The Pastor's Letter

Last Saturday, we were horrified by the murderous shooting of worshippers in Pittsburgh PA at The Tree of Life Synagogue during Shabbat services, killing eleven and wounding six in the deadliest attack on Jews in the history of the United States. All violent acts directed by one person toward another or a group are evil. But, it even becomes more painfully shocking when it occurs in a house of worship as people come to pray and reverence God.

All such attacks toward people are vile, but I believe many people, including myself, feel even a greater sorrow, if that is possible in the face of such darkness, since it involved an assault on the Jewish people. Granted, many ethnic groups and peoples have faced violent prejudice throughout history, but I believe it is fair to say that no particular people have suffered bigotry and hatred more than the Jewish people.

We go to Biblical times and recall the suffering of the Hebrews at the hand of Pharaoh and the Egyptians. They were under the most brutal slavery until God raised up Moses to free the Chosen People. The nation of Israel throughout the Old Testament was always being battered by many stronger nations that surrounded them. As we enter the first century and time of Our Lord Jesus being present on earth, we read in the Gospels and other histories about the cruelty of the Romans to the Jews, oftentimes crucifying great numbers of Jews in a desire to fill them with fear.

The Middle Ages continued to bring forth anti-Semitism in many ways, sad to say, oftentimes at the hands of Christians. The Jews were blamed and targeted as Christ killers. Although some Jewish leaders plotted against Christ, it was the Roman Governor Pontius Pilate who had Jesus crucified. Catholic theology has always taught that Christ died for the sins of all people and that it was the sins of humanity that brought him to the cross. We are sinners.

Many historians see the great evil of the Holocaust having its foundational roots in the anti-Semitism of Christians that was present through the ages. Hitler was certainly no Christian but many Christians were part of this great evil. As a young man, I recall that even some of our liturgical prayers on Good Friday were tainted by a prejudice toward the Jewish people for not accepting Christ as the Messiah.

By the power and grace of the Holy Spirit and the work of Vatican II, our Church has sought to purge out any traces of bigotry toward the Jews in our worship and in our teachings. Anti-Semitism is a sin not to be tolerated in our Catholic community. Several recent popes have asked forgiveness of the Jewish people for our sins of the past. Here is an account of Pope John Paul II, now a canonized saint, asking pardon in the Jubilee Year of 2000:

Saving one of his most audacious initiatives for the twilight of his papacy, John Paul II yesterday attempted to purify the soul of the Roman Catholic Church by making a sweeping apology for 2,000 years of violence, persecution and blunders. From the altar of St Peter's Basilica in Rome he led Catholicism into unchartered territory by seeking forgiveness for sins committed against Jews, heretics, women, Gypsies and native peoples.

Fighting through trembles and slurrings caused by Parkinson's disease, the Pope electrified ranks of cardinals and bishops by pleading for a future that would not repeat the mistakes. "Never again," he said. Centuries of hate and rivalry could not recur in the third millennium. "We forgive and we ask forgiveness. We are asking pardon for the divisions among Christians, for the use of violence that some have committed in the service of truth, and for attitudes of mistrust and hostility assumed towards followers of other religions."

Defying warnings from some theologians that the unprecedented apology would undermine the church's authority, the 79-year-old pontiff asked God to forgive the persecution of the Jews. "We are deeply saddened by the behavior of those who in the course of history have caused these children of yours to suffer, and asking your forgiveness we wish to commit ourselves to genuine brotherhood."

Wearing the purple vestments of Lenten mourning, the Pope sought pardon for seven categories of sin: general sins, sins in the service of truth, sins against Christian unity, against the Jews, against respect for love, peace and cultures, against the dignity of women and minorities, and against human rights. Five Vatican cardinals and two bishops confessed sins on behalf of the church during the ceremony. Cardinal Edward Cassidy who recalled the "sufferings of the people of Israel" asked divine pardon for the "sins committed by not a few Catholics. Yesterday's apology was by far the most sweeping and an unprecedented act for the leader of a major religion. One of the highlights of this year's jubilee, or holy year, was the result of four years' research by a panel of 28 theologians and scholars.

Jesus was Jewish as was the Blessed Mother, St. Joseph, and the Apostles. We hold the Old Testament as the inspired word of God. We pray the same Psalms during Mass as our Jewish brothers and sisters do. Our liturgy flows from the Jewish Passover as the Last Supper was a Passover meal. That is why we use unleavened bread for consecration since the bread at a Passover meal is unleavened. The wine that will be transformed into the Blood of Christ at Mass follows the ritual of the drinking of four cups of wine at Passover. Jesus is the Lamb of sacrifice offered to his Father. So it is clear that our Catholic faith has its roots in the Jewish faith.

It is my conviction that we Catholics seek to root out of our hearts any anti-Semitic feelings. It is good for us to examine our conscience towards any form of prejudice against others of different races, nationalities, cultures, religions, groups, and sexual lifestyles. It is appropriate to disagree with the actions and words of any particular person, but we seek to avoid labeling whole groups of people simply based on who they are.

I will end with the words of the late Mayor Ed Koch:

I have always believed that there is a special bond between Jews and Catholics, and have made it a personal and professional priority to strengthen that bond. In the modern era, the relationship between Jews and Catholics became solidified with Vatican II under Pope John XXIII. More recently, the bond was further strengthened during the reign of Pope John Paul II who made clear his love and respect for the Jewish people by referring to us as the "elder brothers." Pope John Paul II extended Vatican diplomatic recognition to Israel, rejecting the threats of those who he called "Koranic" opponents. His closeness to the Jewish people was demonstrated by his recognition that the special bond that existed between God and the children of Israel is an enduring one.

My special relationship with Cardinal O' Connor is well known in this city. I treasured his friendship and loved him as a brother. His funeral Mass card bearing his picture has remained on my desk since his death, almost eight years ago. I believe that he saved my life. During the corruption crisis I was contemplating suicide and his telephone call one Sunday morning to tell me not to despair, that he knew I was in a state of depression and that he wanted me to know that, as he put it, "Everybody knows you are an honest man," and not involved with those who had engaged in corruption.

Martin was born of pagan parents in what is now Hungary in circa 316 AD, and grew up in Italy. His father was a tribune in the Imperial Horse Guard. Martin was forced at the age of 15 to serve in the cavalry corps of the Roman military as his father. By the time he was 18, Martin is believed to have served in Gaul, and also eventually Milan and Treves. Scholars think he served as part of the emperor's guard.

As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in Amiens, France. The beggar was unclothed and it was very cold. Martin removed his cloak and with his sword, he cut it in half. He gave this half to the beggar and dressed himself in the remnant. That night, Martin had a vision in which Jesus spoke to him while wearing the torn cloak he had given him. When he awoke, the garment was restored. Moved by this vision and apparent miracle, Martin immediately finished his religious instruction and was baptized at the age of 18.

On leaving the Roman army, Martin settled at Poitiers, under the guidance of Bishop Hilary. He became a missionary in the provinces of Pannonia and Illyricum (now in the Balkan Peninsula), where he opposed Arianism, a heresy that denied the divinity of Christ.

first monastery in Gaul.



In 371 he was made bishop of Tours, and outside city he founded another that monastery, Marmoutier, to which he withdrew whenever possible.

As bishop, Martin made Marmoutier a great monastic complex to which European ascetics were attracted and from which apostles spread Christianity throughout Gaul. He himself was an active missionary in Touraine and in the country districts where Christianity was as yet barely known. During his life-In 360 he rejoined Hilary at Poitiers. Martin then time, Martin acquired a reputation as a miracle founded a community of hermits at Ligugé, the worker, and he was one of the first non-martyrs to be publicly venerated as a saint.

Dear Parents,


