## Pastor's Letter

ears ago in my first assignment as a Redemptorist, I was assigned to teach in a high school. When I would come home on vacation, I would go over the parish church and concelebrate the Mass. The priests were members of the same order I belong to and they always welcomed me. I did not call in



advance since I would decide in the morning on what Mass I would attend. The Eucharistic Ministers had all been assigned, were nicely dressed, and looked forward to giving out the Body and Blood of Jesus. When it came time for the distribution of communion, I did not want to ask one of the people assigned to step aside from their ministry, so I just sat down after I received at the altar. I was more than happy to have some quiet time of prayer. Eventually, my sister came to me with a smile, and swore me to secrecy as she told me that my mother was not at all happy with this arrangement. She told my sister, *Poor Patrick - spent all those years studying and now they are taking away his job! He probably will be so unhappy that he will leave the priesthood!* God bless mothers - they watch out so well for their children. I never did bring this topic up to my Mom because I think she would never be happy with her son on the sidelines. She'd want the *Pope* to sit down if I were there and have me lead the service.

Our faith teaches us that we become disciples of Jesus at our baptism. A disciple is one who follows Jesus and seeks to live what he taught us. A disciple has a relationship with Jesus in prayer. A baptized person is a member of the Catholic family. I often joke when I baptize a baby that once the baby is baptized he or she then has 1.2 billion cousins since that is the number of Catholics in the world. If they all give


the baby a gift, he or she will be able to not only go to Harvard, they might be able to buy it.

We are members of the family. In my family in Brooklyn, my main job is to tell jokes at the meals and tease everyone. It is quite a demanding role! After a large meal, usually prepared by nieces and my sister, it will be suggested that the men should take care of the clean-up. At that point, I usually push a button on my phone so it will ring, and I tell them I have an emergency in the parish. However, I think they're getting wise to me.

We are members of the parish of St. Martin of Tours. Our parishioners are generous in the support of their parish and I find you inspire me by your prayerfulness. We are blessed with many people who are involved in one or more of our parish ministries. We have many ways of serving the Lord in ministry in this parish. I know some people are hesitant to serve because they may think they are not worthy. If only perfect people could serve in the church, there would be no pope, bishops, priests, deacons or laity. When I talk to the people who are involved in some form of ministry, they tell me that it brings them a sense of joy. So, for those of you who are involved in ministries, I ask you to invite people you know to consider ministry as a way of being a disciple. For those of you reading this not in ministry, I invite you to pray about some way of assisting in the family work of our parish. I try to thank people for whatever they do, but I find it odd to thank them since I know they serve because they are followers of Jesus.

I love this description of ministry from the Apostle Paul: And how can people preach unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are those who bring the good news!" Roman 10:15

his is the homily that Father Pat delivered at the Memorial Mass for Kay Wilson, a long-time parishioner who was very active in the St. Vincent de Paul ministry as well as the St. Mother Theresa Outreach Center. But Jesus immediately said to them: "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." "Lord, if it's you," Peter replied, "tell me to come to you on the water." "Come," he said. Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came toward Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him.



Today, we come together to celebrate the grace-filled life that our beloved parishioner Kay Wilson lived over the past 97 years. Last week we celebrated the great feast of Corpus Christi, the Body of Christ. As our last Mass, we processed around the blocks surrounding our Church carrying Jesus in the Eucharist. For me that was a true image of the Body of Christ - the people gathered around the Eucharist. I thought of the long line of great witnesses of our Catholic faith, who are now home with God, and who were accompanying us on our procession. I love the quote from the Book of Hebrews that is above the paintings of saints: *We are surrounded by a great cloud of witness*. Now Kay is one of those witnesses who is home with God. She lived her life loving God not only in prayer and devotion, but also knew Jesus in her marriage, in raising her children and delighting in her grandchildren. She knew and loved God as she taught her students, with her neighbors and friends and with the many parishioners she loved. In a most special way, Kay taught us all to see and know Jesus in the faces of the poor and suffering whom she so loved in her work at our food pantry and in the St. Vincent de Paul ministry. She heard the voice of Jesus say, *I was hungry and you fed me, I was thirsty and you gave me a drink.* 

We offer our condolences to Kay's daughters Kathleen and Mary Jean, and to her son Larry, as well as to her twenty grandchildren and eighteen great grandchildren. The Bible says a person is blessed if they live to see their children's children. God truly blessed Kay that she lived to see three generations of family. She had a gift for friendship and her closeness with Jeanne Towers and all the Towers family, her dear friend Jane Massinmino, her neighbors the Rafenskis, the Leidis, the Giannicos, the Houchs, the Croans, the Mancinis and the Millers. Kay shared so much in loving devotion to the St. Vincent de Paul Society and to Rosemary Scarangella at the parish outreach center. We offer a special welcome to Elsie Barone who shelved many boxed and served many people along with Kay.

I first met Kay seven years ago. She was to receive the St. Agnes Medal from the Diocese of Rockville Centre and as the new pastor, I felt this was something I should attend. She was delighted when I showed up in her pew at the Cathedral. What an elegant and delightful woman I encountered! It was a night of celebration for all that she had done and continued to do for so many. Another moment of meeting came on a Sunday afternoon in December. Naturally, since it was a Sunday afternoon, I was yelling at the television as I watched the Jets. The doorbell rang gratefully relieving my pain, and it was Kay looking for the Christmas Giving Tree. Since it was my first year here, I had no idea what the Christmas Giving Tree was, where it was, and how we might find it. She was very patient with me and eventually it was discovered. As always, she was on a mission to help families in need. The hymn *Be Not Afraid* that we will sing is a perfect song to celebrate the life of Kay. She was a woman of courage and commitment and did not let fear or worry stop her from pursing her dreams to help others and to drink in the goodness of the life that God had given her.

er daughter Kathleen told me this about her Mom: Kay was a teacher before she was credentialed. She taught many children to swim and sail. She was a Girl Scout leader. She escorted the children in her life to historic sites, to Broadway plays, memorial parades and seaside visits under the stars. Being a nurse was a lifelong goal and after she raised her children, she headed off to Farmingdale for nursing school. She became a wonderful nurse and teacher. She valued her colleagues and being part of the faculty. She made dear friends at Farmingdale that she treasured for the rest of her life. They are here today, reading, speaking and sharing her gifts. She travelled the world. She visited the Holy Land, sailed on the Nile in a felucca. She kissed the Blarney stone and saw the Passion Play in Oberammergau. She walked on the great Wall of China and in the streets of Moscow. She always said she loved coming home to her Island "from sound to sea, the place to be, Long Island." That is the story of a woman who lived well the precious life that God had given her. She loved to travel and see new things, but it was in teaching and nursing, as well as her family and friends, that she had tireless energy and a way to bring love to others. As her daughter wrote: Kay was a deeply committed Catholic, daughter, sister, wife, mother, aunt, grandmother and great grandmother. A nurse, teacher, friend, swimmer, sailor, sightseer, chef, Parcheesi player and family historian. She cared for many loved ones as they were dying and she was blessed to be in her daughter's home with her son and daughter when she left this world.

Our first reading from Isaiah are the words that Jesus read when he picked up the scrolls in the synagogue in Capernaum. The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; He has sent me to bring glad tidings to the lowly, to heal the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives and release to the prisoners; to announce a year of favor from the Lord and a day of vindication by our God, to comfort all who mourn. Kay, a faithful follower of Jesus, followed those words we heard - to comfort and heal those in need.

Our second reading are words from the great missionary apostle St. Paul. Paul knows that he is coming to the end of his life. He has poured out his life in preaching the Good News of Jesus Christ. He describes his life as a kind of marathon race that is coming to an end, saying: the time of my departure is at hand. I have competed well; I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. From now on the crown of righteous-ness awaits me, which the Lord, the Just Judge, will award to me on that day. Kay Wilson did pour out her life for others and everyone in church today is confident that she is now home with the Lord, her husband, her family, and all those she has loved who have gone before her. She is meeting people in Heaven who are thanking her for being a kind teacher or a gentle nurse, or the person who tells her, you were so good to me when I was in need.

After learning about Kay's love of sailing, I knew I had to pick a Gospel that involved Jesus sailing on the Sea of Galilee. We know the story well. The apostles, many of them experienced fishermen, are on the sea when suddenly a violent storm breaks out. They are terrified and become even more frightened when they see a man walking toward them on the water. They wonder if they are seeing a ghost. Peter sees that it is the Lord. Jesus invites him to get out of the boat and walk toward him. He starts to walk on the water, but feeling the power of the wind and sea, he becomes afraid and starts to drown. He cries out, *Lord save me!* Jesus reaches out and pulls him into the boat. Kay never feared getting out of the boat and walking toward Jesus. I am sure as a human, she had her doubts and struggles but she kept walking. She spent her life helping others who were afraid of drowning by pulling them into the boat of God's love. On May 8th of this year Jesus bid Kay to get out of the boat and to come home to the kingdom that he has prepared for her.


