The Pastor's Letter



The view from my desk

I am not sure if anyone likes packing to move, unless of course they are on the way to Hawaii. I am not sure if I could make an episode of Hoarders, but I am not too far from it. Knowing that I would be leaving St. Martin's on August 1st, I slowly did some preliminary work. Almost all the books that are in the parish library were once mine. I must confess that I might have read at best 5% of them. So that was my first major step in preparing to downsize as I prepare to move. Yet, I am still deciding what remaining books to keep and what books to bring with me. Some are favorites that I have read and may want to use in the future for a quote, and others are books that I may want to read. I am still sorting out

books and donating them (our parish library is filled). With so many movies available On Demand on television, I am also donating many of DVDs to a veterans group that comes and picks up donations. And in full disclosure, many of them I have never taken the time to watch.

I have been carrying on a war of attrition on my two closets and dresser that contain more clothes than Macy's on Seventh Avenue. I have clothes in every size and shape. As I look lovingly on one of my favorite sweaters, I wonder if I will ever wear a size L again. How many Mets shirts does a man need? I love tee shirts. I have tee shirts from different countries I have visited, as well as historical and religious sites, parish and Redemptorist tee shirts, ones that were given to me personally with special words on them, and tees that celebrate my favorite television shows. Almost every one of them has a memory attached - some were gifts and others were places and events that I enjoyed sharing with family and friends. I find them hard to let go of. If I wear a sports coat, other than a black clerical blazer, more than once a year that would be a lot. So, why do I need three Irish tweed jackets? I have a pair of pants that were once torn and repaired by my mother. Hard to say good-bye to them even though they are better suited for someone with a 38 waist.

I have a great collection of pens and reading glasses. I would be embarrassed to tell you how many reading glasses I have. Granted, I lose a pair every three days, and break a pair at least once a week. I think after doing a purge of so many of them, I still have enough to get me into my nineties. I am always in search of the perfect pen. A few pens I have were expensive gifts but most of my pens come from pubs I have visited, funeral homes I have attended, and banks where I did business. Oftentimes, a visitor will ask if he can use one of my pens, and I will say sure. The first ten he or she tries do not work. Father McGowan often teases me that I have more than 100 pens and I still cannot write a legible word.



I do find the hardest things to part with are gifts and personal items that were given to me by people that I love and have been so kind to me. I have precious gifts from the

summer Bible camps, from my 40th priesthood jubilee, gifts given in love at Christmas and birthdays. I have statues of my favorite saints and a bobble head of Pope Francis along with another bobble head of me. I have a piece of The Brooklyn Bridge that was sold during its 100th centenary, a chair from the Mets' locker room, a piece of Ebbets Field, and a sword from when I became a Fourth Degree Knight of Columbus.



I have a great painting of the New York St. Patrick's Parade, a framed picture of Saint John Paul II and myself, a picture signed by Mookie Wilson and Bill Buckner from the 6th game of the 1986 World Series,



a great picture of Grand Central Station (where my father worked for more than 40 years, a picture I took of the sun setting over Lake Erie (where I spent ten years), a crucifix made up of wood from a bush planted when I was born with the corpus of Christ from the cross on my mother's casket, the haunting image of the three firemen raising the American flag over the ruins of the World Trade Center, and a picture of the lake in Ireland where my mother and father grew up. And that is not all of them!

It is hard enough to let go of clothes and books, but some of my possessions bring me to sacred moments. Packing, sorting out and letting go, is not easy. As I write, I am struck by the irony that I am a man with a vow of poverty. Presently, I am reading a book on Mother Teresa for our next book club meeting. Her sisters lived as poor women with the poorest people on earth. I know that I should and need to live a more simple life.

I also know that many of the possessions I have were gifts given to me in love. How blessed I am to know such people and to be so touched and surrounded by their love. I love symbols and what I call ordinary sacramentals. Yet, as I struggle to decide what I should let go of and what I will keep, I do know that my memories, God willing, will be with me. A picture or special gift coffee cup is precious, but far more blessed is the bond that I shared and continue to share with the persons I carry in my mind and heart. God is good all the time.

As many of you have heard, a few years ago, I went to the Holy Land, and Jordan and Egypt. One of our stops was Mount Sinai, the site where Moses encountered God in a burning bush and was told: "Do not come any closer," God said. "Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy ground." It was here on Mount Sinai that Moses received the Ten Commandments. I was excited to be at such a holy place. The tradition is to climb the 5,000 foot mountain, beginning at about 3:00 a.m. so you can see the sunrise from the mountaintop. I was determined to do this, but a friend I made on the

pilgrimage told me not to go. He was afraid that it might be too difficult for me. He started telling me about people who have heart attacks climbing this mountain. That was quite encouraging! So, I decided to ride a camel to the top of the mountain. Again, Alex said riding a camel was even harder than walking. Finally, I reluctantly decided not to go. So, when the pilgrims from our group came back from the trip they were sore and worn out. A woman who had ridden a camel had huge sores and bruises. I remember telling this story one day here at Mass and saying with great seriousness that Alex may have saved my life. One of the parishioners at the door said to me, I think Alex may have saved the camel's life also.

We are standing on holy ground And there are thousands of angels All around Let us praise Jesus now We are standing in His presence on holy ground I love the image of Holy Ground. It is certain sacred space where we encounter the Living God in a very profound way. Holy Ground is wherever the human and the divine touch. The Irish refer to it as a thin place where the lines between Heaven and earth are very thin. It is a place of grace. I was an assistant for nine years to the first Redemptorist pastor who came to St. Martin's: Father George Keaveney. We became close friends. I remember when he went to the hospital and found he had terminal cancer with a short time to live, he asked for three things: his rosary, a few donuts, and a novel. He chose at that moment of such

dark news to continue to live and enjoy the gifts of God. Shortly before he died, he quoted Therese of Lisieux to his sister, Margie, it's all grace. When my sister Gerry died at the young age of 45, I was inconsolable. I could not give a homily so my dear friend Father McGowan spoke. Gerry loved Irish stepdancing and Father John ended his moving sermon with a quote from the poet W. H. Auden, when grace comes you have to dance.

For almost a hundred years, people have of faith have come to this sacred place, St. Martin of Tours Church, and have danced in the living waters of grace. A century ago, lay people from the town of Bethpage walked the railroad tracks to Hicksville so they could receive the Body and Blood of Christ at Mass. In 1917 several laymen approached the Bishop and asked for a priest and a parish. By 1923, like the persistent widow in the Gospel, they had worn him down and he allowed a parish to be formed, with a church to be built, much of which still remains to this day, built by the hand working hands of the parishioners who dragged the wood from their



farms so to share in the building of this church. Over the past century, much of the grace-filled ministry of this parish has been served by the Diocesan Clergy of Brooklyn and Rockville Centre. Soon, these skillful men of God will again take up that call.

Today, we the Redemptorists, stand in humble reverence at the amazing grace of God that we have shared with you over the past thirty-three years. We will be forever grateful to the Bishops, clergy and people of Rockville Centre who have welcomed us into your homes and hearts. When an Irishman wants to greet another Irish person, he says, *Cead Mile Failte - a hundred thousand welcomes*. Today, we the members of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer say to Almighty God and to the Diocese of Rockville Centre and to the Parishioners of St. Martin's, *One Hundred Thousand THANKS* for allowing us to share on this holy ground with all of you.

The words on our Redemptorist Seal are: **With Him There is Plentiful Redemption**. (Latin: Copiosa Eum Redemptio). Many of you shared in a book bearing that same name, or shared it at other times at wakes, at hospital rooms, wedding receptions, block parties, Golden Harvest nights, the birth of children, times of national disaster, parish tragedies and times of the horror of terrorism. Sometimes, there were tears and grief and at other moments laughter and joy. Together, we experienced the powerful and awesome grace of God's plentiful redemption and stood on holy ground.



In today's Gospel, we heard the account of the joyful experiences of the apostles returning home to with Jesus and telling him of their excitement about their first missionary experience. I will share just a few of your words from the book Plentiful Redemption on of how we stood on holy ground and experienced the grace of God in our midst

- I remember the day we all needed someone and Father was there to help. It was the days following September 11th. My son's friend, who was only 19, had been killed by a drunk driver. Father comforted me and prayed for this young man and his family.
- I will always remember what Father did for my family on Christmas Day 2010. In a raging snowstorm, during what was probably the hour he was enjoying his Christmas dinner, he answered our emergency call within minutes, and came to North Shore Plainview Hospital to give Last Rites to my mother.
- I can never forget the love and compassion that the Redemptorist priests showed to the homebound parishioners when they needed a visitforconfessionandspecialblessings.
- Iremember the day when I needed someone and Father scored a HAT TRICK against the FDNY team!!
- Just the thought of St. Martin's parish still puts a smile onmy face! You took agreen, in experienced seminarian newbie and nurtured and prayed him through the stages of religious brother, transitional deacon and finally into a priest!
- During Lentthat year, I was called to receive the sacrament. Truly, the confessor had the spirit of St. Alphonsus, patron of confessors (Ihadn'tyetknowStAlphonsus). It was raining out when I entered the Church, but the Son was shining bright when I left that day... I am grateful.
- I never missed my family or friends back home because God literally arranged for me at St. Martin of Tours for a bigger family, more friends and more of everything than I needed to carry His mission.
- How many pastors do you know who sit a water tank letting people dunk him? Our parish had its own dunking priest.

I began with the story of the poor donkey whose life was saved by Alex. I'll end with the story of the poor priest who was saved by his people. After my dunking, many parishioners said never do that again Father, you could get hurt. We love our priests. As someone recently wrote to me, there is so much love in this parish.

Thank you Lord for the thirty three years that Redemptorist shared holy ground with the parishioners of St. Martin's, For thirty three years we had the joy of dancing in the grace of God with all of you on what will always be for us Holy Ground.






