### The Pastor's Letter

### **NEW MASS SCHEDULE HAS BEEN PREPARED**

The new associate pastor for our parish has been named. We are happy to welcome Father Sylvester Ileka. Father Sylvester is currently serving as Chaplin at South Nassau Communities Hospital and resides at St. Christopher Church in Baldwin. Father Christopher Costigan, our newly named pastor and Father Sylvester, will begin their pastoral care of St. Martin's coming August 1<sup>st</sup>. They are both very happy and look forward to serving here.

Ever since the Redemptorist Provincial, Father Paul Borowski CSSR announced that the Redemptorists would be returning the pastoral care of the parish back to the Diocese of Rockville Centre, many of us have had to move through many emotions - among them anger, resentment, sadness, anxiety, hope, and anticipation. I certainly have felt this mixture of feelings in both myself and from others. For many of us, change is never easy. Now, we are drawing closer to August 1<sup>st</sup> and we all want to do all that we can to say a loving farewell to the Redemptorists for their service here for the past thirty three years, and to give a warm welcome to the newly named priests, Fathers Chris and Sylvester. My own goal, and the goal of my confreres, staff, and parishioners is to do all we can to make as smooth and helpful transition as possible.

As you know, well before the thought that the Redemptorists would leave St. Martin's, I had begun to speak about the need to change our present Mass schedule. The main reason was because attendance at several Masses had been lessening. This reality is happening in many faith traditions throughout the United States as secularism becomes increasingly more powerful in our culture. For a variety of reasons, attracting younger people to practice their Catholic faith is a great challenge. Bishops, priests, and laity have been pondering this serious issue and seeking to develop programs that are inviting to the generations that seem to be losing touch with their Catholic faith after celebrating Confirmation. We trust in the Holy Spirit and do what we can to be inviting and welcoming people.

The other major factor in adjusting the Mass schedule is based on the idea that the liturgy is a celebration of the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. Every Mass, whether well-attended or not, moves the participants into the sacred mysteries of faith. However, when there are more participants in the congregation, it can help enhance the experience of community. Over the years, the Redemptorists have generally had three to four priests here on staff. That was certainly due to the pastoral needs of the parish, but another key factor is that community life is a core value of our order. We generally seek to have at least three to four men in our communities. Having said that, I think our present Redemptorist clergy would say that all of us found our ministry quite active and highly satisfying. The Diocese asked that I change the present Mass schedule in preparation for the coming of just two priests. After discussions with clergy, the parish staff, the Pastoral Council, informal chats with other parishioners and with the new pastor, I have decided on the following schedule:

- Saturday confessions at 2:00 p.m. will continue.
- Beginning August 2nd, there will be one daily Mass at 9:00AM
- Saturday Evening Vigil Mass: 5:00PM
- Sundays Masses: 7:30AM (no music), 10:00AM (Family), 12:00PM, 5:30PM (Teen Mass)
- With the *exception* of the daily Mass change beginning on August 2<sup>nd</sup>, the new weekend Mass schedule will begin on July 13<sup>th</sup>-14<sup>th</sup>

I know these changes may well upset some of our parishioners and I do regret that. However, I believe this is the best decision that I could make at this time. I wish the Church in the United States was in a position where we needed to **add** more Masses to our schedule. Trusting in the grace of the Holy Spirit, we live in hope that such a reality may be in the future. When one studies church history, we see many cycles of great faith and great struggles through the centuries.

The first time I was going to Ireland, an older Redemptorist, knowing my family was from County Clare, told me, you must visit the Ark at Kilbaja. Don't miss that! So, when I visited my cousins in Ireland, I asked them to take me there. Kilbaja is a small village on the west coast of Ireland on the Atlantic Ocean. Still preserved in a small church, it is a small covered roof wooden structure on wheels. There



was enough room for one person to stand on the openended side. In the 19<sup>th</sup> century, many of the wealthy Protestant landowners would not allow their tenants to have Mass on their property. So, the people of Kilbaja built the ark and every week they would wheel it out a foot or so in the ocean. The priest would stand in the ark and say Mass while they stood on the sand and in the water. The beach was a type of no-mans land meaning that no-one was breaking the law by using that area. As I saw this, and think about

it now, how those villagers valued their Mass.

Changing mass times may cause inconveniences, but how blessed we are to have priests in Bethpage who can offer the holy Mass five times on a weekend.

In the thirty-three years that you have experienced the Redemptorists at St. Martin's, you have come to know and love many of our priests. Unfortunately, there was never a Redemptorist Brother stationed here at the parish. Our order is made up of priests, Brothers, and vowed students who are preparing to be priests or Brothers. Most Redemptorists are priests, but there has always been a solid core of Brothers.

These are men who believe God has called them to the Redemptorist way of life, but they do not feel that God is calling them to the priesthood. Some make this decision because

they do not wish to pursue the academic studies necessary for ordination. Others are often brilliant men who know that God has called them to be Brothers. We have had Brothers in our Congregation since our beginnings in 1732. When all of his first companions left our founder, St. Alphonsus, it was only Brother Vitus Curtius who stayed with him. The Brothers like to remind us of this fact from time to time. It is fair to say the most popular Redemptorist of all time is a Brother - St. Gerard Majella.

I remember when I was a young seminarian rushing off to teach a religion class, I jokingly said to one of elderly Brothers, *Rudy, I am going off to save souls*. In a heavily German accented voice he said to me, *save your own soul first*! Probably the best wisdom I have received. Brothers do all sort of ministry in our order. Some serve in our parish offices, others care for the physical needs of the property, some teach, others counsel, and some serve as leaders in our Congregation. I think the key gift of the Brothers in our order is that they by their very lives witness to that truth that though most of us are priests, we are Redemptorists, members of a religious order, called to live religious life. Before we are priests, we are Redemptorists. I have found many of our Brothers to be deeply spiritual men who have bordered on being mystics.

I choose to write about our Brothers since about six weeks ago, one of my closest friends, Brother Thomas Kuhn CSSR, died. Then, yesterday, I received the very sad news that another very close friend of mine, Brother John Bosco Hammond CSSR, had gone home to the Lord. These two deaths were painful for their families, for me, and the Redemptorists, and for the many people they served. These two Brothers were also close to Father Denis and he too mourns them very much. Both Brothers shared many happy moments with me, my family and my friends.

Tom and Bosco were also good friends, but they were very different from one another. Tom was a very quiet man. He was very intelligent and could beat me in a game of chess in about three minutes. We worked closely together for five years in Washington DC. He always called me *Woodsie*. He loved the Cleveland Browns and Indians. He was incredibly caring to our older men when they were in need. He was eventually struck with Parkinson's disease for many years, and bore that burden with a great faith in Jesus. He was a holy man. When we were together in Washington, I was the superior or the community and he was a great assistant to me who handled the financial affairs of the community. In other words, he tried to help me keep the budget balanced. I remember one Lent. The feast of St. Clement Hofbauer, a great Redemptorist saint, fell on Friday and we could not have meat to celebrate the saint. I told Tom to get lobster tails for supper for our community. When I came to supper eager to butter my lobster, there were fish cakes. I asked Tom where the lobsters were. He said, *Woodsie, I could not find any*. I smiled and said, Tom, *in city of Washington DC there was not one store with lobster tails*. He smiled and shrugged. I miss Tom very much.

Brother John Bosco Hammond, (this was his religious name which he preferred to use rather than John, his birth), was the opposite of Tom when it came to speaking. If Tom was quiet, Bosco never stopped talking. In an order that has produced many of the greatest characters in the history of religious life; he would in the top five of our Province. There are so many stories about Bosco. I mentioned that he was a great talker. I remember we went to visit the City Toronto. It was a about a three hour drive from where we were stationed. After touring, we got a hotel room with twin beds. As I fell asleep he was talking and when I woke ups he was talking; the only thing I was not sure of was did he speak all night while I slept. Perhaps, the greatest Bosco story of all was when the Diocese of Erie had a special meeting of its key staff our seminary during the summer. Bosco was helping to serve them dinner and one of the diocesan officials, a nun, said to Bosco, I did not know that the Redemptorist had Brothers. Bosco took offence at this and said to the good Sister, Sister you may someday become a priest, but you will never become a Brother!

Bosco was the hardest working man I ever met. Perhaps that is why we were friends - opposites attract. He painted rooms, he plowed snow, he shopped, he drove people where they needed to go, waxed floors and cut grass. One of the legends of Bosco is that he was stopped by the police at 3:00 a.m. because he was cutting our lawn and there were complaints. Bosco had a rough childhood, and when he joined the Redemptorists, he found his family. He loved talking about the Redemptorists. He was so proud of his vocation. He was quick to correct me if was not at the community prayers or if I were not wearing the proper religious garb. He thought I took sports too seriously and often told me, you play ball with God, and then God will play ball with you. I think it was his way of telling me to pray more for my favorite teams.

Bosco was always the life of the party but in the last years of his life, he seemed to change and lose some of his amazing spirit. He had his medical issues. But this past April, my sister and our friend went to see the Sight and Sound Show about Jesus. I had bought Bosco a ticket but he did not feel up to going. We were disappointed. But the next morning, the four of us went out for breakfast. Bosco became the old Bosco and we had so much fun and joy at the breakfast as he and teased one another and the two women laughed. He was Bosco again and that is my last memory him and a great gift from God. I will miss you. Lord, I thank you for Tom and Bosco and know I have two friends in high places.







### RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

BISHOP JOHN BARRES, STATE CATHOLIC CONFERENCE REACT TO FAILED ATTEMPT TO PROTECT BORN-ALIVE ABORTION SURVIVORS: The LI Catholic printed in its May 16, 2019 edition about Bishop Barres reacting to an amendment to restore legal protections to born-alive abortion survivors. The article was printed in our bulletin last Sunday. The last paragraph read: "As your bishop, I urge each and every one of you, the People of God of this great diocese, to consider this responsibility when discerning your vote in future elections. It is through fervent prayer, and our unrelenting commitment to speak out and defend all human life, that the horrific course we are presently on can be changed."

New York State has passed the most radical abortion bill (RHA) in our country. As you know the Empire State Building was lit up in pink to show how this bill was celebrated by Governor Cuomo who put the bill into action. As a result, you can see the backlash of states throughout America, redefining abortion, and putting forward new bills that would limit abortion, and even make it illegal.

Most importantly is the fact, as Bishop Barres states, we must not give up opposition to this bill here in New York, and to support those that are trying to put forth limits to protect these babies born-alive with no doctor assistance. We must continue to WRITE: EMAIL: CALL: Governor Cuomo, and our state's legislature to continue to show our opposition. We must do the same with the White House, to let our President know that we are in full opposition to the bill passed in New York.

**CNA:** May 24, 2019: A quarter of the Senate signed a letter on Wednesday seeking to keep pro-life and religious freedom protections intact during the drafting of upcoming appropriations bills. The bills will be for the upcoming Fiscal Year 2020, which begins this fall. The letter, sent to Senate Appropriations Chairman Richard Shelby (R-AL), requested that the appropriations committee decline to advance any bills with language that would weaken or remove PRO-LIFE or PRO-RELIGIOUS LIBERTY measures out in place by the Trump administration. Senator Marco Rubio (R-FL) who is a member of the committee and a signatory of the letter, told CNA that he was committed to preventing a SINGLE DOLLAR of public money being used to support abortion. "Taxpayer dollars should not be used to end an innocent, unborn life," Rubio told CNA.

We must continue to make our voice heard, here in New York, our Senate and House of Representatives and the White House. By writing, going on line to oppose this legislation, calling and emailing, we as New Yorkers will get out the word to the rest of America that we are in direct opposition. As Bishop Barres stated: "It defies common sense and public opinion. We continue to pray for a change of heart among elected officials who support such a radical assault on the sacredness and dignity of human life."
