The Pastor's Letter

Dear Parishioners,

One of my final goals here for our parish before I leave in August of 2019 is to have ALPHA well established in our parish. I believe in it very much as a tool that will deepen our own faith in God, and one that will help us to continue to invite others to come to know Jesus. The parish has already had two ALPHAS, and we are presently working on a third. It would be my dream that we have at least two a year in the years to come.

We have had a very fine response in our call for volunteers to assist, as well as in our invitations to attend ALPHA as a participant. There are many volunteer roles and even if you can only help once, it would be great. A key part of ALPHA is the simple meal that opens the session. When we first started ALPHA, I questioned the importance of having a meal. I felt that it took time, effort and resources to create a meal for 30 or so people. Why not let them eat at home and then come? I was so wrong (I am use to that experience). A meal creates a beautiful and warm atmosphere. How often we see Jesus eating meals with others in the Gospels. I love the Scripture text from the Easter Emmaus Gospel: They recognized him in the breaking of the bread. The shared meal is an essential part of the ALPHA experience and it so helps create a communal spirit.

So, to help our parish grow in ALPHA and allow people to experience this opportunity of God's grace, I am asking if you might consider sponsoring a meal. There is no charge to make ALPHA so the meals have to be provided by the parish. I believe in this investment but it would help if it could be shared among us.

If you or a group of you are willing to prepare one meal that would feed about 30-35 people (we do not yet have a final count), it would be a great blessing. The meal is simple: perhaps a salad, a tasty but inexpensive main course and a light dessert.

Another way you can support an ALPHA meal is to financially sponsor a meal with a donation of \$100.00. Our ALPHA team will then buy a meal that will work for us from a local restaurant. There are ten opportunities to do this before Thanksgiving, and we will do all we can to make it as user friendly for you, such as picking up the meal at your home and bringing it to St. Alphonsus Hall, and giving you suggestions for what type of meal you might consider preparing. You are welcome to make your donation in memory of someone, in the name of a group or a particular person.

I continue to be amazed and ever grateful for your ongoing financial support of our parish in the regular collection, in our fundraisers, and in our call to help those in need who are facing emergencies (such as your recent great support of the people of Kerala, India). I am reluctant to ask you for financial help because I do not want to burden you since I know how much you do already. But, because I would love to see ALPHA as a project of the entire parish, I am asking you to consider this request. Thank you as always for your prayers and support of all we do at St. Martin's. I recall a professor I had in the seminary who was a very fine man. He had an interesting style of giving a Sunday sermon. He would tell us what he was **not** going to speak about. So, he spoke a bit about the first reading and then he would do the same for the next two readings. Each little snapshot about the reading would end with his saying that he was not going to speak on it. By the time he finished telling us what he was not going to speak on, he looked at his watch, saw that he had been speaking for a good while, and sat down. We never did hear what he wanted to speak on but we did get three

mini-homilies. I feel a bit like that. I prayed and studied the three Scripture readings for today. In our first reading the prophet Isaiah speaks about his suffering. Scholars tell us that he is also speaking about all the suffering of the Jewish people at that time. Since we all face suffering in our lives, this is certainly a powerful theme to ponder. In the Gospel, Jesus asks Peter and the other apostles a key question of the Gospels: *Peter, who do you say that I am?* Certainly, that question is most important for us all to ask ourselves. Who is Jesus? What difference does he make in our lives? However key these themes are, I was struck by the words of St. James in our second reading. The words we heard today have and continue to be debated through the centuries. They have led to Christians being divided, wars being fought, and people being killed in the name of God. St. James asks: *What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone says he has faith but does not have works? Can that faith save him?*

Misinterpretations and sin on the part of many people of faith in the early 16th century led to the Protestant Reformation whose 500th anniversary was commemorated last year. Martin Luther, a Catholic monk, was so disturbed by the theological interpretations of these words and by a great deal of corruption in the Church that he began a revolution that led to a major split in Christianity that continues to this day. Luther believed that this text and many practices of the Catholic Church put too much stress on doing good works and not enough on the truth that we are saved only by the grace of God revealed to us in his death and resurrection. The pope at the time, Leo X, had a major project going on with the building of St. Peter's Basilica and there was a priest named Father John Tetzel who was preaching that you could save your soul and those of your family by doing the good work of donating money and gaining powerful indulgences. The Catholic Church believes in indulgences but they are not for sale, nor do they guarantee salvation. Luther eventually left the church and started Lutheranism. The reformation in 1520 led to many other groups breaking off from Catholicism into other denominations such Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist and Baptist.

Martin Luther stressed the Bible very much and Catholics throughout the centuries focus on the Eucharist. I think this is one of the reasons that many Catholics feel that they have a weak background in the Holy Bible. Most Protestant denominations slowly moved away from the belief of the Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist. Protestants began to hold their services in the language of the people rather than in Latin. Luther believed that each person had the right to interpret the Bible as he or she believed and rejected the pope and the priesthood as we know it. Since Luther focused so much on the power of God's grace, he dismissed the intercessory role of the Blessed Mother and the saints. So, Catholics and Protestants argued and debated, fought wars and condemned one another. This went on for almost 450 years. That is quite a fight. When I was growing up, we felt that it was a sin to visit a Protestant Church. We also would not allow a Christian of another faith to get married in the sanctuaries of our churches. I would make a comparison to a family or a friend who had a terrible fight with the other.

Sometimes, it takes years for reconciliation and sometimes it never occurs. However, the Council of Vatican II stressed the need to reach out to other Christians and to work for unity where possible. We know Jesus prayed for unity...that they may all be one. Almost 450 years later, we Catholics have accepted some of the changes that Luther called for such as having our Mass in the language of the people and a stress on the Bible. So where are we today in this story? Here is quote from a recent article:

One of the greatest rifts in Christianity — between Catholics and Lutherans — isn't what it used to be. As a sign of those much improved relations, Pope Francis is traveling Monday to Sweden, an overwhelmingly Lutheran country, to kick off a yearlong commemoration of the Protestant Reformation that split the churches 500 years ago. There are still many issues that Catholics and Protestants do not agree on, and some of them are very significant. I believe that Catholicism, in spite of its struggles and failures, is the true faith given to us by Jesus Christ. Yet, we still seek to respect the beliefs of other faith traditions, especially Christians with whom we share the profound bond of belief that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. After a long period of meetings, the Vatican and leaders of the Lutheran Church have agreed that we are only saved by the grace of God. We do not save ourselves, but are saved by the Blood of the Lamb - Jesus Christ. At the same time, when we experience God's grace, it leads us to do good works and to seek to be merciful and forgiving of others. I think of the Blessed Mother, whom the Archangel Gabriel called full of grace. The grace of God in the heart of Mary leads her to action by going to visit her pregnant cousin, Elizabeth. I think of a saying I often heard when I was a student. Pray as if everything depended on God and study as if everything depended on you. If there is someone in your life that you cannot forgive, pray for that grace. But be careful of what you pray for because God will give you that grace and you then must move on toward mercy.

We are utterly dependent on the grace of God, and his grace is always amazingly abundant. When God comes into your life, it shows in action. When my sister Gerry died in 1983 in her early forties, it was devastating for all our family. I said her funeral Mass, but felt too emotional to preach a homily so my dear friend, Father John McGowan gave a very consoling homily. Gerry loved Irish step-dancing so John focused on the hymn, *The Lord of the Dance*. I always remember a line he quoted from the poet W.H. Auden, when grace comes, you have to dance. When grace comes into our lives, we dance by doing good works.



ANOTHER LOOK AT ABORTION - U.S.C.C.B.

From your first moments of existence, you had all the DNA that would determine your SEX, FACIAL FEATURES,



PHYSIQUE and the COLOR OF YOUR SKIN, HAIR and EYES. At 24 days, your HEART BE-GAN BEATING. By 8 weeks, all your organs were present, and your unique fingerprints were forming. ULTRASOUNDS show that by 18 weeks, you could SWIM, SOMER-SAULT, SUCK YOUR THUMB and even COVER YOUR EARS if you heard loud music. If you'd been BORN JUST 23 WEEKS after CONCEPTION, your chance of survival would be 50 - 80 percent, by 25 weeks, it's over 90 percent, and that is still months before full-term birth.

Now, if someone takes an innocent person's life after he or she is born, it's AGAINST THE LAW, just MINUTES BEFORE BIRTH, it's LEGAL in most states and called ABORTION. The only real difference is a declaration by the United States Supreme Court in ROE V. WADE (1973). ABORTION is Permitted Up To FULL-TERM BIRTH. Many people don't realize how unrestricted legal abortion is, misled by Roe's claim that states may ban abortions after viability "except when it is necessary to preserve the life or health of the mother." (Viability) is when the baby has a reasonable chance of survival outside the womb. But in Roe's companion case, Doe v. Bolton, the Court defined "health" to include "all factors - Physical, Emotional, Psychological, Familial, and the Woman's Age -relevant to the wellbeing" of the mother. That seems broad enough to permit virtually any abortion post-viability. The Supreme Court, however, has yet to be confronted with a challenge to a post-viability ban that will test Doe's breadth. Indeed, 20 states currently ban late-term abortions subject to a narrow exception for the mother's life or physical health (not for Emotional, Psychological, Familial, or Age-Related reasons). Most of these laws have gone unchallenged, but they are hard to enforce even if they are constitutionally permissible. (Next week's article will be a continuation of the U.S.C.C.B.'s discussion of this important topic).

The author of the book GOSNELL and film makers Phelim McAllen and Ann McElhinney: the movie is rated PG 13 despite the horrific subject matter, because filmmakers took pains to avoid being too explicit, executive producer John Sullivan told *Hollywood Reporter*.
