Pastor's Letter



like the story of a very erudite Redemptorist who had studied in Europe. He was with some of his friends and the waiter asked if they would like wine with their dinner. The priest, seeking to impress his friends, asked in French for a wine that he described the year it was made, the vineyard from where it came, and its exact shade of color. Those with him were quite impressed until the waiter wrote down, they are having the house wine.

Many people take their wine seriously. Some people take courses on wine, others have a wine cellar and plan the wine for the meal based

on what is being served. I admit to being a kind of peasant who was so uncouth as to order beer when I dined at a fancy restaurant in Paris. Still, my mind can easily go back to my high school days. Our high school had vineyards surrounding the ballfield where we played baseball and football. I loved the scent of the grapes in late October when the vines were heavy with the maturing grapes. A couple of times when I was in high school, an early frost came; school was cancelled and we were all sent out into the vineyard to pick the grapes. Initially, it was a delight to be off from school, but pruning the vines was hard work and the weather was cold.

Jesus drank wine and he talked about vineyards. His first miracle was to turn water into wine so a couple's wedding would not be spoiled. Five large water jars filled to the brim. Scholars estimate that this was about 150 gallons of wine. That was some party! At the last supper, Jesus took a cup of wine and said this is the cup of my blood which will be shed for you. Do this in remembrance of me. Jesus is a great teacher since he uses images that are simple yet profound such as the sheep and the shepherd, the lilies of the field, and the vine and the branches. He described union with him in this way: Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. God the Father is the rich soil, Jesus is the vine and we are the branches. It is the Holy Spirit that brings about the fruit that grows from a heathy vine. Jesus' words about the vineyard leave us with simple but direct questions: am I rooted in the rich soil of God? Am I attached to the life-giving vine of Jesus? What kind of fruit am I producing?

As an Irishman, I love the image of the shamrock that St. Patrick used to help people have some sense of the Blessed Trinity. Three leaves represent the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and the one stem is their unity. Three-in-one. The image of the vine and the branches and is a beautiful reflection on the mystery of the Trinity. The soil that bring life is the Father; while the vine that comes from the soil is the Son. We are the branches and fruit and life that flows from us is the work of the Holy Spirit. Three-In-One.


We take pride in our roots. We research our ancestry and heritage. We think about what we have learned from our parents, our family, our friends. We know we need good soil to grow life. We might have asked ourselves how we spend out time. Does watching hours of television or endless time on the internet affect me? Is that the best soil for me to bear fruit? Is our home environment of good soil and healthy for all who are part of the family? What kind of soil are we giving to our children and those who will follow us to mature?

esus is the vine. Without the vine, there no growth. To grow grapes, there is the need for water, sunlight, pruning of the dying and dead branches. We nurture our vineyards by receiving Holy Communion, by prayer, pondering the Word of God, and by reflecting on our lives as followers of Jesus. We all need pruning. It is easy for anyone of us to fall into habits that do not bring life. Rather than giving nurturing sun and water to our branches, we can allow anger and resentment toward others, jealousy, pride, lust and greed to deaden the vines and choke off new life. Where am I most alive in my life, in my relationships with others, in my spirit? What gives me life? And what can deaden my spirit?

I have had people who speak to me about a certain book they have read, a pilgrimage they made, a program they experienced, a talk that they heard and they say it has changed their lives. I always say to them by their fruits you shall know them. I would ask if that type of prayer, that pilgrimage, that program made you a more loving and compassionate person? If it has, then it is bearing fruit. That is the sign of God's grace: bearing fruit. We heard this so clearly in our second reading from the first letter of John: Children, let us love not in word or speech but in deed and truth. We love not in word or speech but in truth and deed. Is our marriage, our family, our friendships bearing fruit?

Growing wine takes great time and patience. One cannot rush the process. I find myself using more and more the term, *I* am a work in progress. We are blessed by the rich soil of our faith in God, by the redeeming love of Jesus Christ and the ongoing love of the Holy Spirit. God gives us the miracle of grace and life. Pope John XXIII said, "People are like wine – some turn to vinegar, but the best improve with age." We give praise and glory to the Lord of the vineyard.

The Month of May is Traditionally Dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary.



May is a month of growth when nature is reborn. This month normally belongs to the Easter season, between Easter and Pentecost. Many Catholics may be aware that May is consecrated to Mary, but it may be unclear why this month was selected for this particular distinction.

The tradition of dedicating the month of May to Our Lady is centuries old, dating back at least 700 years. Blessed Pope Paul VI wrote an encyclical on the month of May focusing on the Virgin Mary. He wrote that the piety of the faithful has long dedicated the month of May to the Mother of God. He stated in his encyclical:

We are delighted and consoled by this pious custom associated with the month of May, which pays honor to the Blessed Virgin and brings such rich benefits to the Christian people. Since Mary is rightly to be regarded as the way by which we are led to Christ, the person who encounters Mary cannot help but encounter Christ likewise.

The reason for dedicating May to Our Lady is associated with the particular season of the year. May is certainly known for its springtime beauty (at least in the Northern Hemisphere). It is associated with flowers and blossoms, with trees which spring back to life and sprouting grass. In classic western culture, both Greek and Roman, May was connected with the beginning of new life. This ancient belief led to May being associated with the motherhood of Mother Earth and thus to motherhood in general. It is for this reason that Mother's Day is celebrated in May in many countries. This connection between May and motherhood led Christians to adopt May as the month of Our Lady, the Mother of God and our heavenly Mother. She brought life into the world by giving birth to her Son Jesus, who brought about a new spring.

- During May our parish will honor Mary by having her statue in the Sanctuary for the entire month.
- The May crowning of the Blessed Mother will take place at our outdoor statue of Mary (weather permitting) at the 10:00AM Mass on Mother's Day.
- We will say the rosary in our prayer garden on Wednesday nights May 9th at 6:30PM; May 16th, 23, and 30th at 7:00PM. If it rains, we will meet in the prayer chapel.

Homily for John Joyce, Parish Trustee of St. Martin of Tours

Our dear parishioner John Joyce went home to the God who created and breathed life into him this past Sunday. His beautiful family, his wife Noreen, his sons, Michael and John, and his daughter Mary Kate were prayerfully with him in his last hours at St. Joseph's Hospital, drawing strength from one another, from the love they bore their husband and father, and from the husband and father who had given and shared so much life with them. They helped him go home to eternal life and into the loving arms of Jesus as our banner proclaims. John took great pride, as you all know, in his Irish heritage, with his father being a native of County Mayo, Ireland. We Irish often confuse Ireland with heaven, an easy mistake to make, and I thought of the refrain of an old Irish ballad:

Take me home to Mayo, across the sea Home to dear old Mayo, where once I roamed so free Take me home to Mayo, there let my body lie Home to dear old Mayo, beneath the western sky



In our hearts and minds, we believe that John is home with God, his parents, and all those he loved who have gone before him. I offer condolences to his dear wife Noreen, to his children Mike and his wife Therese, John and his wife Patricia, and his daughter Mary Kate and her husband Kevin, his dear sister Patricia, his grandchildren Erin, Meghan, Jack, Ryan, Kate, Emma, Molly and Patrick, all family and friends and parishioners. The names of the grandchildren tell me they are ready for Notre Dame.

John had been sick for a while and he knew that his time to go home was drawing near. Noreen, in her wisdom, knew it was time to open the bottle of Jamison and share a drop of holy water as John could toast life and his family. A few days later, John, in the presence of his family, received the last rites of the Church. A shot of Jamison...the blessings of the Church he loved...surrounded by his family...I suppose that is as close to a happy death as any Irishman could ask for. I also discovered that there was a small branch of our St. Clement Bakers who formed a brigade of bakers who filled the Joyce house with Irish soda bread, brownies, rice pudding and other goodies.

I have been missing John for the last many months. I could say my mourning for him had begun awhile ago as I felt his absence whenever I would go into St. Alphonsus Hall to chat with the dedicated team of parishioners who count the collection. I missed his saying, watch out here comes the boss and some joke about Notre Dame losing. I cannot understand how an Irishman from the meatpacking section of New York (now called Chelsey by the yuppies) could not root for the fighting Irish. I think it had something to do with his having attended the University of Nebraska when he served our nation in the United States Air Force. I missed him at Sunday Mass sitting in the same pew so faithfully with Noreen. All of us on the financial council missed his wisdom and guidance on the parish financial committee.

John along with friend John Lyman are our parish trustees which is an official legal position mandated by the diocese. I trustee is called to help the pastor, especially in business and financial matters. They do that well, but even more than giving me wise advice, I drew inspiration from their love and dedication to our parish. The word *trustee* is well chosen. I trusted John with his gentle guidance and wisdom. However, he was removed from being the financial officer of his home by his wife Noreen who wanted to make sure all the house bills were paid on time.

We feel the loss of John very much in our parish, but as much as we do, I know the sorrow and sense of loss for his family is so very difficult. Noreen has known John for almost 50 years. 48 years ago, a *beautiful* bride named Noreen and a handsome groom named John stood at the altar of St. Mel's in Whitestone and *promised to take each other for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health until death due them part.* How beautifully you both lived that vow to one another and to God.

John loved the Triple Crown races; the Kentucky Derby, the Preakness and the Belmont. I wish I knew that, I might have gotten a few tips through the years. Two of the early entries for this year's Derby are *My Boy Jack* and the other is *Promises Fulfilled*. I plan on putting five dollars on *Promises Fulfilled* and saying a prayer to John for a winner since John lived his life so faithfully. John told me the two worse snowy days they ever had for the St. Patrick's Day Parade were when Father George Keaveney, Redemptorist, was pastor and the other was my own time as Grand Marshal. I think eight inches of snow fell during that parade. John told that if ever was going to chose a clergy person again, it would be a rabbi!

Our reading from the Book of Ecclesiastes speaks of the many seasons of life: a time to be born, a time to die, a time of war. a time of peace...The last verse of this beautiful scripture is often missed: *He has made everything appropriate to its time, and has put the timeless into their hearts, without men's ever discovering, from beginning to end, the work which God has done*. We can see from the way John Joyce lived his life that God's work here on earth had been done by John in loving his family, his neighbors and friends, and most especially his God.

The family chose a powerful witness of their faith in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. We hear St. Paul tell us: For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord. We know in our hearts that nothing can separate John from Jesus and the promise of eternal life. John lived his life based on this conviction. For the Gospel, I chose the text where Jesus refers to himself as the temple and tells the listeners that the temple will be destroyed and rebuilt in three days. The hearers are shocked; it took forty-six to build the temple and you are going to rebuild it in three days. They fail to understand that the temple is not made of brick and stones, but Jesus is speaking of himself, of his death and resurrection.

I know John loved his home, his community and his church. What makes a home is not walls and ceilings but the people who live in that home. Our faith tells us that our family is a church, a temple where God is present. I have no doubt that John loved St. Martin's. I know he helped raise money for this church many times. St. Martin's is a living, breathing body. As beautiful as the stained glass, the altar, the statues and wood are, it is the *people* who come here to pray, to eat and drink the Body of Christ, to help and support each other in good times and bad, *that* is the living Body of Christ. From what I came to know, John Joyce was a man who nurtured and loved the Body of Christ here on earth in the parishioners of St. Martin's. In the way John lived and died in faith, he showed us the Living Body of Christ.

I will end with a poem that invites us to follow John in loving God, our families and our parishioners.

BURY MY BODY but don't bury my beliefs. BURY MY HEART but don't bury my love. BURY MY EYES but not my vision. BURY MY FEET but not the path of my life. BURY MY HANDS but don't bury my diligent efforts. BURY MY SHOULDERS but not the concerns I carried. BURY MY VOICE but not my message. BURY MY MIND but don't bury my dreams. BURY ME but don't bury my life. KNOW THAT MY LIFE CONTINUES IN ALL OF YOU. KNOW MY LOVE FOR YOU WILL BE FOREVER.



Baby Alfie Evans was from Liverpool with an undiagnosed neurodegenerative disorder and was 1 year and 11 months old. He was hospitalized at Alder Hey Children's Hospital, West Derby, Liverpool, UK. The medical team and the child's parents disagreed about whether to maintain Alfie's life support or to withdraw it, resulting in a legal battle. Alder Hey Children's NHS Foundation Trust sought a declaration that CONTINUED VENTILATOR SUPPORT was UNKIND and INHUMANE, and not in the baby's best interests. Alfie's parents, Kate James and Thomas Evans, resisted the application. *re: Wikipedia*

Alfie should have been allowed to die at home instead of in a hospital surrounded by police, his supporters said on Saturday. The toddler died five days after being taken off life support following several court rulings that further treatment would not be in his best interests. His parents suffered a further court defeat when three senior judges rejected an appeal to take the boy to Rome for treatment, despite earlier high-profile interventions from Pope Francis and the Italian government. In a tweet the Pope had written last week: "Moved by the prayers and immense solidarity shown little Alfie Evans, I renew my appeal that the suffering of his parents may be heard and that their desire to seek new forms of treatment may be granted." The Vatican's Bambino Gesu Hospital had offered to care for him. Following protests outside the hospital, police remained on guard inside and outside the building. re: Telegraph.co.uk

Little Alfie Evans passed away, but the struggle over his treatment provoked a worldwide conflict over parental rights, how to care properly for the seriously disabled, and the appropriate role of the state in such intimate and vexed matters. What it revealed is that the law of the UK is in desperate need of revision to make room for the profoundly disabled and their loved ones who wish to care for them, despite the judgment of others that such lives of radical dependence and frailty are not worth living. The heart of the problem is that, according to the UK Courts' interpretation of the CHILDREN ACT of 1989, a life of permanent disability and dependency, whether long or short is not worth living. The UK High Court rooted its opinion in the ethical guidance of the Royal College of Pediatrics and Child Health, which asserts that "it is no longer in the child's best interests to continue (living)" in those cases "where the severity of the child's condition is such that it is difficult or impossible for them to derive benefit from continue life." Because of his disability, Alfie's very life was deemed no longer beneficial to him, and therefore it was declared ILLEGAL TO KEEP HIM ALIVE. Just as in the CHARLIE GARD case, the courts here effectively terminated the rights of Alfie's parents, forbidding them to seek transfer to other facilities that wished to care for Alfie. Both Pope Francis and the Italian government pled for Alfie's life, going as far as to make him an honorary Italian citizen and offering air transport to a pediatric hospital in Rome. But the UK government refused.
