Pastor's Letter

This ancient image of the Blessed Mother with Jesus comes from an image found in the Catacombs of the Second Century.



Several years ago, I went on a wonderful trip to Poland hosted by the Redemptorists of Warsaw. Our province had helped them financially with some projects, and they wanted to express their appreciation. Along with two other friends, we drove over 1900 kilometers all over Poland visiting Warsaw, Cracow, Wadowice (the birthplace of St. John Paul II), the Gdansk shipyards, Auschwitz, and the Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa. At the Shrine of Our Lady of Czestochowa, there were large crowds of people, walking on their knees as they approached the icon of what is sometimes called the Black Madonna because the image is very dark. Our Redemptorist guide was friends with the director of this Shrine and he arranged for three seats to be placed in front of the Madonna for us. Quite honestly, we were very embarrassed to be sitting while these

pilgrims with a deep love of the Blessed Mother reverently approached the sacred image. On the icon there was a mark from an arrow shot by an enemy in the 13th century and later during the same time period, a soldier slashed the face of the Madonna with his sword.

As I looked at the image and the marks on it, I could not help but think of the suffering of the Polish people through the centuries. The country is located between Russia and Germany and has historically been attacked by many groups. In more recent times, the Poles endured Hitler, Stalin and communism. It was their deep faith in Jesus Christ and his Mother that sustained them. Because of a previous position I held in the Redemptorists, I have had the opportunity to visit Lourdes, Our Lady of Knock in Ireland, and Our Lady of Aparecida in Brazil. I have also read about the great graces of the Blessed Mother at Fatima, Medjugorje, Guadalupe and many other holy places where she has come to comfort her people in moments of great need. The countless generations of believers who have sought the intercession of Our Blessed Mother testify and witness to the love that Mary has brought to her children.

The most important question ever asked of a human being was to a young teenage girl in a tiny backwater village of Nazareth in Israel. The promise of God after the fall of Adam and Eve - to put an adversary between Satan and the broken human race - is now to begin. The Archangel Gabriel's question to a startled young girl was, *Will you be the mother of God?* One ancient writer said that at that moment all the angels in heaven surround Mary in prayer, imploring her to say *yes* to this awesome request. God has allowed salvation history and the Incarnation to rely on the response of this young woman. She responds, *let it be done according to His will.* The Angels of Heaven break forth in a chorus of Alleluias. The Redemptorist poet Father John Duffy wrote that *because of her yes, nothing will ever be the same again.* Through the centuries, different groups have debated and argued: *how can a mere creature be the mother of God? This cannot be!* Yet, it is absolutely clear and an essential belief that she **is** the mother of God, since Jesus is both fully human and fully divine. That is the core of the Catholic faith. In



431 in a little Greek town named Ephesus, the leaders of the Church declared the eternal truth - she is *Theotokos*, the Mother of God. Of all her many titles, this is the most profound and significant. While the bishops were meeting in council, it is said that a large crowd surrounded the building chanting, *Theotokos, Theotokos*.

The last act of our Lord Jesus Christ as he is dying an agonizing death on the cross is to provide for his mother by placing her under the care of the Apostle John: *Behold your Mother*. At that moment, after washing feet, after promising us his body and blood in the Eucharist at his Last Supper, and as He struggles to breathe, Jesus gives us one final treasure – His mother. *Behold your Mother*. Mary becomes the Mother of all human beings through this gift given by her Son.

Sometimes, there are those who do not understand the love Catholics have for the Blessed Mother. They tell us we are saved by the blood of Jesus. Only God is Divine. We know that! Mary is a creature like us, except that she was delivered from original sin by her Son Jesus in the Immaculate Conception. Today, there are some growing groups of Protestants and Moslems who see the great place of Mary in our lives. The last words that Mary speaks in the Gospels are at the wedding feast of Cana: *Do whatever He tells you.* The Mother always points us to her Son.

I believe God gave us Mary out of love. God is God. As creatures, it can be difficult to understand and grasp the divine. Whatever we think and know about God, in all the thousands of books written by the most brilliant writers, we can never completely capture the wonder and mystery of God. But the Lord knew the depth of the bond that a child shares with a mother. In our imaginations we cannot get our hands around God. We do our best but He is beyond our human comprehension. Yet, we are so very familiar with a mother's love. The bond with a mother may well be the deepest of all human relationships. The dying solider on the battlefield cries out for his mother. The football star who has scored the winning touchdown says to the television announcer, *let me say HI to my mother!* The despised murderer in the courtroom has his mother seated behind him, while the lost child in Walmart cries, *Mommy!* A desperate daughter on drugs says, *well, I can always go to my mother's*.

We sons and daughters know what a mother's love is. The God who created the heavens and the earth invites us to turn to the warmth, the love, the compassion of his Mother. So we honor Mary the Mother of God as we join with all generations who have gone before us proclaiming her words:

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my Savior. For he has looked upon his handmaid's lowliness; behold, from now on will all ages call me blessed.



THE CATHOLIC CHURCH AND HUMAN TRAFFICKING POLICY

UNITED STATES CONFERENCE OF CATHOLIC BISHOPS (USCCB) As defined by the United Nations, human trafficking is a modern day form of SLAVERY that consists of the ILLE-GAL TRADE OF HUMAN BEINGS THROUGH FORCE, FRAUD, OR COERCION FOR THE PUR-POSES OF COMMERCIAL SEXUAL EXPLOITATION OR FORCED LABOR. It takes a variety of forms in every region of the world. Some people are trafficked for PROSTITUTION, POR-NOGRAPHY, and other forms of SEXUAL EXPLOITATION. Some are trafficked for FORCED LABOR IN AGRICULTURE, SWEAT SHOPS, AND DOMESTIC SERVITUDE. Some are

trafficked for BOTH!. Through SEXUAL SLAVERY, the body becomes little more than an object to be exploited. For victims of forced labor, the body is made into a DISPOSABLE MACHINE, made to WORK LONG HOURS for LITTLE OR NO PAY and for the profit of others. In both cases the person who is ENSLAVED is treated as an OBJECT for ANOTHER'S BENEFIT. The person's GOD-GIVEN HUMAN DIGNITY IS either ignored or forgotten. As an institution that actively opposes EVIL in ALL OF ITS FORMS, the Church publicly identifies with the POOR, the SUFFERING, and those in DESPAIR. In this light, the Bishops of the United States have been active in the fight against human trafficking. The Church has worked closely with government entities, private organizations, and individuals who are committed to eradicating this evil.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT GRANTS TO SUPPORT USCCB MRS PROGRAMS AND SERVICES The following are some of the programs in place: Reception and Placement Grant. Cuban/Haitian Program. Matching Grant Program. Services to Newly Arrived Refugees. Refugee Marriage and Family Strengthening. Safe Passages I. Safe Passages II. Services to Victims of Trafficking Technical Assistance. Technical Assistance For Refugee Child Welfare Services. Trafficking in Unserved Areas.

SAFE PASSAGES I: The Safe Passages Program is funded by the Office of Refugee Resettlement/Division of Unaccompanied Children's Services (ORR/DUCS). The program serves unaccompanied children who have been apprehended by immigration officials and who are in federal custody. The program provides family reunification services through a suitability assessment process and follow up services. It also places some of these children who are in federal custody in the Unaccompanied Refugee Minor programs for long-term placement. Finally the program funds sub-recipient CATHOLIC SOCIAL SERVICE AGENCIES (foster care/group homes/shelter care) for immediate placement of children in federal custody.

SAFE PASSAGES II: This program is also funded by ORR/DUCS and serves unaccompanied children who have been apprehended by immigration officials. Through a team of USCCB/MRS and International Catholic Migration Commission field coordinators, recommendations regarding the placement, transfer and release of children in federal custody are made. The field coordinators are assigned to locations where there are high apprehensions of unaccompanied children and are housed within USCCB/MRS or CATHO-LIC CHARITIES OFFICES. This program includes initiatives to assist with capacity development, and drafting of guidelines and criteria related to the system of care for unaccompanied children.
