The Pastor's Letter

Last week Fathers Denis, Jim and I had to attend a meeting in Long Branch, New Jersey that lasted four days. I want to thank Father Ciya for his generosity in taking care of the parish by himself. With several funerals, visits to the sick, and the two daily Masses, he was busy. I joked when I came home that I did not recognize all the changes that he had made in our church. Actually, I was referring to the Christmas decorations which were taken down. Next week, Father Ciya will go home to visit his family. Unlike the rest of us in our Redemptorist community, Father Ciya only gets to see his family once a year. How blessed is our Redemptorist community and parish to have him here. He is a deeply spiritual man with a million dollar smile.

The meeting we attended is called a provincial chapter which is held about every two years. The leadership of our Province along with elected delegates are in attendance. There were forty-six men attending this session. I smile when parishioners, in particular Jim Belmonte, who said to me, *Padre, how was your vacation?* Even though we were right on the ocean at the Jersey Shore, the days and evenings were rather busy. The purpose of the chapter, and almost every religious Congregation of men and women who have such meetings, is to evaluate our ministries, our personnel, elections for leadership offices, evaluation of our financial resources, review health care programs for our senior men, and to plan for the future. It is a very democratic process and proposals are voted upon by all. The chapter is only in session for a week or so, and then the leadership of the Province, the Provincial, his two consultors, and five other elected delegates direct the province until the next chapter. All of these offices are elected by the priests and brothers of our Province. Although I have great admiration for the structures of the world-wide church and its many dioceses, I am happy to be a religious since our structures allow us to choose our leaders by the vote of every member. None of these offices are for life as is true for a bishop until he retires.

One of the best parts of the chapter is coming together with so many other confreres. We all know each other in varying degrees. I was with men who had taught me, and with men whom I had taught, with fellows with whom I had been stationed and who had been stationed with me, with classmates from my seminary days, and with fellows with whom I had preached missions and given retreats. There were lots of *remembering when*, funny stories, and great laughter. Like our parish here, we have talented musicians and singers who led us in beautiful prayers services and Masses. It is good to be able to sit and listen to another confrere give an inspiring homily.

And, there were serious discussions, presentations and debates around many issues. Once, our province had six hundred men; now we are 140 confreres. Many of us are over eighty, and there are many men in need of assisted living and skilled nursing care. We had passionate discussions about how to attract vocations, how to reach out to younger people who are drifting from the practice of their faith, dealing with the opioid crisis, immigration concerns, pro-life issues, and how we can best use our limited pool of men to serve in ministry. "The Lord does not ask us to be successful, but rather to be faithful." I have been part of such discussions for more than forty years. I sometimes feel a sense of being overwhelmed by these realities. The temptation for me is to want to blame someone or some group, to long for the days of the past, to judge others with whom I disagree, to fall into apathy and discouragement. I think of the word *discourage* which comes from the Latin *to lose heart*. Perhaps, you may have similar feelings about the future of the Church, the decline in attendance, especially among younger people, the bitterness in our politics, financial troubles, health concerns, family tensions and a host of other challenges.

Saint Motber Teresa of Calcutta I have no simple words for you or for me. I seek to trust in God, and to do what I can do in my little corner of the world, to be a faithful follower of Jesus with all my sins and faults. Faith does not take away problems, but without knowing that God is Emmanuel, with us in all the moments of life, I would be lost. So, each day is a gift that God gives me and I pray for the grace to be faithful to Him.

"Do you believe in miracles?"

On February 22 at the 1980 Winter Olympics, sportscaster Al Michaels proclaimed those words as a group of college age kids from America played the Soviet Union hockey team, considered the greatest team in the world, having even beaten the All-Stars of the National Hockey League. As the clock ticked down to ten seconds, and as the puck was sliding away from the American goal, the clock hit zero, Michaels shouted, *Yes!* This was probably the greatest upset in sport's history.

Ten years ago this past week, Captain Chesley Sullenburger landed a plane filled with 155 people on the Hudson without a life being lost and this moment has now been referred to as the *Miracle on the Hudson*. Last July, the world watched and prayed as 12 Thai boys and their coach trapped for many days and nearing death, were rescued from a cave by a heroic group of rescuers.


Are these events miracles? I do not believe that God is a hockey fan chanting *U-S-A* as our hockey team played a game. Experts would point to the amazing aviation skills of Captain Sully and the perfect circumstances that surrounded the event. Even though all the boys and their coach were saved, a courageous Navy Seal from Thailand died during the rescue.

Yet, each event took human beings functioning at their highest capacity to succeed. Each of these extraordinary moments reflected a commitment to people working together, supporting one another, and a great capacity to train and prepare for a moment that they probably never expected to be called to achieve. These three events lifted human spirits and made us feel better about our humanity. Do you believe in miracles?

Our Gospel today gives us the first miracle that Jesus will perform while he is on earth. The Wedding Feast of Cana is a well–known scripture passage to us. Oftentimes at parish gatherings or parties, if the adult libations appear to be running low, someone will kid me with the words, *Father, we might need you to do another 'Cana'*. We are amazed at all the miracles of Jesus, but this one is far from the most awesome. I would think raising a man who has been dead for four days, or feeding 5,000 people with a few loaves of bread and some fish, or calming the storm on the sea and then walking on the waters, are miraculous events even more astonishing than the Cana miracle.

But I love this story for what it reveals us to about Jesus. First of all, he is at a wedding. There you go: you have the Son of God, Lord of the Heavens and the Earth, at a wedding! We can wonder if Jesus did the hokey pokey at this wedding. Did he congratulate the groom and kiss the bride? Did he complain that the band was too loud? Scripture scholars believe that it was probably a wedding in a small village where everyone was invited to rejoice in the event. There must have been a great deal of rejoicing because the wine is running low! Most nationalities consider themselves hospitable. Still, a first century Jew who did not have enough wine for his guests would have been shamed.

But who is going to notice the wine running low? That is a key to this first miracle. Jesus, perhaps caught up in deciding whether to order fish or meat, does not see the looming crisis. Mary, the mother of Jesus, is also at the wedding. With the heart of a sensitive and attentive woman, she sees that the wine is running low. A young couple is about to have their wedding ruined. No bride should be disappointed on her wedding day. So, Mary goes to Jesus and simply says, *they have no wine.* Jesus responds that it is not yet the plan of salvation that he begins to do miracles. That will come later.



I love the words that follow his saying it not yet his time. Mary can read the heart of her Son and knows nothing she asks of him will be refused. Mary says with complete confidences to the wedding stewards: *do whatever he says*. So Jesus, without drawing any attention on himself, has six large water jars filled with water. When the chief steward tastes the water, now wine, and a far better wine than had been previously poured the chief steward is awed struck.

The six stone jars would have had about 120 to 150 gallons of wine. 150 gallons! Jesus must have loved a good party. He is a God of abundance: twelve baskets of leftover loaves and fishes, so many fish that nets are breaking, seeds sown everywhere showing his mercy for every sinner. He is revealing to us a God of abundance.

Don't miss a key detail: Jesus does this miracle quietly. He does not want to steal the attention of the guests from the bride and groom. He does this miracle so a young couple can have a happy wedding day and for love of his mother. Today, we have presented before us another miracle: bread turned into his body and wine into his blood.

I have a lot of pictures and plaques. In fact, I have so many that I have placed some on the wall outside of my office. One reads:



I hope as you go forth today, you see the wondrous presence of God in your life and in the world around you. If you are attentive, you will experience it.

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



NEW YORK STATE PASSED THE REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH ACT (RHA) SIGNED INTO LAW BY GOV. ANDREW CUOMO ON JANUARY 22, 2019, 46 YEARS TO THE DAY OF ROE V. WADE LEGALIZING ABORTION IN THE UNITED STATES.

Last Tuesday, New York State has added a sad chapter to this already solemn date. With the legislature's passage our beloved state has become a more dangerous one for women and their unborn babies. Many others, as well as our governor, area fathers, who held their partner's hand as they viewed the ultrasound videos, watched their child and rejoiced at the first sound of a heartbeat. Many of these same officials were themselves born into less-than-perfect-conditions - poverty, health problems, disabilities, broken families. All overcame these issues to rise to leadership in our state because their parents chose life for them.

We thank all of our partners in the 12 year-long fight to stop this horrendous policy, and all pro-life New Yorkers who made their voices heard in an effort to stop it. Let us all pray for the conversion of heart for those who celebrate this tragic moment in the history of our state. And we pray in a special way for the lives that WILL BE LOST, and for the women of our state who are made LESS SAFE under this law. *(source: The Long Island Catholic, January 23, 2019)*

CRUX: Emily Benson, Catholic News Service: Albany, N.Y. Officials at the New York State Catholic Conference area calling the Reproductive Health Act "worse than we thought it would be." "It foresees a time in New York where it's a crime to be pro-life," said Kathleen Gallagher, director of pro-life activities at the Catholic Action Network for the conference which is the public policy arm of the state's Catholic bishops. The measure, signed into law will expand access to abortion in the state, despite being promoted as simply codifying Roe V. Wade. It not only increases access to abortion across the board, including late-term abortions, but also goes beyond Roe, which left some limits in place.

The bill refers to abortion as a "fundamental human right." The RHA also repeals the current state requirement that only a licensed physician can perform an abortion and repeals the current law that states THIRD-TRIMESTER ABORTIONS can only be performed in cases where the mother's life is in danger. The bill also repeals protections for ACCIDENTAL LIVE BIRTHS and disallows criminal charges for illegal abortions, such as when a perpetrator seeks to abort their partner's child through drugs or physical violence.

While the legislative battle is over, we don't feel that all is lost. The challenge now becomes CHANGING HEARTS and MINDS MORE THAN EVER. Those working in the PRO-LIFE MOVEMENT say their work will focus on educating the public on PRO-LIFE ISSUES and providing resources so that fewer women will choose abortion. Please continue to write, email, call and text GOVERNOR ANDREW M. CUOMO that you oppose the passing of this bill, and pray. Pray that hearts and minds will be changed to honor and protect every human life.

One of the many lovely traditional practices of our Catholic faith is the blessing of the throat near or on the feast of St. Blaise which is celebrated on February 3rd. Catholics love symbols and rituals since they speak to us of the Incarnational God who is with us in the ordinary moments of life.

At the weekend Masses of February 2 & 3, we will have a general blessing of throats. If anyone feels the need for an individual blessing, you can ask the celebrant for a blessing after Mass.

The following is an account of Saint Blaise:

Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebastea and a doctor. The first known record of the saint's life comes from the medical writings of Aëtius Amidenus, where he is recorded as helping patients suffering from objects stuck in their throat. Many of the miraculous aspects of St. Blaise's life are written 400 years after his martyrdom in the "Acts of St. Blaise." Saint Blaise is believed to begin as a healer then, eventually, became a "physician of souls." He then retired to a cave where he remained in prayer. People often turned to Saint Blaise for healing miracles.

In 316, Agricola, the governor of Cappadocia and of Lesser Armenia, arrested the then Bishop Blaise for being a Christian. On their way to the jail, a woman set her only son who was chocking to death on a fish bone, at his feet. Blaise cured the child, and though Agricola was amazed, he could not get Blaise to renounce his faith. Therefore, Agricola beat Blaise with a stick and tore at his flesh with iron combs before beheading him.
