

### The Pastor's Letter

#### (Homily for the Rite of Acceptance and Welcoming for our RCIA candidates)

I have been a Catholic all my life with the exception of about two weeks. As was the common custom of the time, I was baptized the second Sunday after my birth. I presume the same is true for many of you.

In spite of being a very intelligent baby, I am not sure if I truly gave my heart to following Jesus as an infant. Although I cannot remember it, I am sure I received my first Holy Communion with devotion. In addition to wondering how much money I would get as gifts for my Confirmation, I am sure I was eager to receive the gift of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

Again, like you, I grew up in what I would call a Catholic culture where being Catholic was not something you thought about as a decision to make. Being a Catholic was for me as much part of my life as going to school, eating and sleeping. Almost everyone I knew was Catholic. By the time I was in the 8<sup>th</sup> grade, like almost every Catholic school student of the day, I could easily rattle off the Ten Commandments, all the key prayers of the Church (and with some of them in Latin, no less), the seven sacraments, the names of the apostles, and the four marks of the Church. I may not have grasped all their meaning, but I had them memorized.

I went to a seminary high school and would confess that I might have thought more about sports and playing pranks on my friends than I did on my relationship with Jesus. I was a Catholic. After high school, I decided to continue to think about a being a priest. There were many reasons why I considered this option, but it was no dramatic decision. When I first joined the seminary, there were 100 people in my entrance class. (Ten were ultimately ordained.) I followed many of my friends who entered the seminary a year earlier. After high school, we began what was called the novitiate in preparation to make vows as a religious. I have often described that year as a kind of spiritual boot camp. The entire focus of that year was to pray and reflect on the call to be a vowed religious. And that was the year, although not at any particular vivid moment, that I slowly began to truly know Jesus and to fall in love with him. I wanted to be his follower. It was a choice, an experience, that changed my life forever. I would be willing to bet, if you look over your own lives, you will see one, if not more, such moments when your choice to love God was not just because you had been raised Catholic, but because it became a decision you made from an invitation by God.

Today at this Mass, we have had the honor and privilege of witnessing several young men and women who are making choices to follow Jesus Christ in faith as Catholics. Each one has their own story and their own unique history as they choose to enter into the Catholic faith. They are responding to God's grace in their lives. They want to follow Jesus in a community of believers. That is you and me. I love the prayer at Mass before the sign of peace that says *look not on our sins, but on the faith of the church*. That is us - human and sinful but together filled with the grace of God. We are to witness to them our faith. At the same time, seeing them in their eagerness to follow Jesus in the Catholic faith is a powerful witness to all of us to never take our faith for granted. It is always an ongoing gift from God.

#### **Gaudete Sunday**

Certain Sundays throughout the liturgical year have taken their names from the first word in Latin of the Introit, the entrance antiphon at Mass. Gaudete Sunday is one of these. What Is Gaudete Sunday?

**Answer:** Gaudete Sunday is the Third Sunday of Advent. The Introit for Gaudete Sunday, in both the Traditional Latin Mass and the Novus Ordo, is taken from Philippians 4:4,5: "*Gaudete in Domino semper*" ("Rejoice in the Lord always").

Like Lent, Advent is a penitential season, so the priest normally wears purple vestments. But on Gaudete Sunday, having passed the midpoint of Advent, the Church lightens the mood a little, and the priest may wear rose vestments. The change in color provides us with encouragement to continue our spiritual preparation—especially prayer and fasting—for Christmas.

For this same reason, the third candle of the Advent wreath, first lit on Gaudete Sunday, is traditionally rose-colored. Gaudete Sunday has a counterpart in Lent: Laetare Sunday.

  - Children must be reminded that they are representing themselves, you and St. Martin of Tours each time they participate. Good behavior is a must.


We expect each parent to go over these rules to ensure their child's good behavior. We ask for your full cooperation and look forward to a happy and fun program.

#### Father Pat's homily of 12/8/18

Pears ago, I went to a show called Late Nite Catechism. It was a one person show that had a woman playing a nun who was teaching a group of adult Catholics a remedial course on Catholicism of the 1950's. It was a very funny show, but it was also respectful of the nuns of that time who gave so much to the Church.

The actress interacted with the audience throughout the show. So, if you were in the audience chewing gum, the Sister had you spit it out into a wastebasket and said the next time you would have to put it on your nose. Throughout the show she asked the audience questions, and you were corrected if you did not begin your answer with the respectful word, *Sister*. So, she asked what the Immaculate Conception is. Many hands went up in the crowd, but they all got it wrong, saying it was about the birth of Jesus. I, dressed incognito, finally raised my hand and said, *Sister*, it is the teaching that Mary the Mother of Jesus was freed from stain of original sin when she was conceived. Sister congratulated me and gave me a gold star on my shirt. This is the only award I have ever won after a lifetime of studying about God.

There is old fable about a frog and a scorpion who meet at the side of the river. The scorpion asks the frog to help him across the river. The frog says no because he is afraid the scorpion will sting him. The scorpion says he would never do that. The frog still doubts him, but the scorpion is quite persistent and pleads that he would never hurt the frog if he does this good deed for him. The frog finally agrees and lets the scorpion on his back. Just as they get to the other side of the river safely, the scorpion stings the frog. The frog cries out in pain: why did you do this to me. You promised you would not sting me. The scorpion says, *I am sorry but it's my nature to sting*.

I thought of that story when I read our first reading from the book of Genesis. It is a very familiar story to us, and whether we take it literally or as a kind of parable, it has much profound truth to teach us. God created Adam and Eve to share his love with them. It is clear from the Word of God that it is the nature of God to share his love with creatures. The Father, Son and Holy Spirit, three Persons in a unity of one, created the angels to share in the wonder of Divine Love. God created all the glory and magnificence of creation. The animals of every kind and flowers fill the earth with innumerable colors and shades. He filled the ocean with fish and gave the sun for warmth and light. Then, he created human beings, similar to the animals but with a nature that gives them free will, the ability to love and be loved, and to delight in all that God had created. It was the plan of God that these human beings would have a most intimate relationship with Him.

However, the gift of free will becomes a challenge to his creatures. With all the gifts and wonder that the Almighty had given them, they still want more. Deceived by Satan, they turn away from God and choose sin. The choice to sin begins to overcome human beings and we soon have the murder of Abel by Cain, Noah's ark and the flood, and the idolatry of the chosen people. The horror of sin continues to this day in wars, genocide, crime, hatred, bitterness among families and a continual shout of *no* to the God who proclaims Love.

But God is not about giving up on creatures. His nature is to save, to redeem, to restore, and always give hope. Immediately after the sin of Adam and Eve, we read the words that God speaks to Satan: I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; he will strike at your head, while you strike at his heel." God's nature is to forgive and this becomes the promise of redemption that is slowly revealed through the Old Testament and then we have that most dramatic moment that we soon celebrate: the birth of God who will take a human nature to save us from the power of sin. In our Gospel we begin to know that God will invite an ordinary young girl of Nazareth, perhaps fifteen or sixteen years old to speak for humanity. She is asked to say yes to the plan of God. All creation awaits her response. Full of grace, Mary responds Yes. It has been said that Mary is the new Eve and Jesus in the new Adam. A human cooperated with the Divine God for our redemption. Sin will not be the final story of humanity. We will be saved by this baby who will bring us home to the Father.

This feast of the Immaculate Conception brings our story back to the birth of Mary who will be the Mother of God. The love of God refuses to let the stain of original sin touch her at her conception in the womb of St. Anne. She is the Christ bearer and Christ and sin cannot co-exist. We draw strength and hope from this mystery. Since God could free his mother from the power of sin at her very conception, we know that we can call upon him now to be with us in our daily struggles to follow him and to join with his mother Mary in saying yes to his love.



#### RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

Washington D.C., Dec 10, 2018 (CNA/EWTN News).- The US Supreme Court will not hear an appeal



from states which were seeking to terminate Medicaid contracts with Planned Parenthood, meaning that these contracts will remain. Kansas and Louisiana had attempted to block Medicaid funds from being used for preventative care services provided by Planned Parenthood. A lower court ruled that this policy violated federal law, and the states were attempting to appeal this decision.

By deciding not to hear the case, the court has not cast a judgement on the questions contained in the appeals. Only three judges – Justices Clarence Thomas, Samuel Alito, and Neil Gorsuch – voted to grant certiorari. This is one short of the four needed. Voting against certiorari were newlyconfirmed Justice Brett Kavanaugh, Chief Justice John Roberts, and Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Stephen Breyer, Sonia Sotomayor, and Elena Kagan. In his dissent, Thomas wrote that he thought his colleagues on the bench were trying to avoid any cases involving Planned Parenthood, the country's largest abortion provider. This case in particular did not involve abortion, but concerned other services provided by Planned Parenthood.

"What explains the court's refusal to do its job here?" asked Thomas, adding, "I suspect it has something to do with the fact that some respondents in these cases are named 'Planned Parenthood." Thomas was furious with the court's denial of certiorari, saying: "But these cases are not about abortion rights," but rather "about private rights of action under the Medicaid Act." "Resolving the question presented here would not even affect Planned Parenthood's ability to challenge the States' decisions; it concerns only the rights of individual Medicaid patients to bring their own suits. Some tenuous connection to a politically fraught issue does not justify abdicating our judicial duty."

Former Planned Parenthood clinic director Abby Johnson told CNA that she did not agree with the court's decision. "States should have every right to divert funding away from the nation's largest abortion provider and towards health centers that provide true healthcare to patients, not one that promotes abortion above all else," Johnson said. She also pointed out that Planned Parenthood has done fewer and fewer preventative services in recent years. Between 2009 and 2016, the number of breast cancer screenings done by the organization dropped by 61 percent, she said. "Other cancer screenings have dropped by 64 percent during the same time. And forget about prenatal services and adoption referrals. Those services are barely offered, if at all at some Planned Parenthoods," added Johnson.

Johnson told CNA she believes states should instead fund federal qualified healthcare clinics, which "outnumber Planned Parenthood nearly 20-to-1 and sees ten times the number of patients that Planned Parenthood does every year."


