The Pastor's Letter

I usually love the month of July since it is the time that I usually go on vacation to the Outer Banks and the Poconos. When I am on vacation, I often have the feeling that I wish I could make the clocks go more slowly and make the days last longer. Since we have first heard about the decision made by our Provincial Council to return the pastoral care of St. Martin's to the diocese, I have that same feeling about time. I wanted each day here at St. Martin's to pass more slowly and that August 1st, 2019 would stay far away in the distance.

Now we are in July, I feel that way more than ever. This weekend, we have the first of our two special Masses to mark this time of transition. When I reluctantly began to think about how to plan our farewell, I had two ideas in mind: the first is that a Mass of Thanksgiving should be celebrated to mark the thirty-three years that the Redemptorists have shared life and ministry with the parishioners of St. Martin's. Initially, I was using the words since *the Redemptorists served at St. Martin's* but eventually begin to see that I could express this idea far better with the words *shared life and ministry*. We have been experiencing life and faith together for thirty three years. I know that our Order has blessed you and you have equally blessed us. So, together, this weekend we lift our hearts in gratitude for all the blessings we have received.

Certainly, our common thanksgiving goes first as always to Almighty God, the Source of all life and grace. We give thanks to you, Heavenly Father, for all you have given to us over these years. We thank the Diocese of Rockville Centre for the invitation that they gave the Congregation thirty-three years ago to come and share in the life of St. Martin of Tours Parish. It was Bishop John McGann who invited us into the diocese. We are so very grateful to him, and to his successors Bishops James McHugh, William Murphy, and John Barres for all their support and many kindnesses shown to us over the years. We thank the auxiliary Bishops who have celebrated Confirmations so beautifully in our parish and offered us their wisdom and guidance, along with the talented and supportive staff of the diocese. I can testify that they have been an enormous help to me during my eight years as pastor.

I have found the clergy, the priests and deacons of Rockville Centre to have always been welcoming to us at any gatherings or meetings we attended. They hold the Redemptorists in high regard as do we them. They are gifted pastoral men. I have a special place in my heart for religious women, perhaps because my dear Sister Gerry was a Sister of St. Joseph of Brentwood, but I know that religious Sisters served here at the parish and in diocesan offices with great generosity. I would say the same about the religious Brothers who minister in this diocese. The Redemptorists have been blessed to serve with such men and women over the past thirty three years.

We thank God for the local funeral homes that have been so very respectful of our policies and very generous to us. The same is true for many local merchants who made donations to our parish for various events. There are so many that I will avoid naming names since I do not want to leave anyone out.

I would not be able to do justice in thanking the parishioners for all that they have done for the Redemptorists over the past three decades. Some of you struggled to say goodbye to your last diocesan pastor and team since you so loved them. First, you welcomed us kindly. But, you quickly allowed yourselves to come to know us, and allow us to know you. You began to embrace our ideas and support them with enthusiasm. You shared your enthusiasm for the life and the ministry of the parish with us. You worried about us and our various health concerns.

You mourned with us when we lost Fathers John Radley, Tom Schmidt, Vincent Crotty, George Keaveney, and Brendan Greaney. Sharing grief creates a very deep and lasting bond. Together, we wept for Deacons Frank Carrillo, Jim Biggin, and Gene Capobianco, and so many wonderful and dear parishioners who are now in the halls of heaven. Together, we celebrated musicals, dances, baptisms, block parties, first communions, confirmations, Easter Vigils, weddings, anniversaries, jubilees, summer nights in your backyards, visits to the hospital, prayers for people we loved, confessed sins, shared worries, hurricanes and snow storms. All is grace.

On July 28, we will have another Mass and celebration with the focus on sending us Redemptorists, both past and present, with the prayers, blessings, gratitude and love of the parishioners. Then, in August, there will be the official welcoming of Father Christopher Costigan as pastor and Father Sylvester Ileka as associate pastor.

Our parish has prepared a beautiful book named *Plentiful Redemption*. Under the guidance of our skilled editor Lucy McNamara, you, the parishioners, wrote magnificent tributes of praise and love to God, to the Redemptorists and to each other. I cried when I read it for the first time and now it will be a treasure to me as I move on.

The title *Plentiful Redemption* comes from Psalm 130, *With Lord There is Plentiful Redemption*. St. Alphonsus Liguori used this verse from the Bible when he created the Redemptorist coat of arms. The words on the Seal of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, the Redemptorists, are in Latin: *Copiosa Apud Eum Redemptio (With Him is Plentiful Redemption)*. For thirty three years, and over the almost 100 years of this parish, God has been blessing St. Martin of Tours with his plentiful redemption.

"Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him."

Do you remember the first time that you went out to eat as a child? The first thing the waiter or waitress did was give you a nice, cold glass of water, handed you a menu, and then brought a plate of delicious bread. After you took your third piece, your mother said to you, *don't eat too much bread; you'll spoil your appetite!* Whenever I have a wedding for a couple, I email them a little questionnaire about the story of their falling in love and wanting to marry. I use what they write to help me prepare their wedding homily. Many of the stories tell about the first time one of them cooked a meal for the other. More

often than I expected, many fellows invite their special date to a meal that he cooks. As a priest, I have been invited to many home cooked meals. I suppose that is kind of obvious as you see me. The family humbles me by how much they go all out to make me welcomed and how much effort they put into making a special meal. Very often, a meal is a great sign of showing love for another person. The bags upon bags of food that you bring every weekend to the red wagon are a clear sign of the love and commitment that our parish has to provide for those who are hungry.

But food, like every other wonder and gift from God, can become taken for granted. Father Denis and I have a priest friend who always says when you go to a restaurant with him: *Listen, we are not here to eat, but we are here to dine.* I do have a memory that has stayed with me from my days in the college seminary. I am not quite sure why, but we must have been served roast beef at least twice a week. I am not sure if they figured we were too young to worry about cholesterol, or we were growing young men, or perhaps they found a discount beef market, but there was a steady diet of roast beef. It was prepared well and always delicious. Yet, it is the nature of seminarians, and I suppose all groups in any institution, to complain about the food. So, when this delicious roast beef would be served, we would grumble like the people in the desert to Moses, and say, *roast beef again!* Countless people would love to have such a meal. I suppose you can take for granted any food, but I have found that yet to be true for pizza or chocolate.

God loves us and continues to feed us with our daily bread, the body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ. Jesus was born in a village named Bethlehem which is translated *House of Bread*. He was placed as a newborn in a manger - a place of food for animals. He multiplied loaves to feed those who followed him because they were hungry for the good news of Jesus. His first miracle was at a wedding so a party could continue. When he forgave sins, he called for celebratory meals. The Prodigal Son is welcomed home with the fatted calf. The risen Jesus breaks bread and cooks fish for the apostles on the shores of Galilee. The disciples recognize Jesus at Emmaus in the breaking of the bread. At the Last Supper on the night before he dies, Jesus takes bread, breaks it and shares it with his apostles with the words: *This is my body;* then taking the wine, *This is my blood - the blood of the new and everlasting covenant which will be shed for you.* Every Mass, be it celebrated at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome with the Pope, or in a tiny room in a prison serving as a chapel, moves us into the dying and rising of Jesus. Our lives become co-mingled with His.

Chapter six of John's gospel offers us striking words about the Eucharist. Jesus tells the crowd that *they must eat his body and drink his blood to enter into the kingdom of God*. Imagine how these words are heard. Is this man suggesting we become cannibals? Is he a madman? Perhaps, He means this as a kind of metaphor, a symbolic act. Jesus quickly challenges this idea: *For my flesh is real food and my blood is real drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in them. Just as the living Father sent me and I live because of the Father, so the one who feeds on me will live because of me*. Jesus does not back down. He, as the popular phrase goes, doubles down on what he has said. The Gospels tell us that many walk away from Jesus at this moment. Our Lord does not chase them and try to convince them. There will be no compromise about the Eucharist.

The Church gives us this annual Feast of Corpus Christi, the Body of Christ, to remind us and challenge us to seek to truly understand what a gift Jesus has given us. He has given us himself. I wonder if you and I are like the ushers at great Broadway shows like *Hamilton* or *Wicked*. They have seen the show so many times that they get used to it and take the show for granted and almost come to be bored by it.

I struggle with this in my own faith life. Between Sunday Masses, daily Masses, funerals and weddings, over 44 years of priesthood, it is hard to resist allowing the Eucharist to become almost a routine. Distractions can fill my head with thoughts about what I need to do after Mass. When I take the host and drink the cup, God has entered into me in an intimate and profound way. I pray for faith to deepen my love of the Eucharist.

Do we receive reverently? Do we arrive late for Mass and leave at the first moment possible? Am I checking my cellphone or reading the bulletin during Mass? I say these words not in judgment, but because I know well my own need to grow in love of the Eucharist and invite you to consider how you might grow in appreciation for the words: *Body of Christ*.

I have often seen a haunting sign in the sacristies of some Churches that call me to examine myself: *O Priest of God, say this Mass as though it were your first Mass, your last Mass, your only Mass*. We too can ponder these words: *O People of God, celebrate this Mass as if it were your first mass, your last Mass, your only Mass. Amen*.

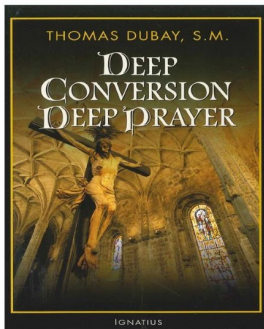

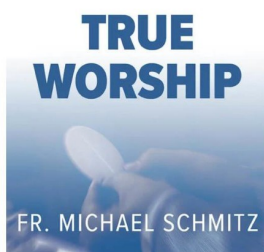

2019 MASS SCHEDULE AND OTHER INFORMATION

Beginning July 13th and 14th the weekend Masses are as follows: Saturday at 5PM
Sunday at 7:30AM, 10AM, 12:00PM & 5:30PM.

Confession: Saturday at 2PM in the Church or by appointment.

The weekday 6:30AM Mass will continue up to and including Wednesday, July 31st. Beginning August 1, 2019, Mass will be celebrated at 9AM from Monday to Saturday.

MULTIPLE INTENTIONS: For the Saturday 9AM Mass, we will continue to accept multiple intentions up to 4 intentions. However, one Sunday Mass can be designated for multiple intentions up to 4 intentions, thereby allowing for eight intentions in total each weekend.

December 24, 25, 31 and January 1, 2020: As of now the Mass times have not been selected, but we can accept Mass intentions for any other dates in December.

The intention "People of the Parish" has always been at the 7AM Mass on Sunday, however, Father Christopher Costigan, our soon-to-be pastor would like this intention to be rotated each week. For instance, beginning Saturday, July 13th at 5PM, the intention will be People of the Parish. The next Mass for this intention will be at 7:30AM on July 21, then at 10AM on July 28th and so on.

The same is true for holy days of obligation. On August 14th, the 7PM Vigil Mass of the Assumption will have the People of the Parish as the Mass intention. The next holy day is All Saints, so the People of the Parish intention will be at the 9AM Mass on November 1st and so on.

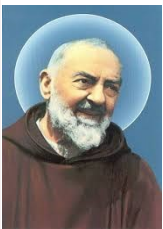

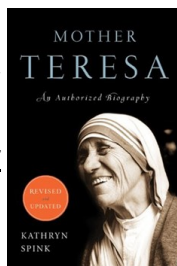

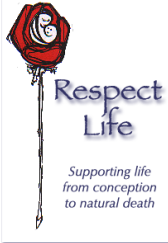

**RESPECT LIFE MINISTRY**

STUDENTS FOR LIFE "Abolish abortion in our lifetime." That's the goal of Student's for Life of America, an organization dedicated to advancing the pro-life perspective among young people today, and their goal is not merely theoretical. Through a dedicated field program on college campuses across the country, a pro-life leadership development program, and the largest yearly national pro-life conference, they are making it their everyday mission to abolish abortion.

According to their mission statement, "Students for Life exists to transform culture by helping young people make abortion unthinkable and obsolete on their campus, in their community, and in our nation." Students for Life of America (SFLA) has gone from less than 200 campus groups to more than 1,000 groups in all 50 states. There are several reasons why SFLA focuses their field program efforts on college campuses. 52% of abortion-seeking women are under 25. When faced with an unplanned pregnancy, many of these young women go looking for help from organizations like Planned Parenthood. Planned Parenthood is usually located near college campuses, with nearly 79% within 5 miles of a college.

The organization's mission is based on the notion that the high school and college years are often when world views are challenge and formed. "This generation values relationships intensely and values just treatment of all," says SFLA's president Kristan Hawkins, "and they have the good hearts needed to love them both - mother and preborn child." "The pro-life generation is motivated by human rights concerns and sees the needs of both mothers and preborn infants as equally important."

Students for Life America created the largest searchable database of pregnancy resources available near college campuses: (PregnantOnCampus.org) which allows students to search their areas for assistance with housing, financial aid, maternity clothes, child care and more. The database is simply a means to offer students options, because when pregnant women are given options, they are less likely to feel like they are being forced to choose between their child and their education.

Now, more than ever, students facing unplanned pregnancies are able to choose a life-giving option - to either parent or place their child for adoption - after making use of the services offered through this database. They want these women to know that they don't have to make that heart wrenching choice; that there is a group of students willing to help these young mothers with their physical, emotional and spiritual needs. *source: Focus on the Family*
