The Pastor's Letter

A lie can travel halfway around the world while the truth is putting on its shoes.

hat is truth? These words of Pontius Pilate heard every Holy Week always capture my atten-



tion since we all seek truth which can be very elusive. The news last week has been quite discouraging. New York State Governor Andrew Cuomo has passed a bill that creates a massive expansion of access to abortion, including lifting restrictions on third-trimester abortions, allowing non-doctors to perform the procedure, and enshrining a fundamental right to "terminate a pregnancy."

I know people have strong feelings about pro-life and pro-choice. Some people, fairly or not, accuse the Catholic Church of talking too much about life in the womb and not enough about the life among the poor, the immigrants, and the most vulnerable. Other Catholics feel that the church speaks too much about these topics and not enough about the right to life. I find that the Gospel of Jesus Christ calls believers to be concerned about **all** these most serious issues. Immigration rights, racism, concerns for the less fortunate, and issues that concern the beginning and end of life are all significant to our faith and its practice.

Last month, Sen. Kamala Harris of California (who has announced that she is seeking the Democratic Party's nomination for the presidency) and Sen. Mazie Hirono of Hawaii, both on the Senate Judiciary Committee, questioned a judicial nominee about his membership in the Knights of Columbus and whether it would affect his ability to fairly judge cases. I am a proud Knight of Columbus. I know best the work of the Hartigan Council: they raise money for those in need, distribute food at Thanksgiving, and donate their time and talent to our parish block party. These two senators want to paint the Knights as a radical organization. The Knights are no more radical than Catholics who hold to the teaching of the Church.

Then we experienced the story of the Covington All Boys Catholic School students who came to Washington D.C. for the Pro-life March. Initially, it was reported that the boys verbally abused and blocked an elder Native American Vietnam Veteran who simply wanted to play his native instrument as a form of prayer and culture. Some of the young men were wearing *MAGA* hats (Make America Great Again: the campaign theme of President Trump). The students were also accused of shouting racist chants.

All of these initial accounts were based on a two minute video. Much of the media, including pundits who were both liberal and conservative, Catholic Church officials, including the principal of Covington Catholic High School and the local bishop condemned the actions of these young men. Some of the students, their parents and the school itself received death threats. A day of school had to be cancelled. Some actors and commentators said they would like to punch the kids in the face and have the school burned with the students it! One movie director said the kids should be put in a woodcutter. I guess their norms about school bullying from adults to teens did not apply in this case.

By the next day, several hours of video had been viewed by many people. What was clear was that an adult group named the Black Hebrew Israelites had chanted vile and disgusting words at the high schoolers, including homophobic and racial slurs. Eventually, Nathan Philips, the Native American, came and approached one of the boys, Nick Sandmann, and stood several inches from him and played his drum. Sandmann just stood and stared at Philips (some say he smirked). Mr. Philips is a veteran (however, he did not serve in Vietnam as he claimed, but God bless him for his service to our nation). Some media people upon seeing and learning about the more revealing videos, apologized, some withdrew their tweets, and others, including the Catholic Bishop of Lexington, said that the students were wrong to wear MAGA hats. They believe such hats cause hurt and pain to others. What is the truth of this situation?

Having taught high school young men for years, I know that some can be compassionate, immature, mean, and kind, all within minutes of each action. Although teens should be held to high standards, I think adults should have a much higher bar for acting maturely. I believe this situation flowed from the very strong feelings in our nation about President Trump. They also were colored by the division in this country over abortion. These students had several strikes against them: they wore MAGA hats; they were Catholic; they were at a pro-life March. It is tolerated to be Catholic, but please do not express a view about law or culture that is out of step with what others feel about such issues. Essential to being a Catholic is how we treat others. The Catholic Church has been in the forefront in this country in seeking to protect immigrants, the vulnerable, the poor, and the unborn.

Is wearing a *Make America Great Again* hat wrong? I understand the great animosity that many people feel toward Donald Trump. We think of the recent government shutdown and the suffering of the laid off workers. Some of his words and actions are extremely disturbing to me. I do not seek to be an apologist for the President. However, have we as Americans moved to the point that free speech is no longer tolerated? Would we condemn a person for wearing a *Black Lives Matter* tee shirt or a pro-choice hat? I hope not. We may or may not agree with the sentiments that one expresses, but I hope the core American value of freedom of speech is always protected.

What is truth? What I wrote is no doubt colored by my feelings and beliefs. It is rare that anyone can be totally objective in matters of faith, morality, and politics. What I do believe to be the truth of this matter is that these young students were unjustly caught in the midst of a culture divide in our country. We must seek to get the facts and information about issues to the best of our abilities before making judgments. I have found that is not easy to do.

What is truth? The one who says he/she loves God and hates his neighbor is a liar (First Letter of John). Can you or I respect, seek to understand and even love someone with whom we disagree on matters that are very important to us? Can we listen to each other? Can we slow our tendency to quick judgments? By the grace of God, we can try.



Father Pat's homily of January 27, 2019

The other night I watched the movie, *The Four Seasons*. I had seen the musical on Broadway several years ago, and really felt the movie could not match the show, but it did, and I enjoyed it very much. There was a scene where Bob Gaudio, who was the song writer and musical arranger of the group, came in with a new song called *Walk Like a Man*. Frankie Valli, (lead singer) and Nick Massi (bass) thought it was a great song, but Tommy Devito, who was jealous of Gaudio, said it was stupid. He took the words literally and said, *how else is a man supposed to walk*. The others explained that it was a metaphor for coming of age, knowing who you are in life and what you want to be.

We all have key moments in our life: birth, graduations from grade school, high school and perhaps even college. We have the experience of our first job, our first car, our first apartment or home, our first love. Many of us marry, and certainly the experience of raising children is transformative. We get a job, begin a career, rise up in the structure of our job or get laid off, retire, or seek something else for our work. We may get divorced, suffer a life-changing illness, have people we love die, join the military service, become part of a volunteer group or causes that energize us, or have a deeply powerful religious experience that touches us to the core of our being. When did you start to walk like a woman? Walk like a man? What made you who you are today? What is your vision of life? Whether you are 16 or 86, what do you want to do with the days that God has given you?

I have always liked the eight stages of life's journey that psychologist Erik Erikson developed.:

Infancy: a stage when we are seeking to be secure in the arms of parents. Early childhood: I am learning that I am a person. I am different than Mom and Dad

Childhood: I can do and accomplish things

Adolescence: what does it mean to a man/woman and adult? Young adulthood: a time to seek intimacy, love and friendship

Adulthood: I want to create, leave a legacy, and have a family

Maturity: I am at peace with who I am and where I have been and where I am going.

Some of us get stuck on one stage for a time, and some of us never leave it. We all have lots of valleys and crises along the way. There are those who would propose today that we are seeking to dodge adulthood and responsibility. Others would say we are rushing children to become adults too quickly. I think the questions that society constantly raises to us is: What do I want from life? What do I need to be happy? I do not think they are the right questions. Better ones might be: What kind of person do I want to be? What do I want to give to others?

In today's Gospel, Jesus has begun to "walk like a man." His childhood and teenage years are over. He knows who he is and his mission from his Father is becoming very clear to him. At the local synagogue in the time of our Lord, any man could walk up to what was the pulpit, unroll the sacred scrolls of the Word of God that have been given to Abraham, Isaack, Saul, David, Solomon, Moses, Jeremiah, Isaiah and all the prophets.



So, Our Lord Jesus reads these words in Nazareth, the town where he grew up and is well known:

The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to bring glad tidings to the poor.
He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives
And recovery of sight to the blind,
To let the oppressed go free,
and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.

The prophet Isaiah spoke these words centuries before in anticipation of the coming of the Messiah. Everyone in that gathering knew them and what they were about. Every eye in the synagogue is on Jesus. What will he say next? There may be a low murmur among the people. Jesus looks them in the eye and announces: *Today this passage is fulfilled in me.* The crowd is shocked; he is claiming to be the Messiah, sent by God! Jesus knows that these words will eventually lead him to a dark and lonely hill named Calvary. His mission from the Father has begun. His life will be about turning the other cheek to his enemy, embracing sinners, comforting the poor and desperate, challenging the harsh religious authorities, breaking bread, preaching his message, and forming a church built on his body and blood. Today, he speaks these words to us: How do I want to live *my* life?





"EVERY LIFE IS WORTH PROTECTING": PRESIDENT TRUMP, VICE PRESIDENT PENCE TELL MARCH FOR LIFE IN WASHINGTON D.C.



The March for Life in Washington D.C. marked the anniversary of legalized abortion in America, and in a surprise appearance Vice President Mike Pence and Second Lady Karen Pence introduced a pre-recorded message from President Donald Trump.

"This is a movement founded on love and grounded in the nobility and dignity of every human life," President Trump said to the massive Janu-

ary 18, 2019 rally, before the crowd began its march through the streets of Washington, D.C.

"When we look into the eyes of a newborn child we see the beauty of the human soul and the majesty of God's creation, we know that every life has meaning and every life is worth protecting." "I will always protect the first right in the Declaration of Independence, the right to life," he said.

Priests for Life, Father Frank Pavone and Aleveda King, the Rev. Martin Luther King's niece, a strong advocate of life from conception to natural death were there supporting the massive crowd of mostly young pro-lifers. The Diocese of Rockville Centre had many buses headed for Washington, with faithful Long Islanders boarding at 5am. The strength, the love and the energy was there among all those that traveled from all over the country for the protection of human dignity. 60 million babies were aborted since 1973 with Roe V. Wade becoming law throughout the country.

Unfortunately, within days of the March, Governor Andrew Cuomo signed into law, the Reproductive Health Act. The Catholic Bishops of New York explained how this Act will expand our state's already radically permissive law, by empowering more health practitioners to provide abortion and removing all state restrictions on late-term abortions, including a baby born alive from a botched abortion.



Catholics love symbols and rituals since they speak to us of the Incarnational God who is with us in the ordinary moments of life.

At the weekend Masses of February 2 & 3, we will have a general blessing of throats. If anyone feels the need for an individual blessing, you can ask the celebrant for a blessing after Mass.



The following is an account of Saint Blaise:

Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebastea and a doctor. The first known record of the saint's life comes from the medical writings of Aëtius Amidenus, where he is recorded as helping patients suffering from objects stuck in their throat. Many of the miraculous aspects of St. Blaise's life are written 400 years after his martyrdom in the "Acts of St. Blaise." Saint Blaise is believed to begin as a healer then, eventually, became a "physician of souls." He then retired to a cave where he remained in prayer. People often turned to Saint Blaise for healing miracles.

In 316, Agricola, the governor of Cappadocia and of Lesser Armenia, arrested the then Bishop Blaise for being a Christian. On their way to the jail, a woman set her only son who was chocking to death on a fish bone, at his feet. Blaise cured the child, and though Agricola was amazed, he could not get Blaise to renounce his faith. Therefore, Agricola beat Blaise with a stick and tore at his flesh with iron combs before beheading him.

NYS Bishops Statement on Passage of Child Victims Act

January 28, 2018

We pray that the passage of the Child Victims Act brings some measure of healing to all survivors by offering them a path of recourse and reconciliation. The legislation now recognizes that child sexual abuse is an evil not just limited to one institution, but a tragic societal ill that must be addressed in every place where it exists.

Sadly, we in the Church know all too well the devastating toll of abuse on survivors, their families, and the extended community. Every Catholic diocese in New York has taken important steps to support survivors of child sexual abuse, including the implementation of reconciliation and compensation programs. We are proud that these pioneering programs have not only helped well more than a thousand survivors of clergy abuse in New York, but have also become a model for how to help survivors in other states and in other institutions.

Now, we hope that this same type of survivor-centered approach, that puts the emphasis on healing, is available to all survivors, regardless of when the abuse occurred, or who their abuser was—whether it was a priest, a coach, a teacher, a doctor, or, as is all too common, a family member. We have long called for strengthening the Child Victims Act and will continue to advocate for the elimination of the criminal statute of limitations, compensations programs for those who prefer it to litigation, and mandatory safe environment training for anyone who works with children, as we have implemented in the eight dioceses throughout New York State.

We thank the brave survivors who have told their stories of abuse in every sector of society. Their witness has moved us all. We renew our commitment to combatting the monstrous crime of childhood sexual abuse and helping all survivors find recourse and reconciliation as they heal.
