Pastor's Letter

Last Tuesday, I met three Redemptorists friends of mine in the city. We had a nice Italian dinner with a very lively conversation that moved from Redemptorist news, to politics, to books, to our ministries, our families and sports. We then went to see a wonderful production of the classic musical *My Fair Lady* at Lincoln Center. One of the fellows had a car and offered to drop me off at Penn Station so I could get the LIRR. As I arrived at the station, I longed for something to drink and I decided on a big bottle of water. As I went to pay for it, I reached for my wallet and it was not in my pocket. Naturally, I panicked. I knew when I last had it and began to assume it fell out of my pocket when I got out of the back seat of the car. I rushed up 33rd Street to 9th Avenue at 11:00 p.m. in hopelessness and despair. Adding to the depth of my depression was the fact that I had just recently lost my wallet a few weeks ago. I thought the Redemptorists might feel the need to assign a caretaker for me.

Suddenly, I had some hope! Maybe it fell *in* the car as I was getting out. I called one of my friends who was in the car. Immediately, it went to voice mail. I called a second friend, also in the car, only to hear his upbeat, cheery voice message. I was in **no** mood for that happy voice. I must have called them both about ten times to no avail. Finally, broken and battered, a man without hope, I boarded the train for Bethpage. Luckily, my train ticket was on my phone or I might still be at Penn Station!

Alleluia! My cell phone rang; one of the fellows called back. They found the wallet in the car! I instantly moved from the darkness of despair to gleeful joy. As the tune from My Fair Lady rang in my head, I could have danced, danced all night through the train car! Now, I am thinking of getting one of those heavy chains, like those used by motorcycle gangs, that tie your wallet to your belt. That just might be a good look for me.

I tell this story in light of our first reading about the depression of the great prophet Elijah. We read: Elijah went a day's journey into the desert, until he came to a broom tree and sat beneath it. He prayed for death saying: "This is enough, O LORD! Take my life, for I am no better than my fathers." Elijah is one sad man. As you know, suicide and the wish to die is no laughing matter. Tragically, many families are devastated by suicide. He wants to die. Elijah was a great prophet who had done great things for the Lord. Now, he is in a most difficult situation. Ahab is a weak king of the Israelites. This king is leading the people astray from the Lord. Worse than that, he is married to a very ambitious queen named Jezebel, a name synonymous with treachery and betrayal. She is determined to lead the entire Jewish nation astray to pagan worship and to destroy the covenant with God. She is seeking to have Elijah hunted down and killed. So, you can see why the prophet is on the point of despair.

However, an angel of God has come to the despairing prophet with warm bread and cold water. The angel speaks to Elijah: an angel touched him and ordered him to get up and eat. Elijah looked and there at his head was a hearth cake and a jug of water. After he ate and drank, he lay down again. This happens a second time with the bread and water as the angel says: "Get up and eat, else the journey will be too long for you!" He got up, ate, and drank; then strengthened by that food, he walked forty days and forty nights to the mountain of God. God, through his angel, has given not only physical food but renewed his strength to go and be faithful.

Depression is a very real issue in the lives of many of us and something that is not easily overcome. People who are severely depressed can only see darkness and struggle to face a new day. Well-meaning friends and family tell them to *snap out of it! Cheer up!* There is nothing more they wish than that, but they are unable. So, if you are one of the many people in our society who suffer what is often a combination of a physical and emotional illness, do not be afraid to admit that and seek help. Your angel may well be a good doctor or therapist. Do not carry the darkness alone.

Many of us may have occasional periods of sadness and struggles, and that is part of the normal reality of living. We can get upset and angry about politics, our health, our family, our church. It is said that some forms of depression are angers turned inward. We all have our Elijah moments where we seek to sit under a tree, or lay in a bed, or watch endless hours of television with little energy. Sometimes, we need the help of a professional. Other times, we can turn to our friends and family for support. We can choose to get involved in some activity in the community or parish. We may not feel like it, but it does help.

Certainly, it is very clear that the liturgy invites us to ponder the story of the darkness of Elijah in light

of the Holy Eucharist. God has given us this Gift of Himself to help us and strengthen us for the journey of life. The Body and Blood of Jesus is food for the journey. Jesus does not take away all our problems and challenges, but faith speaks to us that He is with us and we are not alone. So, you and I come to this table with our wounds and discouragements, as well as our joys.



As we receive our food for the journey at this Mass, we hear: "Get up and eat, else the journey will be too long for you! He got up, ate, and drank; then strengthened by that food, he walked forty days and forty nights to the mountain of God, Horeb." 2 Kings 19:4-8

t our parish church here at St. Martin's, like other Catholic Churches, we regularly celebrate the gifts of the sacraments that God has given us. Each of the seven sacraments are deeply spiritual moments where we encounter the Lord Jesus in a very special way. The sacraments make Jesus present to us in words and symbols.

The first sacrament we receive is **Baptism.** We receive it only once and it marks us forever as a follower of Jesus. We baptize because Jesus told us to *go out to all the world and baptize people in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit.* We celebrate baptisms twice a month at our parish and at the Easter Vigil.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation, popularly called confession, is the sacrament of forgiveness of sins. The priest, representing Jesus and the Church, forgives us our confessed sins. Jesus gave us this sacrament on the first Easter Sunday night, when Jesus told the apostles *to forgive sins in his name*. We celebrate this sacrament here in our parish on Saturdays.

The Holy Eucharist is the most celebrated sacrament in our Church with our regular schedule of eight weekend masses, two daily masses, and masses for funerals, weddings and other special moments. Jesus gave us this great sacrament at the Last Supper with the words, *Take and eat; this is my body. Take and drink; this is my blood. Do this in memory of me*. What greater gift could God give us than that of himself?


Confirmation is a sacrament of the Holy Spirit. In all the sacraments, the working of the Holy Spirit is present, but there is a very special focus on the Holy Spirit when we celebrate confirmation. Usually, a bishop is the celebrant of confirmation, but priests can get permission at special times such as at the Easter Vigil. We celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation usually two or three times a year - once with the bishop confirming our young people, at the Easter Vigil and during the Easter Season. Jesus promised he would send the Holy Spirit to us.

The Sacrament of the Sick is exactly what its name implies. Jesus often healed the sick. This sacrament is for those who are suffering serious spiritual, psychological, or physical concerns, including dealing with the challenges of aging. We celebrate this sacrament in the church communally several times a year. We also anoint anyone at their homes, in the hospital, or here at the rectory for anyone who requests this beautiful sacrament.

Our parish concelebrates the **Sacrament of Matrimony** throughout the year. God gave us the gift of marriage as he called his followers to be faithful, committed, and open to life and love all the days of their lives when they marry. Jesus taught us that *what God has joined, let no one divide*.

Last Saturday, our parish church, I believe, had its first ever experience of celebrating **Holy Orders.** This is the sacrament in which men are called to serve the church and her people as deacons, priests, or bishops. Michael Cunningham, a member of our parish, was ordained a deacon by Bishop John Barres. Michael is a Redemptorist who will be ordained a priest in the coming year. Usually, ordinations are held at the cathedral of a diocese, but Bishop Barres graciously allowed Michael to be ordained at his home parish. It was a wonderful moment in the life of St. Martin's and all who attended were very moved by the ceremony.



DOMESTIC VIOLENCE is characterized as a pattern of coercive behaviors including repeated beatings or threats of violence, verbal and psychological abuse, forced sex, deprivation, control of family possessions, and progressive isola-



tion. Here are some ways to know you are a domestic violence victim: **YOUR PARTNER:** calls you names, puts you down, humiliates you, hits you, intimidates you, shouts, isolates you from friends and family, shows unreasonable jealousy or possessiveness, withholds money, forces you to have sex or perform sexual acts. If you are being treated this way, in whole or part, you may be a victim of domestic abuse. You need not be alone.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ARE A VICTIM OF DOMESTIC ABUSE - CALL 24 hr. Hotline 516 542 0404. Our experienced counselors will help you get through a crisis and connect you with the services you need. INFORMATION IS CONFIDENTIAL. WE OFFER: COUNSELING FOR ADULTS AND CHILDREN. DATING VIOLENCE. ELDER ABUSE. EMERGENCY ROOM ADVOCACY. Trained volunteer advocates are available to support and meet victims as all hospitals in Nassau County emergency rooms. They offer information and assistance and will escort the victims through the health procedures. Emergency Room assistance is available in Nassau County for victims of DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, RAPE and SEXUAL ABUSE.

The Safe Center LI offers free, confidential, extensive resources and referrals, can provide emergency and transitional house and legal advocacy. Child Advocacy Center of Nassau County: The home for the Multidisciplinary Teams of investigators from Nassau County (Police Detectives, Child Protective Services, District Attorney and Nassau University Medical Center) to enhance prosecutions of offenders, Legal Services Center, services in Nassau County Courts to victims.

SAFETY PLAN. As soon as possible, develop a safety plan, if you are still in the relationship. Think of a safe place to go if an argument occurs - avoid rooms with no exits (bathroom) or rooms with weapons (kitchens). Think about and make a list of safe people to contact and keep it in a safe place. Memorize all important numbers. Make copies of all important papers: ID, Social Security cards, health insurance card, passport, birth certificate, etc. and KEEP THEM IN A SAFE PLACE. Establish a CODE WORD or SIGN so that family, friends, teachers or co-workers know when to call for help. IF YOU ARE THINK-ING OF LEAVING THE RELATIONSHIP, KEEP IN MIND THAT THIS CAN BE A TIME OF INCREASED DANGER. To optimize EXITING SAFELY, you can call the HOTLINE to discuss options to get safety planning information specific to your situation.
