The Pastor's Letter

Jesus proceeded on his journey up to Jerusalem. As he drew near to Bethphage and Bethany at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples. He said, "Go into the village opposite



his disciples. He said, "Go into the village opposite you, and as you enter it you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat.

Last week, I went to the Sight and Sound Theatre in Lancaster, Pennsylvania to see their production of an experience named Jesus. I deliberately chose the word experience because that is what the show truly is. The production is put on in a theatre that holds more than 2000 people. The show has live animals, great staging, and many other powerful effects that make you feel as if you are in Jerusalem. You might even find yourself getting seasick when a storm

blows up on the Sea of Galilee or feel the power of the wind blowing on the first Pentecost.

Lancaster is Amish and Mennonite country and the theatre is conducted as a ministry by the Mennonites as a work of evangelization. (They do charge for the tickets, but the prices are fair). At the end of the show, you are invited up to the front of the stage to have someone from the large cast pray with you. I was going to pray for a healing since my knees were a bit crushed by the nearness of the seat in front of me, but I resisted. All in all, I thought the theology of the death and resurrection was very honest to the Scriptures and were certainly in line with our own Catholic beliefs. It is an amazing experience to sit with 2000 people and hear them cheer for the Resurrection of Jesus.

As we enter into Palm Sunday weekend, I was thinking of the scene in the show where Jesus comes into Jerusalem. Jesus actually rides into the scene sitting on a donkey with a cheering crowd singing and waving palms. It is has always been one of my dreams to come down the aisle of our Church sitting on a donkey for the Palm Sunday services. There are two reasons I have not done so in my eight years here:

- 1) For some reason, the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals has refused to allow me
- 2) I am also afraid there might be jokes about which one is the donkey!

The Gospel we hear on Palm Sunday speaks of Jesus coming into Jerusalem riding upon a donkey. That is not a detail that just happens to be put in the Gospel. As you can see from the following quote, the donkey (ass or colt) is very faithful to the prophecies of the Old Testament:

Prior to entering Jerusalem, Christ instructed his disciples to acquire for him a donkey (in Matthew's Gospel, a donkey and a colt). Why did Jesus ride an ass? There are four reasons. First, the prophet Zechariah wrote: "Behold, your king comes to you, triumphant and victorious. He is humble and riding on an ass, on a colt the foal of an ass." (Zech 9:9) The messianic sign was at once perceived by the crowds who hailed Jesus as their king shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" (Mt 21:9) Catholics still shout this Davidic salutation every time the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is celebrated. It is an acknowledgment that Jesus is the true Davidic Messiah and king.

Secondly, an ass is integral to the story of Abraham's offering of Isaac, a type of the oblation of the First Born Son as a sign of obedience.

The third reason is that King Solomon rode to his messianic coronation on a mule that had once belonged to David (1 Kings 1:33-44).

Fourth, King Jehu rode into Samaria (a kind of false Jerusalem) over the garments of his adherents in order to destroy the temple of the false god Baal (2 Kgs 9:11-10:28). One of the first things Christ does upon entering Jerusalem is bring judgment to the Temple which has become a den of thieves. The typology in this account is rather startling as 2 Kings chapter nine contains strong messianic language.

For the past eight years on every Palm Sunday, I have mentioned that our town of Bethpage is cited at the beginning of the Gospel of Palm Sunday: *As Jesus drew near to Bethphage and Bethany at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples ahead.* The name Bethpage comes from the Quaker Thomas Powell, who named the area after the Biblical town Bethphage, which was between Jericho and Jerusalem in the Holy Land. Present-day Bethpage was part of the 1695 Bethpage Purchase.

The Biblical Bethphage is near the Mount of Olives and to the road from Jerusalem to Jericho; mentioned together with Bethany (Matthew 21:1; Mark 11:1; Luke 19:29). The place occurs in several Talmudic passages where it may be inferred that it was near but outside Jerusalem; it was at the Sabbatical distance limit East of Jerusalem, and was surrounded by some kind of wall. The medieval Bethphage was between the summit and Bethany. The site is now enclosed by the Roman Catholics. As regards the Bethphage of the New Testament, the most probable suggestion was that it occupied the summit itself where Kefr et Tur stands today. This village certainly occupies an ancient site and no other name is known.

So, those of you who are from Bethpage, you can be proud that Jesus began his final week at a village that bears the name of our home town. I will never read or hear this Gospel without thinking of Bethpage and St. Martin's.

HOLY LAND COLLECTION

Each day the news reminds us of the violence and instability plaguing the Middle East, but we rarely hear of the shrinking Christian community there, a community that struggles to remain in the land of Christ's birth, death and resurrection. This Pontifical Collection allows the Franciscans and others to continue caring for Christianity's holiest sites and for God's people in the Holy Land. Please be as generous as your means will allow.



"Let the one with no sin cast the first stone."

One of the most haunting movies I have ever seen was a film called *The Stoning of Soraya M*. The film came out about ten years ago and is based on a true story. Due to its intense theme, it was not a popular movie. It tells a horrible tragic story of a woman named Soraya who has been married for 21 years to her abusive husband, Ari. He wants to divorce her and marry a teenager. She refuses because she will be left penniless. Ali, in order to get his divorce, falsely accuses Soraya of infidelity. This charge leads to her brutal death by stoning

with even her family participating in her execution. It is a scene almost impossible to watch. Killing a person for committing adultery is well beyond justice. Killing a person based on a false charge is incredibly evil. We know this still goes on in some nations of the world.

Through the centuries, I think it fair to say that in many cultures men have had a great deal of control and power over women. Even today, it seems that men are often paid a higher salary for the same job as a woman. The right to vote for women in the U.S. was only approved in 1920, less than a hundred years ago. Although the number of political leaders among women is growing, we have yet to elect a woman president. I will resist speaking about the role of women in the Church lest I get myself in waters beyond which I can swim!

The relationship between men and woman is a most complicated issue that is well beyond the most limited wisdom of a celibate priest. I find the title of the popular book, *Men are from Mars, Women are from Venus,* very creative in capturing the relationship between the two sexes. I think of the classic question from *When Harry Met Sally* - can men and women be friends? *Professor Higgins* in *My Fair Lady* asks *why can't a woman be more like a man.* Or the quote about the dancing of Ginger Rodgers and Fred Astaire. Ginger Rogers did everything that Fred Astaire did. Although he got more of the glory, it was noted that Ginger did it backwards and in high heels. When God confronts Adam for eating the forbidden fruit, his response is, *"The woman you put here with me—she gave me some fruit from the tree; and I ate it."*

In recent years, there has been a great movement for the protection of women from acts of physical and sexual abuse and harassment. *The Me Too Movement* is very powerful and impacting political leaders, athletes, movie stars and business people. Some say we are only at the tip of the iceberg while others feel is it being exaggerated. Although either sex can suffer various kinds of abuse, it does seem clear that physical, emotional, and sexual violence against women by men is far greater than the reverse in our society.

Last Sunday, we heard the great and moving parable of the *Prodigal Son*. It is perhaps the greatest parable of God's mercy that Jesus spoke. Today, we see that Jesus is not speaking a parable of forgiveness. He is encountering a real life situation that cries out for mercy. An adulterous woman is dragged in front of Jesus. (Notice, there is no mention of a man involved in the sin!) We can only imagine the fear and terror of this woman. She is about to meet a very cruel death. **Page Seven**

We also know that the religious authorities are not concerned about the Law of Moses of which they quote that calls for stoning an adulterer. No, this is another trap they have set for Jesus. If he calls for the stoning, he will be seen as one harsh religious leader who speaks about mercy but does not live it. If he does not condemn her, he will be accused of violating the Law of Moses. Jesus turns the question on them: *let the one without sin throw the first stone*. Even these malicious hypocrites are not so bold as to consider themselves sinless, and one by one, beginning with the oldest, they walk away. Only Jesus and the frightened woman remain. *Woman, has anyone condemned you? No sir!* she responds. He raises her up and sends her forth with the command to sin no more.

Adultery is serious sin that can lead to great destruction for the individuals and the families involved. It is wrong. Still, I believe that equally sinful is for those who simply use this woman as an object, a nonbeing, to manipulate and control as these Pharisees had done. Sexual sins are to be avoided, but perhaps even more sinful is to abuse another person, especially one in a vulnerable position, by our words and actions. Each of us is sacred and loved by God. To deliberately hurt another by our anger, deadening silence, hostility, harsh criticism and negativity or by our temper, is to stone one another. God only writes twice in the entire Bible. He writes the Ten Commandments on stone tablets. This is the Law of God to guide our morals. In the Gospel, Jesus writes on the sand with his finger. No one is sure what he is writing, but at the conclusion of his writings, mercy prevails even over the Law.

At many weddings, couples choose the words of St. Paul in his letter to the Corinthians about love being patient, kind and forgiving. They are powerful words to live a relationship by. Another reading for weddings is one that I think is a great guide for all of us in our relationship with others: *Let all bitterness and wrath and anger and clamor and slander be put away from you, along with all malice. Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you.* Ephesians 4:31-32

A BLESSED PALM SUNDAY

Hebrews 13:1-2: Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect hospitality, for through it, some have unknowingly entertained angels.

DRVC: 3/16: During Lent, the Church asks us to surrender ourselves to prayer, reading Scripture, to fasting and to giving alms. The fasting that we all do together on Fridays is but a sign of the daily Lenten discipline of individuals and households: fasting for certain periods of time, fasting from certain foods, but also fasting from other things and activities. Likewise, the giving of alms is some effort to share this world equally - not through the distribution of money, but through the sharing of our TIME & TALENTS.

Each of us will take home a piece of palm this Sunday. Many of us will cut the palm and make them into crosses that we will place in our car, above our doorways, or in our wallets. Many of us will go to a cemetery and place them on the grave of a loved one, praying over them and awaiting Easter Sunday. Many children will make little crosses and take them to neighbors that are ill, or those that no longer can attend mass or pin them on their jacket for the coming of Easter.

As we concentrate on almsgiving, maybe we could make a call to someone we need to forgive. Perhaps visit a soup kitchen and help give food to the homeless. Take a walk down the block to a neighbor that has been a shut-in and spend a little time. Filling a bag of \$1 bunnies and chicks and maybe a balloon or two and stop at a pediatric unit at a local hospital, will bring a smile to a child that cannot go home, and fill your heart as you leave. Write a letter to a soldier in need of a word from home.



In our parish, all ministries are in need of volunteers. Just a few hours a week would be a gift to each of them. There are so many to choose from including music, teaching religious education, Eucharistic Minister, lector or the food pantry, to name a few. The DRVC Pro-Life Ministry is in need of volunteers to lead Pro-life Committees in each parish. Time is so precious, and giving of it is quite a sacrifice, but time given to change or make better the life of another will fill your heart. You will take home with you more than you have ever given. May you walk in the footsteps of our Lord, Jesus Christ and consider the sacrifice He has given for each of us. Maybe the giving of alms will bring us to a true and beautiful understanding of his glory.
