The Pastor's Letter

For the past several weeks, many of us have been disturbed by the process of nominating a Supreme

For you formed my inward parts; you knitted me together in my mother's womb. I praise you, for I am fearfully and wonderfully made. - Psalm 139:13-14a Court Justice. Feelings on all sides of the issue were both passionate and angry. I have no doubt that almost all of you have your own strong opinions about what you witnessed. I found the Senate hearing where both Dr. Christine Blasey Ford and Judge Brett Kavanaugh were interviewed led me to feel great compassion for both of them. Both swore under oath about what might or might not have happened more than thirty six years ago. I wonder if we will ever know the full facts of each one's testimony.

Certainly, in addition, there were many other key issues and questions that continue to reverberate in our nation: was a woman's charge of sexual abuse not taken seriously; was an innocent man and his family destroyed over politics; was the media fair to both Dr. Ford and Judge Kavanaugh; was President Trump respectful of Dr. Ford; were the Democrats in the Senate respectful to Judge Kavanaugh. I am sure these and many other questions will continue to haunt us.

Without taking a sides, I am convinced that the underlying issue, the foundation of much of the debate, was the issue of abortion. Many feel that the Supreme Court may seek to limit abortions in our nation. Many others feel that the court has moved from interpreting laws to making laws. The debate about legal abortions has gone on for many decades and reached its apex with the Roe v Wade decision in 1973 that legalized abortion in the United States. In the 19th century, we had an ongoing debate about slavery that ultimately led to the Civil War. Many of us lived through the very intense and at times violent arguments about civil rights as well as the Vietnam War. Today, there are strong feelings about immigration, health care, and the economy, but I believe that there is no greater cultural divide in our nation than in the issues of the protection of human life.

Whenever I discuss prolife and abortion topics, I offer a word of hope to anyone reading this who might have been involved in an abortion. Abortion is against the law of God. Yet, no one should ever believe that they are outside the mercy of God. God is a God of mercy and many women and men who have been involved in abortions need healing from emotional and spiritual devastations. There are excellent programs offered that seek to bring about such healing that are both spiritual and psychological in nature.

Also, although the right to life is the most basic of all rights, it is important to realize that being pro-life means that I am *also* concerned about the poor, victims of war, those who are most vulnerable in our society, the dying, those on death row. *All* human life is precious to God and to us. As Catholics we believe strongly that abortion is against the fifth commandment "thou shall not kill" and is a serious breach of God's law. God is the giver of life. Assisted suicide is also on the rise and again. We believe that only *God* can decide when it is our time to go home to Him. No one is obliged to use all sorts of highly advanced medical technology to stay alive, **but** no one is to take any direct action that leads to taking one's own life or that of another person. There are those who challenge the Catholic Church on its pro-life teachings and say that we are only concerned about life in the womb. Once they baby is born, the child and family is forgotten. That is a life that flies in the face of what we are doing here in our parish with the baby bottle campaign that raises money to help families who are pregnant and those with newborns to have the resources to provide for the care of the baby.

Abortion is clearly a moral issue that is very important in the teaching of the Catholic Church. There are those who will say that you should not impose your beliefs on me. However, abortion is also a legal issue. Our Declaration of Independence states: that all people are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, among them are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. There is nothing more basic than the very right to life. What is the right of a newly conceived person? Does a six month old baby in the womb have any legal rights or a nine month old child about to be born? The cry we hear is that it is my body and I have a right to do with it as I wish. The rights of a baby in the womb is an issue that is not just for religious people. It is about the civil right of the child in the womb.

I remember receiving a Christmas card with the image of the couple's first child. It is hard to look at a sonogram and not see a separate person that should have the same rights as you and I. The refrain of John Denver's song *I Want to Live* captures the yearning for life:

> I want to live/I want to grow/I want to see/I want to know I want to share what I can give/I want to be/I want to live

I love the words of the prophet Jeremiah: "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you; before you came to birth I consecrated you; I appointed you as prophet to the nations."

ROME — Thirty-eight years after being gunned down in a hospital church in El Salvador, <u>Archbishop Óscar Romero</u> was named a saint on Sunday to cheers in St. Peter's Square, while thousands watched the ceremony on video monitors in the Salvadoran capital. Pope Francis also canonized <u>Pope Paul VI</u>, who is credited with continuing the work begun by Pope John XXIII and bringing the church into the modern era with reforms wrought from the Second Vatican Council in the 1960s.


In his homily, Francis said Archbishop Romero "left the security of the world, even his own safety, in order to give his life according to the Gospel, close to the poor and to his people." Of the pope, he said, "Even in the midst of tiredness and misunderstanding, Paul VI bore witness in a passionate way to the beauty and the joy of following Christ totally. "In all, Francis canonized seven people at the ceremony, which was attended by 70,000 people in St. Peter's Square, according to the Vatican.

On Sunday, Francis wore the bloodstained cincture of the martyred archbishop, who was killed by a rightwing death squad on March 24, 1980, while celebrating Mass. The pope also used a cloak, staff and chalice belonging to Pope Paul VI. "Paul VI spent his life for Christ's Gospel, crossing new boundaries and becoming its witness in proclamation and in dialogue, a prophet of a Church turned outward, looking to those far away and taking care of the poor," Francis said on Sunday.

Archbishop Romero's path to sainthood was strewn with obstacles, including strong opposition from some in the church to what were perceived as his political motivations. Those reservations had sidelined previous attempts by his supporters to have him recognized by the Vatican. For decades, Archbishop Romero's legacy was obstructed because several powerful prelates saw him as a proponent of liberation theology, a movement focused on the poor that had been spawned by the church's discussions on social justice in the 1960s. For conservatives, the movement was a thinly veiled adaptation of Marxist ideology manipulated by communists to foment revolution in Latin America. "Romero wasn't communist; he wasn't a man of the guerrilla; he was a pastor," said Archbishop Vincenzo Paglia, the president of the Vatican's Pontifical Academy for Life and the promoter of the archbishop's cause. "And yet he was accused of being political, just as Jesus was," he said. He noted that it was "extraordinary" that: "Romero and Paul VI are being canonized together because, in effect, it is like theory and practice, uniting in one, and that is a great truth for today, putting the poor and the weakest first," he said. About 70,000 people attended the ceremony on Sunday at St. Peter's Square, the Vatican said. In an interview, Archbishop Paglia said that Pope John Paul II had come to understand Archbishop Romero's message. "We have to reclaim Romero, he is ours, he belongs to the church," he recalled John Paul II saying. Benedict XVI cleared the path to Archbishop Romero's sainthood shortly before resigning in 2013.

"As a pastor, he understood that to enact the Gospel was to serve the poor, and he put the church at the service of the people," Father Sandoval said, adding that the archbishop had followed in the footsteps of Paul VI, "a courageous and free pontiff who understood and supported Romero." "They were the movers at the time," he said. To suppress the movement, he noted, their opponents had a simple tactic: "Kill the priests." He added, "Hopefully, Romero will serve to be a pastoral model for the bishops of Latin America." Karina Morey and Renee Workman, both 15, had traveled to Rome from Fairfax, Va., to pay homage to their Catholic school's namesake: Paul VI. The pope's message still resonated with young people, they said. "It's progressive and present," said Ms. Morey. Ms. Workman said, "We look to him to see how we should act like Christians."

If I say the name Lebron to you, I am sure almost everybody who is here tonight at Mass would know that I am referring to Lebron James, now of the Los Angeles Lakers, who is considered by most experts to be the best basketball player in the world and an equal to Michael Jordan. I may not agree with all that he does and says but from what I have read he is a good man who loves his family and is supportive of various charities. It is against my principles to speak well about any of the New York Yankees, but I must confess that Aaron Judge is a wonderful baseball player, and from what I have observed, he seems to be a man, who in spite of his great talents, is very humble and a very good teammate.


I want to read to you a prayer that I read the other day: Dear Lord, thank you so much for the blessings of all my friends, my fans, and my family." Shortly thereafter she said, "Dear Lord, please give me strength to be a winner for all of them and not for myself. Dear Lord, remind me to empower not myself but to empower all those people around me because that is my gift." She then asked God for courage, begging, "Do not let me give in to my own insecurities. Allow me to walk in Your way." Can anyone guess who wrote that prayer? Yes, it was Lady GaGa who went to Catholic school as a teenager and was raised as a Catholic. She said this prayer before she went on stage at for a concert at Madison Square Garden. I saw the movie A Star is Born and she was an excellent actress and sure can sing. Again, I do not agree with everything that she says and does, but God certainly gave her talent and she truly developed it.

Lady GaGa, Lebron James, and Aaron Judge are very popular in our world. Many admire them for their skills and abilities, and we may even wish we had their talents and their money. They are famous and have some qualities we might admire, but in my mind they are not heroes. Being a hero is different than being famous. A hero is someone who is willing to take on great risks and make great sacrifices for others. A hero is someone who follows his or her beliefs even when others make fun of them and ridicule them. I think firefighters and police officers are often heroes since they are willing to risk their lives for the sake of others. I think doctors and nurses who go to poor countries to treat people who have no money are heroes. Your Mom and Dad could be heroes since they make great sacrifices and work so hard to try to help you succeed in life, and love you so very much, even when you are arguing with them. There are lots of ordinary heroes all around us we may not notice; they do so much good for others and they make our world better. They have generous hearts.

Perhaps, you saw the movie *Hacksaw Ridge*. It is an amazing story of a true hero of World War II. Here is a description of the movie: *Hacksaw Ridge* is the true-to-life story of Desmond T. Doss, a devout Seventh-day Adventist Christian whose strongly-held pacifist beliefs are at odds with the war's motives. He was awarded the Medal of Honor when he single-handedly saved the lives of 75 of his fellow soldiers. He was an Army medic who refused to bear arms, much less shoot at the enemy, even while he was saving his comrades under constant enemy fire.

Desmond Doss refused to carry a weapon and the other soldiers called him a coward and a chicken. but he saved 75 of those who ridiculed by his courage and beliefs during a key battle of the war. The Catholic Church has a name for heroes; we call them saints. The saints are men and women who dedicated their lives to following Jesus Christ because he was God's Son. Many of them were persecuted and bullied for being followers of Jesus.

As you prepare for your Confirmation, you will choose a sponsor. Perhaps, you will choose your brother or sister, an aunt or uncle or a friend. Choose a sponsor whom you admire, who has qualities that you want to follow in your own life. You will choose a Confirmation name; choose a saint or virtue that you want to have in your own life, a person who can be your personal hero. You will do community service since we are asking you to be followers of Jesus, to be a kind of hero who is willing to sacrifice for others. Whenever you see a hero on television or in your daily life, you are getting a glimpse, a glance at the source of all courage and heroes: Jesus Christ. He was both God and man. He loved us so much that he gave his life on the cross for each one of us. There is no one greater to follow than Jesus Christ, the Son of God.



RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

The month of October is annually observed by the Catholic Church in the United States as Respect Life Month. We are called to cherish, defend and protect those who are most vulnerable, from the beginning of life to its end, and at every point in between.

Each week, I write an article about Respecting Life from its beginning in the womb, until the dignity of death, bringing life to it's very end. So many issues to cover! It's amazing that there is never a time that I run out of subjects that touch on the lives of many of us, at one time or another - from Abortion, End of Life Issues, Child Abuse, Spousal Abuse, Bullying, The Death Penalty, Religious Freedom, Assisted Suicide, Suicide, Rachel's Vineyard, Gabriel's Courage, Maternity Residences, Pregnancy Centers, Caregivers, Opioids and our Youth, the list goes on and on.

We are America, we are better than that. November we vote which is our right to change in disagreements.

My 9 year old grandson Liam is in the 4th grade at Holy Family School in Hicksville. He wrote this composition, and I would like to share it with you. October 12, 2018 - Liam's Guidance Entry at Holy Family I think kindness is like dominos - once one falls all the others do. Kindness is important. No one wants to feel bad and no one wants to make anyone feel bad. Most people who aren't kind have experienced some kind of harshness. When you get home say a little prayer for that person. Be kind and pray for the unkind, for they will be healed. Kindness is something you won't see or touch, but it's one of the most important things in the world. Kindness is how you will make your mark. Do someone a favor and be kind.
