. The officials awarded Rice the TD; the Owls won going away -- and both players later traveled to New York to tell about it on The Ed Sullivan Show. Dickie Maegle later said he felt like Ed Sullivan treated him like the heel and Tommy Lewis like a hero. "Heck, I was the one who scored the touchdown!" he said. In any event, for years it was considered THE most famous play in college football history. You can actually watch this play on YouTube.




The point I was trying to make on that Palm Sunday was that the player on the sidelines was not a spectator - he jumped in (against all rules) to help his team. Palm Sunday, Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday are days we more actively participate in the services than on regular Sundays. Certainly, we

are called to enter into all Masses by responding to the prayers, singing, being attentive, and receiving Holy Communion. At every Mass we are entering into the dying and rising of our Lord Jesus Christ.

However, the Triduum liturgies do even more to increase our active participation. On Palm Sunday, the congregation responds as the crowd did in Jerusalem at the reading of the Passion. On Holy Thursday, we enter into the witness of Jesus washing the feet of the disciples. We spend time in adoration before the Blessed Sacrament recalling Jesus' Agony in the Garden. On Good Friday many of us will make the Stations of the Cross in Bethpage Park, entering into the journey of Jesus to his death on the cross. We will kiss the cross during the Good Friday service. On Holy Saturday Night we sit for a time in darkness, reminding us that Jesus is the Light of the World. We light our candles from the newly blessed Paschal Candle. We renew our baptismal vows and bless ourselves with holy water. If you have never been to an Easter Vigil, I invite you to attend what is the most moving liturgy of the Church year, and one that is celebrated with great beauty and reverence.

Whether you agree with that pastor who told me not to talk about football or not, I do pray that this Holy Week brings you many graces and blessings as you enter into the joy of the Eucharist, the call to the washing of feet, the sadness of the cross, and the astounding joy of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ.
