

The Pastor's Letter



I have always felt that it is easier to preach a sermon on Good Friday rather than on Easter Sunday. That may sound strange to you since Easter is such a day of joy and Good Friday is a time of sadness and sorrow. But the truth is we are all very familiar with death and loss, pain and suffering. It does not take faith to believe in death; it is a very real part of our journey of life. We have all lost family members and friends, and it has broken our hearts. We have read about mass shootings, holocausts, savage wars, epidemics, accidents, natural disasters, and famines where hun-

dreds and thousands of people have died. We know that no one, not even us, will escape an ending to our natural life.

Ah, but resurrection is harder to see and capture with words. But I believe, as the Scriptures promise: life is stronger than death, and we do feel in our bones, in our hearts, in our souls that there is life beyond what we see here on earth. I think these words of the great American playwright Thornton Wilder capture that reality from his great play Our Town that are spoken by the stage manager to the audience: We all know that something is eternal. And it ain't houses and it ain't names, and it ain't earth, and it ain't even the stars . . . everybody knows in their bones that something is eternal, and that something has to do with human beings. All the greatest people ever lived have been telling us that for five thousand years and yet you'd be surprised how people are always losing hold of it. There's something way down deep that's eternal about every human being. You know that.

We are blessed to live in an area with a change of climate. As the death of winter passes, we delight and cherish the new life that is breaking forth all around us. Nature proclaims resurrection and new life. We live this amazing cycle every year. And even more obvious is night and day, sleep and being awake. Even though I try to stay up and watch the last innings of the Met game, my eyes grow heavy and I move to sleepiness. We sleep and cease to be alive to the world around us. Then, at 6:00 a.m., my radio announces that the Mets have lost another game. The day has begun!

As much as life can be routine, I have never found that no two days have ever been exactly the same. Each day has its own experiences and nuances. It is new day. What will the day bring? Could we not say that each day we awake is a sort of mini-resurrection that speaks of the divine reality of eternal life promised by Jesus? Any analogy discussing the Resurrection of Jesus will be inadequate for this awe-some mystery, but I think of two stories that have been in recent news that speak to me of moving from death to life. The first may strike you a bit of a stretch, but I am thinking of Tiger Woods, my long lost cousin, who recently won the Masters Golf Tournament to the great shock of all the experts. Now aspects of this golfer's life in the past do not make him a candidate for canonization. Still, as I thought all that he has experienced in the last decade, public humiliation brought on by his actions, a significant number of injuries that demanded serious surgeries, and the very process of an athlete getting older and losing some skills, I felt he would never win a big tournament again. He himself was ready to retire two years ago since his back was so bad. Now he is on the cover of every magazine and the most recognized athlete in America and, for me, an image of resurrection.

The second image of resurrection - moving from death to life - is that of the tragic fire at Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, a church which I had the opportunity to visit. The initial reaction of the citizens of Paris and people throughout the world as they saw their beloved icon in flames, was to weep. But when I saw the people of one of the most secularized countries in Europe, in particular the young, watching the flames as they sang hymns and recited the rosary, I saw a faith - perhaps that had been buried deep in the hearts of many - come to life for a time. Then, I watched in awe as many men and women risked their lives to recover the relics, art and sacred images from the church. It was again to know that this 800 year old cathedral was not just a museum to the past, but a proclamation of faith. Then flowed the immediate promises of the rich and poor, secular and religious, to speak to the reality that the serious damage must be repaired and the glory of Notre Dame restored. Death to Life! Resurrection! When I first watched the fire on the news, I thought maybe it was terrorism. It clearly seems not to have been. And in a world where Christians and Muslims often experience great mistrust of one another, I was happy to read the following: Kamel Kabtane, a leader of the French Moslem community, said the following: "We call on Muslims in France to show their solidarity by actively participating in the national solidarity campaign that will be launched to find ways to rebuild this place of history of our country and this place of prayer so dear to our Christian brothers. A hint of resurrection and new life!

For two thousand years we have been proclaiming the Resurrection of Jesus. I will conclude with the words of one of the greatest witnesses of the Resurrection - St. Paul. The Apostle said, The first thing I did was place before you what was placed so emphatically before me: that the Messiah died for our sins, exactly as Scripture tells it; that he was buried; that he was raised from death on the third day, again exactly as Scripture says; that he presented himself alive to Peter, then to his closest followers, and later to more than five hundred of his followers all at the same time, most of them still around (although a few have since died); that he then spent time with James and the rest of those he commissioned to represent him; and that he finally presented himself alive to me!

For the past six summers we have had a week long summer Bible Camp for the young children of the parish. One of the activities that are done is the scavenger hunt in the Church. The children are divided into groups and given a series of items to discover such as: where is the holy water font, where is the infant Jesus statue, where is the Blessed Mother picture and so on. It is a practice that the kids enjoy.

I was thinking that if one of the questions was *how many crosses and crucifixes* are in the church that would be a difficult question to answer. We immediately think of the beautiful resurrection cross above the altar, and the striking carved

image of the crucified Jesus near the altar. But don't miss the cross above each station of the cross. We have two processional crosses as well as the 9/11 cross and I am sure many others. I think of the great consolation that the recovery workers had at Ground Zero when they found mangled steel beams that were in the form of a cross. As the recovery went on, it became a place of prayer, of blessing, and consolation for those seeking to recover the remains of those who had died. The cross is a most powerful Christian symbol!


I remember taking a course many years ago on liturgy. The professor asked us a question: should we use a crucifix or cross for our Good Friday services. I raised my hand and said it should be a crucifix. I said that the body of Jesus on the cross was a very powerful image of our Lord's suffering and death. The professor gently told me I was wrong! He went on to explain that the cross we venerate and kiss today at our Good Friday service is the better symbol. Jesus **is not** on the cross at this time. Our Lord is now sitting at the right hand of the Father and risen in glory. We, the people of the past, the present, and the future **are** on the cross. We are the people who are suffering and in pain - a man dying slowly of bone cancer, a parent burying her daughter who died of an opioid addiction, a refugee fleeing war or poverty, a couple enduring a bitter divorce, a lonely widow grieving for her spouse, a bullied child who sits alone in the lunchroom, a victim of clergy sexual abuse, a starving child, a heart filled with anger and resentment, envy or greed, a person walking in the darkness of depression or mental illness. The litany goes on. **We** are now on the cross of Christ.

We are not masochists. Christians do not embrace or love pain or suffering. We do not choose the burden and sometimes find it unbearable to carry at times. We want to cry out with Jesus, My God, My God, why have you abandoned me. We may want to cry to God with Old Testament Job and demand that God tell us why we suffer. But it seems his voice is silent to us as it was to Jesus who clung to his firm belief that I am the Beloved Son of God. Although all my apostles and friends have left, I believe he is with me. The Emmanuel of Christmas - God with us, remains true to the words of Jesus. It is finished. So, we come forward today and in awe and reverence to kiss the cross. We do this because we know God so loved the world that he gave his only Son that whoever believes in him will not die, but have eternal life. Every cross is sacred because it shakes our soul with the reality of the love of God.

We come forward to kiss the cross as a response to our own suffering. The cross may be on our shoulders today, or may be in time to come. But we know it is unavoidable. As we kiss the cross, this ritual is our response in faith that God will not abandon us. When we are on the cross, when are in pain or suffer, he *is* with us.

Elie Wiesel tells a story of the death camp of Auschwitz that describes this reality. He speaks of a time when the Nazi guards randomly lined up ten prisoners to hang since someone had tried to escape. One of them was a small boy five or six years old. All the prisoners of the camp were made to watch this horror. The nine adults died quickly. The boy because, he was small and thin, did not. He hung in agony, gasping and crying for breathe. Wiesel says it was the darkest of so many brutal experiences. A voice from one of the prisoners said with bitterness, *Where is God?* The only sounds are that of those of dying child. Then another prisoner points to the child, and says, *God is right there with the boy*.

This faith in that promise is **why** we kiss the cross of Christ.


