The Pastor's Letter

It's hard to let go of the past when it's holding some of the best memories.

Father, do you know where you are going yet? This is a question that several parishioners have asked me in the past few weeks. I am sure it is equally true for my other confreres as well. My sense of this question is that it comes from a place of care in the questioner. He/she knows that not knowing what is to come can cause anxiety and there is a desire that we be at peace. When I hear the question asked, I feel that I am being cared for by our parish.

I do not believe that any of us will get the answer to that particular question until mid-June. The process of getting our assignment has several steps. First, about six months ago, we elected our Province leaders for the next four years. Our leadership team has a Provincial, Father Paul Borowski, and two full-time advisors, Fathers Jerry Knapp and Matthew Allman. In addition to these three men, we also have five part-time advisors. These men have other ministries in the Province but meet monthly with the Provincial and his team. These eight men are responsible for making the assignments of all the men in our province.

Over the past several months, the eight men have been broken into four teams of two. The four teams are then assigned Redemptorist communities to visit and speak with the confrere of the community. So, two of the advisors to the Provincial came for a day here at St. Martin's to visit with us. We had a meeting with all of us together and then each of us had our own meeting with the team. During that meeting, we are asked how we see ourselves fitting into the ministries of the Province. We are asked about our health and what we might desire to do in the coming four years. So, we might name a particular place we think we would like to be stationed or we might name a more general ministry in which we might wish to serve. The advisors might suggest a few situations to us, but there is final decision given.

There is a week-long meeting in June at which all the information that the teams have gathered is then shared with the entire Provincial Council. There is also an assessment of what are the personnel needs of the province and how they might be best served. Finally, after several days of lengthy discussions, the decisions are made, and the phone calls to the confreres throughout the province begin. This is one time when many of us are nervous when the phone rings. We are told our assignment and a date is set for our arrival at the new location.

Many confreres remain in their present situations for another term while others move to a new assignment. For twenty-one years, I was very involved in this process as a part-time advisor, full-time advisor, and as the Provincial. The men who do this work take it most seriously and try to the best of their abilities to serve the needs of both the province and to place the individual confrere in a pastoral situation that will be fulfilling to both him and the people he serves. One of the beauties of the system is that the men who make the appointments know us pretty well; they also know that the positions they have are not permanent and the very men they are assigning, may one day be assigning them.

Where am I in all of this? I have known since I arrived here at St. Martin's that it would be only for eight years since a pastor in our Redemptorist system only serves two four-year terms before he is reassigned. For me, there is a great sadness in leaving that is heightened by the fact that the Redemptorists are leaving St. Martin's. It would have been hard for me to leave anyway but the reality of sadness for many of you with our withdrawal adds to my sense of sorrow.

I tend to be a person who is anxious about what is to come. Yet, that feeling of worry about where I am going has not overwhelmed me. These have been busy months and I am trying to live each of the days here with joy and energy. I have come to truly love parish life. So, I could certainly see myself working in another parish. I also like to preach and to be assigned to a retreat house has its appeal. I am not sure if I will be asked to take a position of leadership such as pastor. I have mixed feelings about that very issue. I have had a fair amount of responsibility for the past thirty years. Being in charge has its blessing: you can make decisions and try new things; you are busy and have lots of demands on you. I think I would miss some of that very much. Yet, stepping back into a less demanding role would also have its blessings. It would be an adjustment.

All of you have gone through such changes in your own lives: choosing a school, getting married, having children, buying a home, moving, seeing the children grow up and move away, retiring, downsizing your home, and so forth. An illness of the death of a loved one changes our lives in an instant and quite dramatically. Change is part of life. I think of two great examples from Scripture, that of Abraham who is asked by God to leave all that he knows and to follow an unknown plan that God slowly reveals to him; and our Blessed Mother, who, as a young girl of fifteen or sixteen, is visited by the Archangel Gabriel and whose life is transformed in a most awesome way with the question...will you be the Mother of God? This young girl says yes in the greatest act of faith to God.

If I had my way, I would love to stay here at pastor for the rest of my life. But as an eighteen year boyman I made a promise to God and the Redemptorists to do what I am asked to do by my religious superiors. That promise has shaped my life and brought me much happiness over the past fifty years. God has blessed me over the years, and I know he will continue to do so.

I hadn't realized as I looked around how much deeper the colors are and how green God's outside world really is. I hadn't realized how much I was missing. What a world He has created! *God is good!*

Lastly, a reflection...time changes all things be they physical, emotional or even spiritually. Spring has sprung and the outside world is waking up and enhancing everything around it. At the Resurrection, we went from darkness to Light. In Spring, usually everything seems brighter, the birds sing louder, the trees dress up in their "Sunday best" to compete with all that is around them. Spring eventually calls on Summer to make itself known with all of its pleasures and activities. Summer will then get tired and call on Fall to do its thing and Fall will bring the beauty and the pain of Winter. Life goes on but in God's hands, he snaps his fingers, nods his head with a smile on His face and we remember what we heard in Genesis... "And God saw that it was good!" I am so proud to be a parishioner of St. Martin of Tours Church! Let's keep on journeying. God is more than good. God is awesome!







ALABAMA SENATE OUTLAWS ABORTION, SETTING UP SUPREME COURT ROE V. WADE CHALLENGE: CNA,

Montgomery Ala. May. 14, 2019. The Alabama Senate approved a bill that will outlaw nearly all abortion in the state. The bill, which is expected to be signed by Gov. Kay Ivey, is intended to be a direct challenge to Roe v. Wade, the 1973 Supreme Court decision that declared unconstitutional state measures prohibiting abortion.

The Human Life Protection Act (HB314), if signed into law, will make attempting or performing an abortion a felony offense. Doctors who perform abortion would be charged with a Class A felony and could face between 10 years and life in prison. The penalty



would apply ONLY TO DOCTORS, NOT TO MOTHERS, who according to the bill's sponsors, would not face criminal penalties for undergoing abortions. The measure does include a provision that would allow abortions "in cases where abortion is necessary in order to prevent a serious health risk to the unborn child's mother."

Opponents pledged months ago to challenge the legislation in court. This is exactly what the bill's sponsors expected. Supporters say court challenges could lead to a reversal of the Roe v. Wade decision. Bishop Robert Baker of Birmingham said in April that the legislation reflects "the strong commitment that the people of Alabama have to life." In an April 2 statement, the bishop praised the lawmakers' effort.
