The Pastor's Getter

ears ago, I read a book by a woman named Martha Manning called *Chasing Grace*. Amazon described the book this way: The eldest child of a devout Irish-American Catholic family, Martha Manning weaves her story around the seven holy sacraments: baptism, penance, communion, confirmation, holy orders, marriage and last rites. She recalls her childhood pratfalls, adolescent yearnings and entrance into motherhood with wisdom, wit and remarkable honesty.

One of my favorite stories that Manning writes was about a night that she, her mother, and two elderly nuns had gone to dinner and a show in Washington, D.C. By the time the show ends, it has gotten rather late. As they drive home, they soon find themselves hopelessly lost in some very dangerous parts of our nation's capital. The two nuns are in the back seat chatting and laughing about the wonderful evening they had just shared. They are completely oblivious to any danger they may be in. In the front seat, Martha and her mother are getting more and more frightened. These are the days before cell phones and GPS. Finally, Martha can't take it anymore and she turns to the two Sisters and says, *be quiet, don't you realize we could be killed at any moment?* One of the nuns says, *don't worry dear. We are all in the state of grace.* The author goes on to say that she and her mother often told this story and ended with the words, *can you believe those nuns?* And the other would respond, *No, but I wish I had that much faith!* 

In our Gospel today, Jesus is speaking to his apostles about his leaving them to return to the Father. We just marked The Feast of the Ascension this past Thursday. It is clear that Jesus has a deep and profound love for these men. I have always loved the scene in the musical *Godspell* where Jesus is saying farewell to his disciples. It is a very emotional scene, and one that captures the love and sadness that both the Lord and the apostles are experiencing. He promises to send the Holy Spirit. The Gospel speaks these words to them and to us: *Righteous Father, the world also does not know you, but I know you, and they know that you sent me. I made known to them your name and I will make it known, that the love with which you loved me may be in them and I in them.*" Our Lord uses the words the world several times in the Gospel. What does Jesus mean by *the world* and why is he so concerned about its impact on his followers? Is Jesus renouncing the world as an evil place, a reality from which we need to isolate and protect ourselves?

The traditional phrase *the world, the flesh and the devil* captures the power of temptation and what might turn a follower from God. To be called *worldly* is not a compliment in terms of Christian values. Yet, God chose to become fully human and enter into our world. He lived all that was human except sin. He turned water into wine so a party could continue. He attended festive dinners and delighted in children, the lilies of the fields and fields of purple flowers. He had friends in whom he delighted.

There has been a long history, and not without wisdom, of fearing the power of the society and culture that could lead a believer away from the Lord. Many saints chose to withdraw from the world around them. Some of the earliest followers of Jesus chose to go in the desert to withdraw from temptation. Still, Vatican II gives another long held tradition of the Catholic faith, as it speaks about how much wonder and goodness are in creation and in people who may not be followers of Christ.

Many of us loved the image of Saint John Paul II when he would get off of a plane in a country that he had never visited. He would kiss the ground since it was holy to him. Many secular people, as well as others who are not followers of Jesus or those who have no faith beliefs, are doing wonders around us.



They are feeding the poor, working to protect the environment, seeking to build peace, fighting disease and sickness, and caring for the abandoned. I believe, whether they know it or not, that they are doing such great deeds by the grace of God. I think of some of the great movies I have seen, television shows that have inspired me, music that has moved my heart, books that have made me see new realities, and creativity that amazes me. I see the hand of God in such activities of our world.

Yet, we are not naïve about the modern world. There are very

strong and seductive currents that are not in line with the Gospel. To state a few: the hostility toward life in the womb and the considerations of euthanasia, the easiness with which our world turns to war, bigotry and racism, misuse of the wonderful gift of marriage and sexuality, greed, pride, rampant selfishness, and hostility toward people of faith. How easy it is to say, *everybody else is doing it!* or *it's not my problem!* This is *the world* that Jesus warns and worries about leading to great harm to the believers.

The challenges for people of faith is to discern what is best in the world around us and embrace it; and to turn away from that which is sinful and ugly in the plan of God. A question that a follower of Jesus must ask himself and herself regularly is: *Is the world changing me, or am I changing the world*?

As you may have noticed over the years that I have been here at St. Martin's, I like to tell stories of the past about people, places and events that were important to me. Memory is a great gift from God and I think as we get older, we fear any diminishment of our memories. In later years, my father slowly began to be affected by loss of memory: I am never sure if this is dementia, Alzheimer's, or hardening of the arteries. I

first clearly noticed it when I arrived home to Brooklyn after several months of teaching in our seminary which was in Western Pennsylvania at that time. When he saw me, he was delighted and welcomed me. He then asked me if I had come by horse from Killanena. Killanena was the name of the village where he grew up in Ireland. Although pained at what I saw happening to him, I said, *no Dad, I came by car by Erie.* 

Unlike most Irishman, my father was never one to sing in a pub or at a party. Elena, our music director, has frequently asked me to follow that same tradition of Dad. However, once at supper, he suddenly broke into this verse: *Up with the kettle and down with the pan, and give us a penny to bury the wren.* In parts of rural Ireland, many years ago, on the day after Christmas, St. Stephen's Day, the local boys would go from house to house in a way similar to our Halloween, asking for money, either for themselves or for a good cause. I am not sure if they played tricks or not on those they visited. The wren was a bird that that Irish believed had betrayed them in the middle-ages by revealing them in a battle with the Norsemen. The bird was also blamed for betraying the first Christian martyr St. Stephen. I was fascinated to hear my Dad sing a childhood nursery rhyme in his mid-seventies. In his own mind, for a moment, he was a *Wren Boy*. Memory - and how it works in us - amazes me.

I can sit and think of great memories of Dad: my first trip with him to the Polo Grounds to see the 1962 Mets. I can walk in Grand Central Station, where he worked for more than 40 years, and feel his presence, or visualize him lying in the sun at Coney Island. I find such remembering bittersweet. When we remember, we enjoy the gift of the other person for a moment, but then realize that the moment has passed and I miss the person. It also reminds us that we are getting older and no longer a child or a young priest home on vacation.

These thoughts came to me as I prayed about the Ascension of Jesus into Heaven. For thirty-three years Jesus walked the earth. He ate and drank, and breathed the same air as I. He sailed on the Sea of Galilee and walked the dusty streets of Nazareth. He offered his life in a profound love for you and me on Good Friday. Then, the most powerful memory of all, he broke forth from the chains of death on the first Easter, with the promise of eternal life for all who believe in him. For forty days, he continued to walk the earth and was with the early church. Sometimes, his resurrected body confused the apostles and they thought he was a ghost, and other times he would cook fish for them on the shores of Galilee. That is their memory of him. And then, with the great promise of not leaving us orphans, that he would always be with us, and assuring us of the coming forth of the Holy Spirit, he ascended to the Father. Through the Holy Spirit, Jesus would also be present to us.



his is a bittersweet moment for the apostles: they are sad to see him depart, but they are vibrantly alive with his message to make him alive in their preaching by the grace of the Holy Spirit. How blessed we are as believers; we have the Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist; we enter into his death and resurrection at every Mass; the word of God in the Sacred Scriptures speaks to us.

The Holy Spirit makes Jesus alive in the wonder of creation, in the gift of life, of love, of family and friends, in the kind acts we can do for others and in the kind acts done for us. Jesus is so very present to us. Still, this feast also speaks to us that we now

have the task by the Spirit to make him present and visible in our world by how we live and act. We are also the real presence of God on earth when we are faithful to the Christian life. The mission of Jesus given to him by his Father is to continue through. The Church and our faith are not a mere memory of the Living God; it is our mission to continue to touch the broken world we live in with his love. I often quote to you and to myself the prayer that is located at the Central Avenue entrance of our church:

Christ has no body now on earth but yours, no hands, no feet but yours. Yours are the eyes with which Christ looks out his compassion to the world. Yours are the feet with which he is to go about doing good. Yours are the hands with which he is to bless us now. - Saint Teresa of Avila

**RELIGIOUS FREEDOM: STATES SUE OVER HHS' STRONGER CONSCIENCE PRO-TECTIONS FOR DOCTORS, NURSES:** Catholic News Agency (CNA) 5/2019: Washington D.C., May 22, 2019: An array of states and cities filed a lawsuit against a new Department of Health and Human Services rule allowing medical professionals to refuse to take part in procedure because of religious or conscientious objections.

The suit filed May 21 in the US District Court for the Southern District of New York claims the conscience provision illegally favors healthcare workers over patients. The HHS Rule, announced May 2 and published May 21 in the Federal Register, strengthens a series of laws intended to protect the conscience rights of

doctors and nurses. It is due to take effect two months from its publication in the Federal Register.

Under the rule, medical providers may opt out of direct participation, as well as having to refer patients to other providers who will perform procedures to which they object, such as abortion and sterilization. Roger Severino, director of the HHS' new Conscience and Religious Freedom Division, has said the rule "ensures that healthcare entities and professionals won't be BULLIED out of the health care field because they decline to participate in actions that violate their conscience, including taking of human life." "Protecting conscience and religious freedom not only fosters greater diversity in healthcare, IT'S THE LAW," he stated. "Finally, laws prohibiting government funded discrimination against conscience and religious freedom will be enforced like every other civil rights law."

New York is leading the suit against the new rule; its co-plaintiffs are Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Illinois, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Vermont, Virginia, and Wisconsin, as well as the District of Columbia, Chicago, New York City, and Cook County, Ill. The plaintiffs say the rule would force some healthcare facilities to hire more staff in case there are too many conscientious objectors to provide requested procedures. The text of the rule acknowledges that several submissions were made during consultation regarding the possible limitation on access to abortion and sterilization in some communities, saying these submissions proved the inadequacy of previous conscience protections. "The Department observed that it was contradictory to argue, as many commenters did, both that the rule would decrease access to care and that the then-current conscience protections for providers were sufficient," the rule reads.

"If the Department's new rule would decrease access to care because of an increase in providers' exercise of conscientious objections, it would seem that the statutory protections that existed before the regulation did not result in providers fully exercising their consciences as protected by law."
