The Pastor's Letter



Last Saturday, for the first time in my 43 years of being a Catholic priest, I celebrated an interfaith wedding outside of a Catholic Church, sharing the ceremony with Irene, a Jewish cantor. It was a truly moving experience for me. Close family friends asked me if I could be the celebrant of the wedding. The Catholic Church may give a dispensation to a Catholic to marry outside of a church if the person of the other faith has good reasons such as he/she feels their faith and beliefs are sacred to them and they desire them to be honored in a setting other than a Catholic Church. I know this may raise the question why the Catholic Church will not allow two Catholics to get married

at the beach or at the family home. The present norm makes sense to me (unless there is some very compelling reason such as a serious illness) since the church, to my mind, is the proper setting for two Catholics, however beautiful the beach or home. Certainly, we also welcome marriage where one partner is a non-Catholic.

I joked that I almost got married at this wedding because before the ceremony began, I bumped into the table that was holding the glass that was to be broken by the couple at the end of the ceremony. Although I managed to spill some water, gratefully the wedding glass remained intact. The ceremony went smoothly after this initial potential disaster. The cantor, a friend of the bride's family, had done such ceremonies before and she could not have been more welcoming and kind to me. As cantor, Irene sang some prayers in Hebrew as she explained well the Jewish rituals that we were observing. She had a beautiful voice and some of my friends teased me that they were grateful that I did not sing! We had two beautiful readings, one from the Old Testament and the other from the New Testament that spoke eloquently about the gift of love that God has given us in our hearts to share with one another. I gave a homily and received the wedding vows. As the newly married couple broke that glass that had survived my bump, I joined in on an enthusiastic *Mazel Tov!* Throughout the lovely reception, in which I danced a very moving *hokey pokey*, many people, both Christians and Jews, came to me and thanked me for the role that I had played in the service. I am sure they did the same for Irene.

As I participated in sharing the ceremony with Irene, I was struck by the rich bond of faith that truly exists between the Jewish faith and Catholic religion. Saint John Paul II called the Jewish people *our older brothers in faith* and Pope Francis used the term *Our Big Brothers*. Catholics are strongly encouraged to have a profound respect for the Jewish people; we share such a common heritage since the Jewish people are the Chosen People, and Jesus, the Blessed Mother and the apostles were Jewish.

Quite honestly, Christians have not always been respectful of the Jewish faith and even our former liturgy contained hurtful words toward the Jewish people. Far worse than that, were the persecutions that were tolerated and even called for by the Catholic Church during the past two millennia. It is fair to say that even some of the roots of the Holocaust can be found in the dark prejudice of some Christians toward Jews through the centuries. I read this article last Tuesday and was touched by it very much, especially in light of my recent wedding experience. Here is part of it the article:

The Catholic Church rooted out anti-Semitism — it can do the same for abuse by Gil Troy (Here is the link to the entire article https://nypost.com/2018/09/03/the-catholic-church-rooted-out-antisemitism-it-can-do-the-same-for-abuse/)

As a traditional Jew who feels blessed by my heritage, I empathize with my Catholic friends as the Church they revere convulses with scandal. My heart, naturally, hemorrhages with the victims. My head cannot fathom how men of the cloth could be so monstrous. But my soul also aches with the betrayed believers, those who trusted the institution, only to see so many supposed Guardians of the Faith act wickedly — as serial criminals or co-conspirators covering up multiple crimes.

Some might expect me to channel my grandfather with an "I told you so." Growing up in Poland, he hated the Church for its aggressive, pervasive, often-sadistic anti-Semitism. If he were alive, he would connect the sins of the American pederasts with the sins of the European Jew-haters. Fortunately, the Church evolved. Half-a-century ago, Vatican II sought "mutual respect and understanding" between Catholics and Jews. Today, the state of Israel protects Jews, while the Catholic Church stopped preying on them. The result is Jews like me who see a different side of Catholicism.

Starting in the 1960s, the Church started purging anti-Semitism theologically — viewing Jews as brothers, not Christ-killers; liturgically — cutting the word "faithless" (perfidis) from the Good Friday Prayer for the Jews; institutionally — creating the International Catholic-Jewish Liaison Committee and the International Jewish Committee for Interreligious Consultations; and symbolically — with Pope John XXIII and Pope John Paul II, in particular, blessing Jews, attending synagogues, visiting Auschwitz, belatedly recognizing Israel. This spiritual root canal was long, spasmodic, controversial and painful — the Church long resisted acknowledging its systemic passivity during the Holocaust. But with leadership and vision, the Church changed then, as it must change now.

The last sentence of Troy's article is very hopeful to us Catholics today. He calls us to continue to root out the terrible evil of clergy abuse as we have sought to do quite well with seeking to end institutional Catholic prejudice toward our Jewish family in faith.

September is PAD and Atrial Fibrillation Awareness Month

Atrial fibrillation is the most common type of irregular heartbeat and is a leading risk factor for stroke. Peripheral Arterial Disease (PAD) is a vascular condition related to heart disease and stroke. What do they both have in common? They are both detectable with simple, painless screening.

This is why St Martin of Tours Parish St Alphonsus Hall is hosting Life Line Screening, the nation's leading provider of preventive health screenings on <u>Friday</u>, <u>September 14</u>, <u>2018</u>. The screenings provided focus on vascular disease, including atrial fibrillation and peripheral arterial disease.

Other tests check for abdominal aortic aneurysms and PAD, also called "hardening of the arteries" in the legs. A bone density screening to assess osteoporosis risk is also offered and is appropriate for both men and women.
