

Pastor's Letter

This past week, you may have read or seen the news that Pope Francis has decided to change the



Commission Against the Death Penalty, March 20, 2015 teaching of the Church on the death penalty, which had stated in *The Catechism of The Catholic Church* the following:

2267 Assuming that the guilty party's identity and responsibility have been fully determined, the traditional teaching of the Church does not exclude recourse to the death penalty, if this is the only possible way of effectively defending human lives against the unjust aggressor. If, however, non-lethal means are sufficient to defend and protect people's safety from the aggressor, authority will limit itself to such means, as these are more in keeping with the concrete conditions of the common good and are more in conformity to the dignity of the human person.

Today, in fact, as a consequence of the possibilities which the state has for effectively preventing crime, by rendering one who has committed an offense incapable of doing harm without definitely taking away from him the possibility of redeeming himself - **the cases in which the execution of the**

offender is an absolute necessity "are very rare, if not practically non-existent.

As you can see from this teaching, although the Catholic Church did allow the death penalty if certain conditions were met, it also stated that such conditions were very rare if not practically non-existent. Now, our Holy Father had decided to make Church teaching on the death penalty very clear:

This teaching will now be updated to reflect Pope Francis' teaching that the death penalty will never be acceptable. The Pope explained his decision by saying the death penalty is "inadmissible" because it "attacks" the inherent dignity of the human person.

I think it is good that the Pope has made this ruling although I wonder if it will have much impact on states in our nation that allow the death penalty. Certainly, there are accounts of people who have committed mass murders, including children, acts of violent terrorism that are barbaric, and other evil deeds that lead my heart to cry out for vengeance. If someone in my family was murdered, I may cry out for the death penalty. I am sure many good and intelligent people, including Catholics, will disagree with this new teaching and have good reasons.

- From what I have read and studied on this issue, the death penalty fails to act as a deterrent from
 other criminals committing murder. States with the death penalty do not have a lower percentage
 of murders than do other states.
- The death penalty is more expensive to implement on a prisoner than a life sentence. That may sound surprising but because of all the court appeals that go on for more than a decade that are mostly paid for by the state, the cost of finally executing someone is very expensive.

- With the new evidence that comes forth from DNA testing, there have been several cases of people on death row who were found to be innocent due to this very conclusive evidence. Sad to say, there have been cases of innocent people being executed.
- A key argument for me is the clear fact that wealthy people who commit a murder are far less likely to face the death penalty than a poor murderer. The poor cannot afford expensive lawyers.
- Fortunately, I have never been involved in issues of the death penalty. However, I have found in my life that seeing those who have hurt me suffer does not provide me any true healing.
- Murderers by clear justice should pay for their crimes. Society must be protected from criminals, especially violent ones. We need prisons. We should not be naïve about rehabilitation and paroles. However, in some cases, criminals do change from their violent past. Whether they should get out of prison is to approached with great care for society, the victim's family, and the criminal.

An eye for an eye was the moral code of much of the Old Testament. One cannot read the words of Jesus in the Gospel about *turning the other cheek, loving one's enemy, and what we do to the least of our brothers and sisters, we do to him.* Jesus does not call for an eye for an eye but the law of love. As a New Yorker, you are most likely familiar with the Yiddish word *chutzpah*. The best definition of chutzpah I have heard is that of a man who kills both his parents and asks for mercy because he is an orphan. Well, as I read about Pope Francis and the death penalty, I saw that Andrew Cuomo got involved in the discussion. Full disclosure on my part - I am **not** a fan of the governor who said the following:

The death penalty is a stain on our conscience. Today, in solidarity with Pope Francis and in honor of my father, I will be advancing legislation to remove the death penalty from NY law once and for all. What Chutzpah! This man is perhaps the most active governor in the United States in promoting abortion on demand without any restrictions. He was quoted as saying, people who are against abortion should leave New York State!

Our Holy Father in his decision about the death penalty is affirming that all life, even that of a brutal killer, is a gift from God. Certainly, an infant in the womb is totally innocent and a murderer is not. Still, as a Catholic we stand for life from conception to natural death. We stand with the poor and the weak and the vulnerable.

I admire Pope Francis very much. Some of the things he says disturb me, and I struggle to see if I can accept them. I love Jesus. Some of the things he says challenge me very much and I find very difficult to live. We are all sinners in need of grace.

All babies are precious and wondrous. I have many pictures of myself holding babies, baptizing them, and making the funny faces that all adults do with newborns. I have a picture of myself feeding Thomas, my oldest great nephew who is a now a junior in college, with a bottle. I remember his father saying to me, *Uncle Pat, do you want to feed Thomas?* Who could resist such an invitation? However, I failed to master the skill of burping him, and I was very quick to outsource changing his diapers.

I also had the holy experience of helping my mother drink her *Ensure* when her mind was failing and she had trouble taking in enough nourishment. I have often been in nursing homes, hospitals, and rehab centers and have seen the tender moments of spouses or adult children gently spoon-feeding a loved one with pudding or ice-cream. One cannot help think that when they are helping to feed an infirm parent, that these roles were once reversed many years before and the feeder was the one being fed - the mystery of the cycle of life.

Most of the weddings I have attended have the moment when the bride and groom feed each other with



the wedding cake. Some newlyweds cannot resist the temptation to humorously push the cake in the face of the partner as the crowd laughs and the master of ceremonies makes corny jokes. Although I love funny moments, I think this can truly be a beautiful moment. It can symbolize powerfully that the husband and wife will truly be feeding each other in the marriage in the thousand upon thousands of meals that they will share, their children they will feed, and the distant thought that one day when they are old or sick, they may have to do the same for one another. The wedding

cake is sweet and it suggests the sweetness of marriage when there is genuine sharing of kindness and tenderness toward one another.

Chapter six in the Gospel of John is called *The Bread of Life Discourse*. Unlike the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, John does not tell the story of the Last Supper. Jesus' words about the meaning of the Eucharist are found in chapter six of his Gospel. Last week we heard about the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. This week, the people who experienced that miracle are searching for Jesus because they are seeking to make him their king. They want a king who will feed them with bread and fish so they never have to worry about being hungry again.


I read that the expression *a chicken in every pot* goes back to the 1928 presidential campaign of Herbert Hoover. A circular published by the Republican Party claimed that if Herbert Hoover won, there would be *a chicken in every pot and a car in every garage*. He was elected president on that promise and in the first year of his presidency, the Great Depression of 1929 began! As we hear this Gospel, Jesus and his questioners are speaking on two different levels and the hearers are not getting what he is saying. They want to be fed with bread that satisfies human hunger. Jesus, as he speaks about feeding the people with food, is clearly talking about the Bread of Life, the Eucharist, as spiritual food that sustains us and gives us a path to God in this life and the next. Someone from the crowd asked the question: *What can we do to accomplish the works of God?* Jesus answered, *this is the work of God - that you believe in the one he sent.* The purpose of the food that Jesus offers is that you will believe in the one who sent him. You will deepen your faith that it is Jesus, God's Son, who was sent by the Father with the words of eternal life.

A couple of years ago, we had a very fine mission given to us by Father Kevin MacDonald, CSsR, a Redemptorist who was stationed here at St. Martin's for several years. He gave a wonderful talk on this Gospel calling us to be Eucharist, the Bread of Life, for one another. I have heard several parishioners refer to this talk and I think about it myself. We are what we eat - when we eat the Bread of Life at Mass and Jesus truly becomes part of us; when we seek to follow Jesus by being kind and compassionate to others; when we seek to forgive rather than to be angry; when we feed one another with kind and gentle words rather than negativity and gossip; when we respect those with whom we may disagree, we become Eucharist to them because we are feeding them with Jesus' love. *Wherever there is love, there is God.*

I love the movie *It's a Wonderful Life.* Through his work at the Savings and Loan, George Bailey helps ordinary people to have the opportunity to buy simple homes they can call their own. In one scene George and his wife Mary come to the housewarming for the Martini family who just moved into their first ever home. The Bailey's give them gifts with the following words: *Bread...that this house may never know hunger. Salt...that life may always have flavor, and wine...that joy and prosperity may reign forever.* Our Lord Jesus gives us himself in the Eucharist that we may share his love with one another.

Each day we watch, hear or read of the division we are facing here in our beloved America. We are facing cruel actions and hearing cruel words spoken out of fear, some from feelings of injustice, and others maybe, for political reasons. It seems there are few places we can escape to for peace of mind and heart. So, may we reach out for guidance, hope and love in prayer.



Lord, we pray for the power to be gentle, the strength to be forgiving; the patience to be understanding; and the endurance to accept the consequences of holding to what we believe to be right. May we put our trust in the power of good to overcome evil and the power of love to overcome hatred.

We pray for the vision to see and the faith to believe in a world emancipated from violence, a new world where fear shall no longer lead men to commit injustice, nor selfishness make them bring suffering to others. Help us to devote our whole life and thought and energy to the task of making peace, praying always for the inspiration and the power to fulfill the destiny for which we and all men were created.


served here at St. Martin's for the past thirty years.
