The Pastor's Letter

Father Pat's homily of January 6, 2019

Gratitude bestows reverence, allowing us to encounter everyday epiphanies, those transcendent moments of awe that change forever how we experience life and the world.

Like many men, I often find myself clicking the remote through the probably more than 200 televisions stations, only to find no movie, news story, or sporting event that captures my attention. In such a case I often find myself watching reruns of *Everybody Loves Raymond*, a show that I never watched when it was originally on television years ago. On a recent Christmas episode it told a story where there was a conversation between Robert, my favorite character, and his mother Marie. Robert was as usual complaining that Raymond was always her favorite. Robert mentioned a Christmas memory from his childhood - Raymond got a great set of toys and all Robert received was a pair of very large orthopedic shoes.

Marie responded, Robbie, they were so expensive because they were a size 17!

I hope you were happy with the Christmas gifts that you gave and received. My family has all but given up on giving me any gifts other than Amazon gift cards since that is what I tell them I want. Our family Christmas routine is to wait for Uncle Pat to come home from wherever he is saying Masses and then begin opening the gifts. There is a mad swirl of wrapping paper flying, with lots of *thank you's*, *I love it, it is perfect, and how did you know I wanted that!* Then a great burst of toy instruments and electronic games that the little ones have received, and a rush to hide when one of the kids asks if someone can help put their Lego set together.

Before the official gift giving begins, I often give out some of my old clothes, books, and videos that I no longer need to the family. Since only a few of them have the great muscular build that I have, some of the kids feel disappointed since I have little that interests them. I did give one of my college-age great-nieces marble bookends that belonged to my late sister, Geraldine. Micaela was thrilled to have them. A moment later, she saw her younger cousin Fiona's disappointment since I really had nothing I thought she would like. She did not complain but Micaela noticed and said, Fiona, you can have one bookend and I will have the other so that we can share the memory of our Aunt Gerry. Perfect. Her act of sharing was a gift to the whole family and it brought a tear to my eyes.

When all the official Christmas gifts were given, and the smell of turkey filled our living room, and before calling us to the table, my sister said she had one more gift to give. She addressed Thomas, her oldest nephew and a senior in college: Thomas, you are the oldest and I am giving you my husband Jack's wedding ring. You can wear it or not. When you get married, you can use it or get a new one, but I want you to have it. Jack pushed you in a carriage when you were a baby. Thomas, who is a wonderful young man with a kind of strong, masculine Clint Eastwood exterior, cried for about ten minutes.

This past Christmas, as has always been my experience here at St. Martin's, parishioners are very kind to the clergy with gifts of Christmas cards and emails, their kind words and greetings, promises of prayers, their delicious desserts, Irish spirits, and so many other kinds of very thoughtful gifts. I can assure you they all are appreciated. This Christmas was a little bit different; so many parishioners told us, we will miss you guys so much. They were words full of love and appreciation. What a great gift to be loved and valued and to hear it spoken so lovingly.

Three gifts: a wedding ring, bookends and words of love. To me they were gold, frankincense and myrrh. I tell you these stories because I invite you to look over your own days of Christmas and see where you were touched by the love of God either as you saw it in others or experienced it yourself. It may have come at a moment when you least expected it, or you may only begin to see it now, as you look back and say, that was a very a very special moment.

We call this Sunday *The Epiphany* which is the Greek word *to make manifest*. The great Irish writer, James Joyce, talks about *epiphanies - those moments when we see or experience something we never noticed before*. When we have our children's Christmas pageant here at St. Martin's, the role that the children most ask to play is surprisingly not Mary or Joseph, but the one who gets to carry the star over Bethlehem. This great feast where Magi from East follow the star is core to Good News of the Christian message: Jesus is for all people of every nation, language, culture, or nationality. I spoke about three times when I saw the Star of the Epiphany, of God's love made manifest. The star is not just for Christmas. The word on our Advent/Christmas button this year was *Emmanuel. Emmanuel means God with us in the beautiful moments of life, in the humdrum days of January and February, and even in the sadness of suffering and loss. God with us: Emmanuel.*

My brothers and sisters, the star is over the pulpit as we hear the Word of God, over the table of the Eucharist as we received his body and blood, over the people in our church, over the parish, and over the whole world. *God with us.* I will end with the words of John Shea, a favorite author of mine.

We bring gold for he will bring people into their true worth
We bring incense for he will reconcile people to God.
We bring myrrh for his death will be our path to new life.
The truth is the child
Waiting to be found



All the deaths and funerals we celebrate are sacred. From time to time, I like to include in the bulletin a funeral homily of a person who was well known to many parishioners. This is the homily I gave for Tommy Corrado on January 4. - Father Pat



Tommy died.

Of course, we needed only one name to share this very sad news that impacted many people here in Bethpage and in many other places. There are certain people who become so famous or so loved that they need only one name to be spoken and everyone knows of whom we are speaking. We say the name *LeBron* and everyone thinks of the great basketball player, *LeBron James* who plays for the Los Angeles Lakers. The name *Bruce* and you immediately think of the great rock 'n roll singer, Bruce Springsteen; and the name *Oprah* needs not be accompanied by *Winfrey* since we all know her by her first name.

I think it would fair to say that Tommy Corrado reached that status here at St. Martin's Parish and among his family and friends. You said the name *Tommy* and the image of a kind and loving man comes to your mind immediately. We were blessed to know Tommy and to experience his love and generosity. Tommy was a most special part of the parish here at St. Martin's, especially to his many friends from the 7:00PM Saturday night Mass. When Tommy became ill, and was unable to usher at the seven, so many people asked me, *where is Tommy? What is going on? We miss him!* How true...we do and will miss him so very much. I will not attend the Saturday night Mass without thinking of him, and his asking me if there was a second collection or if I needed any help. Once in a while I would ask him if wanted to give the sermon and he would laugh and say, *that's your job, Father!* Actually, I was afraid to let him give the homily because people would find him far more interesting than they did me.

I want to offer my deepest sympathy to those who are hurting the most - his dear and loving sister Julie and her husband Steve, his niece Juliet and her husband Rickie, his nephews and their spouses Stephen and Dena, and Derek and Elizabeth. Tommy never married or had children but was deeply loved by his family and he loved his family so very much. I met with his sister Julie and her husband Steve and they were devastated by his death. They loved his so very much. Years ago, when Tommy's mother Mary was dying, Julie promised her mother that she would always take care of Tommy and watch out for him.

To Julie: no sister could have been more loving and faithful to a brother than were you. And to Steve: no brother-in law could have more supportive to Tommy and Julie. To listen to them was an honor for me since I was hearing a beautiful story of love. The Bible tells us that wherever there is love, God is present. God was truly present in this family. I believe Tommy's parents, Mary and Fred, now reunited with their precious son, are smiling down in love at all the Corrado and Campange families. Julie made it clear to me that being with her brother was a joy and not an obligation. He brought all the family great joy.

I know he had a special place in his heart for his nieces and nephews, Gabriela, Gavin, Caeden, Owen, Derek, Jayden, and Mel. I know that you have been praying very hard that Tommy would get better and that it hurts very much that he has left us to go home to God. We have just celebrated Christmas; the whole reason for Christmas, all the presents and decorations and trees is because God decided to come among us and help us get home to heaven when we died.

I believe that Tommy is now in heaven because Jesus loved him and Tommy loved Jesus. You now have a special uncle in heaven to which you can ask to bring your prayers to God. Tommy still loves all of you. I also offer a special word to some of Tommy's special friends, Pam and Joey Carlucci, Dee Gianni, Jennette Lessard, Dawn Smith, Barbara Casey, and Kathie Spellman. You all held a special place in Tommy's heart. He had a gift for friendship.

The family picked beautiful readings for Tommy's Mass. We heard Pam read the following words to us today from the Bible: The souls of the just are in the hand of God, and no torment shall touch them. They seemed, in the view of the foolish, to be dead; and their passing away was thought an affliction and their going forth from us, utter destruction. But they are in peace.

We draw consolation in knowing that Tommy was a just man and he is now at peace. In our second reading, Dee read: See what love the Father has bestowed on us that we may be called the children of God. Yet so we are. We all have special roles in life; Tommy was a son, a brother, an uncle, a great uncle, a friend, the head usher of the 7:00PM Saturday Mass. But the greatest title he had was in what we heard in that reading. We are the children of God. Nothing could be greater than that. Tommy is a child of God.

I chose for our Gospel a reading where Jesus is surrounded by children. The apostles tell the children to leave Jesus alone since he is busy but Jesus tells the apostles let the children come to him. Jesus loved these children and blesses each of them. He then tells us that the innocence of a child is what is needed to enter the kingdom of God. I always found Tommy to be childlike. I mean that as the greatest compliment that I can give a person since Jesus says that is the most important quality one needs to have in life. Our Lord tells us, such as these belong to the kingdom of God.

On Saturday nights after the 7:00PM Mass, I would go to my man cave, have a nice cold soda and turn on the Mets or a Notre Dame football game. I would be in my nice recliner with the work of the day finished. At about 8:30, I would hear a knock on my door. I would reluctantly get up and say,



who it is? It's me Father, Tommy. Everything is done and the collection is put away and the church is locked. I would thank Tommy and say, see you next week! I will miss that knock on my door very much.

On December 29, 2018, Tommy went home to the God who created and loved him. He did not have to knock. The door was wide open to welcome him.





THE ABORTION EXPANSION ACT LIVES IN THE BALANCE: L.I. CATHOLIC, January 4th. NEW YORK STATE is the ABORTION CAPITAL OF OUR NATION, with a rate of 29.6 abortions for every 1,000 women of reproductive age. That's more than TWICE the NATIONAL AVERAGE.

New York legalized abortion in 1970, three years before the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in Roe vs. Wade. Abortion is legal here for ANY REASON up to 24 weeks of pregnancy, and any time after that if the mother's life is at risk. So even if Roe were to be overruled, the vast majority of abortions in our state would continue to be legal and available. Governor Cuomo and the Democratic leadership in New York State Legislature want to go even further, and make abortion less safe and more expansive than it is now. They've promised to enact the so-called REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH ACT early in 2019.

- Allow non-doctors to perform abortions.




