The Pastor's Letter

The human heart is exquisitely fragile. Our judgments need to be gentle, our understanding deep, and our forgiveness wide.

For many years, I was involved in a wonderful weekend program called Engaged Encounter. This program is still going and I consider it one of the best ways couples can prepare for the Sacrament of Marriage. The talks are given by married couples and a priest. There is also a very structured method to assist couples in speaking about the key issues of marriage.

I recall that we would have a question and answer session on Saturday night, and it seemed that any questions asked

about sex were referred to me, the celibate priest. I think the team couples were a bit reluctant to address such an intimate topic. (So was I) Many of us who are older grew up in a time when there were little conversations about sex and sexuality. Although it was not the official teaching of the Catholic Church, I would admit that most of what the priests and nuns said was mostly about the dangers and sins that could happen due to the misuse of this gift from God. I say that because the Catholic Church has always taught that sexual intimacy in marriage is a sacrament. As we know a sacrament is a holy experience of encountering God through the power of the Holy Spirit.

Now our society seems to constantly talk about sex and sexuality on talk shows, in songs and movies, on the internet, and in books and magazines. The 1960s, with the easy availability of birth control, has been called *The Age of the Sexual Revolution*. Now, fifty years later, I wonder if it delivered on all that it promised. Are people happier and more moving today than in the past? Are families stronger today than in previous decades? My answer is a strong no. I believe that our society has lost its way in terms of the sacredness and genuine meaning of sexual intimacy. I recall a famous scene from the movie, *The Graduate*, starring Dustin Hoffman as Benjamin and Ann Bancroft as Mrs. Robinson. When Mr. Robinson finds out about the affair between Benjamin and his wife, he is raging angry at the young man. Benjamin's response is classic. He says, *Mr. Robertson, it didn't mean anything! It was just like shaking hands!* It didn't mean anything may well be where our modern culture sees sex and sexual expression.

Recently, I read an article by a well-respected priest named Ronald Rolheiser. I thought the article had great wisdom about sex and sexuality. Rolhesier begins by saying that he rarely talks about sex since most people see priests as not truly understanding since they are celibate. He quotes an author named Gary Gutting:

Writing in an issue of Commonweal (September 23, 2016), Gary Gutting says: "We do, however, need an ethics of sexuality, and the starting point should be the realization that sex is not 'fun'. That is, it's not an enjoyable activity that we can safely detach from things that really matter. Sex isn't like telling a joke, drinking good wine, or watching a basketball game. It's not just that sex is more intense; it also taps emotional and moral depths that ordinary pleasures don't. Core human values such as love, respect, and self-identity are always in play. 'Casual sex' is a dangerous illusion. Sex is a problem for us mainly because we conflate it with fun."

Father Rolheiser goes on to describe the evolving societal changes toward sex that many of us have witnessed:

Can sex begin and end as just fun? Many within our culture today would say yes. It seems this is what we have evolved to. Until the 1950s, our dominant sexual ethos tied sex to both marriage and having children. Sex was considered moral when it was shared inside of a marriage and was open to conception. The 1960s excised the part about sex being tied to having children as birth control became acceptable within the culture. But sex still needed to be within a marriage. Pre-marital and extra-marital sex, though prevalent, were still not seen as morally acceptable.

The 70s and 80s changed that. Our culture came to accept sex outside of marriage, providing it was consensual and loving. Sex, in effect, became an extension of dating. Today's generation was born and raised inside that ethos. Finally the 1990s and the new millennium brought still a more radical shift, namely, "hook-up" sex; sex where soul, emotion, and commitment, are deliberately excluded from the relationship. For many people today, sex can be understood as purely recreational – and still moral – purely for fun.

God has made us sexual beings. Sexual intimacy is about expressing love and physical union. Sex also invites human beings to be co-creators with God in bringing forth human life. What could be more awesome than such a reality? Thus, it is our faith that says sexual intimacy is reserved for marriage since it is such a powerful force in our lives physically, psychologically, emotionally, and spiritually. To reduce this divine gift to casualness, a hooking up, is to cheapen that which is sacred and leading to the possibility of hurting the other and ourselves.


People struggle with their sexuality. It is a powerful force that can lead us to choose behaviors that are not in line with our moral teachings and traditions. Many of us fail at times in controlling our passions. God is merciful. Grace is powerful. Sexual failures often bring on great guilt that can often lead to further weaknesses. Although sexuality is a key aspect of life, this is only one area of so many that a disciple of Jesus is called to live. Even more difficult than chastity for many of us is the call to love our neighbors, our enemies, the poor and needy.

The article I am writing about ends with these words that capture what I think is a profound truth: What's to be said about this? Can sex be purely for fun? My answer is the same as Gutting's. Sex purely for fun doesn't work because, try as might, we cannot extricate sex from soul. In the end, sex just for fun is not fun – except in fantasy, in ideology divorced from reality, and in naive novels and movies. For the sensitive, it invariably brings heartache, and to the insensitive it invariably brings hard-heartedness. To everyone it brings sexual exploitation. Most seriously, it leads to a certain loss of soul. When soulfulness is not given its rightful place within sexuality, worse still when it is deliberately excluded, we end up selling ourselves short, not properly honoring ourselves or others, and at the end of the day this results in neither happiness within ourselves nor proper respect of others. Soul is a commodity worth protecting, particularly in sex. If you wish the read the entire article, Google: What We Haven't Got Right About Sex by Ronald Rolheiser.



With the stucco painting of the Church now finished, all the projects that were planned for the capital campaign have been completed. From looking at this report, the first thing that is so very clear is the amazing generosity of our parishioners. The excellent development company we hired told me that we would struggle to reach the goal of \$1,500,000, saying it would more likely be in the range of \$1,200,000. The quality of generosity which reflects a deep love of the parish and our Catholic faith

is a core value that I have seen in our parishioners for the past eight years.

We did consider turning the auditorium into a gymnasium but we ultimately found it beyond what we could afford. We also considered an elevator for the school but that was judged well beyond our price range. The handicap ramp leading into the school cafeteria was not in our original plans, but I am happy that we were able to do this. When the original campaign was planned, we said that if there were any leftover funds that they would be used for the ongoing care of our parish plant. So, the parish has \$160,337.00 still remaining in the campaign fund.

I am so grateful and humbled by all you did in the *Paving the Way for Christ Campaign*. A special thanks to our chair people, Kate Mayerhofer and Martin Meaney, to our building committee under the excellent leadership of John McCarthy, to Steve Descovich who did a great deal of work for the renovation of the food pantry, to T. J. Hance, our former plant manager, to Barbara Amoroso, our former finance manager who kept excellent records throughout the campaign, to Genny Mitchell for clerical work, and to Dirk Wojtczack, the diocesan representative who was most helpful to us. I thank the local funeral homes who were very supportive of the campaign: Arthur F. White, Frederick J. Chapey, Charles J. O'Shea and Vernon C. Wagner Funeral Homes. Congratulations to the Parishioners of St. Martin of Tours and to all donors.





RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY

U.S. SUPREME COURT WILL SOON DECIDE "PEACE CROSS" FIRST AMENDMENT CASE. (CNA) Washington D.C. June/2019. Before the month is out, the US Supreme Court is expected to issue its decision in an establishment clause case with the potential to create a new standard for dealing with problems related to RELI-

GIOUS LIBERTY, RELIGIOUS SYMBOLS, and the relationship between religion and public life. The Case: The American Legion v. American Humanist Association, hinges on the legality of the BLANDENSBURG PEACE CROSS: a 40 foot stone cross that was erected in 1925 in Prince George's County, Maryland. The cross honors those from the area who were killed in World War I. The Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission has performed regular maintenance around the monument since 1961, as it is located on a median in the middle of a public road. This, the American Humanist Association has argued, is entangling government unnecessarily with religion.

Joe Davis, legal counsel for the Becket Fund for Religious Liberty, told CNA that things appeared to be positive during oral arguments, and that "at least five" of the justices indicated that they felt as though the cross monument was legal. Oral arguments do not, however, always reflect what the justices decide months later. If the Supreme Court does rule in favor of keeping the peace cross, it is increasingly likely that they would have to use a new sort of legal test to justify how the cross is constitutional. Since 1971, the Supreme Court has used the LEMON TEST to decide these cases, something Davis described as "wildly inconsistent." The application of the Lemon Test has led to some religious symbols being found constitutional, and others not.

"The parties defending the cross argued that the Lemon Test should be replaced by a coercion test, when you ask if government action is coercing some religious exercise," said Davis. "And if it's not, it's not an establishment clause violation. The Becket lawyers argued what Davis termed a "Historical Approach," which would put the action in the context of what the founders of the U. S. intended when they created the establishment of the First Amendment. The Supreme Court heard oral arguments of the case in February. The court's term ends at the end of the month, meaning that the decision will be released shortly.
