The Pastor's Letter



Fr. Sylvester and I would like to thank you for the warm welcome we received last weekend. It's a great sign of the spirit and warmth of the Parish and a great encouragement for us. We will rotate the Mass schedule this weekend so during these first two weeks each of us will have had all of the weekend Masses. With exceptions for special events and schedules, we will generally alternate Masses each weekend.

Thank you for your understanding with the changing of the Sunday Mass schedule in early July. I know change can be difficult and we all get into routines. Father Pat and the parish staff, with input from me as the incoming pastor, discussed a lot of different variables and came up with a schedule that we think will work for all.

One of the changes on the schedule was the elimination of the second scheduled time for confessions after the Saturday evening 7pm Mass. Please know that we will be adding confession times! My goal is to have confession times scheduled 7 days a week here at Saint Martin! We will be keeping the Saturday 2pm time and adding times the other 6 days. Right now, I am thinking we will add time either before or after the Sunday 5:30pm Mass and either before or after the 9am Mass during the week. I just want to take a few weeks to evaluate what will work better for the parish and for the priests. If you have any ideas, please let me know!

Also, regarding confessions, we are currently working on glass inserts for the doors of the two confessionals for the protection of priest and penitent. I am also considering how to add a confessional or at least some sort of screen to the parish office so that anyone who stops by for confession during the day can use it. By Church law and practice confessions are to be heard in a confessional except for unusual circumstances. This would allow for that. Also, <u>both</u> the priest and the penitent have the right to a fixed screen to celebrate the sacrament. In other words, both the priest and the penitent must agree in order to use the face to face exception in the sacrament.

Over the next few weeks I would like all of the heads of ministries and parish groups to contact me to set up a meeting, so you can let me know the great work you are doing as well as any ideas you have for improvement. The easiest way to contact me for appointments is by email (<u>fathercostigan@gmail.com</u>). You could also call the office and leave a message. I encourage all parishioners to always feel free to email me with any questions, ideas, or concerns!

This coming Thursday, August 15, is the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, <u>a Holy Day of Obligation</u>. Masses will be Wednesday evening at 7pm and Thursday at 9am, 12 noon, and 7pm.

August 11, 2019 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Our Church continues to suffer as a result of past sins of sexual abuse of minors. Victim survivors of abuse and their families also continue to carry the terrible effects of that abuse. We pray that the fire of the Holy Spirit may descend upon the Church to purify and sanctify her. It is also important that we are all aware of recent developments that will cause uncertainty and present serious challenges for us in the months and perhaps years ahead.

Governor Andrew Cuomo signed the Child Victims Act (CVA) into law last February. The CVA suspends for one year any statute of limitations associated with alleged sexual abuse of a minor. This law will allow currently time-barred lawsuits to be brought against individuals as well as public and private institutions, regardless of how many years or even decades ago the abuse may have taken place.

When the one-year window to file lawsuits opens on August 14, 2019, hundreds, if not thousands of lawsuits are expected to be filed across New York State against dioceses, parishes, municipalities, public schools, hospitals and a broad range of not-for-profit charitable organizations, both religious and non-religious. The financial impact of this law may be far reaching.

However, if we are people of the Paschal Mystery, we enter the unknown with what we do know - that the death, resurrection and ascension of Jesus Christ will sustain and strengthen us in the days ahead. The power of the Resurrection overcomes despair.

No doubt, we will hear about many past failures. We will again hear the heart wrenching stories of victim survivors. I have personally met with survivors of abuse, their families, friends and loved ones. I have listened at a deep level to their stories of tragedy, betrayal, trauma and their heroic efforts to engage in the process of healing. Their lifelong wounds of trauma run so deep, that only the warmth of the Holy Spirit can begin to touch, relieve and heal them. Together, we pray that the fire of the Holy Spirit brings the light of true repentance and reform, moving the Church to continue listening and responding with the humility and compassion of Jesus Christ.

It is also important that we be aware of what is already happening and has been happening for many years in our Diocese as to the extraordinary work that goes into child protection. First, the Diocesan Office for the Protection of Children and Young People was established in 2003. Many years of hard work have made this office one which puts the safety and well-being of children first, and seeks to reach out to and support victim survivors of abuse. It works to ensure the screening and training of every person who works in or volunteers for the Church. If you are an employee or a volunteer in your parish, you know about background checks, VIRTUS training and the call for every member of the Church to be vigilant in protecting children.

For years, we have worked closely with law enforcement whenever an allegation of abuse is made against a member of the clergy, an employee or volunteer in the Diocese of Rockville Centre. Our confidential hotline (516-594-9063) is closely monitored, and calls made to it are returned within 24 hours by a licensed mental health professional. Allegations of abuse are promptly reported to the appropriate district attorney's office and are thoroughly investigated. In addition, pastoral care and mental health support is offered to any abuse survivor who needs assistance.

These are just a few of the reforms, efforts and safeguards that have been in place since 2002 in our Diocese, and have made the Church on Long Island a truly safe environment. And we do not rest there. We continually work to discern the best ways to adjust and enhance our child protection practices, to raise consciousness in the Church and society about vigilance and to support survivors of abuse.

In 2017, we initiated our independent Reconciliation and Compensation Program (IRCP) to provide a confidential mechanism for survivors to receive compensation and some measure of healing and justice. We intend to continue this program for the foreseeable future, even after the CVA takes effect, so survivors can, if they wish, be heard in a fair, respectful, confidential and timely way. To date, 370 people have filed claims with our IRCP. The vast majority of claimants - 277 to be exact - have accepted compensation totaling just over \$50 million, with 75-80 claims still being processed.

We have worked diligently with our financial and legal advisors to assess our financial position and maximize the availability of insurance coverage to meet the demands that will likely be imposed by anticipated CVA litigation. Please also know that parish collections and financial donations made through the Catholic Ministries Appeal will continue to be used, consistent with our commitment to our parishioners, to support the Diocese, and its ministries and pursue the goals of the Catholic Ministry Appeal. The parish offertory and Catholic Ministry Appeal funds have not and will not be used to resolve claims for clergy sexual abuse.

The work of the Church - of administering the Sacraments, of teaching, healing, advocating, serving, and ministering to the poor and vulnerable - can and must continue, despite the sins of the past. I speak in greater detail about all of this, and about the Diocese's robust safe environment practices and commitment to them, in a Catholic Faith Network (CFN) special video which you can view on CFN television, the Diocesan website (www.drvc.org) and on Diocese of Rockville Centre social media platforms.

The coming months will require perseverance and prayer if we are to emerge even more dedicated to Christ's saving mission. As the opening of the CVA window takes place near the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin, we are reminded to turn to Mary our Mother and draw courage from the one who did not look away from her suffering Son. She waited patiently, suffered with Him, and shared in His victory over sin and death.

This is the same Mary who, as Mother of the Church, gathered with the Apostles in the locked room, waiting for the power of the Holy Spirit to descend at Pentecost. As we enter a time of Pascal Mystery suffering, may Mary guide us, so that together we may continue to carry out the mission of her Son: the building up of the Kingdom of God throughout Long Island and the world.

St. Martin of Tours CYO Basketball





U.S. BISHOPS: MASS SHOOTINGS ARE AN EPIDEMIC AGAINST LIFE

Washington D.C. (CNA): U.S. Bishops are calling for prayer and action in the wake of two mass shootings in El Paso, Texas and Dayton, Ohio. "We encourage all Catholics to increased prayer and sacrifice for healing and the end of these shootings. We encourage Catholics to pray and raise their voices for needed changes to our national policy and national culture as well. God's mercy and wisdom compel us to move toward preventative action."



On Saturday, August 3rd, a 21 year old man opened fire at a shopping complex in El Paso, Texas. He killed at least 20 people and injured more than two dozen others before he was taken into custody. The shooter reportedly published a four page document online in the hours before the attack, detailing his hatred toward immigrants. He also reportedly described the weapons he would use in the shooting. Less than 24 hours later, a 24 year old man fired an assault rifle in downtown Dayton, Ohio killing nine people and injuring more than two dozen others. Within one minute, Dayton police arrived and killed the shooter.

"The lives lost this weekend confront us with a terrible truth," the Bishops wrote. "We can never again believe that mass shootings are an isolated exception. They are an epidemic against life that we must, in justice, face. Something remains fundamentally evil in our society when locations where people congregate to engage in the everyday activities of life can, without warning, become scenes of violence and contempt for human life."

The Bishops repeated their call for President Trump and Congress to pass responsible gun legislation. "Once again, we call for effective legislation that addresses why these unimaginable and repeated occurrences of murderous gun violence continue to take place in our communities," the Bishops wrote. "As people of faith, we continue to pray for all the victims and for healing in these stricken communities. But action is needed to end these abhorrent crimes."

RESPECT LIFE OFFICE DRVC: We live in a culture of death, a culture torn by abortion and euthanasia, by wanton violence, war, murder and hatred. Life is treated as if it were cheap and many are the threats to the dignity of human life. Yet we believe that all human life is from God, and that he alone is the master of life and death. Blessed John Paul II made the defense of all human life the centerpiece of his pontificate. The death penalty presents itself as a complex moral issue because of apparent conflicting demands of justice on one hand and charity on the other. Some crimes are so serious and heinous that they seem to cry out for the ultimate punishment of death. And yet the Gospel message is forever one of forgiveness, of reconciliation, of committed charity toward all, without exceptions. Ref: The Death Penalty DRVC.
