## Pastor's Letter



St. Mary's College, Ilchester, Maryland. Here is where I entered the novitiate in 1967-68. I took my first vows in the chapel and entered the Redemptorists fifty years ago. After the novitiate was moved, the building and property were sold. Eventually a fire destroyed the building. Local teens and adults are fascinated by the ruins of the property and claim the place is haunted. It even made online lists of haunted places! I never saw any ghosts except I once had a vision of Joe Namath. He promised met the Jets would win one Super Bowl in my lifetime. Little did I know it would be one year later (1969) and that the

rest of my life was doomed to suffer as a Jet fan.

1968 was one of the most turbulent years in recent American history. The ongoing war in Vietnam had deeply divided our nation and a generation of the young went off to fight a war that gradually grew extremely unpopular among many Americans. There were many protests against the war and the government. Some of the protests turned to bombing and other acts of violence. In Memphis, Tennessee on April 4, 1968, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated. This great tragedy led to rioting in many of our cities, and the authorities sent tanks into some cities to try to control the violence. A few weeks later, on June 5<sup>th</sup>, Senator Robert Kennedy was shot and killed in Los Angeles. For many, it felt like the very structures of the country we knew were falling apart. In August of 1968, there was more uproar in the streets of Chicago at the Democratic National Convention. In November, our deeply divided nation elected Richard Nixon as the next president.

The Catholic Church was having its own tensions that year. The decisions of Vatican II were beginning to be implemented. Altars were turned to face the congregation and English replaced Latin as the common language of our liturgical prayer. Many priests, Brothers, and Sisters chose to leave their vocations. Many Sisters began to dress in more contemporary clothes. Churches were renovated and some had their statues and saints removed. Some had the expectation that Vatican II would lead to a change in the Church's teaching on birth control. However, Pope Paul VI (soon to be canonized a saint) wrote the *Encyclical Humane Vitae* that reaffirmed the teaching against artificial use of contraceptives. This decision was a source of much debate among the theologians, clergy and the laity.

In the months leading up to 1968 and for much of that traumatic year, I may as well have been living in another world. After graduating from The Redemptorist High School Seminary in Western Pennsylvania, I had my summer vacation with my family and then soon founded myself putting on a black suit, a white shirt, and Panama straw hat, and took a bus to Baltimore in late July of 1967. This was the required dress code for a Redemptorist candidate for the novitiate. I was seventeen years old. We were to spend the next fourteen months or so in a town outside of Baltimore named Ilchester.

It is not easy to define exactly what a novitiate is. All religious, whether seeking to be Brothers, Sisters, or a religious order priest, must make at least a year long novitiate. Some orders, including the Jesuits, have a two-year novitiate. The Catholic Church has clear outlines of what is expected of a novitiate and a novice (one who is making the novitiate). Each particular order has its own norms.

Most of the fellows in my novitiate class had gone to the same high school so we knew each other pretty well. After a period of transition, we began the novitiate on August 1, 1967. The goal of a novitiate is to introduce the novices to the purpose of living the religious life, to learn the history and rule of the order that you are seeking to enter, to reflect seriously on making a commitment to the order through the vows of poverty, chastity and obedience, and to deepen one's relationship with God through prayer, fasting, discipline, and the guidance of the novice master, who is in charge of the formation of the novices. We were often reminded that he was evaluating us to see if we were truly called to this life. At the same time, we were discerning if we wished to be a vowed Redemptorist. I often say that the novitiate is like a kind of religious boot camp to see if we have the perseverance and call to live the life of a Redemptorist.

Although there were many radical changes going on in the world around us, I could say that we made the same novitiate that was being made all over the world by Redemptorists. I think little had changed in the methodology over the past 200 years since our Order was founded. After four years in high school living dormitory-style, we were each given our own room. They were quite spartan, with four religious pictures on the wall, a crucifix, a chair and desk, a bed, and dresser. The day began with someone knocking on our door at 5:30AM saying a prayer in Latin (which I have forgotten), then we responded with a Latin prayer. There was a half hour of prayer, then prayers of the Psalms, then Mass, then a half an hour of prayer after Mass, and finally breakfast. Almost all our meals were eaten in silence except on Thursday (our recreation day) and Sunday. The rest of the day was made up of conferences, more praying of the Psalms, periods of meditation, work around the property, spiritual reading, time for visiting the Blessed Sacrament, saying the rosary, and other prayers. Recreation consisted or walking around the property with our class for a half hour after lunch and supper and entering into conversations. There was not too much to speak about since we had no access to television, the radio, or newspapers. Thursdays and Sundays, we were allowed to play sports for two hours or so.

The food was probably the best food I have ever had as a Redemptorist. We had two Redemptorists Brothers, one a fabulous baker and the other a great cook. The only problem was that we were strongly encouraged to do penance and give up our favorite foods and desserts. I had the misfortune to be sitting next to the novice master at meals so I really had to resist many delights. Penances were strongly encouraged and one could choose to kneel while eating his food, kneel in front of the altar with our arms outstretched in imitation of Jesus on the cross, or a favorite of mine, wear a sign saying *I am a fool*!

This was 1968. I often think we were the only teenagers in America to go to bed on New Year's Eve at 9:30PM. This style of Redemptorist novitiate no longer exists, and our novitiate today is very different. Some of this may sound very strange to you. Today, most of our men make the novitiate in their mid-twenties.

August 2nd was the feast of St. Alphonsus (his feast day is now August 1<sup>st</sup>). On that day, proudly wearing our Redemptorist habits, we novices nervously and humbly took the vows of poverty, chastity and obedience for three years. After three years, we could then choose to commit to being a Redemptorist for life. Our parents and family were allowed to attend the ceremony, but they had to attend a separate dinner than we did after the ceremony. Taking the vows was the moment we became Redemptorists. That was fifty years ago this August 2<sup>nd</sup>. For fifty years I have been a Redemptorists. In spite of how odd the practices of the novitiate may sound, in spite of the young age that I made it, in spite of the



complete withdrawal from family and the world around us, I have no complaints about that year. If I were novice master today, I would not run it that way, but that year had a most profound effect on me. Simply put, for the first time in my life, I felt truly in love with Jesus Christ.

Through the years, I have had many moments of deepening my faith in Him; and there have been other times when I drifted from His love. I do believe the novitiate gave me a sound foundation for the rest of my life.

Fifty years later, I am a very different man from the teenager who wore the straw hat on a bus to Baltimore. Nonetheless, I am so very grateful to God for calling me to be a Redemptorist, and I pray daily for the grace of perseverance. God is good all the time!







#### THE LIFE CENTER OF LONG ISLAND REPORT

For well over a decade you have heard and supported the message of the Life Center of Long Island by your generosity for the May, Baby Shower, and then again in October during their Baby Bottle Campaign. Each October we tell you of the services that the Center provides, We try to give you insight into a woman experiencing an unexpected pregnancy and the challenges she faces. From the moment a woman reaches out for

help, the Life Center goes into action, making her feel welcome, and helps her with her individual needs. The following article, is from the Life Center News Letter for the Month of July 2018. The article describes those behind the scenes, the Counselors, who will stay with her from the moment she asks for help. They are the ones that sit and listen to her concerns, and open a door to the services the Center will provide until the baby reaches 2 years of age. These are the volunteers that hear the heartbreak, reach out to family and guide her to feel secure that she has made the right decision, bringing her child into the world.

#### NEVER DOUBT THE POWER OF PRAYER (names have changed to protect confidentiality)

"It was a hot and humid day Samantha was in our reception area waiting to be seen. I brought her into our consulting room and offered her a cold cup of water. Samantha smiled as she accepted my offer. As she drank her water, she told me she wanted to take a pregnancy test kit now. Usually, we talk with the client before the pregnancy test kit, but I made an exception seeing how adamant she was in taking the pregnancy test kit immediately. I showed Samantha the bathroom and gave her the pregnancy test kit. When she returned to the consulting room she was extremely anxious and angry. She said the test was positive and showed it to me. She said she suspected that she might be pregnant. She continued to tell me that she already had four children, with the youngest being less than 1 year. She said her boyfriend did not want another child. She also shared that she had housing problems and was not working at the time. She said, "No way am I having this baby."

I tried to calm her fears, but she did not want to talk. She said she did not want to hear any more as she made up her mind. As she got up to leave, I looked at her and said I would keep her and the baby in my prayers. Giving no response, she left. I felt helpless as I watched her walk out the door. I said a silent prayer and put her in our Lord's loving hands. Over the following weeks, I tried reaching out to her, but she would not take my calls, nor call me back. Wondering if her child was another tragic victim of the abortion industry filled my heart with sadness, but I continued to pray for both of them.

Recently, I was in my office, when I was asked to come down to the reception area because someone wanted to talk to me. It was Samantha. I did not know what to expect, but her eyes filled with tears. Was she hurting because she aborted her baby? If she is, God's mercy is in this room. She told me that when she left our Center, she was determined to abort. But every time she had an appointment, something held her back. She could not go through with it and two months ago she gave birth to a healthy baby girl. She wanted to thank me for not giving up on her. I told her I believed that what kept her from going through with the abortion was the power of prayer being offered for her and her baby. And, somewhere in her despair, she opened herself to God's truth and healing grace.

Samantha was given clothes and diapers and all the needs she required for her baby girl. The day ended with an embrace and a prayer of thanksgiving to God for his mercy and grace.
