The Pastor's Letter

oliticians often leave Washington to go back to their state or home districts to get a sense of what issues their constituents are thinking about. In some ways, I had such an experience with my own family, who although they deeply respect my vocation as a priest, they are far more likely to see me as brother or uncle. Since they are committed Catholics who seek to live their faith, I feel by listening to them I can get a good sense of what they think are important Catholic issues. This is also true about the parishioners here at St. Martin's; however, I think some hold back their thoughts since they may think saying something negative about the Church will hurt my feelings. I appreciate that, but I **do** welcome hearing what you are thinking and what could be impacting your own faith life.

As I was sitting in my favorite chair in my niece's vacation house over the Thanksgiving weekend, reading *The New York Post* with a virtual *do not disturbed sign* hanging over my head, there was a serious conversation going on in the kitchen with no walls between us. Discussions included politics, family concerns, Christmas, and of course their various parishes by three generations of Catholics. One of my family members was hurt by the way his pastor had treated him, while another spoke of sermons being too long or too political. Then one member, a lifetime lover of her Catholic faith, a longtime religious education teacher, and a daily Mass goer said, *And the Pope should get control of some of his priests who are doing so much damage to our faith*. This was said with a mixture of sadness, pain, and anger. I thought to myself, if the Pope is in trouble with her, he is really in trouble with the larger church community.

From the day Pope Francis was elected, I have found myself attracted to him and his message. I saw him as man who truly walked the walk with the poor when he was the Archbishop in Buenos Aires, Argentina. He truly stood with the poor and lived a very simple, personal lifestyle. As Pope, he continued in a similar way. He spoke of the message of Christ's love for the poor with passion, and he focused very much on the mercy and love of God for his people. I did not always agree on everything he says (I am not speaking about dogmas of the faith), but his words were challenging to me and made me think. I found it so easy to love and admire Pope Francis.

I know that the dark issue of sexual abuse by the clergy continues to be very disturbing to us: we think about what pain and hurt has been done to the victims and their families; we ask why the abusing priests were rarely arrested; we question what the bishops and pope knew and did they cover up such terrible actions.

The issue of Cardinal McCarrick and his rise to power in the church in spite of the fact that in some church circles it seem clear that his serious misbehaviors were known to people who should have taken steps to confront the evil actions and did not. It troubles me very much that Archbishop Vigano, formerly Apostolic Delegate to the United States, alleges that the Pope Francis knew about some of McCarrick's abuses and did not confront him. Pope Francis has remained silent on these charges.

I believe that the American Catholic Church, since the Dallas Charter of 2002, has taken very serious steps to protect minors from clerical abuse. There have been some failures since 2002 and none can or should be tolerated. However, the major recent issues have been toward the Bishops and the policies that address any abuse of minors or vulnerable adults, and their need to be transparent about any issues of sexual abuse of minors or vulnerable to the civil authorities and the people of God.

think the American Bishops, perhaps having had a very serious jolt from the Pennsylvania investigations and the report given, went to Baltimore this past November determined to write a policy that addressed their own need for transparency and accountability. I believe that were determined to do it. However, to the disappointment of many of them, and to me, Pope Francis told them to hold off on the writing of this policy since there will be a world-wide meeting in February of 2019 to address all these issues in a universal way.

Some commentators, both secular and religious, are suspicious of this and wonder if it is another form of cover-up. I want to believe that the Pope's reasons for this delay are valid, but I am left with many questions. He is the Vicar of Christ on earth and I seek to be loyal to his holy office and to him. In this in between time, I pray that the Holy Spirit will move our Church to a cleansing healing at this upcoming meeting.

Although we are moving in to the joy and innocence of Christmas, I write this letter to let you know that I am aware that many of you are struggling and feeling confusion about what you see and hear. I share similar feelings, but like you, I trust in the promise of the Jesus to be with us until the end of time. We had an open parish meeting on the issue of clergy sexual abuse a couple of months ago. I asked some-one who did not speak at the meeting what was their thoughts were. With the permission of that person, I'll end with a bit of what was written. I found it quite moving:

We are all human with good and bad in all of us, even the nuns and priests. We all knew for some time there was sexual abuse charges within the church. We thought it was being addressed. I think when we cover things up, it can become bigger and could explode. Well, it did. Now we are exposed. But maybe it is for the better. I feel sorry for the victims and shame on those who abused others. What can we do? Let us pull up our sleeves and put on clean clothes and start by carrying the cross with Jesus who forgives. Pray for our beautiful priests and lay people. God will get us through.

Why do I stay a Catholic? I believe that God exists. I am God's child. I believe in the Trinity. Where else can I receive the Real Presence of Jesus Christ who died for me? Only at Catholic Mass. Have mercy on us and the whole world.

Last Saturday we had an ALPHA retreat for those men and women who have been participating in this beautiful spiritual program that invites us to open out hearts to the love of God in a very unique way. This is the third ALPHA our parish has had. The retreat had a special focus on the Holy Spirit, the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity. I think most Christians find that they can envision God as Father since we all have

had fathers and can relate to that concept. Most of us have a favorite image of Jesus that we take from our reading and hearing about him in the Gospels. However, I would say that the Holy Spirit is the most elusive for us to capture in our minds. We had two videos on the retreat that certainly helped me to come to a sense of the power of the Holy Spirit in my day-to-day life. One person on the retreat described the Holy Spirit as *a nudge from God*. Another person said that she was amazed at how her life had changed and knew that it could only be explained by the presence and actions of the Holy Spirit. I certainly have experienced the power of the Holy Spirit in many moments here at St. Martin's as I see people respond in love to one another, to those in need, and in the very way they live their lives.

When I was saying a few words on the retreat (I am not sure if you will believe it was only a few words), I said I had a very powerful experience of the Holy Spirit the night before at the talent show that our youth group had put on under the direction of Diana Hughes and Liam Gordon. The night began with an amazing performance by the F.R.E.E. Drum Corps and Color Guard who are all young people with special needs. They played their drums and waved their banners with a spirit of happiness and with smiles that spread from ear to ear. Wow! The audience gave them a standing ovation to what they had experienced in seeing these precious young people perform. The rest of the night was equally very touching. I know many young people can be self-conscious, but so many of the teens sang and danced and joked with great enthusiasm. The very word *enthusiasm* is rooted and has a connection to the Holy Spirit. *Webster's Dictionary* defines enthusiasm as: a) strong excitement of feeling : b) something inspiring zeal or fervor c) belief in special revelations of the Holy Spirit. I experienced all three qualities in those young people who shared their talents to raise funds for an adaptive trike for a special needs child. I saw that enthusiasm in the more than \$2,000.00 raised from donations and raffle tickets from so many parishioners. Also parishioners have been generous in support of ALPHA. The experience of the ALPHA retreat and the Teen's Talent Show merged for me into a kind of mini-Pentecost. The Holy Spirit is always full of wonder and so often catches us by surprise.
