### The Pastor's Letter

My mother was always afraid that she had cancer. I know that is a fear that many people have since it is such a prevalent disease. We know great strides have been made in battling this disease but to hear the word from a doctor can be overwhelming. I recall once that Mom fell from standing on a chair to get into a closet and broke her hand. She went to the doctor and he set the bone and put a cast on her wrist, but she was convinced it was bone cancer. So, when my Mom was in her

late seventies, we took her to a doctor and it turned out this time she really did have cancer. We were told it was very treatable and it was, but my sister and I felt this would be the worst possible news my mother could hear and that she would probably collapse in fear. So, when we got into the car, she said, let's go get a cup of tea, and have a sandwich. In the Irish culture, it seems a cup of tea can diminish any fear or worry. It was the ultimate comfort food, better even than Twinkies or mac and cheese.

I remember when I went to my first funeral of a beloved aunt. The family was so very sad at her death, and it was the first time that I had gone to a wake. I recall that after the burial at Calvary Cemetery, we went to a local restaurant in Brooklyn and had a meal with most of my relatives attending. I was surprised by this. It seemed strange to be mourning and eating at the same time. I came to learn that this was a common ritual that families had. These meals were special because we continue to share memories of the deceased, to laugh and remember them in a beautiful way. Such meals have a powerful effect on healing and comforting those who have suffered loss.

Our parish is having its fourth ALPHA program and I am very happy about that, and hope it continues into the future. An ALPHA evening consists of a simple meal, a video about Jesus, and a discussion. When we were planning ALPHA, it was the importance of the meal that baffled me. I thought - why not start right with the video and discussion! What was so important about beginning with a meal? I soon came to see how wrong I was. I now see the meal at ALPHA as most essential to the program. People who do not know each other slowly begin to bond over lasagna and meatballs, and come to know each other better and it builds a true sense of cohesion among the participants as they seek to share faith.

Jesus was often going to a meal, eating a meal, or leaving a meal. This was an essential method he used in preaching his message. It was called table ministry. Sinners were welcomed at these meals. We recall that Jesus fed thousands of people with a few loaves and fishes. His first miracle was to turn water into wine so that a festive wedding meal could continue. The word *Bethlehem* means *house of bread* and Jesus is placed in a manger, a place of food for the animals. The return of the Prodigal Son concludes with a great meal and the conversion of Zacchaeus leads to another meal. It is easy for us to see how important meals were for Jesus and his ministry. The night before he dies, Jesus shares the ultimate Jewish meal with his disciples: the Passover meal which celebrates that God brought the Jewish people out of slavery into freedom and the Promised Land. On that night he takes bread and says *this is my body*, and he takes a cup of wine and says *this is my blood shed for you*. Then he says: *Do this in memory of me*. This meal, which will continue until the end of the world, is the meal that brings all who believe in Jesus into his death and resurrection. Whenever we celebrate this meal at Mass, we proclaim with one voice: *Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again*. We have the expression *you are what you eat:* at the Eucharist we eat the Body of Christ, and we become his body now alive in us in a very unique way.

The Easter Gospels are some of my favorites. Although Christ has shown himself to the apostles and Mary Magdalene, it does seem that the first believers are struggling to understand this most wondrous reality: the one who was dead is risen! At times Jesus is described almost as a ghost-like figure who can pass through doors and often not recognized. In other times, he has a real body that can be touched. Although this is a time of great wonder and awe for the apostles, they are also confused. Perhaps, they almost doubt what they have seen and experienced. Like us, they believe but continue to have questions. Key to understanding these Gospels is that the apostles have yet to receive the fullness of the outpouring of the Holy Spirit. That will happen on Pentecost.

Peter and the apostles find themselves in a kind of Limbo, so when they don't know exactly what to do, they decide to go back to what they know best. So, the fishermen go fishing. I think of my sister. When she is worried, she starts vacuuming the house. As we heard in the Gospel, they are not catching any fish. They hear the voice of a stranger telling them to try the other side of the boat. The Apostle John is the first to recognize Jesus: <u>it is the Lord</u>, he cries out. Then, Peter jumps into the water and starts to swim toward Jesus. You have to love the passion of Peter - ever eager to show his love after denying the Lord three times.

Jesus is on the shore preparing breakfast for the apostles. He is ready to cook fish over the fire and share bread with them. We might call this the first church cookout! Jesus, who was the foot washer at the Last Supper is now the tender Master preparing food for his friends. A ghost does not cook food. Jesus is truly raised! This is another key moment as our Lord prepares them for their mission to go and preach the Gospel to the entire world. These men are slowly being transformed into the pillars upon whose faith the church will be built.


What has brought us to Mass today? Do we need comfort because of the challenges and burdens of life? Do we need to touch and encounter the mercy of God through Jesus? Has this sacred ritual possibly become a routine or an obligation? We need food to live. A meal brings us together. We use food to heal us as we mourn, to celebrate joyful moments, to mark special occasions, to share life with one another. We bring ourselves to this sacred meal, with all our strengths and struggles. Jesus is in our midst, feeding us with his body and blood. I have a friend who loves to eat out. When you go to a restaurant with him, he will say, we are not here to eat; we are here to dine. At this Mass, at every Eucharist, we are with the risen Jesus who comes to us in this most visible and mysterious way. Jesus says to us, I am the bread of life; whoever eats my body and drinks my blood shall have eternal life.

#### ALIVE FROM NEW YORK

There seems to have been a backwash as a result of the radical HHS Abortion Law Governor Cuomo signed into law on January 28, 2019. Thousands gathered in Times Square last Saturday as abortion survivors joined with pro-life advocates for a special FOCUS ON THE FAMILY event that broadcasted a 4D ultrasound image of an unborn baby. Several abortion survivors described their accounts to the large crowd.
