

Pastor's Letter

I received the following email. (I had permission of the writer to put this in the bulletin but I chose to leave the writer's name unmentioned.)

Thank you for taking the time to speak with me this morning. As I told you then, I am not a member of St. Martin's parish, but I did attend the 11:30 Mass on Father's Day...and I was saddened that there was no mention of prayer for the people who are suffering at our southern border. It seems to me that, although there are no easy answers, that should not prevent us from grappling with the serious questions. What better place than our churches to help us grapple with the issues of right and wrong? Our churches can help us to form our consciences by prodding us to think.

Separation of children from their parents - no matter where it takes place - is cruel, inhumane, and evil. The National Catholic Conference of Bishops has spoken out against what is happening...and I wonder why we aren't sharing this with the Faithful when we gather to remember who we are and Who we follow. I want my church to be brave and to challenge us. Jesus said "You are my witnesses." How are we called to witness here in the United States in 2018? How do we witness to the least of our brothers and sisters? How do we witness to the preferential option for the poor? What would Jesus be doing if he were walking the streets of our country today? How can we make the Gospel relevant in our lives? This is not the time for us to be comfortable in our Christianity. This is the time to remember that we are "the communion of saints" and we are one with all those who are suffering everywhere in our world. Sincerely...

Last Sunday, someone approached me at the end of Mass, asking why there was no mention in the prayer of the faithful about the children and their families who are suffering at the southern border. The person who spoke to me was very sincere and concerned; and we had, although brief, a respectful conversation about this serious reality facing our nation. I did explain that the prayer of the faithful, which is edited by me, has limits and some practical concerns that make it difficult to address the many needs of the world and our nation, along with our local concerns. However, I thought her questions were fair and left me once again thinking about a topic that troubles me very deeply and one to which I feel I have no simple response. I promised the person that if an email was sent, I would put it in the bulletin as I have.

I have spoken in homilies and written in the bulletin how difficult I find it to give a clear Catholic position on the multi-complex issues our nation has in addressing immigration. I think it is clear to all of us that we want to treat all people with kindness and understanding in a Christ-like way. Jesus' words on how we will be judged could not be any clearer than in *Matthew* 25: For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in. How a nation welcomes strangers is not so easy to address. The Catholic Church, while putting absolute stress on compassion for immigrants, also clearly states that a nation has the right to have borders. To quote Pope Francis: The Pope reaffirmed basic Catholic doctrine regarding immigration, namely, that sovereign nations have the fundamental right to maintain secure borders and to receive immigrants in an orderly and controlled fashion. "Yes, every country has the right to control its borders, who comes and who goes," Francis said Friday, "and those countries at risk —from terrorism or such things— have even more right to control them more."

I am sure all of you, as am I, are disturbed by our present policy, which is a law that has been on the books for many years, that is, separating parents and their children in some situations at our borders. The image of children crying for their parents haunts me. President Trump has decided to have this law enforced. I strongly disagree with his decision, as do many of our Bishops. Cardinal Daniel DiNardo, the president of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops, said in a statement, "Families are the foundational element of our society and they must be able to stay together. While protecting our borders is important, we can and must do better as a government, and as a society, to find other ways to ensure that safety. Separating babies from their mothers is not the answer and is immoral.

Still, I believe this issue lies not only at the feet of our President. Members of both the Democratic and Republican Parties for many years have refused to work together for a just and compassionate immigration policy. Additionally, I have a growing mistrust of the media, both those who are either liberal or conservative in their thinking, to give information that is not at times heavily biased by their personal beliefs. This adds further confusion for many of us who are seeking to understand this pressing issue. I believe our elected officials of both major political parties are using children to manipulate immigration to benefit their cause rather than to work for a policy that we as a nation can stand behind together.

So, we will continue to pray for a just and compassionate immigration policy. For a variety of reasons, I may not always list this concern in our prayer of the faithful since we have so many public prayers to pray for. Certainly, one can contact the White House or Congress to give voice to our thoughts by email or phone. Tip O'Neil once said, *all politics are local*. We can be compassionate and kind to all people in our lives, be it our spouse or a stranger. I am proud that our parish outreach center and our St. Vincent de Paul Society never ask a person about their nationality, immigration status, or religion. In our name they care for them. We have a beautiful image of the Holy Family in our prayer area. Jesus, Mary and Joseph once had to flee as refugees to Egypt to escape Herod. I invite you to take a moment to pray there for all immigrants seeking to enter the United States, especially the children and for wisdom and guidance on all our political leaders.



CNA/EWTN NEWS: June 13, 2018: AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION URGED TO KEEP STANCE AGAINST ASSISTED SUICIDE: The AMERICAN MEDICAL ASSOCIATION voted this week to return to committee a report recommending CONTINUED OPPOSITION TO PHYSICIAN ASSISTED SUICIDE - a move that commentators have called a MISSED OPPPORTUNITY TO STAND UP FOR THE VALUE OF HUMAN LIFE.



"For more than two decades the nation's most PROMINENT AND LARGEST ASSOCIATION OF PHYSICIANS VOCALLY OPPOSED PHYSICIAN-ASSISTED SUICID,," Dr. Peter T Morrow, M.D. president of the CATHOLIC MEDICAL ASSOCIATION. He said the national delegates' refusal to accept the recommendation was "hugely disappointing and frankly disturbing." Morrow said that since the AMA's founding in 1847, its ethics code has seen PHYSICIAN-ASSISTED SUICIDE AS ALWAYS, "FUNDAMENTALLY INCOMPATIBLE WITH THE PHYSICIAN'S ROLE AS HEALER." "Our mission to the CMA is to continue to focus on educating our patients on palliative care and hospice and improving access to those much-needed END OF LIFE SERVICES that include emotional and spiritual support."

The rejected AMA committee report is the product of two years work. It cited concerns that assisted suicide's use might expand from mentally competent, terminally ill adults to children, people with psychiatric disorders, or people with socioeconomic challenges. Physician-assisted suicide is legal by law in the District of Columbia, Washington, Oregon, California, Vermont, and Colorado; and in Montana through a state supreme court ruling. It will become legal in Hawaii next year. A bill to legalize assisted suicide is under consideration in Indiana.
